ODDS AND ENDS

Not a lot of news this issue. Marie and I have been competing in fun runs every weekend. A week ago at Stanford University's Great Race I ran my fastest 10 km ever and finally went under 40 minutes with a time of 39:19. My best finish in a race was 17th place in a very hilly 15 km a few weeks back. I can handle the uphills okay, but those downhills are murder on the knees. The winter series of bicycle races start next weekend. I will finally find out what this running has done to my cycling muscles.

Last issue I made a comment about Cathy Cunning and Eric Grog which was a bit presumptuous, as I later discovered. Cathy was quick to write "Boy am I embarrassed now! Marriage? Did I ever say marriage? Maybe 5 to 10 years down the line but not now! Live together maybe -- but not marriage!" Well, I guess that clarifies things. I later spoke with Cathy on the phone and admitted that I just assumed that she meant marriage when she said that she and Eric were thinking of getting together. She said that my misinterpretation of the situation was understandable. "Older people" always assume marriage. Well, I guess that puts me in my place. But I didn't think that I look that old...

Writing of being old (33 as of three weeks ago), in foot races runners compete all at once, but are divided into categories to determine placings. One would expect that all or most of the top runners would be in the 20-29 age category. But it never seems to work that way. Instead most are in the 30-39 age group. For example, in a 5-mile race last Saturday I finished in 27th place overall. In the 30-39 category I placed 16th. Over half of the runners in front of me are in the same category. I don't know how many of you read Science magazine, but in their 23 September 1983 issue there is a very interesting article on dietary carcinogens. A number of plants in the human diet synthesize toxic chemicals in large amounts as a defense against bacterial, fungal, and insect and other animal predators. For example, black pepper contains piperine, which is a carcinogen in rodents Edible mushrooms contain some of its metabolites are mutagens. hydrazines, many of which are carcinogens and mutagens. Nitrosamines are suspected agents of stomach and escphagael cancer in humans. In the digestive system these nitrogen compounds are formed from nitrate and nitrite. Beets, celery, lettuce, spinach, radishes, and rhubarb all contain high levels of And finally, burnt and browned foods formed by heating proteins nitrate. during cooking are highly mutagenic. Thus, it is best to minimize the consumption of charred meats and rancid fats. No more barbeques, in other words. I recommend visiting your local library and reading the entire article if you are interested in more details.

On a slightly less serious subject, I want to mention the recent issue of Xenogogic, published by Larry Peery. It is a three-part monster issue that has to be read to be believed. Larry is normally verbose, but he has been saving up his words for this issue. One part is devoted to his Diplomacy power poll report. Interesting material, even if you don't agree with all of it.
