

Dear all, this issue is late, but I have a good excuse, I am not in New Zealand, I am in Thailand, until Jan 11, and then fly to Colombo, I arrived in Bangkok on Nov 19, and had a week there orientating, hosted by AIESEC, Thammaset University, and Yuvabhadana Foundation, a charity arm of Premier Group, who have the local Hertz and Volvo licences, amongst many other infrastructural fingers in Thai pies. The foundation supports education in rural areas, giving aid and equipment to schools in poor provinces, it is only a few years old, but had bought equipment for several schools in Sukhothai province. I have been placed as an English teacher at Krai Nai Wittayakhorn Rachamangkhalapisek School, a secondary school for Matiyom 1-4 (form 2-5 equivalent ! guess. Bigger schools go to Matiyom 6). It is in Krai Nai village, 6 km off the main Sukhothai- ! Phitsanulok road. The turnoff is 4-5km east of Kong Krai Lat, the district capital (provinces/changwat are divided into districts/amphoe). 3 other NZers are at Kong Krai Lat Wittayakhorn. They are an Indian boy, a Chinese girl and a white girl, all 21-24 yrs old. As the oldest and most independent, I have been placed alone, which suits me much better. They have 1500 students. My school has 300 and 13 teachers, I live in a small 4 room house next to the school. It is plastered concrete block, with a wooden floor. The 4 rooms open onto an open 'hall' and stairs lead to the ground floor where there is a storage room and a toilet (2 squat toilet stalls and a Japanese bath/mandi. There are resident frogs, mosquitoes and chichak lizards. Stray dogs prowl as do a couple of mangy cats. My room has 2 school desks, a grotty wardrobe and a bed with a mozzie net. I have a padlock to lock my door, but there is no glass or screen for the windows, only warped shutters that don't, so anyone can get in if they want. There are 2 other teachers' houses next to mine, one with a pregnant English teacher and he husband, 2 small kids and a coop of fighting cocks. The other has 3 single female teachers who speak 5 words of English between them. There are 2 dorms of 6 or 7 Matiyom 4 girls behind us, Mon-Fn. These girls are about 16/17, and I eat dinner with them and am supposed to speak English with them, but that is beyond all but 2 of them. My meals are delivered by the art teacher's wife, breakfast and dinner. She lives in the village 1km away up a dry dusty road. The dust gets in everything, so I must sweep at least once a day. Lunch during the week is paid for by the school. They have a cafeteria, with rice and veges, cooked by the students, that is doled out in a ladle. I tend to get Chinese fried rice. Thais eat boiled rice and separate common bowls of fishy soups and weird veges, and lots of little chilles called, literally, mouse shit peppers. They are HOT! The farmers locally grow rice, and use a tank-sized tracked harvester that spews furnes and chaff. They plough with 2wheeled cultivators, that are also used to tow trailers for transporting grain or workers. The 2 English teachers here cannot speak good English, so there is much work for me to do, and I enjoy the company of the other 34 Nizers on weekends, when I get to speak more than one syllable words. We do have a sound lab, computers and a band, but the programmes and keyboards are a) in Thai, which I can't read and so this has taken ages for me to work out how to do it in English, and b) the teachers use them a lot so I cannot get access for a games zine! The computer room is a/c and my desk is in it, but the state of the That economy has meant we turn off the a/c and this is the hottest room as there is no fan and only small windows, I teach 14 one hour classes a week, at least one of each level and stream. But even after 4 years English, they cannot speak very well. I think they can read and write ok. Butr no one can answer my questions about their reading, so I just concentrate on pronunciation and try and get them confident at speaking, and used to a 'farang's voice. I have successfully taught them a couple of poems and even 'she sells seashells...'. Weekends I try and get out, as I get no lunch! I have been to Phitsanulok, a largish dull town, with good shops and an a/c mail, with a KFC outlet, it also has 3 churches, which are very welcoming. Sukhothal itself is smaller and nondescript, but has great markets. Population about 15000 I guess. I did a weekend's work for the FLC language academy there, who have an exchange with KEY learning in Auckland. The teachers there own Firend House, a guest house in Lonely Planet, and they put us up and fed us GREAT food in return for teaching. But they got us all a little too drunk on Thai whiskey on Sat night, and while we were ok, THEY were under the weather, the wife especially! The stuff is good but potent.

Sukhothai and nearby (100km) Kampheng Phet and Si Satchanalai have UNESCO world heritage carks of their 14th century city ruins. I had an elephant ride at the latter. Lots of laterite wats and stupas and city walls to see. Quite impressive, and very evocative of 'Ozymandias'. As usual in Asia, foreigners (ie whites) are charged twice the local rate, even for the elephant rides. That rankles. I think we in the west should charge double the local rate for all citizens of countries with such racist policies. Thus it is possible for the Chinese Nzer to get in for the local rate if she keeps her mouth shut, while I am automatically a tourist! Thailand isn't so bereft of. Westerners that the local kids chase you like in India or Indonesia. They are shy and must be stalked with caution from downwind. The local women Are attractive. Half the pleasure in getting a shave recently was having the lovely, large breasted Thai hairdnesser leaning luringly over me while she attracked my beard. It took a good half hour, to my joy! The most fun you can have with your clothes on! Several have asked to marry me, which is also nice. But I turned them down. What would my family think of an illiterate noe stallholder for a daughter-in-law? So I am plumping for a graduate stallholder...

I have also been to Mae Sot on the Burmese border. A highway bridge over the river here connects the 2 countries, but no foreigners can cross, only locals. More racism. However, I crossed into Burma at a village 50km south, with the full smiles of the Thai army in their bunker, but when the Burmese soldier on the other side got off the toilet 10 minutes later, he locked me out. I didn't get a passport stamp, but I was there, and even in a small village straddling a stream, the contrast between the 2 countries was large: thatched huts for the Burmese and plank houses for the Thais. That's the first country to expel me tool Visited a nearby refugee camp. Refugees can speak better English than Thai English teachers. But they live in worse conditions, \$000 in this camp. They need more water tanks, about NZ\$1200 worth. If you want to donate towards this, or volunteer as an English teacher (they have a Frenchman in that capacity now), or campaign

for Burmese rights in Thailand (they are confined to the camp and have been there 8 years. The Burmese are building prison farms for 20 000 people just across the border from them, then contact The Catholic Office for Refugees and Relief Services, 122-122/1 Soi Narksuwan, Nonsee Road, Yannawa, Bangkok 10120, Thailand. Phone 681-5301, fax 681-5308.

I have had to perform first aid on 2 kids knocked off the motorbike outside my house by a teacher in his car, until the ambulance arrived. Luckily it was only shock and deep lacerations, no internal/bone injuries. The others had 2 people killed and a student with a leg amputated 2 weeks ago outside their school. The 2 girls had another 2 killed outside their house last week. The Thai newspaper here is really a tabloid, and had the tale of 2 bike riders speeding at night, who didn't see a pipe-carrying trailer, and ran into it, impaling themselves on a copper pipe, 5cm diameter. They were both alive but in comas at last report. The photo showed them in hospital, with the pipe through both their chests, like a spear, but so thick! Kids race mybikes with no helmets, on crap roads, past other crap drivers. The roads and driving here are insane, yet seatbelts and helmets and sobriety are unheard of. The others were driven home from a party by an inebriated teacher. They have never been so scared. Yet the hosts insisted that they must be driven home, as they were 'too young' to find their own way and something 'bad might happen'. Apparently the teacher slalomed the central dotted line! While the law says drive on the left, most Thais spend more time on the right. I have hitched with a guy who drank beer from a bottle with a straw, then biffed the bottle out the window. But he was the best driver we had, slow and sane. Maybe he knew he was drunk. I have loan of a motorcycle, but always wear boots and a helmet. I have toured the local back-roads, but hate the main road!

So life is exciting, but hot I need a fan to sleep at night. Some mornings it is almost chilly, but the days are blistering in the sun. I drink lots and move as little as possible. That is one advantage of a job over travelling! They have a green melon Fanta and a pink pomelo one. The latter is nicest and I have a crate in my fridge! Yoghurt here is also good, even the fried-rice flavour. Com yoghurt and ice cream is big too. The local cycle-ice cream man sells scoops with ruts, a squirt of condensed milk and a wad of sticky rice between two slices of floppy white bread. All for 5 bant. Mmm...

I haven't been sick yet, and enjoy the fruits (27 kinds of bananas) and drinks. I have a budget of NZ\$10/day, and am well within it, as the school provides the accorn, and food, except on weekends.

Christmas I will have to work, but it is a half-day; p.m. only, and a games day of some kind. We NZers will have a stap up dinner that night in Phi-lok. The local pop music can be quite good. I have a tape and a CD to bring home. But as I have to lug everything to Sri Lanka, I aren't souvenir shopping here.

I hope your Christmases and New Years are good, and get your orders to me at my NZ address (to be forwarded to me in S.L.) on time pleasel
