Welcome to the second issue of DIPLOMACY WORLD NEWS (DWN), a new publication and service from DIPLOMACY WORLD. This issue is brought to you with our compliments and the hope that you'll use it in your own Diplomacy publication and that you'll encourage people to join our new service as a subscriber.

The Idea: During the winter of 1987 I sent the first experimental issue of DWN to some 30 hobby publishers and asked for their comments and suggestions. The response was far better than I had anticipated, especially from the hobby's smaller publishers, and for that reason I decided to go shead with this project for a trial period of one year. At the end of that time we'll see.

My original idea was simple: to make available to the entire Diplomacy hobby a single, complete, integrated source of information about news in the hobby; in affect to establish an AP, a UPI, or a Reuters for the Diplomacy playing world. Backed by the resources of DW, the IDS, and major hobby publications and services, the DWN would seek to provide an importial source of news to the entire hobby by means of a network connecting the hobby's services, projects, publications and players. I wanted to create a publication that was small, simple, fast, accurate, cheep, and convenient. DWN is the result.

The Plan: For now I plan to publish DWN on a quarterly basis (alternating with DW) and IE will include news on every aspect of the hobby (FIF, PBM, Com/Tournament, PBEM, Computer, etc.) from every available source on matters of interest to hobby members. The publication will be distributed to anyone who wants it for a small charge. Publishers will find it suitable to include as part of their own publication, to lift from it selected items which may be of interest to their readers, to paraphrase in their own publications, or simply as a source of background information on what's going on in the hobby. Individuals who want to keep informed on what's going on in the hobby, but who don't want to subscribe to a lot of publications or spend a lot of money doing so, will find it a good source of unbiased information. Hobby newcomers will find it a quick and easy way to learn what's going on and who they should contact for more detailed information.

What's In. What's Out: The restrictions on what will be included in DWN are simple: it must be news related to the game or hobby of Diplomacy and it must be brief. There will be no features, no editorials, no games, etc. in DWN, just the classic Who, What, Where, When, How and an occasional Why. Items included must be short, a few hundred words at most. Anything move can be included with the mailings but it will be in flyer form and there will be a charge for it

How Much?: Speaking of charges, DNN is not a charity project and so the people who use it will have to underwrite its costs, just as subscribers to a news service do. The basic charge for a subscription will be 50¢ per ounce (\$1.00 per ounce overseas) and since I'm figuring around one ounce per quarterly issue that means a trial sub will be \$2.00 per year. In addition, I am asking any publisher who plans to use DNN materials in their publication to pay a small fee to help cover our expenses. The rates are simple: \$1 per year if your circulation is less than 25, \$2 per year if it is between 25 and 50, and \$3.00 per year if it is more than 50. For that fee you can recopy as much, or as little, of DNN in your own publication as you like. The charge for including a single 8½ by 11 inch flyer in the mailing will be \$10.00 per side.

Input: There are two ways to get your news announcement in DWN. First, you can sit down and write a press release for us to use (Just include the basic information of Who, What, Where, When, How, and perhaps why? and when you went the announcement run.) or you can send us a copy of your magazine, publication, or announcement and we'll pull the information we need from that.

Again, the key is to be brief and to be on time for the deadlines for any, given issue. If there is something in a magazine or publication you went us to use be sure to highlight it so we'll spot it. Ballots, poil forms, etc. will be included but only as flyers and charges must be paid for them.

Output: What you'll be getting from DWN will be similar to the enclosed sample issue. As you can see it is designed to be easily read and either copied in toto in your publication (as a sub-zine if you wish) or so you can clip out individual items to include. Issues will be normally be sent within a week of the dealine and they will be mailed first class or simmail overseas. It won't be anything fancy, just the straight facts. Please don't judge this issue as a sample of what we plan to include regularly since this time we've got more DW and less hobby news than will normally be the case. And, obviously, we hope you will reprint DWN in your own publication, especially if you are a small publisher because it is often your players who lack access to hobby information.



Now your support, by subscribing and by using it, will show us if that is indeed the case. If you have suggestions or comments please feel free to send them along. This next year is a trial period and we expect to make our share of mistakes. Still, with your support I think we can provide a valuable resource tool to the hobby.

Dear Hobby Member:

Once again it is my privilege to bring to you the names of the 1987 nominees for three of the hobby's most prestigious awards: The Don Miller Memorial Award (for outstanding service to the hobby during 1986); the Rod Walker Award (for outstanding literary achievement in the hobby during 1986); and the John Koning Memorial Award (for outstanding play of the Diplomacy of any kind during 1986). I hope you will, if you are a hobby publisher, reprint the ballot, instructions, and (if you are so inclined), my comments here in your own publication. Please remember that the deadline for receipt of all ballots 6 July 1987. And, of course, I hope you'll return your own ballot. In recent years two of the awards have been decided by one vote, so your vote can make a difference.

Because of the early date of this year's DIPCON it will not be possible to announce the names of the recipients of these awards at that event. However, Fred Davis, Jr., will be attending DIPCON and the various perpetual plaques will be on display there. The names of the recipients will be announced in the summer (July) issue of DIPLONACY WORLD and in other hobby publications. If you'd like a copy of the results send a SASE with your ballot. Recipients of the individual awards will receive custody of the perpetual plaques for the coming year and a personalized plaque to keep. Donations to cover the costs of the plaques, engraving, postage, etc. should be sent to Fred Davis, Jr.m 3210-K Wheaton Way, Ellicott City, MD 21043. Remember, these are hobby supported awards. Checks, made payable to Fred, may also be sent to me with your ballot. Even 5 or 10 stamps would help a lot.

Over the past few years these awards have recognized the achievements of some of our hobby's brightest stars. And over the same $\mathfrak p$ riod of time these awards have drawn more and more participants from the hobby. Is upe that tradition continues this year.

And now for the Awards:

The Don Miller Memorial Award is named for the late Don Miller, founder of the Miller Numbers, active hobby publisher during the 1960s, and a fine gentleman. It is awarded for outstanding service to the hobby during the previous year. The 1987 nominees are:

SIMON BILLENNESS; for his work with the Zine Register and the Zine Bank.

JIM BURGESS: for his work with the U.S. Orphans Service.

CARY COUCHLAN: For his work in promoting the international hobby in Europa

Express.

BRUCE LIPSEY: For his publication <u>Once Upon a Deadline</u> and work on the 1986

Runestone Poll.

KEN FEEL: For his work on the 1986 DIPCON Administration Committee, Masters of Deceit, and his development of a flyers program for the hobby.

WRITE IN: Print name clearly.

Vote for one name only. Write in votes are allowed. ID portion of the ballot must be completed.

The John Koning Memorial Award is named for the late John Koning, founder of DIPCON, active hobby publisher during the 1960s, and an outstanding player. It is awarded for outstanding play of Diplomacy in any form during the previous year. The nominees for 1987 are:

EDI BIRSAN: Ranked fourth among all time players and top active player in the

Calhamer Point List.

KATHY BYRNE: Perhaps the best player of Italy in the history of the game,

and among the top of every rating system and poll.

MORGAN CURLEY: A newcomer to the hobby who played his first tournament at last year's DIPCON and started with an elimination and ended with a win, and took two best country performance titles.

DAVE LINCOLN: Now at the top of the Dragonstooth Rating System, having won his

first 3 PBM games, and he's played very well in tournaments.

MALC SMITH: He won the DIPCON championship last year.

RANDOLPH SMYTH: Fifth in the DTRS with more wins than most PBM players have played games. He's one of the few to win playing every power on the board.

DON SWARTZ: He's third in the DIRS with five wins.

Five of the nominees are well known in the postal hobby. Two of them made their mark during 1986 primarily at convention/tournaments. Each, however, is worthy of this honor.

The Rod Walker Award is named for Rod Walker (who is still very much alive) and was donated to the hobby by Avalon Hill in recognition of Rod's many literary contributions to the hobby. For 1987 the nominees are:

J.R. BAKER: For his Dippy Doodles cartoons in <u>Diplomacy</u> <u>World</u> and elsewhere. DON Del GRANDE: For his sub-zine Meeting of the Minds and development of the International Tournament Rating System, in Life of Monty. (A series)

MORGAN GURLEY: For his 'DIPCON XIX: My First Tournament Games," in Diplomacy

World (#43, Summer 1986).

MÉLINDA ANN HOLLEY: For her "England" in Diplomacy World (#44, Fall 1986). DEAN JUDSON: For his "Scientific Diplomacy" in The GENERAL (Vol. 23, No. 2).

DICK MARTIN: For his editorial role in House of Lords.(A series)
ROD WALKER: For his "The Nastiest Rating System in the World," in Politesse (47, March 1987) and elsewhere.

Piease excuse me if I make some comments on this year's RWA nominations, because I know others will. I was amazed that we did not receive any nominations for this Award from the hobby at large this year. But, after spending most of a morning going over various hobby publications from last year, I understand why that was the case. Or at least I think I do. To be very blunt about it, 1986 was not a particularly good year for the hobby literarily. Ch, there was a lot of good writing in the hobby's zines but little of it was devoted to the game or hobby. Most of it was devoted to non-Diplomacy material; and that doesn't qualify for this Award. There was a lot of good press, but most of it had very limited special appeal to a small audience. All in all there was precious little that the members of this committee saw qualified for this Award.

The fact that so much of what there is comes from Diplomacy World is reflected in the list of nominees. That may raise the question of bias, but the fact is that DW publishes more material qualified for this Award than any other publication in the hobby and more than most other publications combined. After all, that is our unique task. That is why DW is the hobby's flagship publication. And so you will see some unusual names and achievements among this year's RWA nominees: a cartoonist, a couple of rating systems, and an editor who actually knows how to edit! And yet, somehow, I think thes were among the best literary achievements in the hobby last year. And certainly the works of Gurley, Holley, and Judson are all qualified.

However, the members of the RWA Committee only see about 35 of the hobby's publications on a regular basis and that doesn't include, I am sure, all of the possible sources for materials qualified for this Award. So, I'm going to do something a bit different this year. I'm encouraging people to write in their own choice for the best Diplomacy related article/writing/literary creation of 1986. Simplly put it in the space provided on the ballot and enclose a copy of the item with your ballot. And, if anyone is motivated enough to launch a write in campaign for someone else's work, so much the better. But please, no self-grandizement. Even if none of the write ins made it to the top, perhaps we can discuss them in the July issue of DW and make us all more aware of what's being published in the hobby.

So, before you rush to criticize our nominees for this year, pause, and think about whether you have an equally well qualified candidate.
