Jack Powers (3 Mar 1983): "Hi, cousin-in-law. My wife's 3g grandmother was a 2nd or 3rd cousin to Daniel Boone. I bet we're only removed about 58 times. I live near a federal archives and have access to all available Census records Photocopying is available for most records. All you need from 1790 to 1910. for 1850, 1880, 1900, and 1910 is a name and a state generally. However, sometimes records get mixed so county and other names related help. result of my search I attended a 300-yr Linville family reunion in Chester, PA The family owns the famous (and only U.S.) Octagon Barn on last August. Linvilla Orchards there. I have my Linvilles to 1500s England and Agees to 1500s France, among others." ((I have looked at the 1880 and 1900 U.S. Census and have found quite a bit of interesting information on the Wasson side of the family. But I found no listings for Beyerlein, although supposedly my grandfather and his parents were living in East St. Louis, IL at the time. I also checked Missouri (just across the river) and found nothing there although my grandfather's mother, Eva Schappo, was born in St. Louis, MO according to my grandfather's birth certificate. I have not checked the 1910 Census yet, as it has just been recently made available at the Federal Archives at San Bruno, near San Francisco. If you (or any other reader) can find anything on my great grandparents, Christ Beyerlein and Eva Schappo, in the Census records I will offer a reward of ten issue subscription to the postal Diplomacy zine of your choice.))

## TRAVELS

Earlier this past month I spent a week on the road and in the air visiting three watershed sites we are studying for an EPA project. With a co-worker I flew to Corpus Christi, Texas, and then drove to Harlingen near the mouth of the Rio Grande. We were there to look at a nearby river, the Arroyo Colorado. After three days there talking with local experts and looking at the river we headed east for rural Mississippi and a look at the Yazoo River and its We flew into Memphis, Tennessee, the closest big city. While tributaries. staying there I went out jogging and jogged past Graceland: today a shrine to Elvis Fresley. Across the street is a small shopping center with all sorts of Presley souvenirs and associated junk. It is amazing what people will buy. I tried to give Gary Coughlan a call, but he was apparently at work. day in Mississippi we flew on to Georgia and the Little River in Tifton. During our stay the town was overrun by a Eaptist ministers convention. There is not much to see or do in Tifton, but perhaps Baptist ministers don't care.

Finally after six days, eight separate plane flights, and 1200 miles of driving I was home again.

And, of course, the next day I got up early and ran in a 10 kilometer foot race in the rain with 7500+ other crazy people, including Marie. I finished in 43 minutes, somewhere in the top third of the crowd. Then, seven days later on this past Sunday, I tried my feet in a half-marathon (13+ miles). That is about twice the distance I had even previously tried to run so I took the first five miles at an easy pace with Marie. As the race progressed I picked up the pace and finished 632nd out of 1400+ runners, with a time of 1 hour 45 minutes. I was just happy to finish. The only damage to the body was some tender toes, which should heal in a few days.

The bicycle racing still continues, although I have not had much in the way of success yet this spring. In my first USCF race of the season I destroyed a freewheel while warming up. I switched to my spare rear wheel for the race. But my luck was running poorly that day as early in the race I dropped my chain going up a hill and by the time I had it back on I was off the back of the pack and out of the race. But there are many more races to come.
