The REAL Reason Behind Diplomacy





For a background, I will quote from EE #19 which quoted from EE #18 to give you

a view of what happened. All of you have seen #19 but some have not seen #18.

"Frem EE #18,p.16: "Essentials: R-3, or 1979 KG is a game carried in Retaliation and GMed by Dick Martin. I am Turkey, Jack Masters came in as a standby for Austria (and was replaced by Steve Langley), Scott Jones is England, Stephen Lee is France and Bob Olsen was Germany. This game has been plagued with GMing errors by Dick

"From EE #18, p.15: "Briefly the game that I was in, R-3, went first to John Michalski as ombudsman and then to Don Ditter as ombudsman/BNC. (It should have gone to Ditter at the very first but that was the GM's fault and my ignorance. I wanted an irregular ruling from the first). Don Ditter did not tell me why he ruled as he did. He ignored me for 3 months. I became angry and then had Rod Walker and Mark Berch review this case. They essentially held up Don Ditter's position. I was determined that no player would be ignored in this fashion without some public notice. It was wrong."

In EE #19, Don Ditter, Mark Berch and Rod Walker presented their views of this situation. I view R-3 as an example to study for ways that players and GMs can get along better. And the are many views of hew that can be done. Don Ditter and Mark Berch had responses to each other's comments in EE #19 and those two letters are first. Then the alphabetical letters begin.

Don Ditter (New York, USA): "I'd like to answer one comment from Mark Berch's letter on R-3. Mark stated: "I think however, that he(Don Ditter) should return to the former practice of making such evaluation of irregular status only after a game is completed." (Page 27).

I disagree with Mark on this point. If there indeed was the "former practice" -----it was a poor practice in my opinion. There are four ways of handling an irregular situation as I see it:

- Accept no complaint that a game is irregular until the game has ended.
- Accept the complaint, but do not investigate it until the game has ended.
- Accept the complaint, investigate it, make a decision, but don't tell the players.
- Accept the complaint, investigate and inform players of the decision immediately.

Option (1) is unacceptable to me as a player could wait and see how he finishes in a game before deciding whether he wants it declared irregular. You get the "sour grapes" case where a player loses in 1912 and then complains about poor GMing in 1904 hoping to get the game declared irregular.

In my opinion, if a player thinks a GM has done something that grossly violates the rulebook, HRs[Houserules] or accepted GMing practice--the issue of game regularity should be raised immediately, no matter what the year or your position in the game. Of course in many cases it's not one thing, but a number of errors that may build

"up to a breaking point. I believe the time to complain about a GM is as soon as possible after the wrong has been done. If an ombudsman is used, the error may be able to be corrected before damage is done.

Option (2) is also unacceptable---- the complaint should be investigated when received, while it is fresh on the players' and GM's minds. Why wait one or more calendar years before investigating when many of the principals may have left the scene?

Option (3) is probably the one that Mark is advocating. I believe the players deserve to know what your decision was as soon as you have made it. I see little difference between declaring a game irregular at the start as local, GM in the game, etc. and declaring one irregular in the middle of it. The only argument to hold back a decision would be to keep player interest alive or not affect the game. (though the complaint itself may affect the game).

the complaint itself may affect the game).

I think Option (4) is the way an irregular game complaint should be handled. The problem should be resolved and the players informed of the game's status as soon as

possible.

As for his point that I have deviated from "former practice", I'm not aware of it. I've never heard of a BNC [Boardman Number Custodian--Bon is the current one] holding back a decision from the players until the game has finished. When I took over the BNC from Lee Kendter, there were several games that he had declared irregular that were stilling progress. I'm sure it has always been common practice to declare a game irregular at the start if it violates certain accepted practices.

In conclusion, I believe the proper way to handle an irregular game complaint is the file the complaint, investigate it, decide and tell the players as soon as possible. There should be no holding back of complaints, information or decision by the players, GM or BNC. Comments Gary? Or Mark?"

Don Ditter is the current Boardman Number Custodian (BNC) who assigns numbers to all Diplomacy games, publishes gaming information in the zine, Everything TWEBNC is the only one who can declare a game irregular.

Mark Berch (Virginia, USA): "Don Ditter has kindly provided me with a copy of his comments. I hope my response can appear alongside his, so that readers can see both points of view, Don has presented a good analysis of some of the issues involved, but I am not persuaded.

but I am not persuaded.

We must keep foremost in mind the <u>purpose</u> of labeling a game as irregular. It is there as a warning to ratingsmasters that, in the opinion of the BNC, the game should not be rated. But games are not normally rated until they are over, so there is no legitimate need for this information before the game is over. Release of this information before them would only allow it to be used for other purposes.

Gary raises the possibility that a player might wait till the end of the game before deciding whether he wants to have the game called irregular. [I am sure that Mark means "Don" and not "Gary" in the above sentence—GC] This, he says, could be sour grapes—the issue should be raised immediately. I disagree 100%. In many cases, the player ought to wait to see how it turns out, altho he should gather his information before then, while memories are still fresh. I know this sounds absurb, but hold on a minute.

Suppose a GM says, "If any player dies, the game will come to an immediate halt and the deceased will be called the winner." This could be part of the HRs or imposed during the game. Is the game irregular? Let's assume no one actually dies. The answer, I should think, is no. If the GM's actions did not have at least a reasonable chance of affecting the outcome, why should those actions cause the game to be called irregular? We shouldn't be getting involved in a bunch of theoretics. If there's little or no chance that the GM's decision affected the outcome, there's no justification to calling it irregular. And wes, "affected the outcome" is a legitimate touchstone for this determination. Keep in mind that "irregular" speaks to the ratingsmaster, and he rates the outcome of the game.

OK, suppose a GM throws out a player's orders, NMRs him, and there is no replay. But the wictim goes on to win the game. But if he complains at the time it occurs, the game will be called irregular. Then, when it's all over, the irregular label will turn out to be wrong because it didn't harm him, it didn't affect the outcome

of the game. If a player thinks he can recover from what the GM has done to him, he should be encouraged to let things lie and see whether the GM's error really affected the outcome of the game or not. And this can't be determined until the outcome of the game is known. As for the "sour grapes" argument, well, the BNC should not be concerned about the player's motives. It's not important. What is important is how serious the GMing error was, and whether it had a reasonable chance of affecting the outcome of the game. A player should not feel that he must press his case right away or be accused of sour grapes. He may hope to be able to recover from the GM's error. Then comes the second error, and he decides that the cumulative effect of the two errors is enough to harm. If he had protested early, then he'd have to start all over again with the second error. In short, I see nothing to be gained by pressing players to present their protests as soon as possible.

Finally, one must consider the game itself. If a decision is released before the game is over, it could affect the game, and that would be a shame, a real case of the tail wagging the dog. A ratings-conscious player might lose interest in the game, or the GM might decide the game is doomed anyhow, so why bother. A decision, once announced, could affect the negotiations. If the decision is unknown, or hasn't been made, it can't affect the game.

I would favor Ditter's options #2 or #3. The label is there only as an indication of what to do with the game's conclusion, and so that is the proper time to reveal it."

Bill Becker (Michigan, USA): "Thanks for fighting for players' rights. I can't see how some people can treat it with a big "so what"? Or tather I wish I didn't have to deal with them......Something that is sadly lacking in this hobby though is good standards. I understand a lot of the problems of publing knowledgeably and on time, and thus accept the fact that everyone isn't going to live up to what I consider standard. I find that as a player I don't live up to my own standards sometimes.

The real crime of not living up to any standard is the loss of new players who don't understand that there are several zines that are superior to play in when it comes to time or GM error. I don't have any real solutions to game problems. I accept that they exist, that a larger share of games are actually irregular than so declared, and that I myself am merely a flawed correspondent and statistic within the hobby."

Ron Brown(Ontario, Canada): "I'm afraid you don't have my support, though I still sympathize, in the ombudsman case.

I was somewhat bewildered by your assertion that you were "screwed". Where? As I read it, you disagreed with your GM, appealed to a mutually agreeable ombudsman who found, with some qualification, in the GM's favour. A lot of people are now going to be second-guessing Michalski on it and I don't think he should be subjected to that. In any case, I can't see that he did anything wrong and his decision seems reasonable to me.

Then you take on Don Ditter. Why? You wanted a game declared irregular and he didn't see that there was grounds for it. You give the impression in your article that Ditter is supposed to be a demigod who dispenses "irregular" labels whenever a player disagrees with a GM. There are very few and quite clearly spelled out cases where a BNC will declare a game irregular. They all involve gross violations and do not require judgement calls. That, I believe, is how it should be. The BNC has a tremendously time-consuming job and to ask him to rule on every GM-player dispute is unfair to him and to the hobby. His rules have to be simple and clear-cut, and they are.

I've seen this before where a player becomes bitter because he wanted a game declared irregular because of a GM violation and his request was turned down. I think this is because there's a confusion of terms. A GM may act in an "irregular" manner, but the BNC's definition of "irregular games" is rather technical. I think the confusion boils down to that.

"Anyhow, Ditter didn't have to contact Martin in your case to see that the game did not fall into the "irregular" category. You may disagree with the grounds for declaring the game irregular, but that's another subject altogether. I don't see where Ditter"failed" except in his tardiness in responding to you--and that's hardly grounds for saying he's "abused" his power. I think you owe him an apology.

Now, you seem to feel, and I've seen others who are trying to articulate the same thing, that there should be a regulatory body of some sort presiding over GMs—and that this body should have some clout. I tend to agree. You became bitter when you discovered that the current system, of finding a mutually agreeable ombudsman on an ad hoc basis and a BNC with very limited powers, did not have the power you thought it should. But where is this governing body to come from? In my experience, as an outside observer of the American hobby scene, every U.S. hobby organization is doomed to fail from the start. As soon as a group is set up everyone and his sister starts taking pot-shots at it and searching for flaws. If it fails to live up to their ideals, then active acts of sabotage occur. You have the experiences of the IDA [International Diplomacy Association] and NADF [North American Diplomacy Federation] as examples.

I can't see how [John] Caruso's plan, of establishing a pool of ombudsmen[Page35] { is going to make any difference. If a GM chooses to ignore them, what can they do? And believe me, there will be groups who ignore or persistently attack them.

I think the problem in the States is that you're a huge country with a great number of active people all with their own ideas of how things should be run. And, because it's so large, splinter groups can find a considerable following. Contrast that with Canada where we have only four active zines at the moment. Because we're so few, we can influence each other, and do. The four pubbers realize they need each other and are willing to accommodate and help out the others. (The fact that we're all personal friends helps too.) In the States, four pubbers mean virinally nothing—and they can go on their own merry way, flagrantly violating, not only the rules and conventions of postal Dip, but the rules of common sense and courtesy as well.

All you can really do about people like Martin is present your case publicly, as you did in "Poor Richard's Almanac", and let players decide for themselves whether or not they'd like to play under a GM like that. Some will choose him as a GM no matter what he's done. (After all, people are still playing under Buddy Tretick) But that's not your problem. You've done your bit by "exposing" him. I'm tempted to say the whole R-3 mess is partly your fault, as you should have never gotten involved with people like Masters and Martin to begin with. But then, how were you, when you began your game, to know that they'd turn out to be, if not insane, at least stubborn, careless, and irresponsible? No one, no matter how much power you give him, is going to be able to predict that two years down the road, a GM will experience a change of personality and abuse his players. And, even then, who's to say when the abuse begins? If a GM gets pissed off with a player(it happens, I know) and puts him down, is that abuse? If he interprets orders a different way than the player intended, is that abuse? I really don't know the answers. I have a player now who every season claims I did not copy his orders as written and I have to go to the trouble of photocopying his original orders and mailing them to him. Seems to me that's a case of a player abusing a GM. I wouldn't throw him out of his game, but damned if I'm going to let him sign up for another. Do his player rights over-ride my GM rights?

There aren't any easy answers. You were badly treated by Martin, but I can't see where Ditter let you down. Nor do I see any viable way to settle player-GM disputes other than the process of referring to a third party, agreeable to both, to settle it. And if one side or the other refuses to accept the ombudsman's decision, then there is really nothing anyone can do about it, unless you want to get into blacklishing which, in the end; will not have much effect on someone determined to go his own way.

Sorry to learn that your game was messed up. It's painful when something you've put so much effort into is screwed up by someone else. All you can do in the future is adopt Randolph Smyth's approach: and that is, to play only under the best GMs with proven tract records. Even that's not perfect as Randolph discovered when Cuerrier screwed up[A messy, rare Canadian fold], but I honestly think it's the best we can do in this anarchist, catch-as-catch-can hobby.

By the way, don't take me wrong: I am not against Caruso's plan. I hope it works out and I'll support it, as I do any hobby group that's performing a service.

John Caruso (New York, USA): "I've heard talk that some people feel there should be a GM rating system. Personally, I don't like the idea. I think the polls are a very good indication of that. However, I kicked around the idea and came up with a simple, but what looks to be a fair system. No system can be fool-proof, but this leaves out the most prejudiced feelings.

As games are completed, either the rating master contacts the players, the players contact him or some other means is found, possibly the players can vote in their end of game statements. The players vote on their game just completed. Very Good or Good is +1; Average or No Comment is 0; Poor to Shitty is -1. Then all votes are tabulated. If it's a plus number, the GM gets a +1. If it's minus, the GM gets -1. An "O" is an "O". The ratings master could then list the GMs number of completed games—the score and possibly, how many negatively rated games. It's just an idea, but it's a lot of correspondence work for the rating master.

Why did I send it to you? [Rod] Walker hinted that you may be or want to do something down this avenue. Like I say, I don't like any rating of GMs, including my system which I feel makes for a fairer count. Even my system can have grudge votes cast. If you do decide to do this, I will support you as long as the system is fair and consistently applied to everyone. As for rating your GMing--you could do it or have an outside party do it for you and give you the results. Those who don't answer are considered "no comment". Like I said, it's almost an unrealistic amount of work.

Any player who participated in that game should have a say in the rating of the GM. Even dropped or expelled players, or one season standbys, though the latter is not as valid a judge(note: standby for one season means the guy took the position for one turn then stepped out). If you do decide to do this—it would be up to you to decide the entire procedure. You wouldn't have to use any of my ideas. That's up to you. I am only supplying to you what I have tabulated—tentatively thus far. I have never seriously considered doing it. I just made a set of standards for a hypothetical, that I thought was fair to a GM, yet let each player under that GM have his fair equal shake on rating. The GM should not be allowed to rate himself.

Walker has again, hinted to me about GMing ethics. There is already a set, hobby tradition standard of ethics. This is what the BNC uses to rate games that are challenged. Again, there are common-sense ethics—cheating, stealing, etc. Rules which bind a GM to particular methods of GMing would be poor. That's like saying you and I GM by Brux's Bruce Linsey pubs Voice of Doom houserules, or Brux by mine. This is one reason why I don't like GMing ethics. However, if it was done as a poll of all GMs—with votes—it would allow the GMs to vote for their own ethics and would be fair.

Don Ditter is unofficially opposed to imposed ethics. But a fair polling of all GMs he supports. The ethics could then be attached to the CSS [Ombudsman Service System proposed by John Caruso--see page 33]. Like I told Walker, I would poll the GMs, with hobby support in distributing the ballots, but only after I received any or all suggestions from everyone. One reason I dislike GM ethics is that it looks organizational; in fact, it is. But, I would still conduct the polling of GMs.

Would you support a polling of GMs to vote on their own ethics?

"like to work closely on this. I find you to be one of the more rational and fairer people in the hobby. You care about people, and you are tired of seeing the players shafted. So am I. So let's get something in black and white(or blue and beige) started."

Dave Carter (Ontario, USA): "WOW! EE was something else (#18). I'll hold back comment until I see the rebuttals but I think the most telling part is how does a player handle a GM's irresponsibilites after that player has invested time and energy into a game. My own response, where I felt that I was treated unfairly, was simply to resign. Of course this is not so easy when you are doing well or have been playing the game for some time.

[From a later letter]..."I read your 'feud' issues from cover to cover because I wanted to know exactly what occurred between you and Martin. I still don't understand how a GM can change a game from non-DIAS [Draws Include All Survivors] to DIAS without a 100% yes vote from all the players. I can't comment on Dick Martin as a GM from great personal experience but towne, it's the players who control the

Patrick Conlon(Louisiana, USA): "You made an accusation against your GM, Dick Martin. To use a courtroom analogy, he became the defendant and you the plaintiff. This meant that the burden of proof rested with you and that he was innocent until proven guilty beyond a reasonable shadow of a doubt.

Consequently, Dick didn't have to say anything to Don and Don wasn't required to seek out info from Dick. If you couldn't make a strong enough case, the matter would simply be dropped, and the defendant freed of any guilt. I know that doesn't always seem fair--just look at all the crooks who "beat the system". But the reason our system of justice is set up that way is to protect everyone from random accusations.

Therefore, although the way in which you were treated by GM and ombudeman (Ditter) was less than what it should have been, neither of them can be found guilty

in this matter.

I think you have over-reacted to all of this, most likely due to the acrimonious attacks that eventually ensued during the course of this "search for justice." I hate te see this sort of thing happen. I don't like reading it. I don't think it belongs in the hobby, but most importantly because I hate to see a good friend get hurt. So let's put aside the nonsense and stick to the valid questions at hand.

One: GMs accused of miscenduct should be innecent until proven guilty. The

burden of proof lies with the accuser, not the embudsman.

Two: If any ombudsman is capable of declaring a game irregular, it should still be reviewed by the BNC. I personally feel the BNC has a responsibility to the hobby as a whele on this matter.

Three: What makes a game irregular anyway? [John] Michalski says the "GM must violate the rules of play and/er principles ef fairness." But this answer is too vague to be of much use. It is only good as a guideline and offers no certainties. So, to protect the players' rights, as was your stated purpose behind much of issues number #18 and #19, we need to shed a little more light on this point.

Beth [Mark] Berch and [Rod] Walker make a great deal of sense in all the issues. But they differ slightly in their opinion on whether R-3 should have been declared irregular. This only emphasizes the fact that there is no clear-cut, generally accepted definition of an irregular game. Furthermore, the responsibilities of an embudsman/BNC in such a situation are not as permanently fixed as they should be.

So let me take a stab at offering a solution: A game is irregular if (1) the eriginal balance between the seven players, as defined by the rulebook, is altered or (2) the "divine right" of the player-rulers to control the destiny of their nation is almogated by means other than the natural conquest of one player by another.

"Under this definition, a game with two players in the same area code would be irregular because the balance of play would be tilted in their favor by affording them essentially more time for negotiations than the other players had. However, in a seven man phone game, the balance of play would remain intact and thus the game would be regular.

I'm sure this rule has flaws --- someone out there will find some. But hopefully,

it will be a step in the right direction."

Patrick Conlon does a subrine, <u>Free Speech Alley</u>, in <u>The Modern Patriot</u> and also writes many articles around the hobby, including the "Cultural Flushing" series in EE.

Thomas Franke (West Germany): "Ombudsmen and KK's Policy" opened the eyes for me on how problems could lead to a nasty feud in the hobby. It began with some minor details, and in the end, it's a very big "balloon", which causes a great deal of trouble. I would never give any of my games, which I'm GMing, in case of an error over to the decision of an ombudsman. Everybody, who also tries to adjudicate the error properly, always has a new opinion and the more you have of these opinions, the more you'll find it harder to do it right.....I think it's nearly impossible to get things right in this nasty game--you are "only" in the position of a player and such a position is always weaker than the GM's."

Pete Gaughan (California, USA): "Players' Rights: By far the best part is your quote, "Please don't underestimate my bitterness or my capacity for getting my point across on a hobby-wide basis." Go back and count the number of times you used 'bitter', Gary. Here again we may differ philosophically, but I hate bitterness. No, I'm not completely free of it either.

But that quote sums up what you tried to do with #18--show all concerned that you are concerned. To some it will come off as wimpy tears; to others, as unrighteens indignation; to some(and to me) as legitimate frustration. I do hope that, having made your point(s), you will (a) expect backlash, and (b) ignore backlash....

Bear in mind that you are generalizing from a specific. I have only been in one ombudsman situation, and that as an adversely affected bystander. But I don't think that either of us knows enough to say that a player always starts out at a disadvantage with a GM or ombudsman.

My opinion: the burden of proof is on the player. The ombudsman has no responsibility to seekinput, and the GM has no duty to produce incriminating evidence. Extending the "court-of-law" analogy, if the ombudsman hears only the player's side (assuming the player has a solid case) he darn well better rule in favor of the player—because the GM either doesn't care or is incompetent. That's pretty strong English for me.

According to my system, then, John Michalski and Don Ditter did less than mediocre jobs in your case--but you blew it by your pursuit of the issue. Even as bad as R-3 was, hounding Dick for proof of his position was silly, and hounding Don

Ditter for an explanation bordered on childish.

[From a later letter] I didn't go into the ombudsman dispute last month, but I should let you know that there I don't agree. I still back up my comments from last month about our respective ignorance(gee, you'll have to edit these two letters as one at this rate); however, seeing Mark's and Rod's analyses confirms my original opinion: aside from being a careless GM, Dick Magtin was not in the wrong in his conduct of your game at the time you appealed. Now, his "ultimatum" was "irregular" and probably cause for removal to a new GM (IF you could convince the other players), but everything previous was by the book, especially DIAS. No, I don't GM by the book (IF one of my players wants to be a real stickler, he could force a DIAS declaration—but I'm revising my housevules). But Dick is allowed to.

[From a later letter] Okay, maybe I'll never be convinced that you didn't go after a python with an elephant gun. But I liked the overall tone and effect. The ombudsman section, still, has not revealed anything new to me; I would still agree with Rod. Incidentally, it appears that you do too(i.e., Dick was right in action

but not in principle). Issat so?

'Guy Hail (Texas, USA): "Dick Martin screwed you around to be sure, but it is only a hobby, Gary."

D Guy Hail pubbed, and just folded, The Great War In Modern Memory.

Scott Hanson (Minnesota, USA): "Now that the two issues are out, maybe we can forget about all this. But, kids, we can all learn from this unpleasant experience. This whole thing between Dick and Gary goes beyond just R-3--it was a clash between personalities and attitudes about the hobby, and it could probably have been avoided (Not that I mean to place blame on either Gary or Dick). Allow me to generalize (quite badly). Gary, being a very careful and thorough player, got upset with the inconsistent GMing. Dick, being fun-loving, got peeved when Gary got picky. Being a bit on the crazy side myself, I perhaps sympathize a little more with Dick, but I can understand where both of them are coming from."

Pat Hart (South Carolina, USA): "I am very surprised about the ombudsman role in disputes. What's his use if a:GM doesn't have to abide by his decision?"

Pat Hart writes articles for various zines, including ES (see page 5) and also does the DIPSCRIPTIONS in each EE.

Steve Langley (California, USA): "I don't think you had a case for GM interference re the Austrian build -- nor for Dick's arbitrary removal. The business of DIAS certainly could have been handled better but still wasn't reason for declaring the game irregular. So, OK you have long since accepted that.

Martin's handling of the ombudsman selection was way out of line. Michalski did fine. Ditter should have done something. And since that was your point, well taken."

Mark Larzelere (Maryland, USA): "It looks like you are just disgusted with the way your protest and game were handled and are appealing to the hobby at large for some sympathy. I can sympathize with you to a point because I once had a legitimate complaint that nobody took seriously either. I think all this shows is that the hobby could use a better way of handling disputes. Even if the mediator thinks one side is clearly wrong, he should give him FULL "due course" in hearing his complaint. Failing to do this risks him having bad feelings later on."

Mark Largelere is the pubber of <u>Appalling Greed</u> and he runs the Marco Poll.

Bruce Linsey (New York, USA): "I believe that Dick is a sloppy, poor GM and that R-3 was not well-run. I do not, however, believe that the game should have been declared irregular. As Berch has already done, I'll go over your complaints point by point and give my opinions on each. [Bruce then did this and concluded the following]....I conclude then that none of these points is strong enough to make the game irregular, although several of them are very indicative of lousy GMing.

On to other matters: Ditter, in my opinion, should have questioned Dick concerning the removal of Jack[Masters]. This is too major a point not to be studied and all the facts should have been known before he made a decision concerning the regularity of the game. In the end, I believe his ruling would have been the same as it was --- but I agree that he should have investigated the matter more thoroughly than he did.

I do not think that this omission makes him unfit for the job of BNC."

Mark Luedi (Indiana, USA): "In that ombudaman thing, I would be inclined to agree with Walker and Berch.... (while reading both Walker's and Berch's opinions, I tended to agree with most of the points they were making). I do think the matter(s) should have been investigated further by some body. "doing that. Perhaps some good will indeed come of it. Perhaps an ombudsman could recommend to the BNC that a game be declared irregular. The BNC could then still have the final decision, but wouldn't have to do the casework; and could also act as a "court of appeals" should anyone disagree with the findings of the first ombudsman.

Few games run smoothly enough to be declared "regular" it seems. It's all a pretty subjective thing. Anyways, I haven't really the in-depth experience to delve deeply into the matter. But boy, were EE's 18 and 19 most interesting. Not to mention

Randolph Smyth (Alberta, Canada): "This letter is provoked more by your other comments in the issue which don't relate directly to your disagreements with Dick Martin. Most critically, it worries me that you seem disillusioned with the existing ombudsman system, at least as it applies to defining games as "irregular". As an occasional ombudsman myself, and after our telephone conversation a couple of months ago on the subject, I'll throw my two cents in that things aren't as bad as they seem. As far as I know, all your facts are right(e.g. only the BNC can call the game "irregular"), but I think you're attaching undue importance to this. (I may be repeating some of what I said on the phone, but...).

I mean, what does "irregular" mean, anyhow? What is the point and effect of calling a game irregular? The term seems to have developed a life of its own, approximately synonymous with "damned". But damned by whom? Players go on the warpath and reputable GMs quake in their boots at the threat that their games might be "irregularized". Rather like keeping records of the incidence of leprosy..everyone runs screaming.

turning only to hurl a few stones.

As near as I can figure from early issues of Terminus and Everything, the BNCs of the time made little notes with the game write-ups, whenever anything seemed not quite kosher. The criteria were never hard and fast: I seem to remember for instance, that one BNC made no special mention of allowing a single player to command two positions(at different times) while his predecessor made a big deal out of it. Only in later years were the occasional games stuck with the formal label "irregular".... ... without changing the ad hoc nature of the decision-making process at all! (My involvement in the hobby only goes back to 1973, so I'm making deductions about the earlier years by inspection of the records. A real old-timer like Rod Walker may have some corrections to make on this). Anyhow, calling a game "irregular" seems to be only a warning from the BNC to various ratings masters to take an extra-hard look at a game, to see if it meets their criteria for inclusion in a ratings list. In compiling the CPCRL[Calhamer Point Count Revised List] this summer, I left out a few wacky-looking games that were not commented on by the BNC of the time, and included a few that were condemned by the BNC. So there is even a large grey area in the practical application of an "irregular" label.

I understand from the zine that you are no longer particularly interested in having your game in Retaliation declared irregular. Still, I think the history of the term(if I have it right) goes a long way to explaining Don Ditter's apparent disinterest in the affair, and perhaps even Dick Martin's pheice of John Michalski as an ombudsman. Your specific request that irregularity should be addressed may have been largely ignored because "irregularity" per se has very little meaning in the formal sense. Your question may have been skimmed in the same way that you might skim over a novice's request to have one of his games declared "friendly".

What does that mean, and how does one act on it?

Certainly Don [Ditter] and Dick [Martin] were both remiss in not explaining this to you when you first went to them with the problem, if your description of events is correct. But I wouldn't say they were grossly negligent. Hell, if I was getting married, I would have better things to do for six months than answer odd requests from relative novices. I'd be letting people down during that period, not fulfilling my committments, but that's the way it is sometimes -- none of us are professionals. I can't comment further without seeing Don's justification ("not for print"), but for the moment I'm still willing to give him the benefit of the doubt. (Three months must seem a lot longer to you than it does to me. The speed of normal first-class mail to and from Medicine Hat[Randolph's home], and all that.)

There is also the wider question of whether GMs and ombudsmen are in some kind of ((Continued on page 3)))

GM comment:

Mass Murders began with an A/T alliance in the east and endless possibilities elsewhere. The first stab of the game came in Fall 1901, with the French move into London. It was, in my opinion, the only stab of the game. There were wars elsewhere, but no real surprises. Yes, the stage was set for one of the most boring games in the history of postal Diplomacy. It was only the action off the board that kept the game somewhat, uh, interesting. The press helped stoke the flames of hate, resulting in threats of multiple resignations as early as Winter 1901. Feelings were being bruised from La Jolla to Flushing, until the matter ended with a hasty apology in Spring 1902. Looking back, I think Keith bent over backwards to temporarily return matters to their proper perspective, and I belatedly thank him for it.

On the board however, Keith made what I considered to be an error in strategy by choosing to wipe out England rather than immediately push on against Germany. England was committed to Scandanavia while Germany pushed into Austria. By eliminating England in 1903, not only did France lose a possible stronghold (deterrant at the very least) in Scandanavia, but also lost the chance to gobble up the very vulnerable German centers. As the stubborn Russian progressed in Scandanavia, all hopes of a French win were lost. After all, France can't make much progress against a strong A/T in the south. At this point (WO3), it was fairly obvious that the game would be a draw. The only question now was, who would share.

That question began a ten month period of bickering, namecalling, allegations of GM favoritism, calls to abandon the game, threats, innuendos, and general good clean fun! I suppose that events outside the game could have affected things here also. At any rate, as people lost their cool, hard feelings resulted. It was no secret that everyone wanted the game to end. That you people finally got your shit together and came to an acceptable and honorable end is a tribute to all of you.

Special thanks go to Gary Coughlan and Dick Martin for running the game in their respective zines. It's a shame Gary didn't get in on the front end, when the press was excellent and there was still some fun to be had.

Congratulations to Bob, Keith, Dick, Mark and Kathy on the draw.

Now, I know that new zeens come along pretty often, and silently sink (or splash) into oblivion just about as fast, so this may not be all that big a thing on the surface. However, what makes it a newsworthwitem to me is the wording he used in his flyer/exphanation of his decision. You see, Bob acknowledges that he sees an obligation to his players to carry through with the commitment he made when he opened the game. He asks for material contributions to spruce up FH now that it is on its own, but little other than that. He will take it from there, and go with what (ever) he has, whether convenient for him or not. This strikes quite a chord in me. You see, a few years back, I wrote in the late BRUTUS BULLETIN, in either an attack on some GM or in answer to some letter, that I viewed CMing as a matter of honor. Once you agree to take on and run a game, whether for a fee for for free, you assume an obligation, and one which you are honor-bound to carry out. That obligation is not a function of how much free time your current girlfriend allows you, or whether you have visited your folks often enough, or whether your dog needs to be walked or not. You are obligated to carry out the duties you pledged people you would when you said "I'll be the GM", both when it is convenient for you and when it is not. Too many ansholes in this hobby always whine about how it is "just a hobby" and that for the few bucks gamefees they take in vs. their greater costs, they will do their duties when-and-if they feel in a hobbyish mood. Bullshit. PLAYING Dip is a hobby; CMing is a job. Players can do as they wish; a CM has to perform, for his pledge is not variable on the varying moods and conveniences of his time the way a "hobby" is. If it will just be a hobby to you, fine, play. Just don't GM. There are too many assholes out there already who GM when-and-if there is nothing better to do, and the image the hobby presents suffers badly for it. And rightly so. I remember to this day what Lee Kendter (Sr) wrote to me after my statement about honor appeared; paraphrasing, he expressed agreement and support and said, 'not many CMs view it that way'. Ain't it the truth?

That is why this little notice is hobby news to me, and I'm spending half a page on what would otherwise be a paragraph announcement used as a linear separator in most zines. When someone comes along and says, 'this is my duty as I see it', and he sees it the way <u>I</u> do, well by God, that <u>is</u> news! So if you, (unlike me!), have a few spare bucks, why not try it on this fledgling zine? I'd say its chances look better than most. "of collusion against the players. You went through a rough and finally unsuccessful' appeal process against a GM who has implied himself that his zine and GMing could be a lot better than it is(e.g. your quote that he publishes as he pleases for a select few subscribers). But the fact that the decision went against you doesn't mean that GMs hold all the aces in the hobby.

The court system is a pretty good analogy. In this "case", you are the aggressor, the "prosecutor", attempting to push through an unusual and drastic measure, having a GM's game declared irregular. Dick Martin stands white-faced in the docket, on trial for the murder of a perfectly good game. I say, darn right you should have to prove your case beyond any shadow of a doubt--you are taking action against him, and he is innocent until proven guilty.

But on the other side of the coin works just as well. At one point in the issue, you implied that Dick might try to throw you out of your Retaliation game. In fact, as long as you follow all the rules as a player, I doubt he will try, no matter how much he may dislike you. Then, should the case be appealed, the onus is on him to justify taking such an action against one of his players. If he chooses to make light of that case, then the game would almost certainly be declared irregular: you (the player) are then annocent until proven guilty.

So, the cards are usually stacked against someone -- but it's not always the

player that bears the burden of proof.

Finally, you seem to be searching for an institution that can make an incompetent/ /unethical GM adhere to higher standards to avoid punishments severe enough to drive enough to drive him from the hobby. (You don't actually say anything like this, but it appears to be the only real thrust of your proposed Irregular Games Certification Board). Sadly, it's simply impossible. It's incongruous to hold Bernie Oaklyn up as an example, but the guy has been publishing FLD Front du Liberation de Diplomacy for years, successfully, despite the odium of virtually the entire hobby. The publisher is king, as long as he remains within the laws of the land, because no hobby organization can possibly stop him from using a typewriter and duplicating facilities to put out a zine. No hobby organization can prevent readers from reading or subscribers from subscribing to this material either. "Public opinion" is all we have -- but as many Canadians have found out over the past year, a zine on the way out has a strange kind of power, since the publisher doesn't give a damn about public opinion either. You say that Mark Berch asked you to re-direct your energies into something constructive. I think it's up to you to decide what is most important for you in the long term, but you should establish whether the output of your project can live up to your intentions for it -- otherwise you will end up being frustrated by your own creation. Do what you want, as long as you can do what you think.

I hope you have not been reading this so far in a negative way. It's a reaction to your own comments, remember, and I've picked out the ones that I feel need more information and evaluation. Without having heard the other side, it certainly appears that, in general, you're being treated rather shabbily."

Kevin Stone (Pennsylvania, USA): "As to the major topic in #18, let me say that I am sorry the whole situation came up. I realize that both issues are free (you told us about 69 times!), but I'd rather have paid for them both and read some of your typical outstanding material.

First off, I don't side with you on this issue. I agree that you have been mistracted. Mad I been the ombudsman or BNC, I might have declared the game irregular.

The best way to illustrate my reasoning is to relate the case of Grove City College vs. Department of Education [Kevin attends Grove City College]. Several years ago, the Department of Education (Health, Education and Welfare at the time) wanted the college to sign some papers concerning discrimination and our compliance to Title IX. This entailed a great deal of paperwork, so the college didn't sign, citing our rights as a private school. The penalty for not signing is the cessation of federal funds. The only problem was that Grove City accepts no federal aid. So the Department of Education attempted to cut off direct student loans to our students. The college them sued on behalf of these students. At the the college, but still insisted ((Continued on page 32))

"that we sign the papers. Even though millions of people support our position, we lost our first two decisions and are now taking the case to the United States Supreme Court.

I know in my heart that the college is right as I'm sure you know you are right in your dispute with Dick. However, if we lose in the Supreme Court, it won't matter that I or anyone else knows we are right. So it is with you--you lost your case with an ombudsman and took it to the "Supreme Court" of irregular games, the BNC. If we lose our case with the Supreme Court, we will have two choices: sign the papers or close the school. When you lost your case, you had two choices: accept the decision and continue play or resign from the game.

As for Dick's actions, I question whether or not he actually imposed DIAS. If he specifically states in his houserules that DIAS is not in effect and switches in mid-game, he is wrong. If his houserules made no mention of this however, he is not "imposing" anything---he is merely repeating Part II of The Rules of Diplomacy: "Players may terminate the game by mutual agreement before a winner is determined, in which case all players who still have pieces on the board share equally in a draw."

As I said before, I am truly sorry about the whole situation. I only hope that after these issues are run through the mill, we will see no more of it. I plan to volunteer for John Caruso's Ombudsman Service Pool [See page 33] to help prevent something like this from ever being blown out of proportion again. Keep up the great work."

 \Box Kevin Stone shows how subbers, i.e. non-pubbers, can participate meaningfully in the hobby by volunteering for various committees and providing feedback.

Porter Wightman (New York, USA): "I decided I'd wait until I'd seen both issues before commenting on the topic.....As far as Dick Martin is concerned I only have sympathy for you....On the other hand I believe the ombudsman ruled as he should have--I have on more than half a dozen occasions sent in orders conditional on who's orders get used for various countries.

Apart from this, my philosophy is that a resignation is a resignation. Once submitted it's irrevocable--after all the GM notifies all players immediately and appoints a replacement--it would be too easy for abuses to occur were resignations able to be rescinded at the drop of a hat.

The question of Martin promising to accept Masters' orders if they arrived, however, does complicate the story. I believe conditional orders were called for and, if I had been a player NOT allied with Masters, I would have been upset because I wouldn't have know with as much certainty as his allies whether he was in the game or not!!

In summary—though Martin was revealing the breakdown of his interest in his games—I don't believe his missteps were severe enough that appropriate measures couldn't have been undertaken by you to insure some semblance of continuity given Masters' participation or not.

Maybe you find my logic lacking or my heart hard-but I've even played in games where the GM has supplied standby orders when he's not been able to dig up a standby!! This insures no NMRs but it requires great trust that the GM is writing up a set of orders before the other orders come in and sticks by them. Generally I find it an entirely unacceptable practice-but I continue in these games to their conclusion because the other players deserve no less a consideration. They, also, may get burned by GM standby orders. Examples like this are all the more reason zines like EE should stay around and occasionally run issues like #18 and #19 to get the Dip community to come to some sort of consensus on when a resignation is a resignation. Most of mainstream Dip would never consider GM standby orders proper. Maybe now they will come to accept resignations as final.

Department Porter Wightman contributes a lot of time and effort (and his machine!) in helping the pubbers of The Modern Patriot, Hoof and Mouth and lately The Shogun's Sword.

Jim Williams (Iowa, USA): "The Players' Rights article was interesting. Up until I read it, I had no idea what your complaints were with R-3 (specifically). If I were the ombudsman in that matter, I believe I would have ruled the same way John Michalski did, though. As far as your fleet removal goes, as John says, the GM could do ((Continued on page \$3))

"practically anything, as long as he had a half reasonable explanation and did not contradict his own house rules.

As for the removal of Masters from the game, again, any half-assed explanation would be enough to justify that move. Suppose Dick said that he accepted Jack's initial resignation, and did not want to go through the trouble of informing his replacement that he was not needed when Jack offered to continue. Therefore he simply left matters as they were.

As GM, he could even say that didn't like Jazk's policies Jack Masters is the pubber of <u>Black Frog</u> and decided not to renew his sub. Subs are needed to play, so...At any rate, Dick made his decisions in R-3 based on his judgment as a fair GM, or in order to screw you, but only he knows for sure. You think that he was out to get

you and I'm inclined to agree with you...but...

While you're treating Dick with kid gloves, instead of giving it to him with both barrels, your patience wears thin with Ditter and he gets the brunt of it. Oh, maybe, he didn't work his butt off trying to uncover every scrap of evidence in the case, and sure, your side was very well prepared, and presented, and you went out of your way to do the whole thing utterly by the book, but the bottom line is, that you had no case. (Even though you'd been screwed).

I think that Ditter realized this, and although he was remiss in his communications with you, he had done all he could as far as the end result. (He may have been able

to garner more facts, but not enough to warrant declaring the game irregular).

In other words, my dear friend, in my humble opinion, you were way too hard on Don. I'm not going to belabor the point or even bring it up again. I just felt that since I stand behind you when I think you're right, I should tell you when I don't agree.

Don said that he would have resigned the R-3 position early on, if he were you. I would have too."

Those were the responses to EEF 18 and #19, a good cross-section of response which shows concern about relations between GMs and players. As mentioned several times above, John Caruso has launched the Ombudsman Service System(OSS) to help guarantee that the rights of both players and GMs are looked after. The following is written by John Caruso, the pubber of Whitestonia:

OMBUDSMAN SERVICE SYSTEM (OSS)

"This is an active, current list of those who have volunteered their services to be an ombudsman for disputes. The list is held and distributed on request by John Caruso, 160-02 43 Ave, 2nd Floor, Flushing, New York 11358 USA.(212)-353-9695.

There are a few things you should know before you jump into this.

- (1) Both parties[The GM and the player] must agree upon the use of an ombudsman, and on who is chosen.
- (2) An ombudsman can't declare a game irregular. Only the BNC can do that. However, the ombudsman can recommend irregularity to the BNC, and in 95% of the cases, the BNC upholds the ombudsman's decision.
- (3) Be absolutely sure that both of you have tried to work out the problem before you have approached the OSS. You'd be surprised, with a little effort, that the 2 parties may be able to resolve the difference without the need of an ombudaman.

- (4) Take the time to write out specifically what the problem is, why you feel you were screwed, dates, names, etc. If your complaint is not worth the time to detail out, then your complaint cannot be all that valid. Remember, you'll be asked to supply a copy to the ombudsman, so present your argument straight-forwardly and to the point. Refrain from emotional comments and name-calling. Stick to the facts, as that is all the ombudsman is interesting in. Also include the names and addresses of all the parties that may be involved, or that can shed any light on the dispute.
- (5) Be prepared to accept any decision the ombudsman makes, whether it is favorable to you, or unfavorable to you.

THE CDO CODE OF ETHICS

While the U.S. does not have a generally recognized code of ethics for GMs, Canada does. It is the Canadian Diplomacy Organization's Code of Ethics. Until such time as the U.S. has a code of ethics for GMs, I as the GM of EE's games will abide by the CDO Code of Ethics to guarantee players in this zine full protection. The CDO Ombudsman is currently Randolph Smyth, 212 Aberdeen St., S.E., Medicine Hat, Alberta, CANADA TIA ORL.

Larry Peery, pubber of <u>Xenogogic</u>, is asking for input from pubbers, subbers, players and GMs for what you think should be included in a U.S. code of hobby ethics. Write Larry at P.O. Box 8416, San Diego, California 92102. (The CDO Code of Ethics follows below):

- (1) I will try to adjudicate my games in an error-free manner. If an error occurs, I will correct it as quickly as possible and with as little disruption to the game as possible. I will try to use good judgment in weighing the harm done to the individual player against the harm done to the game as a whole.
- (2) If a difference of opinion between a player and myself is not solvable by discussion between us, I will submit the matter to the CDO Ombudsman rather than arbitrarily deciding in my own favour.

THE CDO CODE OF ETHICS (Continued from page 34):

(3) I will be as punctual as possible in sending game results to the players (or to the publisher, in the case of a guest GM), bearing in mind that I am a hobbyist rather than a professional, and punctuality may sometimes be affected by personal factors. If I habitually have a delay of more than a few days between deadline and mailing, I will make this known to prospective players before they enter games. If at any time I find myself no longer able to maintain my habitual standards of punctuality, to the point where games are seriously affected, I will turn the games over to another GM rather than carrying on in an inferior fashion.

(4) If any of my normal GMing practices differ from those recommended in this Code, I will make them known to prospective players before they enter games. I will maintain a set of houserules and policy outlines and will provide it to players on their first entry into a game GMed by me. If I change my houserules or policies during the course of a game, I will acquaint all players with the change before

any player is seriously affected by it.

(5) If a publisher or carbon-copy GM, I will keep in touch with the mainstream

of the hobby by cooperating with hobby institutions and so on.

(6) I will use replacement players wherever possible, and in particular, will not let games be spoiled by allowing major positions to go into civil disorder. I will avoid GMing practices which would make my games irregular, or unrateable by current systems(example: using replacement players who have already played in the game).

(7) In general, I will try to deal fairly and honestly with players at all times; I will try to be impartial in my adjudications and my handling of games; I will try not to give one player advantages not available to other players, where such advantages can be easily prevented; I will give players the benefit of the doubt where differences of opinion arise; I will try to maintain good communications between players and GMs, in particular by explaining reasons for gamemasterial actions when they are not likely to be immediately apparent.

I've seen it twice already, and will probably go a third time. I don't think I've seen any other film three times, but E.T. is special. The cinemas in Holland were a bit disappointed. It's doing very well, but they expected more. However in England, I think it broke all records." Franke Petersen (West Germany): "E.T. made its first appearance in the

German movie theaters on Dec. 10th and I was one of the 700,000 Germans who saw it in the first 3 days. That movie is coming on so strong, it's unbelievable. Just here in Eckernförde, which is a city of only 23,000 pitiful souls, it's in its 4th week, and there are more to come. I can kind of see why it's such a great success here and all those other countries which are shaken by depression -- it's a perfect distraction from the worries about finding jobs that are not there anymore. Yeah, and it's damn funny. As for my part, I really enjoyed it. E.T. even gives away a clear message on the doubtful way our world is run by a bunch of technocrats." C-G Spare(Finland): "Do you know what I mean with 'green' people? Perhaps you do not (yet) have them there. No, I am not referring to E.T."

I have heard of the "Green" movement in West Germany yes. I hope they do not get into a position where they can paralyze the government there. As for E.T., I've heard it was banned completely in Norway because it teaches(supposedly) children to distrust adults! Frauke sent me a clipping about E.T., called "Der Ausserirdische" in German which also said of E.T.: 'Er hat Angst. Er ist allein. Er is 3 Millionen Lichtjahre von zu Hause entfernt....E.T."

It's beautiful here in the "dead of winter" -- 70 degrees in the day, 40 degrees at night. Plus you get to see the sun for 12 plus hours a day, which is a nice change from Chicago, where you're lucky to see it once a week in the winter."

 \square Bob does the <u>Mass Murders</u> game which appears in EE and which just ended (See page \mathbb{A}) His next game will begin as soon as he is settled in his new home. I've been shivering in Memphis now for weeks with highs in the low 40s. Tonight it's in the mid-20s. But someone else really has me drooling for the warmer climes and that is Jack Fleming who is now in Old Mexico.....

Jack Fleming(Oaxaca, Mexico): "I got your letter today. Thanks. It took a week to get here which is about average -- some take 4 days, some 2 weeks. I'm in a restaurant and splurging on a comida corrida(daily special) for 160 pesos(148 to the dollar so it's about a buck ten or so). I just had a noodle soup and now a fried egg has arrived(she said something about being out of rice listed on the menu--this must be the substitute). I have been spending only 90 or 100 pesos for the comida corrida in some other restaurants so this is a step up.

It's good to hear that my orders are there -- since I apparently am without allies in the Windsor game, the least I can do for myself is move the pieces. It looks like a sure win for Austria. Oh, well, it's just a game....

The next course has arrived -- the tortillas and beans I recognize, but this main dish has me stumped -- I think it's "Bocadillos de Califlor." Maybe some sort of vegetable combination(heavy on the califlor as they spell it) that has been baked and now covered with a hot sauce of tomatoes, chilis and onions. It's pretty good.

I haven't had any tequila yet, but plan to buy a small bottle tonight (250 ml for about 50 cents) in your honor. I'm also going to try to get an article together for you tonight. If it's enclosed I did and if it isn't then the tequila won out.....

Now I've got your letter open so I'll get at some of the things you asked about. No, it isn't like Berlin in the 20s(Not if Liza Minnelli told the truth in "Cabaret") It's a lot dirtier and the average people are a lot poorer. Comparisons do pop up for me quite often. In some ways it seems the entire "Third World" functions in the same manner [Jack traveled in Asia and Africa in the early 1970s]. Take a farmer or a street kid from here and put him in Egypt, India, Laos or just about anywhere and if he knew the language, he'd adapt quickly. The same piles of paperwork for anything halfway official pompous self-worshipping officials, endless waits, delays, loud ((Continued on page 43))

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"cheap buses, machismo and festivals. It's great!

There are some incredibly severe problems in Mexico now -- the huge foreign debt and the population increasing at a reckless rate are the two top ones. Sometimes I read where statements are made about not knuckling under to American pressure on the debt---most of which is owed to American banks. But personally I see no anti-American sentiments. The people continue(after a month and a half) to be incredibly friendly. open and courteous. The population problem is probably the most serious Mexico faces (or rather ignores). Every woman over 16 seems to be carrying a baby and often young couples go by with 3,4 or 5 kids. Children are everywhere. If Mexico continues to ignore their population growth (and traditions, the Church and machismo all call for large families), there are some very dark times ahead south of the border.

Dessert has arrived -- bananas covered with cream. Yeah, my room costs a dollar a night. And it's no dive--a 9 X 11 foot room, clean, with a single bed, desk, mirror and chest for clothes (the bathroom is down the hall). The window opens on a great view of the Santo Domingo church and the landlady is old and absent-minded. It's great. There are cheaper rooms in town(I heard of some for 50¢)--but for my money, the Posada Margarita is home.

As for my Spanish---I have a fine time when I go into a restaurant or a hotel---- I know what questions to ask and what sort of answers I'll receive. But when a shoeshine kind comes up(they're everywhere) and starts into some questions I'm often lost. Though for the last week I've been taking some tutoring at a library, so I think I'm getting better. I'm sure I'm doing much better than when I crossed the

border—then I spoke practically no Spanish.

How about the prices? With the new exchange rate(148 pesos to the dollar) I haven't paid more than \$3.50 for a hotel(and that was \$3.50 for a dive in Mexico City) Other than that, tops have been \$2.50. Food is reasonable -- this morning bacon, eggs, and coffee cost me 45 cents. Lunch of beef stew(caldo de res) was 40 cents -- including the 10 cent bottle of Pepsi and tonight's dinner is 160 pesos(including the coffee that just arrived) or a dollar and ten cents. Reasonable. Handicrafts are very cheap and the biggest problem is deciding which you can possibly not buy. It's the Colden Age for traveling down here.

For those interested in a bit less hardship and more Regular American Comfort, the prices are still reasonable. Some of the best hotels in Oaxaca charge about seven dollars a night(for 2!) and the best restaurants offer steak dinners for little more than 2 dollars! This place is the deal of a lifetime!

A few last things. Before I left on this trip a few people warned me that I'd never return. The Mexican Menace. Violence, knives, gangs, etc. It isn't true. Mexican people I've met have been without exception friendly, and non-belligerent. American Rascist stereotype certainly doesn't fit the Mexico I've seen.

Let's forget the article and you can just print this. Right now I'm over in the Zócalo(town square) sitting on a park bench under a street lamp. In the bandstand located right in the center of the block, the brass band is playing some music I half recognize. The families are strolling around the block, kids running right and left. On the next bench to my right a drunk is solemnly directing the music with one hand, his head resting on the other. The fountains are bubbling, shoe shiners shining, and chiclets saleskids pushing their gum. This is the life!

Most Mexicans think I'm French! Apparently red hair is "French"!

Thanks for the view of "Life South of the Border Down Mexico Way". Jack travels around the country but his "main base" is in Oaxaca which is about 240 miles southeast of Mexico City. What about siestas -- does the whole country shut down? Smash our stereotypes! Let's hear the true story. Meanwhile, back in the states......

<u>Bill Becker(Michigan, USA): "How's life in the frying pan? I've seen a few jibes at</u> you position on what I call hobby standards."

Al Pearson (West Virginia, USA): "You think most of the criticims in most of the zines is unfair and one-sided; well, it probably is, but now no one ever told you the world was going to be fair. There is very little you can do about it.....So, what is there to do at this stage? Nothing, just let it blow over; and it will in a few months. Yes, it will probably be rough for a while, but if the hobby is worth it, you will stick it out."

Bob Osuch (Arizona, USA): "A bit of advice -- you may take it with a grain of salt. I believe it would be in everyone's best interests if all the recent hassles were buried ((Continued on page 44+))

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"as of now. Start the new year off on the right foot--ignore ignorance....if you keep retaliating in print against all your detractors you may find little sympathy left in the hobby. You've probably already thought over this very thing, but in case you hadn't it's something to consider."

Steve Langley (California, USA): "Hang in there, Gary. You are a fine writer and are very funny. All you have to do to weather this is wait. I know it hurts. I know it is hard, but you have the advanto reply to or dignify [Steve names a zine] and the like. I know who you

are enough to know that you do care for other people. Not everyone does. I think you did 'overreact' a while back--I know you are not alone in 'overreacting.'" Steve Hutton (Ontario, Canada): "EE #20 was very good. It's good to see a return to the old EE! After #18 and #19, I was worried that the old EE might be dead." Mary Beck (California, USA): "The hobby really is very disappointing in so many ways, and I feel very bad when I see the people who keep it together and alive and put such excellent efforts into it(namely yourself and a few others) wind up defending themselves--or should I say having to defend themselves from petty innuendoes and bickering, etc... The surprise of my life from the beginning introduction to Dip was that "a game" based correspondence could get so out of hand. I certainly don't blame you for getting so upset. with what has happened --- I hope it has calmed down somewhat by now."

Daphne Fritz(California, USA): "It really saddens me that you're being attacked from certain elements in the hobby. I think sometimes you see attacks where there aren't any, but some are bona-fide attacks. It always seemed to me that this hobby was friendly. I didn't think things could escalate and become as serious as this whole feud has. Please Gary, take it easy. I know you're hurting, but lashing out won't help....How old are you? (I've heard 26-35)."

☐ That does it! WHO told you I was 35?! Thirty-Five?! Arrrggghhh!!! I am actually 31 and while I'm at it, I may as well make some other comments. I said in EE #20 that "acid tongues" and "acid pens" could do what they liked in the other zines that I wouldn't be participating in that element of our hobby. And I'm not. But in the meantime, let me allay all of your fears or most of them. To wit Idea I am not an alcholic I am not a "closet fascist" I am not mounting any letter or phone campaigns against anyone..... I do have a sense of humor. I also know what is not humor.....I am not a "monster" (I may not be "God's Gift to Women" --- or Men depending on your type of "humor" --- but I do have at least average looks)it is "news" to most of the people listed that I have "attacked" them. Why not write to them as Fdid?..... I do not print letters which say on them, or within them that they are "not for print". Every letter which is printed in EE is saved by me, letter and envelope. If anyone has doubts, please write to me and I will send you a copy of any letter that is disputed. (In fact I save every letter that is sent to me whether it is printed or not). I think that EE #20 and this EE show that I mean what I say about making EE as it was from EE 1-17. Readers looking for smears and controversy will have to go elsewhere.

Mark Berch (Virginia, USA): "I was surprised and disappointed at your statement on page 15 [In EE #19] that, "Mark Berch completely backed Dick's GMing in R-3 every step of the way", for several reasons:

- A. You said you weren't going to do this. In your July 21 letter to us, you said specifically (and repeated later in your zine) that while #18 would be just your viewpoint, with no comments by us, #19 would be just ours, and you would not be commenting on our analysis of the R-3 GMing.
- B. Your description of my position is totally inaccurate. I used the phrase "poor GM" to describe his GMing of that particular game. I made numerous criticisms of his GMing, such as saying on page 26 that he took a "tremendous risk" at one point. I called two actions of his "inexcusable." At a number of points, I noted that if I were a GM, I'd do things differently.
- C. You inserted that summary of my actions into a place where it was of no relevance, and potentially misleading. The topic there was not Dick's handling of R-3, but your handling of 81 AM [Swedish Roundabout]. The quote that you gave from my letter concerned the 81 AM situation. So why did you preface my quote with my ((Continued on page 45))

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, supposed opinion in the R-3 matter? They may be connected in your mind, they may be connected in Dick's mind, but they are not in mine. If you believe that my opinion of "Dick's GMing in R-3" is in any way related to my comments on 81AM, you are mistaken, and I hope your readers have not drawn any such connection.

Also in #19, you say that you are "fair". But that is an evaluation to be made by others, not by you. At best you can say that you try to be fair. I personally do not thank you have been at all fair to Dan Stafford. You have unfairly assumed that he was being malicious. You refer to his use of the word "homosexual" in describing you as a vicious lie, as character assassination, and as name calling. But you have no evidence of any malicious intent on his part--indeed, you have his explicit statement that he is not anti-homosexual. That is important if you are going around

saying he was trying to harm you.

In this regard, I draw your attention to the Gregory Stewart piece in RE #17. the same issue in which you complained about DD Diplomacy Digest, Mark's zine This piece began with some snide implications that I am not, shall we say, sexually satisfying to my wife. Did I respond by savage denunciations? No. There was no evidence from the context of an attempt to hurt me. I see no evidence from the context of the Diplomacy By Moonlight article that he was intending to hurt you. My assumption, and apparently that of some of your readers, was that it wasn't intended to be taken totally seriously. He did preface it, after all, with a comment about how he used to think the Jews ran the hobby.

As for your comments about DD, until such time as you are willing to give me specifics of your criticism, there is no way I can either defend myself, or print a retraction/apology. That seems to be the way you want to leave things: Vague Charges and Nasty Comments, With No Real Possibility of Resolution."

 $ar{oldsymbol{eta}}$ You charged me with "boycotting" the Leeder Poll. I think John Caruso in Whitestonia #60/61, page 14(November 9, 1982) expressed the point very well. not ever "boycott" the Leeder Poll.

EE #19 was yours. I did not comment in any way on your comments on R-3. And if you reread that July 21 letter, you will see I expected you to type your own comments -- that's what all that talk about margins and 65% reduction meant. Yet, you said in EE #19 to me: "Please feel free to correct all errors of spelling and punctuation. I know how you despise such things." I went ahead and typed all 52 pages of your comments.

While you called Dick Martin a "poor GM", you also upheld his decisions in every case because I, as the player, did not "win" on a single point. So when Dick was accusing me of being improper in my own GMing actions to him as a player, I printed your remarks. He knew you had backed him so there would be no reason for him to disagree with your assessment in 81 AM. I had not acted improperly as a GM and your comments on that showed that clearly to Dick Martin, whose GMing you had previously backed up in the essentials.

I am not "going around" anywhere saying that Stafford harmed me. I made my comments on that in this zine and Diplomacy By Moonlight. In fact, I have not written any letters or made any comments anywhere on any "controversies" since late November. You will have to look elsewhere for people who are making comments. Yes, I do try to be

fair and I do a damn better job of it than my current detractors.

There was no Gregory Stewart piece in EE #17; there was a Gregory Russell piece however if accuracy means anything. These pieces have been written for over 2 years and have appeared in many zines and are well-known to be fiction. Obviously everyone knew that it was not you, Mark Berch yourself talking in that play. It was obviously

not real. And Gregory Russell is well-known to you.

By contrast, I do not know Dan Stafford. I met him at ORIGINS this past summer and said, "Hello? You're Uncle Dan? You look too young to be anyone's uncle." That was it. He said nothing to me. Then I see his comments, not in an article, but in a letter to a sine whose pubber had tried to get Stafford to not print it. Stafford insisted that it be printed. Mike Mills(New York, USA): "In response to Spare's article "Americans are Different" all I can say is that he's right: I have witnessed several such embarrassing moments. I guess, since I'm American by birth that I should be more upset with this view of the US, but I do think that most Americans are crass, brazen, chauvinistic and inconsiderate when either overseas or as witnessed by what passes for "popular culture" in the States.

Anyhow, I asked the young lady in French where the "toilettes" were, as this was one phrase I thought would be important to know in Paris. She rambled on, thinking I knew French well, which I didn't. I caught the words "hall" "to the left" and "gallery of sculpture." I said thank you. And told the Texans where to go. To which they said, "You know they really ought to speak English."

I wonder if French tourists say the same thing in the USA.

Face it. US culture is money, power, fame, celebrity status with the emphasis on the cheap and easy fix full of substitute values. US culture is the disposable culture.

If you ever make it to Europe, just watch the American tourists taking their tours. They ride around the cities and countryside in air-conditioned buses and are taken to first the popular attraction and then the rip-off gift shops for Americans. You won't find them in twos and threes travelling by train, proring over train schedules and sharing food with some locals and trying to communicate with them. It's they spend big bucks for the trip and don't get a shot at getting eye-to-eye with the people of the country they're at, who are the "country". Buildings, rivers, and Rembrandts are the artifacts of the country; the people are the real thing. And it's not so hard to get to know them, a lot of them speak English and if you can manage a few words of their lingo, you're in business.


I once had a wonderful talk about Burgundy, fishing and wines with a Frenchman in Ireland using our mutual understanding of Spanish and a few words of French and German."
