Except for the the article beginning on this page, I won't tell you what this issue will contain because I don't know at this point. This article is dedicated to 4 of my friends, but most especially Jim Briggs who is now in the US Army in West Germany.

Jim wrote: "I've really been depressed lately. Been working back-to-back(24 on, 24 off) for about a month now. When I go to the rear I've just got time to sleep, and maybe go out for a beer. Gosh I need a vacation!!!"

Well Jim's story made me think of the massive overtime

that I've been having. Then I got a call from an old Army buddy of mine, Dave MacIntosh who went through Korean linguist training with me and was stationed in the 329th ASA in Korea with me. Dave met and married Sooki and both of them now live in Indiana and they plus Jim reminded me of some of my experiences in Korea. Another Army buddy, Tom DeGraaf, was with me on the particular time I'm about to tell you about and Tom is the one who mailed the fake Voice of Dooms and the fake Whitestonias that I did in 1980 and 1982 respectively. All are getting this issue.

Some background. While in Korea, I kept journals of what happened to me, and that is what you will be reading. I think it is a good example of what a peace-time army is like, why enlisted men view officers as assholes and well you'll see. Many of the terms won't make sense to non-Army people so on page 7-9 I'll have a little definition of terms with the numbers going first and the rest alphabetically.

Most servicemen in Korea were stationed there only 12 months. But if you had less than 120 days, or 4 months left in the Army at the end of the 12 months, you weren't worth it to the Army to relocate you back to the States, so you had to stay in Korea the rest of your Army time. I had 104 days left....AAARRRRGGGGHHHH!!! So when Dave went back to America, I had to stay and make new friends, one of whom was Tom DeGraaf. I was an E-4, the equivalent of a corporal called a "Specialist 4" and solely by virtue of being in the company for so long I was regarded as knowing what I was doing. Let's just say, I saw it all, only the officers changed, their stupidity didn't!

The unit I was with, in the 2nd Division is the one that runs PT, or rather jogged 3 miles each day as exercise. President Carter, if any of you remember his visit to Korea, did this morning run with the troops. It was always at 6 0°clock in the morning unless it was too cold which meant it had to be 6 degrees Fahrenheit (I'm guessing this is -9 degrees centrigrade for you Europeans) or less to be too cold. So let's all travel back to February, 1978 when I was in the Army and.....let Jim know that, this too will end and someday you'll write about it in your zine!

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 1978

No mail call. Mail truck had a wreck I hear. No FT because of the cold. I planned to do an ESC on 129 today but we get pre-empted by a Lt. Hendricks-Grim "bright idea" [Our officer platoon leader and Grim was another squad leader with delusions of grandeur] All teams in 3rd platoon must set up all their gear, like in the field (except for concertina). Grr. Originally Higgins [our enlisted man platoon leader] said only Chinese were to do this [We were Korean linguists but a small group of Chinese linguists were stationed with us] so they could get used to the field. It was so cold and so hard to even get stakes in the ground. We set it all up. Then Higgins told us to make a list of what we lacked. We could have done that without setting anything up. Katusas [Korean Soldiers attached to the US Army] have a 1-3 FM locker inspection. The Americans take it down. Have team chief meeting with Higgins (I had to go). Our team is to be the "roaming turkey". We'll go from hill-top to hill-top the whole field problem. I heard Grim wanted to be it but we got picked for some reason. Should be interesting. All we have to do is hearability, no recording. If nothing is up, we can post a guard and go to sleep. We're to have Friday "field briefings". East atKatusa Snack Bar with Moon. Go to Green Door with Greenjanother buddy from Mississippi. Moon was a Katusa]. Drink a zombie and several Tequila Sunrises. Feel good. Back to barracks.

Kevin G. got orders for Ft. Hood. Get Pouk to teach for me Thursday and tell Kittrell I resign as teacher Don't laugh but I gave English lessons to the Katusas Too many ESCs and too much time in the field.

DeGraaf and Green both had read the Brady article(Sept 30 here) while at Goodfellow in Texas, where linguists trained. Brady was the gung-ho general

Moon invited me to his home Feb 25th.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 2, 1978

No mail call because lst truck was wrecked yesterday, 2nd truck blew out an engine, 3rd truck arrived but no mail because weather cancelled the flight from California. Loaned Han \$10.

No PT due to cold. Radio @ 7:15 says it's one below zero. Eat breakfast with Greg. Jo, Higgins on a site survey so I'm team chief. We split up several little chores. ESCs are the big thing. Big hassle with Sig/Maintenance over our switching the huts and 2 missing 744s, not an operational turkey and because no power supply. There are drills they say.

So I rush to the motor pool, get Dellinger to switch huts again, get a dispatch without a request(thanks to Birkenbueler) and take it to Sig/Maintenance. Work with Tiny[of Sig/Maintenance. He was a huge guy] and Pabst beer on putting the clasp on by 7 PM. Also in the afternoon I help DeGraaf ESC 17 and positions. He's nice[God, what a judge of character I was!!] Also ESC 129. Grim is no longer team chief (Ha replaces him), he's training NCO for 3rd platoon and he doesn't like it at all. Have a beer party tonight with Greg and Bobby(Green) in barracks. Greg thinks he has a chanchre. I hope I don't get anything [I had recently "lost" my Asian virginity. I'm still an African virgin and a European virgin!]. Sarah Daniels said she got a DEROS inquiry on me. Top says C.O. is still going to answer my questions. Hmm. 4 new MRPV-3s came in today.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 3, 1978

Mail from Mother, Eric Good(with \$10 he owed me) and Del. No PT due to cold. Around 3 degrees but poor new guys have to go to zero fire anyway. I spend all day with DeGraaf and Jo ESCing turkey. So much is wrong—both antenna controls, one recorder, 1 744 (only one we had) and 1 901(we got another). Had to leave it overnight and will report tomorrow at 9AM to see if they can do anything with it. I write letters tonight. Tim picked up my cards for Robbin and Anita, they turned out super. Nasianka is out of ATSE, moves back to company tonight. Savage got his orders. Reports to Lewis April 19th.

DeGraaf said Min Ho asked him to buy Johnny Walker Black Label to bribe the lst Sergeant See under Katusa on page 8] Ha! I can't believe it. DeGraaf is now getting it instead of me. Same old story, won [Korean money not good in the American stores on the post] to get liquor which costs dollars.

Greg didn't go to the dispensary today. Hhhm.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1978

Mail from Carol with picture of kids. [Uh, there was no PT on Saturdays and Sundays or when you were out in the field] Up@ 7 AM. Go to Sig/Maintenance at 9 AM. Turn in stuff. No yelling. They give me 2 744s but both antenna controls still blow fuses. The local pedestal on top of turkey shakes the van. It may have been damaged in the shifting so some body may have to pay for it. Hedrick wants me to write a statement and have Hamer(who first mentioned it)[Hamer was the enlisted man over all 3 platoons] to sign it. No way, he's already tried to weasel out. McMillian[one of the company captains, semi-gung-ho] said blame can't be assessed because of so many shifts in 3rd platoon lately. Cotton is out of ATSE too. He and Paquette were with Johnson who got caught for possession by the MPs. C.O. wanted to put the Fony Bar off limits but only the General can do that. I get off about 2 PM. Eat at ASB, get February Playboy. Have beer party with Greg and we play monopoly with Matt Root. Rumors of whole company moving to 122 but nothing comes of it, except NCOs, including Higgins move somewhere.

C.O. called me in to answer my questions. He "forgot" to ask for questions at the commander's call and clock radios can stay out overnight as long as we are physically there. I get it back too. [See clock radio on page 8]. Wilson didn't bother to take the driving test. Grrr! [See driver on page 8]. ((Continued on 5))

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 1978

Mail from Aunt Ruby. Wake up about 8:15 AM. All shift people are moved to 122 today, including Tim. I'm really sorry to see him go. We move Matt's bed down off Jo's and take full advantage of the space. They were crowded. Go to small PX get goodies for the field, have Kim O.K. when Katusas had the name either Kim or Lee, we had to use their initials to distinguish them!] get 2 cases of ramyon. Go with Green, Glidewell and Wilson to Green Door to eat steaks and play spades from noon to about 4. Eat at messhall. Green has arms room guard and Leroy is CQ. I spend night writing, it has really warmed up. Hope it stays like this for the field. I catch up all my letters and fix up my duffel bag for the "field trip."

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 1978

Mail from Mother, Grandma, Aunt Lena and my contact from Dr. Huie[I had lost my left contact and wrote to my doctor in Memphis who replaced it for me!]. PT. To almost fire station[about half way of the 3 miles], we were outrunning brigade [a rival company]. Field people weren't supposed to have PT but Lt. Hendricks didn't get the word out. WCYS [my shorthand for What Can You Say? to officer stupidity and incompetence which often extended down to our sergeants as well.] At 8:15 AM we get our stuff together. Put DF stuff in conex, pack down generator. Take drive antenna out of turkey so Sig/Maintenance can work on it while we're gone. Wilson looks for a donkey dick and finally found one. Get gas in afternoon. Plans to get 5 cases of pepsis. We should be all prepared for a long time. 131(Grim's) breaks down, they switch it to 133 tonight. We're to get up at 3:30AM and leave by 7 AM. Green Door closes its doors to E-4 and below starting today. They'll be sorry because we gave them all their business. We'll see how long it lasts. Wilson goes to PT[Pyongtech, another post in the Army] Feb. 20th, Green March 6th. Hmm. We order from chogi boy. Go to sleep by 8PM.

Lee Y.S. is now on our team and is going to the field with us. Get my contact today. 1st Sergeant thought I wasn't going to the field and had me done for Cu duty. So I guess I'll get it soon after getting back. Root suggests we go some weekend to the ski resort. I like that.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 1978

70 days til DEROS. PT guys ran to theatre. WCYS.[a very short distance on the day the field people didn't have to run]. Wake up about 3:30 AM. Motorpool late. Get vehicles about 4:30 AM. Load personal gear, eat. I have to sign for green and crypto equipment. Leave @ 8:30. Go towards 208 route but we turn before there and Higgins leads us to 188, nothing but a low hill with a road over it. We get no cuts from 11:15 to 1 PM when we shut down and pack back up. He returns, takes us to 496. I was certain it was the place I saw Grace remember Grace, Dave?!] last June and it almost was. It's off to the side and has a nice bunker. We had trouble getting up the hill but finally made it.

We put camoflage and concertina around vehicles, trailor and generator and fix stove up. I can't get tape recorders to record off 744s and manpack has no cassette so we simply gist. Jo makes schedule and I'm to be guard 3-5 PM and in the van 5-7 PM. That's nice. Miller said Cpt. Mc mentioned sending me and Grim to PT[Pyongtech] for linguist rotation but not together because we're 'so valuable." Hmm. Can't set up 292 because we have no male adapter.

Our team is Wilson, DeGraaf and me, Kims O.K., D.W., Jo and Lee Y.S. We're living in a bunker with one warm room[[it had the portable stove in it] and one cold one. I'm in the warm one.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 1978

Up about 7:30 AM. The jeep died at 3 AM[our radio contact with Higgins]. The generator was turned off @ 2AM. I got it started up again @ 7:45. Put a new schedule into effect. I really wasn't working that hard and those in the afternoon get to skate out since that is most probably when we're moving around. So I have (now) guard 7 to 10 AM and van(with generator shut down so not at all) 3 to 5 AM. DeGraaf and I are the carry-weights from 10AM to 6 PM. It should work out okay but today it didn't.

No one came until 4:30 PM when Hendricks and Son came. And they only brought gas and diesel. We're down to one case of C-rats and 1 can of water. Still no 292 ((CONTINUED ON PAGE))

We're getting many cuts but no recordings and not up all the time. We push the jeep around (Hendricks') to get it started. He didn't even have a sandwich in his green machine, ha ha [Army humor, see sandwich on page?]. He said someone will be here tomorrow early. Help DeGraaf on his 3-hour shift. This wasn't our day at all. I switch cots with DeGraaf. 4 are in one room with stove, 3 aren't. He froze last night so I switch with him. Wilson and Kim D.W. say they're okay.

Hendricks said that the main site was still putting up camoflage. A ROK sergeant said we would have to move, not I.C. cleared but he didn't come back. I heard Leroy so the Js are out.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 1978

Wake up about 6:20 AM. In the Crient 13 months today. Kim D.W. locked keys in 880 and the turkey was locked last night at 11 PM. Wilson and I fish it out with a kimchi clothes-hanger. Snow starts really coming down. We take up concertina and start shutting down when Miller drives up with Greathead, McKay and Pfeiffer. Pfeiffer repatches in turkey so now recorders record 744s. McKay works on the 1st generator. Roads are icy and frozen already and snow keeps on coming down. They said main site hasn't had a hot meal yet. Grim's team has had only 6 cuts, the Chinese are not operational yet, Lt. Hendricks is going to work at ATSE after this, Lt. Pillsbury[we called him the "dough boy"] is going to be over the platoons and didn't want it.

They have trouble going down so they leave the trailor here and say we are to consider ourselves snowed in. Snow keeps coming and a windy fog. Set up a new schedule for 10 to 6PM. Still snowing tonight. We shut generator off at 8 PM. We may be stuck up here. We're down to 1 C-rat base (again!) plus our goodies. C-rat is 12 boxes. We have 7 people.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 1984

Wake up cold. Go on guard at 7AM. It's still snowing. Check out positions, vehicles and generators for status report. They don't answer. However we can hear Casey 39er who apparently cannot hear us. Shake snow from camoflage. Kim O.K. and Wilson will go down the hill to buy supplies @ noon. ROK soldiers come by hunting rabbits. Katusa may get spring water from them. Such resistance to using melted snow water instead of water can—yet they say we won't use ROK water because it's dirty! They don't seem, Wilson included, to realize how serious this can be.

Wilson and O.K. head for a village down the hill to get some supplies. Higgins Son, Miller, Greathead and Spear come about 2PM. Give supplies to last til Monday. They're all fed up with Hendricks. C.O. wanted all to come in but under the conditions it's impossible. I.G. is postponed to Feb. 23rd. Miller said he wishes he was with us. Higgins tells us to work a 12-hour day and gives us a bottle of Oscar [champagne]. I got mail from Mother, Aunt Grace, Ron and return of some money from Dr. Huie.

We put up 292 and concertina and make van operational 4-8PM. Wilson and O.K. get back about 5PM with fruit, bread and beer. Wilson went on a short time. I take a towel bath tonight. Read in Of Human Bondage and go to sleep. Ann had a baby girl, Theresa Ann on Feb 2nd. Miller said we're going in a day early. O.K. said that unlike Wilson when the girl spoke to him "I rejected her proposal." Ha ha. I've been in Korea itself 13 months today.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 11, 1984

doesn't bother me. Guard 7 to 10AM. Can't establish green coms until noon and then they can hear us but we can't hear them. Hendricks said "I go prepare the sandwich" and Higgins said "Check your sandwich". Compromises [these were "secret words" which we not to mentioned in broadcasts]. We now run 0500-0900 hours, 1100-1500, 1700-2100 in van. Jo says a ROK captain, apparently connected with the sergeant from Feb 8, wants to know what we're doing here, our equipment and weapon serial numbers.

Higgins says to only tell them rank, name and serial distribution number. Just like a POW I said. I never actually saw the ROK captain, the Katusas did Read in Of Human Bondage. It was real sunny today but snow shows no sign of melting anytime soon. It. Hendricks and Green come up @ 7:30 PM saying we were to pack up and leave tonight but we talk them out of it. Apparently the message got real garbled and they had thought the ROKs were going to seize our equipment unless we showed it to them. Hendricks said it went to General Grange and the ROK generals, a big mess. Skinner[our commanding officer, or C.O.] ordered It. Hendricks to take us off. Apparently someone will have to answer for it.

Anyway, we're to pack up tomorrow and head for 246, the main site. I sleep or start to sleep with Green in 119 but it gets so cold. Lt. Hendricks was in my cot so I sleep between Jo and Lee Y.S. half on each cot. Uncomfortable.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 1978

Get up @ 5AM. I'm so cramped by sleeping on 2 cots. Eat C-rats. Go on guard duty at 7AM and take down concertina. We load most stuff in back of 119, burn garbage and start down. Wilson and I ride with Lt. Hendricks in 129. Each curve fills me with foreboding. Once we skid sideways. ROKs help us out. We used MoGas to burn up ice in pathway of truck. We use axes and shovels to chip at ice. All want to go in to Casey, except Lt. Hendricks [Casey was our home post]. We finally get down and head for 246. Grim's team is going in for a display along with the milkies so we're to take their place. Much trouble getting up to 246 also. It was 246 I went to last May 26th and not 296. Gregory was wrong [Mr. Gregory.

It was 246 I went to last May 26th and not 296. Gregory was wrong [Mr. Gregory, a warrant officer]. Grim left tent, stove and cots for us. We set up turkey, camoflage and I get a cot right next to the stove, so does Henry[Wilson]. We deserve it, ha ha.

See the note. When Higgins told me to just give name, rank and serial number, I said "Just like Papa Oscar Whiskey right?" and from that he drew the conclusion that the ROKs were there. Anyway a message came from McMillian saying I had reacted "professionally." Hhm. Set up schedule. I get midnight to 3 AM but Higgins only wants us to go til midnight so I really luck out. Word comes down that we head in 6 AM Wednesday. Great, maybe we'll get the weekend before the I.G. then. Hendricks said that Chapman got hit by a train and was in serious condition.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 13, 1978

Green has trouble starting recorder about 7AM. I tell him what to do: change the fuse. Then generator won't power, so we're on a 4-2 schedule again. Later both recorders won't function and Pfeiffer drove Estwright back to Casey so no Sig/Maintenance, just great. If it isn't one thing, it's something else. General Grange is supposed to come here today. Miller went in expressly to get the mail.

Lt. Hendricks grabbed up all the log books see status report on page 9], and our team was in great shape. May as well mention this now although I've known of it for a week or so. In March, the 3rd platoon will create a permanent site with rotating teams on 675 or 694 which I've never heard of. Rest of platoon will be fixing camoflage, ESCs etc. I hope that's my last field problem. They bring our generator up the hill so we're on a full schedule but we only have one can of gas. Hhm. Finally get mail after 3 days of none: from Nother, Ma and Pa, Lucille, Memie, 2 from Anita and 2 from Robbin. Supper(the hot meal!) is real late. Gets up here about 8:20PM but they forgot the utensils so had to go back down the hill. Back at 8:40 PM. It was only spaghetti. Ugh. I, among others, made no attempt to get it back leaving him with a dilemma...comman<u>der's</u> call - where the C.O stands before his men and answers any questions after giving them a lecture. Supposed to be held monthly. Ours had left without giving any of us a chance to ask questions about the asinine things being done...concertina - coils of wire strung around the perimeter of the tents and vehicles to keep outsiders away....conmex - huge outdoor lockers which contained equipment for the field.... cuts - tape recordings of North Koreans talking to each other on the radio...DEROS date of return to the continental US from Korea....dispatch - the paperwork needed to drive a vehicle...donkey dick - slang for gas can spout...driver - the ones who drove the vehicles and were responsible for them. If you didn't have the army driving license, you could escape a lot of boring work. Katusas usually couldn't drive so all the work was done by the Americans with driver's licenses... Ramyon - Korean noodles now available in most US grocery stores....ROK -South Korean soldiers, not Katusas ((continued on page 9

OF LEGIONS (An S.P.Q.R. Review)

Basic to success in S.P.Q.R. will be your use and deployment of your Legions. Each province is entitled to raise a Legion, and in addition, each player is entitled to raise a faction Legion (Optional Rule C).

A Legion is actually a set of units collected under the same title, as Legion Aegyptus. A legion is composed of a Legion Headquarters (LHQ), a variable number of cohorts (Roman soldiers) and a variable number of barbarian bands.

An Imperator does not belong to a legion, per se, but his primary role is in augmenting combat die rolls.

Now, due to the command radius rule and the requirement that new cohorts be raised is cities within the home province, it is necessary for the player to weigh his moves carefully.

A legion in the field or on the march is like an octopus. The LHQ is the head and the cohorts with the hired barbarians are the arms. If the arms are stretched out more than 5 movement points from the head, the arms lose their movement capabilities and their ability to attack, unless commanded by an Imperator. And if the LHQ is captured or destroyed, the same thing happens.

A unit out of the command radius of its LHQ may only use 1 movement point. Now consider the Legion going on the great campaign. Say, Legion Cappodocia marches to Dacia and battles the heinous enemy. Losses are taken, but the legion is intact. The player then raises more legion cohorts at home in Cappodocia. Those cohorts are out of command radius and as such won't be very much good to the Legion in Dacia. Moving 1 movement point per turn is a silly use of cohorts. Thus, the CR rule forces a Legion to just about bring everything with him without much hope of replacement.

The exception to this strategy would be a Legion from neighboring province going to war next door. Replacement should be easy. The major use of the Faction Legion though is the far-off war.

A faction Legion can raise new cohorts
wherever it goes, so that the use and deployment of the
faction legion represents the player's trump card.

In the field, use the faction legion to
soften up targets. Let them take losses and repair themselves
along the march. Save the far-from-home legions for the
pivotal fights or as defense.

In essence then, the faction legion is the first guy over the top. The others bring up the rear.

The barbarians are relatively replaceable on the march provided your in one of the frontier provinces because the LHQ has to hire them. If such is the case, then hire as many as you can for a war and let them take all the losses.

Using the Imperator is a simple affair; he's where the action is. Imperators stay out front with the best troops, and often it's a good idea to team two Imperators together for a +/- 3 DRM.

So, you start planning your campaign to conquer, let's say, Dacia. Your jump off point is Noricum. You're using the faction Legion, L. Noricum, L. Germania. Two Imperators are leading the van of Faction Legionairres. The provincial Legions are stacked with hordes of barbarians.

The only trouble is that the man in Dacia has seen the preparations and has advanced his L. Dacia, L. Thracia and the faction Legion to the Dacian



border. You are going to encounter some fairly stiff odds and take a pounding, but hasn't your mobilization gone to far to stop? It's cost you a treasuretrove of gold and silver for the barbarians. You've made promises to the other patricians for their votes in the Senate and you will need the gold and silver of Dacia for your coffers now. So, you must plug away...

In order to better your chances you ideally have to make your attack as much of a surprise as possible, that is you raise and station troops as far away from the target as possible. In the above, the faction Legion would stay in Gallia. and L. Germania would stay in Germania they would raise their troops in the same season that the attack is made. In this case, L. Noricum raises itself to as many cohorts as possible and gets 10 barbarians. L. Noricum pushes over the Dacian border first without regard to consequence and the faction and Germanian Legion force march (7 mps) to the border, rapido. Most likely L. Noricum would have tangled with just one enemy legion and that legion would most likely be understrength.

In the next season, L. Noricum holds and the other two leap-frog it for the front.

I am now having the rules for S.P.Q.R. reprinted. I had 100 copies and need about another 100. I am also going to make one change in the rules.

Though the change might appear rather simple, it will drastically change the flow of strategy. This is the rule in essence.

There is no fee for cohorts and barnarians to use sea movement. (It had been 5s/cohort/sea space, which is quite an expensive proposition in this game.)

Instead, units using sea movement must use transports. Transports are ships designed to carry men and their arms, without a combat capability.

Each transport can transport three (3) strength points. Each transport costs 1 shipment of timber AND 20 sesterces to build!

This new rule will do one tremendous thing: sea borne attacks will be within the reasonable bounds of risk and possibility. Sicilia could then attack Hispania and the game would strike a balance between the prominence of the raod net and the sea spaces.

The timber market would be important, as

some players would not want another to gain too large a stock of timber for sea transports.

EDITOR'S NOTE:

The following pages contain the recent game reports of BREAD AND CIRCUSES, an S.P.Q.R. game currently GMed by Chuff Afflerbach. I am also a player in that game.

B&C is using an S.P.Q.R. map that has minor differences from the map in this issue of SAVONLINNA. Essentially, only the northern road-net of Cappodocia is different. And the road link between Mediolanum and Pisae, Italia, was deleted.

At this point, no military actions have occurred. Money has been saved up, resources, like gold and silver counted, food stores against a famine, and lots of letters written. Essentially, it has been a gearing up period, but believe me it wasn't boring. Now, we are at the cross-roads. Sometihing has to give. Strong military forces are on the board and everyone's waiting for the first fight to take place.



Well, enjoy reading through these. The map in the center fold shows the approximate positions of Legions in the Empire, though not each individual cohort and barbarian band.

VESUVIUS ERUPTS IN ITALIA!

Thousands of frightened citizens are reported fleeing the city of Pompeii as Mount Vesuvius has come back to life, belching huge clouds of black ash into the once-blue Italian skies. Loss of life has been minimal, resulting more from the general panic than from any volcanic activity. Of more concern to Governor Severus is the effect the fallout of ash will have on the fertile farmland of the province. Preliminary reports indicate that at least half the Italian foodstuffs will be lost in the coming year; it will not be known until spring whether the entire crop will be wiped out.

News of the eruption prompted immediate belt-tightening measures by governors across the Empire. Midamerican, Pyrrhonist, and Lusitanian leaders reduced each of their provincial food allotments by two shipments in anticipation of a future shortage. There were grumblings among the populace, but Praetorian observers


report no sign of any open revolt.

Ironically, the Vesuvius blast came only days after Severus himself opened the warehouses in Ravenna and Athenae, inviting his subjects to help themselves to the bounty of the harvest. The move was part of a concerted effort by Severus to establish his own preeminence as the Empire's peacemaker. As host to the coming Senate Session in Roma, he has spared no expense in making the visiting delegates as comfortable as possible. The dramatic entrance of the volcano may very well upstage these promotional efforts.

Also threatening to mar this "Unity" theme are the further intrigues of the newly-appointed Marcus Aurelius. After wooing the representatives of the City of Roma, he is now calling for a total of six Imperators to be summoned to Rome. These proposals promise to spark heated debate on the Senate floor. And like an awakening volcano, the once-dormant Allegantia Midamericus is re-emerging at the very heart of controversy.

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



ANDERSONIUS DEPOSED IN COUP: MIDAMERICANS WELCOME NEW LEADER!

In yet another political upheaval within the Allegantia Midamericus, the current commander Marcus Aurelius Andersonius has been overthrown in Massilia by his own palace guard. Assuming control of the troubled faction as well the governorships of Gallia, Germania, and Noricum, is the former Imperator TOM SWIDERicus. (1183 Robinson Hill Road, Endwell NY 13760.)

In Massilia crowds greeted the news with a tumultuous welcome, emphasizing the popular support for the coup. In the Midamerican provinces, Legion headquarters anxiously awaited orders from their new leader, and Imperators accepted the latest development without comment.

Meanwhile in the Senate, the Midamerican representatives fell silent and the expected floor fight failed to materialize. Thus the controversial summonses of six Imperators proposed by Andersonius were rejected out of hand. And with the Midamericans abstaining, even their own troop increases failed by a narrow margin. The only votes the Senators ventured to cast were for those authorizations previously negotiated by Michaelius. It is expected that the new Patrician Swidericus will continue to recognize all such treaties already approved by his faction.

All other proposals before the Senate met with unanimous

All other proposals before the Senate met with unanimous approval. Jakius Maximus was on hand to sign for the 800 sesterce loan to his Lusitanian faction. And after adjournment, the Senate dispatched Praetorian fleets to insure neutrality in the Adriatic, Iberian, and Aegean seas.

BULLETIN (POMPEII): According to the environmental impact study just released by the Imperial agronomists, the recent eruption of Mount Vesuvius has destroyed one half of the Italian food and timber production for fiscal 193 A.D.

NEW TREATY: The Treaty of Argentum has been duly registered with the Imperial Archives in Roma.

PATRICIANS FAIL TO COME TO TERMS ON THE OPEN MARKET

Those who came to trade went away empty-handed, and valuable cargoes have remained untouched at the docks and warehouses across the Empire. Financial analysts are calling the very first Open Market a big disappointment, but it may prove useful yet in setting price ranges for the next trading session.

Perhaps the biggest surprise was the failure of the Claudian Export Office to offer a single food shipment for sale. Their large surplus and massive advertising campaign brought in bids of up to 25\$ for a shipment, but the CEO appeared uninterested:

Severus too declined to bid, but he was busy behind the scenes in private trading. After the Market closed, he announced the acquisition of the 3 food shipments stored by the Pyrrhonists in the city of Troia. The food was donated as relief for the drought-stricken province of Italia.

Preliminary Report from the ex-Grand Kommissar of P.D.C. on P.D.C.R.A. 1984.

P.D.C.R.A. 1984 was run by R.E.T.S. Chairman of the Bureau of the Treasury Tom Swider of Zone One. As Tom was extremely over-worked with his college studies, part-time job and other committments, the disbursement of P.D.C.R.A.funds has been late. However, Tom has notified me by letter and phone that the monies should be received by the appropriate Bureau Chairmen (sometimes referred to as 'custodians') by mid-January 1985.

The following then is a report by the ex-Grand Kommissar of the disbursement of these funds from information supplied by Tom. '

- 1.) Total monies collected to be distributed, \$280.00.
- 2.) Proportionments: USOS to receive \$25.00 off the top from \$280.
- 3.) The following Bureaus to receive the percentages listed of \$255.00.

4.) From the remaining 33%, \$84.15, the following Bureaus will receive the following listing below.

5.) After immediate disbursements there is \$24.15 left in the Bureau of the Treasury. Presently there are two plans under consideration.

I. The \$24.15 will be combined with the total of

the next P.D.C.R.A. and distributed.

II. The \$24.15 will be combined with monies from the next P.D.C.R.A. and applied toward the fees and expenses of the "P.D.C. Gunboat Tournement" to be run by Tom Swider, et al., at the 1985 CRIGINS Convention to be held in July 1985 in Towson, MD, outside Baltimore. In this plan P.D.C.R.A. monies would be used solely for the purchase of 'Zine Registers, to be given to the top "X" seeded boards in the second round, winner's plaques and tournement entrance fees, etc.

The following code is used: W: the Western Front (Belgium and France); S: the Southern Front(Serbia and the Balkans); E: the Eastern Front(Russia); T: the Turkish front(which ranged from Eypt to Iraq to Armenia); C: the German colonies in Africa, Asia and the Pacific; and N: Naval

actions. Anything else is miscellaneous. Sundays are put into parentheses so you can find the day of the week easily, to make this seem more alive to you.

MARCH 1915

- 1- As of this date, England and France tell neutral countries that they will not allow any neutral vessel to freely proceed to Germany nor return from Germany. This was the beginning of the blockcade (see 3-8,3-11,3-17); Germany complains of any country manufacturing munitions to sell to warring countries; Belgium calls all men aged 18-25 to the army
- 2-Allied naval bombardment since 2-25 destroys outer defenses of Dardenelles forts(T)(see 3-18)
- 3- Austria agrees to cede Trentino to Italy after the war as a price of Italy's neutrality; Italy informs England on what conditions Italy will join the Allies 5- Allied ships bombard Smyrna; escaped German POW Lauterbach in Padang, Sumatra, Dutch East Indies(see 2-27,4-16)
- 6- Kaiser agrees with Feb 27 agreement for Germany to compensate Austrian concessions of land(see 3-3) to Italy with Polish land belonging to Germany.
- 8- Russian advances cause Germans to retreat to their own frontiers (E); US protests to Enghand and France about 3-1(see 3-17); Joint Council of Austro-Hungarian
- ministers agrees to 3-3 in ceding Trentino to Italy but only after war is over. 9- Germans forced to abandon Taveta in German East Africa(C)(now Tanzania)
- 10-11 Chicago conference of 563 Slav delegates wanting freedom from Austria-Hungary 10- English launch attack at Neuve-Chapelle(W)(see 3-14); Zapata followers capture Mexico City during Civil War(see 1-28); German cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich enters Newport News, Virginia, USA where US interns it for damages caused by its sinking the Frye(see March, April)(sec 3-31)
- 11- England implements Orders In Council which is the beginning of the blockcade against Germany. The English justify this by 1-26 German act of nationalization of foodstuffs(see 3-1, 3-13, 3-17)
- 13- Russians breach defenses of Przemysl(E)(see 3-22); English take Moshi, German East Africa(C); France formally agrees with English action of 3-11; England rejects US protest note of 2-20(see 2-28, 3-11)
- (14) End of indecisive Neuve-Chapelle battle(W), English suffer 13,000 casulties. (see 3-10)
- 15- English sink German Dresden(N), the last of Van Spee's force, in Chilean waters--- England explains and apologizes to Chile.
- 17- Russians occupy Memel(E)(see 3-21); Norway, Sweden and Denmark issue identical notes of protest to France and England over 3-1.
- 18- English resume attack on Dardenelles forts(T,N). It fails and 3 ships Ocean, <u>Irrestible</u> and <u>Bouvet</u> are sunk; German Zeppelin raid on Calais, France(W)
- 20- German Zeppelin raid on Paris(W); Germany informs Italy that Germany would guarantee any arrangement worked out between Italy and Austria-Hungary
- (21)- Germans recapture Memel(E)(See 3-17) 22- Russians take Przemysl(E)(see 3-13, 6-3)
- 24- Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister Burian agrees to cede to Italy the southern Tyrol including Trent, a city(see 4-8)

A CHILD CHARMED BY A SNAKE - The Rochester <u>Union</u>, of last evening, gives the particulars of an extraordinary case of "snake charming," which recently came to light in that city. The <u>Union</u> says its informants are men who are reliable and who have conversed with the family and have seen the child referred to. They represent the parents to be worthy people and the child to be a pretty one, bright and intelligent, but evidently in declining health. The story is as follows:

There is residing on Monroe street, near the eastern line of the city, a worthy family by the name of Davis, the head of the family being employed in a nursery. Mr. and Mrs. Davis have a daughter two years of age, who has become attached to a snake, which came into the yard from an adjoining field a few days since, and has become so much under the influence of the reptile that it appears to think of but little else. The snake and the child first met, no doubt, while the latter was at play in the yard near the house, but just how long since, the parents do not know. One day Mrs. Davis found the snake in the arms of the child, and the little girl was fondling it as she would a kitten. The mother was naturally much alarmed by the apparent peril in which she saw her child and seized a stick to destroy the reptile. The snake slowly retreated, showed its tongue, and hissed at the mother. The child cried, and begged so hard of its parent to desist, that she allowed the snake to retreat to its hiding place.

It soon became apparent that the little girl thought of but little else but her companion, the snake, and would return to the yard in search of i; ((sic)) as often as she was allowed to do so. Under the fascination of this reptile, the child — a very pretty little girl — has began to decline, and now weighs but 18 pounds. Respectable physicians were consulted, it is said, and advised that no violence be used toward the snake, as it might prove fatal to the child. How many meetings the snake and the child have had, we are not positively informed, but we infer that they have been frequent. When they meet they rush to each other with all the apparent emotions of friendship and attachment that can exist between two living beings. Only yesterday Mrs. Davis came to the city with the little girl, and when she returned the party left in charge of the house informed her that the snake had been more bold than usual, and had actually been upon the steps leading to the door, awaiting the appearance of the child.

As to the size and variety of this reptile we are not advised. We suppose, however, it is one of the common brown wood snakes which are regarded as harmless and which seldom attain a length of more than three feet.



Good food, gourmet eating and dainty delicacies, even if you don't know it, have always played a major role in the History of mankind. For instance, if the Brusselers were defeated by the armies of the Count of Flanders, at Scheut, on August 17, 1350, it is mainly because said Brusselers had considered that roasting (and eating) the great quantities of chickens they had brought with them was more important than lining their troops in good and efficient order. Since that day, we are nicknamed "kiekefretters" (chicken eaters) and, don't get anxious, we finally got rid of the Fleming occupying troops at the battle of Assault Street, two months later. A funnier episode of the great Belgian military history (and of the History of the Chester cheese) took place in 1905, in the Bahr-el-Ghazal. In 1905, the British and Egyptian troops, commanded by the "Kaimakham" SUTHERLAND Bey, bagpipes leading the way, finally reached the Belgian fort of Lado, on the upper Nile.

"Well done: said SUTHERLAND to PAULIS (the Belgian commander). You've won the first rubber, but this is not the end of the game. Will you please return to where you're coming from and let us occupy the country in the name of His Majesty?"

"In the absence of any further order from my government, answered PAULIS. I consider it my duty to remain here. But we have no real reason to fight, so let's both send a message to Europe, and wait and see..."

The Belgians, their Congolese soldiers and their Azande allies, thus entrenched themselves around Lado while the British started to besiege them. Of course, since that was a time when "gentleman" still meant something, both Belgians and British used to organize parties where the officers from both camps could meet and discuss.

But soon, the situation became dramatic for the English. Their food supplies were low, and the region was poor in game. On an evening, SUTHERLAND saw PAULIS opening a can of Chester cheese, and he immediately proposed to exchange it for fresh poultry. PAULIS agreed, and added "If you're lacking of food for your troops, we'll be glad to supply them. One more glass of porto vintage?"

So, quick negotiations with Austria resulted in another alliance shift and brought about my one true stab: an abandonment of the Austrian attack and a complete shifting of my forces from left to right vs. Kussia. In one fell swoop, I had Kussia throttled. Although I technically honored my agreement by refraining from seizing certain of his natural centers (Warsaw, for example), I did use somewhat specious reasoning to occupy Silesia, etc., etc., as was illustrated by my press statements. Clearly, I did violate the spirit of our agreement. Yes, I confess, Dave.... I am guilty! Wea culpa! But, you know, the manuveur was so-o-o beautiful and the timing was so-o-o right!

Frankly, I've always felt that the aura of the game changed forever at that point when I stabbed Kussia. The tension and uncertainty of the game relationships (which Iy and I had striven to maintain throughout) was broken, and Dave started throwing his centers at me in an effort to tempt me to go for the win and break up the IG alliance. And, brother, was I ever tempted. I almost succumbed to the succubus, I must admit. However, the uniqueness and closeness of the working rapport I had established with Hare (oh, yes, tolks, he did visit me for Xmas '83!! We almost died when Brux printed that Jy had gotten on a train to visit me in Buffalo. He made it all right, but we softpedaled the implications of Brux's remark with a story about a snow storm closing railroad traffic into Buffalo and that Jy got off at Syracuse, etc.), and the subtlety of the play we had engaged in to which was owed the evolution of the German position itself, forced me to the decision that a team effort (for that it was) deserved a team reward. Jy Hare deserved his share of the draw. Even though Germany seemed in the center of activity and engaged in much of the central board work, none of that would have been possible - absolutely impossible - without the close, behind the scenes cooperation and rapport which France and Germany shared throughout the entire game. We played as a team, and it was the team that deserved to receive the spoils of victory.

Well, that's about it. Another dimension to the game was The Press War, of course. Triggered off by Brux's 85th issue — your anniversary issue, was it? — and by a challenge issued to or by Reilly, all of a sudden we all got swept up into this press mania. Amazing.... I can't believe I wrote all that — that we all wrote that much! But it sure was a hell of a lot of fun.

Ah, well, Rigel 2 awaits us, eh, fellows? I do, sincerely, wish to thank Iy Hare, Dave Kleiman, Steve Knight, Bob Sweeney, Rich Reilly, and Greg Ellis, and, last but not least, Bruce Linesey, for a most fun-filled, entertaining year and a half or so. Without a doubt, Rigel was the game I enjoyed the most in the zine I enjoyed the most. The Voice of Doom, I'll miss ya....

((And I'll miss the lot of you, too. Most GMs never get to have the privilege of GMing for a group of players like you seven.

Nelson touches on an interesting question of GMing ethics. It is true that Ty Hare left BRUXCON '83 on a train bound for Buffalo, and visited Nelson. I mentioned this in the zine, not dreaming that it would affect the game. After Nelson and Ty expressed extreme consternation, I agreed to play dumb in the event anyone asked me about it (though thankfully, no one ever did). That is, I agreed to say that I'd put Ty on the train, but not to say that I knew he'd made it. I suppose that this could be viewed as GM deception of the players (potentially, at least); I viewed it as doing my best to protect a player-to-CM confidence. But boy, if ED were to continue, I'd sure want to get further comments from the audience for print!

So long to RIGEL, and long live RIGEL II!))

The Runestone Poll: How It Will Work

First I'll print some late-arriving letters on this topic, then we'll get to the final decisions. My thanks to all who participated in this discussion.

From Mark Berch:

Dear Bruce,

- I'd like to dissent from some of your plans for the Runestone Poll.

 1. I believe that only subbers should be able to yote for a Zine.
- 1. I believe that only subbers should be able to vote for a zine, and only players should be able to vote for their GMs. Granted, non-subber/players can be very well informed. But their opinions are not relevant. A publisher is responsible to himself, of course, and to his readers. It is their opinion that matters; it is their judgement that should determine the "fate" of the zine, Runestone-Poll-wise. The views of others are irrelevant, because the CM has never undertaken to run a game according to their wishes. Suppose that Mr. X feels that a GM should do no more than adjudicate the orders that come in, and set deadlines, etc., but not get involved in the game in any way. Things like NMR insurance, writing a commentary or headline for the game, use of replacement orders for S '01, permitting general orders to be used, introducing replacement players if someone NMRs out, giving out the "score" of a vote, etc., are all wrong. And when he learns that GM Y does most of these things, he knows what he needs to give the guy a low vote -- these things are important to him -- turnaround or even accuracy may not be. But Y should not be held to those standards of Mr. X, because he has never undertaken to run such a game. The same thing is true of zines. Some feel that reprinting is wrong, that a proper dipzine should run games, and not criticize other pubbers, etc. By that standard, DD should get low marks, but I don't publish to meet his standards, and the fact that I don't is thus irrelevant. ((I assume you mean that his opinion of your zine is thus irrelevant...)) It's the same reason I can't vote in the New York ((Massachusetts?)) elections. Your senator is not responsible to me, and is under no obligation to do things according to my wishes, and thus should not be held "accountable" to me. Thus, your focus on "knowledge" is not enough; there is the question of accountability.
- 2. Inclusion of non-North Americans is very premature, when it comes to zines. We should not pretend that we have an integrated hobby. Part of the problem here is that for North American zines, with rare exceptions, the subbers are a good mix of pubbers and non-pubbers. But with British zines, nearly all their North American subbers are pubbers.
- 3. I agree that the subzine poll has limited value, but it has enough to justify it. It's somewhat of an experiment, but it's a decent enough experiment that it should be kept a few more years to see how it turns out. I'd run it the same way that John ((Leeder)) and Randolph ((Smyth)) did -- use a minimum vote cutoff as you think reasonable, and then just print a mean, with or without top/bottom cutoffs as you see fit. But do keep the minimum vote cutoff. There's no reason for a subzine which receives only 1 or 2 votes to "win" -- and if you do that, people will think you are trying to sabotage it. ((??))
 - 4. Top/bottom cutoffs. Very good idea.

Every zine people vote for should be included. If people want to vote for zines, the pubbers should not be permitted to override those wishes by taking out their zines from the Poll results. It's amazing to me how fast some people are to be uncooperative or throw monkey wrenches into things.

Bruce.

Here at last, too late for <u>Echo of Doom</u> #2, is a summarization of my thoughts on including non-North American zines in the NA Zine Poll. (All comments here refer to the zine poll, but apply in general to the subzine and CM polls as well.) To clarify terms: While the U.S. and Canadian hobbies aren't integral, we'll assume as much for these purposes and use the reference "NA". Similarly, the UK and continental-Europe hobbies are, so far as I know, discrete but with a fair amount of overlap; call them collectively "Euro".

You propose to make Euro zines eligible for the (note the name) North American Zine (and Subzine and CM) Poll. Quite simply, I disagree. To put it simply: The NA and Euro hobbies are separate groups, with established population bases and traditions. Each has its own poll: the NA Zine Poll (aka "Leeder" or "Rumestone" Poll) for Canadian and US zines, and the UK Zine Poll for British and, recently, continental European zines. (I trust I won't turn off any Britishers by not following the ethnocentric English affectation of differentiating the Isles from "Europe" as a whole.) Why encourage the halfhearted intrusion of

one into the other's internal poll?

There is not and probably never will be a significant amount of trans-Atlantic interaction. Those with experience tell me that across-the-puddle Dip can exist only as a curiosity and social event. Other than "Seven Nations" games, the postal handicap is just too great and telephone/telegraph costs too high to permit a "fair" game, though PBEM networking should prove to be an exception for those with the equipment on-line. I don't want the two hobbies to lose track of each other. But I feel that, as long as most people on both sides of the ocean know about each other and have means of contact, money transfer, etc., as seems to be the case now; the "free market" will allow the hobbies to develop whatever level of interaction the players desire. Efforts to push that level higher (or lower) seem to me to be folly, and inconsistent with the purpose of the polls.

Bruce, you offer two reasons to open up the NA Poll: primarily that it would be interesting to see how the two hobbies' zines compare, and secondarily that the results might encourage transatlantic interaction by promoting NA awareness of the top Euro zines. I already offered my opinion on the second idea. Now for the first: I agree in theory. In practice, you only have something meaningful if essentially the same reader base is comparing zines on essentially the same terms. You have that if the NA and Euro polls are combined, particularly with a vote-receiver on each side of the Atlantic. If you can bring that off, super. This discussion assumes you do not.

Maybe I'm wrong, but it's my feeling that the very few people who will rate zines from both hobbies are each likely to rate zines from the two sides differently, and that these people are likely to perceive and rate zines differently from the run-of-the-mill NA (or Euro, for that matter) reader. Certainly anyone who considers timeliness a factor in a zine's quality will find his ratings affected if a zine has to cross the Atlantic. Further, the base of players who can (let alone will) vote for zines from the other side is so small as to be statistically insignificant regardless of any hypothetical bias introduced.

I feel that, if you want to compare NA and Euro zines, you should do the following. Open up the poll to zines and readers from both sides. Compile the poll regularly, ignoring votes for Euro zines. (Your work with the Zine Register will help here.) Then take the ballots listing Euro zines and compile them, giving a look at how NA and Euro zines compare in the eyes of those who receive both. It won't be too much extra work -- we're talking maybe 5-10 ballots here. If large numbers of ballots of this type come in, then I suppose I'd scrap my objections. But that won't happen this year (even discounting this senseless boycott movement), and won't happen until there's

a change in hobby practices. Until then, I say we combine the two polls, leave each restricted to its own field, or compile the "comparison ballots" (so to speak) separately.

From John Pack (excerpt):

Dear BRUX,

...Runestone Poll entries should definitely be made in accordance with \underline{VD} Houserules: eye color, zodiac sign, and social security number all to be specified.

((Uh, no thanks. You think some people are on my case about the poll now...))

All right, then, so here are my responses and decisions. Having had time to think it over, I am persuaded by the argument that we shouldn't try to pretend that the Euro and NA (to use Mike's terminology) hobbies are one and the same. In fact, they are quite discrete. I personally think this unfortunate, but the Poll is not the right vehicle to use to remedy the problem. While I still think it would be interesting to compare zines from both sides of the Atlantic, at least for this year the Poll will remain the North American Zine and CM Poll. Any member of "either" hobby may vote, however — this is the way it's always been. But only North American zines, subzines and CMs are eligible for inclusion in the results.

I must also confess that this decision was motivated in part by a desire to change things as little as possible. There is already enough turmoil, justified or otherwise, surrounding the Poll this year. I don't want to add to it by making major changes to the voting procedure.

As announced last issue, we will keep the subzine poll. There will be a minimum vote cutoff of 5 for subzines and CMs; 10 for zines. These numbers are the same as last year's.

I'm going to keep the idea of a top-and-bottom cutoff, but for ease of calculation will make it 10% instead of Randolph's 8%. This will be rounded down. Thus, for a zine which receives 28 votes, the two highest and two lowest votes will not be counted when determining the zine's "average" score. (For the preference matrix, all votes will count.)

There will be no "official" proclamation against grudge votes this year, as such a constraint is both unenforcable and impractical. I mean, let's be open about it: my opinion of certain zines has been influenced by the way their editors deal with feuds, and this will be reflected in my votes. I'm sure that that is true of a lot of people, and has been in the past. Let the voters vote as they see fit, rather than dictating the criteria they must use for forming an opinion about a zine.

GMs will not be allowed to vote for themselves. Editors will not be allowed to vote for their own products, whether zines or subzines. Again, these decisions adhere to the status quo of years past.

Players may vote only for GMs under whom they have played during the polling period (April 1, 1984 through the present). Voters in the zine poll are on their honor to vote only for publications of which they have seen at least three issues during the polling period. Once again, these are consistent with the procedures we had under Randolph Smyth.

I reject Mark Berch's plea to allow only a zine's subbers to vote for that zine, although he argued it very well. For one thing, this is too drastic a change, in my opinion. For another, people often have reasons for not subbing to a zine — the same reasons that might prompt them to give a zine a low vote. To restrict the voting to a zine's subbers would be to artificially inflate each zine's score, since a zine's strongest supporters are usually its subbers. I think the intent of the Poll is to obtain a hobby-wide opinion of each zine, not just the opinion of its subbers. More complete instructions will accompany the official Poll announcement, when it appears.



WHATS THISP

40 hobby members took part in Larry Peery's exhaustive question survey concerning zines and hobby involvement, and much of the results are very interesting on any number of levels. The results came in a 66-page booklet which you can obtain by sending Larry \$2.00 US. His address is: P.O. Box 8416, San Diego, California 92102 USA.

I can only provide the briefest of outlines here but some of what appeared was....

Each zine was rated in 8 to 11 different areas depending on the type of zine it was. Each zine receives a mini-review by Larry based on the votes the zine received. Since Steve Heinowski's <u>Ter-ran</u> has recently published its 100th issue let's take its ratings as an example: This is how Larry presents each zine.

Steve Heinowski's <u>Ter-ran</u> is another hobby game zine that offers good games in a well-run manner. High marks in Scheduling, Gamesmastering, House Rules, Game Variety make this the player's zine.

63 of the hobby's zines are rated in this manner, but the most interesting part of the poll to me was the background and opinion questions and their answers. Some examples: when people played their first face-to-face game and when they played their first play-by-mail game. Larry comments: "Surprisingly, to me anyway, many people did not take up the postal hobby at the same time as they began to play Dippy FTF. For some the gap between the two was as much as ten years."

Out of 30 people and the number of zines they receive, 13 received 0-10, 8 received 11-20, 5 received 21-30, 3 received 31 to 40 and 1 received more than 41.

<u>Question</u>: "Overall, do you believe the hobby as a whole is better off today than it was 2 years ago?....Answer: Yes(4), No(12), Unable to Determine(13), About the same(5).

Question: What are the 3 most important things you look for in a Dippy zine?

Answer: Larry says: "Many people said the same things over and over again in slightly different ways....Among the most often mentioned: "Good, prompt gamesmastering", "entertainment", "good reproduction", "interesting writing", "reliability".

Question: What question would you like to ask the members of the hobby?

Answers: "Why are there so many NMRs?" "What keeps you in the PBM hobby?"

"Does anyone but publishers really give a damn about any of the feuds?" "Why do you publicly criticize people you don't like and overlook your friends' faults?"

There is much more to this poll so I'd urge you to send \$2.00 to Larry and then you can find out, among many other things, who was considered the 5 most influential people in the hobby, the 5 best face-to-face players, the 5 best play-by-mail players, the 5 favorite games of any type, how you compare in terms of hours per week spent on the Diplomacy hobby, how many PBM Dippy games other people are currently playing in(and how you compare) and much more. Good job, Larry!


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


