



Der Chancellor again attempted to ban other parties from the election, and because
of stepped up Government efficiency, he succeeded in banning the Communists, Centres
and Coalitionists. This turned out to be beneficial to the Social Democrats, since,
during a raid on Communist Headquarters, it was found that they had been planning
to denounce the Government action on Versailles, and a plot to break up the Social
Democrat rally was uncovered.

It was also discovered that the Coalition had had a very good chance of winning the election due to a massive advertising campaign, thus the ban sent numerous voters home in disgust due to the Government's flagrant attempt to control the election.


At last, at 9:30PM we got underway with the first Diplomacy game. I was unlucky enough to draw Italy, and proceeded to piss off France (Greg), Austria (Mike) and Germany (Chris) during the first year. Aside from my S'01 move of A VEN to PIE, Greg and I were able to patch things up quickly, and we formed a triple alliance with England (Charles). Meanwhile, Germany made an immediate attack on Russia (Pete) in 1901, although he miswrote his orders, by ordering two units from Kiel during the first turn. This was nothing compared to Ken's Turkey ordering A BUL to CON in S'01, the suprise of the game! Since Chris was a novice, everyone went immediately after him, but he continued to move against Pete, and managed to hold his own against us old pro's. Eventually A/T/G got together against I/F/E with an independent Russia, and several draw proposals were thrown in at about 3:00AM. Yours truly vetoed all draws except the only one allowed in the rules, so Pete and Chris (1 center, and 2) can thank me (5) for a share of the 7 way.

The gaming broke up at that point, and resumed the next day. On Saturday, Conrad Minshall arrived, but we were less Ken and Chris, and as such lacked 7 players. While waiting for Charles to arrive, the rest of us started up a game of SPIES! We player the basic version, which I had never played before, and it seemed quite tame compared to the advanced rules. Germany (Greg) won (I think), followed by; France (Pete), England (me), Russia (Conrad) and Italy (Mike).


