MUSICAL COMMENTARY

Goodbye was the last album by the greatest rock/blues band of all time, The Cream. While EGGNOG wasn't the greatest 'zine of all time, the sentiment is the same.

Cream was the first of the supergroups. Born of the musician's perennial dream of bringing together the cream of the current musical crop into one mind-boggling all-star group, Cream united Ginger Baker, even now respected by those in the know as perhaps the greatest master of rhythm on drums, Eric Clapton, King of the British guitarists past and present, and Jack Bruce, still considered the best bass player yet. This was mid-1966, when those who had outgrown wacky Beatles and early Beatles imitations were ready to get their teeth into some adult and substantial music, so Cream's timing was perfect.

Prior to their emergence as a trio, the three Cream musicians had collaborated & created following in their own right. Bruce, who created the group's folk songs, was in the

group with jazz and blues influences, with which the jazz-oriented Ginger Baker also played. Bruce also played with the highly commercial Mannish Man group for a while, and with the legendary Alanis Korner, before he became a member of the bluesy John Mayall's Bluesbreakers, the group Eric Clapton went to after sweetening the phenomenal Yardbirds (the group without which Heavy Metal would not exist). Clapton was a living legend prior to Cream for both the aforementioned Yardbirds and Mayall's roots-oriented band.

With Cream, rock finally grew up and Clapton became an all-time rock hero, edging Lennon and Jagger from their pedestals. Although there had been plenty of blues-playing around, it took Cream to fully tune a whole new generation into that kind of music. Cream was one of the prime movers behind the blues revival of 1968 and the great interest in the roots of the new blues-rock. Clapton and fellow guitarist Mike Bloomfield (the American wanderer from the Electric Flag and the Soul Interchange Place Band, currently with Prime Cuts) were the first to work

and scoundrels, bringing up the names of blues originals like Buddy Bolden, Howlin' Wolf, Elmore James, and B.B. King. It worked both ways: for them, for once some of the more astute heard the originals, they were less impressed by what the Cream and Bloomfield bands were doing. But that was irrelevant because Cream conquered like no other band did, so that by the end of 1968 (1968), when they called it quits, they were able to sell out New York's enormous Madison Square Garden weeks before they had their farewell concert (and this was in the days when monster concerts were not a regular event).

Cream's music was essentially interpretive blues and rock, with all kinds of personal versatility but very little cheap flash and virtually no help from musical friends. There were no stars, just the music. Clapton's guitar was as lean and melancholy as his face. Jack Bruce was the quintessential musician. Ginger Baker was the devil with drumsticks. Once the pressures of success got to all three members, there was nowhere to go but out. They announced that they had grown as much as they could together, but to continue growing they must break up. Unlike most bands which will stick to a proven formula, the Cream had to be its own boss.

Following Cream's untimely demise, Clapton and Baker reunited briefly for Blind Faith (with Rick Grech and Steve Winwood). Baker then went on to form his loose musical union, the Air Force, which produced some of the best jazz on record. This ensemble was followed by a few occasionally wanting solo albums and a still-existent Baker-Curwitz Army. Jack Bruce has embarked on a solo path, stopping only once for the three albums produced under the West Bruce & Young name, with ex-Beatnik alumni Leslie West and Corky Young. Clapton, of course, has achieved fame first with Lennon's Plastic Ono Band, Blind Faith, Delaney & Bonnie, various solo albums and smaller projects, and the short-lived but phenomenal Derek & The Dominos (Heyla).

A series of NBRs by the other two major powers should have made the two of us unstoppable, but due to Eric's greater experience and a couple of miseries and a crucial NBR (I sent the orders in plenty of time, honest!) on my part he grew much faster than I did. The war was the turning point; after that the two of us just didn't work together as well as we had before. I needed his help to catch up, and in Fall 1905, he didn't give it to me. I was really hoping for a N/E draw; Eric said he didn't have any objection to it, but apparently the other players felt that I shouldn't be included. I am satisfied with the strong second, but I could have done much better. Congratulations to Eric Verheiden for a well-deserved win!

GERMANY (Eric Verheiden): Gee, that was quick... I wish I could say this was all due to brilliant strategy, but that is not really true. Franco was gone very early in '02 -- before I even came in. The Anglo-German alliance had almost ideal prospects with L/A vs. A/T (more or less) bickering in the east. With France gone, I jumped in against the former Pacific resis-

I have no more wish to be associated with any more regular postal Diplomacy games, at least not as gamesmaster, and I long ago grew tired of playing in them. So this is it.

The whole hobby can from here on in go straight to hell for all I care. It has been intimated that I have a slightly negative attitude towards the hobby as a whole. Well, somebody finally figured it out. This was not always so, but in the last two or so years it has become increasingly evident to me that I no longer felt at home in the hobby in which I had been for the past years. After ten years in this idiotic hobby, I'd like to see some of the people who think I am too depressed about the whole thing come back to me and tell me exactly what they think of it. It is only a shame that they will never have seen the state of the hobby in 1971...they are stuck with 1981. Truth is, most everyone with real brains who was involved in the hobby back then has already come to his senses and dropped out long ago.

Actually I am not yet completely out yet (oops). I still run two variant games, which will hopefully end relatively soon, and Uli runs a tournament game for Ed's Sergeant, I think. But for all practical purposes, this is it...the final issue. And I'm not going to try to outdo myself for this one, either.

Sorry for the lateness of this issue, but it's gotten kind of tangled up. Lots of the stuff I need to complete this issue is still at home; I forgot to take it with me on my trip back, or did not think I'd need it but do.

That's why 1980J isn't adjudicated this month...the last SPY issue is fermenting at home. So is the supply center chart for 1979CU, but I think that I can make do without. (If not, I'm sure somebody will tell me.) 1979LJ has finished, which makes me very happy.

As for the games:

1979CU This game will be kept by me for at least another month, until I unload it on somebody else. There is the chance that I gamesmaster it to conclusion, assuming that that conclusion is not too far off. But I'd rather have somebody else take it over.

1980I This game will have to be cancelled entirely. I'm very sorry, but I cannot continue to run this game, and private inquiries have not resulted in any deal to take it over. I'm also sorry to say that the game never really did succeed to the point I wanted it to...mixed moves and deadline problems messed the whole thing up more than once. Thanks, you players, but there's nothing I can do about it. From what I gather, the loss was hardly overwhelming...

1980J I will get in contact with my own personal favorite gamesmaster, Doug Boyerlein, and will ask him to take over the game. I have no doubt that he will be only too happy to do so. All players are asked to submit orders to Doug. I am forwarding S.C. Charts, players names and addresses, everything needed to run the thing. I am also sending in orders already received, which have not been many. Get on the ball, the rest of you, or Doug will replace you. More later in the 'zine.

The variants I will continue to run them in POLITICIAN, as before. Just by accident do they appear in EDGE this month.

Needless to say, my last games

are cancelled at this point. Also, non-playing subscribers should find their checks for the unexpired portion of their subscriptions enclosed in this issue. Players for 1980J should find the same, since to receive EFGIART from Doug costs nazy a penny as long as you play, and that should just about take care of the technical aspects of the fold. Publishers to whom I sub should send me the rest of the issues due me...in August Fred Hyatt decided just to cut me off of his list despite the fact that I still had another 15 or 16 issues of his 'nine coming (he did not fold). I'd hate to have that happen again. Perhaps some of you will find more money enclosed for subscriptions to your various and sundry rags, though I doubt my overstretched checking account can handle that much.

It's been obvious from the last six months worth of ECGNOC that my interest in Diplomacy has totally disappeared. Thus the decline in editorial quality of ECGNOC since I've been in college. (It might also have something to do with my time problems, too, and the fact that I happen to feel that most anything else I do ends up being more important than Diplomacy anyway...)

So, I've been ad-libbing all this time and I presume that I've missed something, though I can't think of anything besides blasts at the current state of affairs, and I don't feel like publishing those. So, should I remember anything later, I'll probably include it at some opportune moment.

1980J COMMENTS

The spring orders illustrate the importance of sending in orders and the damage ~~an~~ a single NLR can cause.

If France had sent in orders, he probably would have taken Munich and Tunis. As it was, Italy captured or retained both, annihilated a French fleet (not to mention the missed build) and ever marched (temporarily, most likely) into Marseilles. In short, the French have lost the initiative to Italy.

On other fronts, Austria and Russia continue to miscoordinate their attack on Turkey. England, remaining loyal to France, continues to move efficiently through Germany to Russia. However, Russia is now on home ground and may be able to push

The Italian breakthrough does take immediate pressure off of Austria, giving more time (apparently necessary) to finish off Turkey. However, a more successful eastern alliance may yet face the instabilities inherent in a three-way arrangement.

I thank Eric very much for all of these seasons of analysis; he's done an excellent job. I am only sorry that I keep butcher-ing everybody's work with my lousy typing today, but it's the first time I typed since last issue, so what do you expect? Thanks again...
