NEWS

A lot has been happening in the past four weeks. Yesterday I just got back from San Diego (more on that later). Prior to my trip I had some major (for me, anyway) achievements in both cycling and running. The winter series of bicycle races started in late October. The first event was a 12.5 mile time trial. I had the fastest time (30:22) and beat my previous best time by over 40 seconds. Then two weeks later I competed in a 7-mile hillclimb with 2000 feet of climbing. I have never been a good hillclimber (lighter riders have a better power-to-weight ratio) and on this course last year I was happy to finally go under 33 minutes with a time of 32:48. This year I started out strong and kept on pushing a fairly large gear (65 inches). When I caught my one minute man, who is a good climber and almost caught me last year when I started one minute before him, I knew that I was headed for a good time. I hit the finish line at 30:33 and a new course record only to finish in second place when another rider arrived a few minutes later with a time of 30:22. But I couldn't have been happier with my finish.

In between these bicycle races I competed in a 10 kilometer run and bettered

my personal record by 3 seconds with a time of 39:16. When things go right...

Last week a co-worker and I flew down to Riverside County to look over some streams that we are studying for a flood insurance study. At the end of the week my co-worker headed for LA and his girlfriend and I journeyed on down to San Diego to visit my grandparents and some old friends.






