FRANCE (Larry McCloud) Build a par. Has a bel, a bur, a ber, a mar, a par, f pic, f por.

GERMANY (Richard Craig) Constant. Has a mun, a kie, f hol.

ITALY (Walter Loy) Build a rom. Has a vie, a ven, a rom, f adr, f tun.

RUSSIA (Bryan Jurkowski) Remove a lva, f sev. Has a ukr, a war, a stp, f nth.

Players should note that I specifically asked for Winter 1902 orders and did not request Spring 1903 orders (although, of course, it was fine to include them with the winter orders). I try to move the games along as quickly as possible, but I will separate seasons where I think that the situation may be too complex to request conditional orders. That was the case with Winter 1902/Spring 1903. And, of course, any time conditional orders are requested each player has the right to request a separation of seasons if the situation is too complicated. The deadline for Spring 1903 orders is Monday, 19 September 1983, 7 pm PET.

No orders were received from Fred Winter. I assume that this was an oversight on Fred's part and that he will continue playing. However, if no orders are received for Fall 1921 Turkey will be placed into civil disorder. I did not receive an response from Hcrst John regarding shifting this game to a four-week schedule. So we will continue with eight week deadlines for the next season. The deadline for retreats and Fall 1921 orders (which may be made conditional on the direction of the retreats) is Monday, 17 October 1983, 7 pm PDT.
