This is THE DOGS OF WAR, a zine for the play of postal Diplomacy. DOGS is published every twenty-four days by John and Betty Daly at Route 2, Box 136-M5, Rockwell, NC 28138. Our phone number is (704) 857-1555. The subfee is ten issues for \$3.50, but that will probably change with the next postage rate increase. Wasn't the Postmaster General bragging last year about how they showed a big profit? Now he's complaining that they're losing money again.

The U.S. Orphan Service is looking for information on about fifty games that were started after 1978 but that have now disappeared. Details and a listing of the games are enclosed on an insert. Please look the info over to see if you can help the U.S.O.S. out.

The latest issue of DIPLOMACY WORLD contains an article on the new (1983) rulebook for Diplomacy. There have been some changes in the rules concerning convoys and I would like to discuss them. Rule XII.4 now reads: "MORE THAN ONE CONVOY ROUTE. If the orders as written permit more than one route by which the convoyed army could proceed from its source to its destination, the order is not void on account of this ambiguity; and the army is not prevented from moving due to dislodgement of fleets, unless all of the routes are disrupted." The old rule stated that a convoy would fail if the convoying army was given more than one convoy route. I've never seen it happen, but with the old rule a player could mess up an opponent's convoy simply by writing orders to convoy the same army by a different route. The new rule prevents this, but now a player can insure the success of his convoy by giving it two or more routes, and an opponent would have to disrupt all routes to stop the convoy.

Rule XII.6 has also been changed: "BOTH A CONVOY ROUTE AND AN OVER-LAND ROUTE. If an army could arrive at its destination either overland or by convoy, one route must be considered and the other disregarded, depending upon intent as shown by the totality of the orders written by the player governing the army." Without this rule, a player's move of A Bel-Hol could be made to fail by an opponent ordering F Nth C A Bel-Hol and then "accidentally" also writing F Nth hold. This double-ordering disrupts the only convoy route, but with the new rule the gamemaster can

assume that the convoy wasn't wanted by the player so it becomes irrelevent.

Maybe you don't think this stuff is too big a deal. But imagine a
case where a clever player provides an "unwanted convoy" under the old The gamemaster is stuck: strictly following the old rules, the clever player gets away with his plan to stop his opponent's moves, but the other guy swears he's been cheated. That's the stuff that arbitrations are made of, and arbitrations can disrupt a game.

Another rule change involves a situation I discussed back in DOGS#58. Rule XII.5 now reads: "A CONVOYED ATTACK DOES NOT CUT CERTAIN SUPPORTS. If a convoyed army attacks a fleet which is supporting an action in a body of water; and that body of water contains a convoying fleet, that support is not cut." That rule provides this adjudication:

FRANCE: A Tun-Rom; F Tyh C A Tun-Rom (dislodged); A Tus S A Tun-Rom. ITALY: F Ion-Tyh; F Rom S F Ion-Tyh

Actually, this is the same way things turned out under the old rule;

the new rule is really just a change in the wording of the old rule intended to clarify things. But there's still a problem that the 1983 rules don't address. I'll let Rod Walker take over from here

THE CONVOYED STAND-OFF

It has been stated in DOGS OF WAR (#58, p. 7) that this is the correct adjudication of the following orders:

A Tun-Rom, F Tyn C A Tun-Rom (dislodged), A Tus S A Tun-Rom. F Rom-Tyn, F Ion S F Rom-Tyn. A. FRANCE: ITALY:

This situation is a standoff...or at least it is arguably one. And that is how I rule it; so that John's suggestion of hobby unanimity on this point is at least a wee bit in error.

To understand how a standoff could occur here, we must first turn to a variant of this situation, the one which appeared first in John's example in DOW 58:

B. FRANCE: A Tun-Rom, F Tyn C A Tun-Rom, A Tus S A Tun-Rom ITALY: F Ion-Tyn, F Rom S F Ion-Rom.

In this situation, one must rule that F Tyn is dislodged and the convoy dis-John cites as the reason, "that the convoying army is unable to protect the convoying fleet". For reasons detailed in DIPLOMACY WORLD #35, this language is no longer valid as a reference to the Rulebook. However, regardless of the language, the point is, why is the ruling made in that way?

The question of how to rule on this situation arose early in hobby his-

tory. What do you do when a convoyed attack is attacking a space which contains a fleet which is in turn supporting an attack on one of the convoying fleets? At that time, debate centered on the concept of where the attack was coming from, as a means to determine whether support was cut. In the above situation, for instance, was the attack coming from Tun (in which case the support of F Rom is cut) or from Tyn (in which case it is not unless it is dislodged...but in those days it was possible to rule that the support of a dislodged unit was still valid).

Steve Cartier (who then played and published mostly under his well-known nom de guerre "Dan Brannan") proposed a ruling to solve the problem. That was, "a convoyed attack comes from the direction of the last convoying fleet". This solved the problem...the support of F Rom was not cut. The problem first appeared in something like the form of "B" above, but without the support of A Tus. Here, clearly, F Tyn was dislodged, and the attack Tun-Rom would have failed anyway. With the support of A Tus added, the situation is more complicated, but the general ruling is still, F Tyn is dislodged.

What we have here is a particular situation, but do we have a general

ruling? My contention is that we do. The Rulebook wording about "does not protect the convoying fleet" was adopted in 1970 for the 1971 edition as a way of giving effect to the particular situation but avoiding the larger implications of the ruling that lay behind it. (It's no secret, I'm sure, that Allan Calhamer does not like Brannan's Rule.) The new wording, that "a convoyed attack doe not cut certain supports", is in fact weaker than the old one, and neither wording in any way negates Brannan's Rule.

So now we turn to situation "A". Now the convoyed army is not attacking a supporting fleet, but one that is attacking back. That is, it is attacking the fleet that is convoying the army. But the convoyed attack...the army, that is...is coming from the direction of the convoying fleet. We then have two attacks (Tyn-Rom and Rom-Tyh) each with one valid support. What is the result when you have two units, each trying to enter the space of the other and each equally well supported? A stand-off. And that's how this situation ("A") should be ruled.

I do not expect this interpretation of the game to be popular. It never

has been. However, I do wish to make the point that there is an alternative to the ruling presented (for situation "A") in DOGS OF WAR (and many places elsewhere). And, further, it should be clear that this ruling has a sound basis within the Rules as well as general game philosophy...and that is more particularly true under the rulebook text which is now the official one.

I may be, for all I know, a minority of 1 within the hobby. I know of no one else who espouses this ruling...despite its venerable and credible antecedants in 16 years of hobby history. And here I am, still crusading for it. I hope there are others who, yet, will join this minority who see Brannan's Rule as a simple but elegant solution to convoy problems.

((Well, hopefully I'll never see situation "A" in a DOGS game so I won't have to worry about it. But until Avalon Hill addresses the problem in the next rulebook, I'll stick with my original ruling that the French F Tyh is dislodged. I like to be in the majority. (Except in my job where the Equal Employment Opportunity people make me wish I was a black female).

((As for the new rules I discussed earlier, they will be adopted immediately for all DOGS games, mainly because I think they are more

fair than the rules they replace.))

John Daly (Gamemaster): 1981IA (DOGS#13) began on September 18, 1981 and ended on October 26, 1983 with a win for Dan Stafford's France. Despite the length of the game, no standbys wore used. That's more amazing than anything else that happened. Congratulations to Dan on the win and to Mark for doing so well. Thanks to Stan and Porter for staying with the fight.

Dan Stafford (France): My basic strategy when entering into a new Dip game is to form a strong alliance on my side of the board, preferably one that doesn't leave a strong "corner" power at my back, while discouraging the formation of any strong alliance on the other side of the board. And although I probably shouldn't take all of the credit, this game stands as a shining example of the superiority of that strategic approach.

In the west I found the German player very cooperative, so I dedicated myself to a campaign against England with my favorite opening:

F Mid-Eng; A Mar-Spa; A Par-Gas.

The east played along without any "help" from me: Turkey hit Russia and Italy stabbed Austria in 1901. In 1902 it got even better: both R and T decided to attack Austria while continuing to fight each other! Unfortunately, Italy supported Turkey into Greece, and it began to look

as if a power-to-be-reckoned-with might actually emerge from that mess. But that was easily remedied when Turkey built a fleet. I was able to convince Italy of the threat from the east and in 1903 he turned on the Turk. Perfect! That move insured that all the eastern powers would outlive England.

With England virtually gone, in 1904 Phase II began - Germany turned east against Russia while I did the same against Italy. Both attacks were well set-up so that by the end of 1905 Russia was out and

Italy was on the ropes.

1906 saw further advances by F/G into Eastern Europe, but it wasn't until 1907 that there were any political changes - I moved on Munich in that year. Had I made it, I should have been able to push on to a win (at that point the center count was 11 to 11), but Mark saw it coming and bounced me. My offensive peaked out 14. In 1908 all the remaining players (A-I-G) rallied against me, Germany cleverly slipping a fleet behind my lines.

I knew I would be able to hold in the south for a while, but Mark could force his way through in the north. Had the A/I/G alliance held

up, I could have been eliminated in time.

But Germany was making all the gains so I was able to convince Stan (Austria) to move on Germany in the south. Mark immediately let up on me which led to a reformation of our alliance (but I had gained Bel in the initial stab which I never gave back, while he did disband the fleet behind my lines in Ipl!)

From then on we worked toward a 17-17 draw as we moved to finish A&I. But at the last conceivable moment a chance to grab the 18th was presented and, alas, weak person that I am. I could not resist it.

Now that the game is over, will you, John, confirm that I did vote yes on the F/G draw every time that it was proposed except on the last turn?

((If you say so, but actions speak louder than draw proposals!))

Stan Johnson (Austria): This was an interesting game. I was attacked by Germany and Russia, then stabbed by Italy and Turkey, yet lived to tell the tale. Italy and I formed a good working relationship that carried me thru most of the game. I came out from under his wing when he suggested giving up the game to F-G. I temporarily drove a wedge thru their alliance but my seizure of Rumania sent Germany back into the French camp. Mark disappointed me by throwing the game. I thought Porter Wightman and Dan Stafford played especially good games.

Terry Suitor (Russia): You could easily subtitle this game, How Not To Play The East, considering what happened. This game started out to me with an easily seen attack by Turkey upon me, however I moved badly and it left me in a poor position the rest of the game. Also a mistake in a letter to Austria had him moving to Gal, expecting a bounce that never came. Despite the poor start, I was able to turn Austria to the south, while getting Italian and German help for invading Austria. However, everything unraveled here, as Italy deciced to be much more independent leaving me in a quite poor position with two enemies and only a single German unit for support. After a short time of stalemate on the Eastern front, France and Germany turned east, with Germany grabbing all of the north. Germany then offered me survival, which I accepted, but then missed a move which saw me eliminated.

Despite my poor showing, I can say that it was a very good learning experience. Next time I get into a game, I will try for a better alliance, and spend more time on the game. Congratulations to Dan for a well carned win, and to all the other players, except Turkey, for making it an enjoyable game, and to John for his usual superb GMing.

TWO LAST 1981IA ENDGAME STATEMENTS

orter Wightman (Italy): So its over for me. By the time you read this it will be over for you, too. This game started out fairly well for me. cohnson's reputation was quickly established and much of the early diplomacy centered around what to do about him. I ended up attacking him because he was extremely vague in reply to my third and fourth

letters which had details for an assault on Turkey.

It turned out that trying to deal with McDonald was nigh on impossible. He was abusive and demanding; generally a real TURKEY. Therefore I allied with Stan and put McDonald out of the game. The time I had wasted allied with McDonald, however, gave France and Germany the time they needed to dispose of their chosen target, England, and deploy in our direction before we could swing around to defend. My only hope at this point was that F/G would break up. This never materialized. As I write this it looks like an F/G draw. I guess it was Stan who was always vetoing the draws because I voted for them every time I remembered there was a proposal.

Congratulations to Mark, for staying with the game through what seemed like a dozen address changes, to Sleaze for his usual sleazy success, and to John for the great GMing. To Stan, too bad we couldn't ally when we could have been on the offensive. I think you need to do something about your early game letter writing - unless of course you had plans for my immediate demise that didn't pan out. To England, wherever you are, I think you might do better if you wrote. To Terry, you seemed okay to me, but I still don't understand all the badmouthing I heard about you from ALL sources in the game. To Peter, good riddance Captain, Esq., Sir or whatever your fertile imagination has for a title

these days.

I wrote scores of letters in this game and I lost. I even got scores of letters in this game, too. Maybe I've found the secret! Don't write, don't worry about not hearing from your allies. Just propose draws and call people up at 6:00am their time as I did in my game in HOOF & MOUTH. I got a four way draw that way. I wrote four letters and received one the whole time I played that game! In this game I wrote 22 letters to A, 7 to E, 14 to F, 15 to G, 13 to R, and 11 to T. I received 34 from A, 2 from E, 14 from F, 15 from G, 15 from R, and 15 from T. Ah well, better luck next time, right?

Mark Rowell (Germany): Dan, congratulations - you deserved the win. I played a lousy game diplomatically and was lucky to finish the game in the running. I should have listened to you in the end, Stan, but you are not any easier to deal with than Dan is. Porter, I am really sorry we ended up on opposite sides of the fence, perhaps if we had worked closely early things would have turned out better for both of us.
