The Country List: As usual, average scores are computed on all completed games for all countries in two lists: one for all games in which the country was played, and one restricted to games in which the country was played by no more than one person (whether or not he was actually active throughout or not). You will note that, since the last such list (III, 3, p. 3), the poor have generally gotten richer (except Austria (and the rich have gotten poorer, a welcome switch. Average score for all countries in the first list is 3.382; in the second, 3.671. The change from the last list is also indicated in each case.

Many games, listed in III, 3, are not included in my rating lists, as they are team games, variants, or hoaxes (this last category includes 1964C, 1967K, 1967L).

Completed Games: A few games have come to completion since last issue. Not as many as I would have expected, though. Those finishing are:

1967V. This GRAUSTARK game ended in a 4-way tie (with a fifth survivor), a rarity among games. When the last three game-years (1910-1912) resulted in no change in the strength of the respective players, the utter deadlock which had occurred became apparent. Drawn were: Austria (Hugh Anderson, 7 units), England (Dave Lebling, 7), France (Eugene Prosnitz, 9), and Turkey (Sherry Heap, 9). Surviving was Germany (Mehran Thompson, 2). Having been in a 4-way split myself, I know how frustrating it is.

1966A. Gad! This one has long white whiskers. Run in LONELY MOUNTAIN, it lasted until 1918. The steady growth of France was stymied only temporarily by Turkey, but the game finally ended with a whirlwind gain of three units by France. Our congratulations

Jerry Pournelle on his third, well-won, victory! Second was John Austin, Turkey. The other survivor was Germany, played by Terry Kuch.

1967AF. This game appeared in BIG BROTHER, which has an unpleasant habit of shedding players almost as fast as Autumn leaves, and it is not unusual to see two or three dountries in civil disorder simultaneously in this 'zine. When Austria, which then had 9 units, was inconsiderately placed in civil disorder by the Gamesmaster, the conclusion of the game became more or less a foregone conclusion. England, played by John Koning, won with only 15 units on the board (out of a total of only 29!). We look forward to the inevitable day when a game is won in Big Brother by a country without a player.

1966AB. Begun in ORTHANC, this game move in Winter 1903 to sTab, which now publishes Orthanc as one of its sub-zines. In 1910, no less, the game was won by a rapidly expanding Germany, played by Mehran Thompson. This is his first win, against the determined opposition of Charles Reinsel's Austria. England (Charles Brannan) and Turkey (James Latimer) also survived. This game is also unusual in that a country (France) survived which had a supply center but no units. Sigh ... only in sTab ...

1967AG. This is the game that took a trip. Begun in CEREBRAL NEBULA, it moved to EFGIART and then, when that latter folded, to ADAG, the Diplomacy Orphan's Home. It was won in 190¢ (esee!) by James Munroe, playing Italy. This is Jim's first win, for which congratulations? Sedond was Steve Hueston, playing Germany. There were only two other survivors (England-Ken Porter; Russia-Mark Lyon), who had only 6 units between them. That was a truly fast and furious game. Italy's average rate of expansion was a phenomenal 2.5 supply centers per year (yipe!).

Additions and/or corrections to this listing should be sent to me as soon as poscible, and they will be published next issue.

Advice to people thinking of publishing a Diplomacy 'zine: don't. It's too damn expensive.

Many people have asked me how much it costs to run, say, EREHWON, so I think that, this issue, I'll explain. The easy way is to figure out the cost of a single issue. EREHWON runs about 20 pages, and an average run is 100 copies. Mimeo stencils of good quality cost me \$3.60 a outre, or 15¢ each. Twenty would be \$3.00. Paper of the proper weight and absorbtive quality is \$2.00 a ream, so 2000 sheets is \$8.00. However, one must add 25% for pre-runs, waste, and the like, which is another ream, or a total of \$10.00. A run of this magnitude will consume a can of ink (2.00); the total cost of the printing thus being \$14.00, or 14¢ a copy. Since the finished product weighs over 2 ounces, postage (first class) is 18¢. Total cost: 32¢. I sell subscriptions at 20¢ an issue, which means I lose 12¢ per issue per person.

The typical game runs to about 1911. Counting a separate issue for Spring, Fall, and Winter, this means 33 is sues, at a cost of \$10.56. Since I charge \$4 for the game, that means that, for an individual in only one game, I lose \$6.56. If this individual is in two games, which begin and end about the same time, my loss is cut to about \$3.00.

Of course, some games finish before 1911 (although some last much longer). Some issues will be less than 20 pages. Therefore, in some instances, my losses may hot be quite so great as indicated above.

Consider this, however. In the past year, mimeo paper has gone up from \$1,60 a ream to \$2.00 (+25%). Postage is up from 5¢ an ounce to 6¢ (+20%). Costs of machine repairs and maintenance, plus time and effort expended, are not even computed. In short, a Dippy 'zine is an expensive proposition. No doubt the cost to the player will go up again in the near future.

# RATINGS IN SEATTLE

New that the publishing of Dippy 'zines in Seattle has ceased entirely, one is moved to wonder why. The answer is, they're too busy playing Diplomacy. Silly excuse!

Playing when you could be publishing. Really! Anyway, read on.

I received an interesting letter from Doug Beyerlein. In lieu of a required retreat in 1967Naa, he sent me a description of a new (sort of) rating system for Dippy play which is being used for in-person games there. This system is based on the McCallum system, which runs like this: each player gains a point from each player whose play was inferior to his own, and loses a point to each player whose play was better. The system thus runs from +6 for the winner to -6 for the first player eliminated. Let me proceed and quote, in large, Doug's letter:

Figuration and I have been playing around with various ratings for our local Diplomery games. Since April we have started a league...for playing Diplomacy (all seven-man games) and have ten games played at present. To work out a rating system we started with McCallum's.... However, we thought there were two factors to be included

that were missing. These were the country factor and player factor. We know the odds favor Turkey, England, and Russia for a win, leaving the other players with what is left: Italy, France, Germany, and Austria. /Note: This is true of postal experience. Some groups report Austria and France as the great terrors. A win as Austria should count more than a win as Turkey....To work the player factor in, both Steve and I... know how chess ratings work.../and/.../u/sing these factors we have constructed the Seattle Ratings on the following formula:

Player A: (previous average..., if not 0)(country average...before this game)

"Assuming player A was first eliminated, he would lose one point to every other player in the game, or a total of -6 pts.

"Player B -1 plus 1/20 of the difference of their average scores if A has a lower average score than B; if B is smaller than A then the decimal is negative.

plus 1/20 of the difference of A's and B's countries' average scores, worked as with the players' average scores.

sorking this way through the other five players and then added together for a game score.

"For example: Game #10: Ken Taylor played Germany, getting -4 points for being the second player eliminated from the game. His average before this game was +3.15 and Germany's average was +0.14. He receives the following scores:

The reason Ken got a score worse than -4.00 is because of his high average before the game plus the fact he took a country that had been doing reasonably well to a poor finish. Because of this he lost on the average more than one point to the people who beat him and the one player that he did beat took Austria to a quick end which did not hurt Austria that much.

"As you can see, Italy fares far better with the strong players in Seattle than weak players. With Austria coming out on the bottom on both lists you can see the problems we have with it..."

This information is most interesting, Doug. An initial look at your figures shows immediately that France and Italy fare far better in Seattle than they have been doing in Dippy postal play, while England and Bussia are not doing as well. Turkey at the top and Austria at the bottom is S.O.P. I hope to be able to publish more of your interesting results in future issues. Comments from readers are invited and encouraged.

# RULE CHANGES/ADDITIONS

Change-Sheet #1 to EREHWON's House-Rules should accompany this issue. The specific changes are amendments to Rules 6, 20, and 28, and a new Rule 33 has been added. What is the effect of these changes?

Rule 6. With the addition of this rule, all stand-by players who are not receiving the 'zine for which they are standing by because they have paid a game-fee or have a current trade agreement will be required to subscribe. This change in previous policy has been occasioned by a chronic problem at Pandemonium: money. There is never enough, and the operation has never been self-supporting. One positive result of this, however, will be the opening up of stand-by lists in all 'zines beyond the previous 5-person limit. See Announcements, item 5.

Rule 20 has been completely rewritten, to include all ramifications of Brannan's Rule in four corollaries. Corollary b is a distinctly new addition. The effect of this corollary is this: Army A is attacking province P, convoyed by fleet F and supported by unit (army or fleet) S. There is a fleet, FF, in P. It attacks F, supported by fleet SS. Even though FF is not attacking A, the effect of A's supported attack is to stand of the attack of FF upon the convoying F. Nifty, no?

Rule 28. Two utterly ridiculous "rules" are negated by sub-rules i and j. The former deals with the strange idea that the annihilation of a convoying fleet also annihilates the convoyed army. The latter deals with the so-called "Key Rule". For further explanation and castigation of these ideas, turn to Announcements, section 6.

Rule 33. States definitely, for the first time, the exact nature of EREHWDN's trade policy. This rule will be enforced.

# OUT OF THE GRAVEYARD — I MARSOVIA (1)

Out of the Graveyard will be a permanent, but irregular, feature of EREHWON. Its purpose will be to summarize the contents and life history of various defunct Dippy 'zines. Not all such efforts will necessarily appear in this section, either because I cannot gain access to the necessary material or because there seems no purpose in it. Right now, I am depending on my own files; later, however, I hope to scrutinize the extensive holdings of John Koning and maybe solicit information from Don Miller and other nice people who have a lot of stuff I don't (like copies of CORSAIR; hint, hint). The coverage will consist of three parts (a la Caesar): a tabular summary of all known issues, supply-center/player charts for games carried, and a narrative recitation of interesting goings-on, reprints of press-releases, graffiti, and the like, and so on.

Today's offering is MARSOVIA (Part 1 of 2 parts), edited by Bob Ward and usually published by Conrad von Metzke. The 'zine was active from early 1966 to mid-1968, and carried one game (1966N). I had the pleasure (?) of losing as Austria (as a stand-by), after Art Canfil staged some sort of anti-Vietnam foolishness aboard a U.S. naval vessel to which he was assigned. It is very hard to play postal Diplomacy from the brig. Anyway, Bob is now in the service (and taking things far more sensibly, I might add), and this hopefully temporary condition has forced the discontinuance of his publication. Nonetheless, 1966N was played through to completion, being won by Dan Barrows' France in Fall 1909. I was (alas!) wiped out.

Herewith is a tabular summary of the 'zine. Certain symbols are used. The first column is the number of the issue. If the number is in parenthases, this means that the number was not actually assigned. The second column indicates the game content (season and year) of the issue. The third column indicates the date of the issue. The fourth

column is the method of reproduction: d, ditto; m, mimeo; x, xerox; c, carbon copy. The fifth column is the number of pages. If starred, this means that the 'zine was printed on both sides of the paper, so that one sheet contains two pages. Footnotes are as indicated.

The game began in Winter 1900 when the entire 7-man Marsovian National Guard escaped from the National Institute for the Psychically Disturbed, to which they had been committed for their neuroses. Each of them believed he was the supreme ruler of one of the Great Powers. Disorders continued, as England installed an American pig farmer, Henry J. Krajewski, as Prime Minister. To some extent, the future aspect of the game was foreshadowed in 1901, as Germany invaded Sweden, Russia attempted to take Vienna, England kept Germany out of Holland, and Turkey conquered Greece.

At this point the Government of Austria was overthrown by the deaths (by poison) of the Emperor and seven members of the Imperial Family who stood closest to the Throne. The eighth closest, Count Ladislas of Nassau-Krumlau, a former druggist, assumed the Throne as Ladislas II and VI of Austria and Hungary. This didn't seem to help much, as Russia and Turkey promptly attacked Austria, seizing Budapest and Serbia in 1902. England and Russia continued to hammer at Germany, while France and Italy traded blows around Spain and Marseilles. It was in 1902, also, that Prime Minister Krajewski's poetry began to appear (alas), thus arousing the wrath of his chief political rival thereafter, Dame Princetonia Garrigus, President of the British Federation of Poets. The P. M. 's rather obvious preference for Shakespeare occasioned an appearance of that gentleman in the House of Commons. Dame Princetonia was soon to follow. In Austria, the Emperor proclaimed one Rurik Vladimirovich as rightful Tsar at a great rally. He also consigned the broken Treaty of lemburg to the flames, along with the Russian Ambassador. //TO BE CONTINUED//

- 1. A Word of Thanks. For the past few months, Pandemonium Publications has been in fairly serious difficulty, with a sick mimeo, lack of available funds, and insufficient time. Only in November were we able to resume anything like a normal publishing schedule (still subject to change without too much notice). Despite a hiatus of many, many weeks between issues, our players and readers were most patient and understanding. Many of you wrote notes of concern ("When in hell is EREHWON coming out???") and sent offers of help ("If you can't run your own stupid games,..."). Seriously, I did appreciate the sincerely nice letters. I want to thank all of you for putting up with it all. This is not the last time something of this sort will occur, unfortunately, since my projected re-entry into civilian and academic life next August will doubtless disrupt things again. However, I want to assure all of you that I intend to continue publication of all my 'zines am games, even if there are delays and further mass confusion. Again, my thanks for your patience.
- 2. Deadlines. The days are over when you could count on a long "grace" period between the published deadline and the date I would actually stop accepting moves. My usual practice is to wait until the next mail delivery after the date of the deadline to catch moves that were accidentally delayed a day or so. This "grace" period may be as much as 48 hours, but may be no more than 24 hours. After that, I plan to adjudicate the games which are due. After I adjudicate the game, even if there is a further delay in printing the 'zine, I will not accept moves. Submission of Sealed Orders is the best way to avoid the consequences of late moves. Remember, if you put your moves in the mail as much as 3 days before the deadline, you stand a 50% chance of being late.
- 3. THE OZ FREE PRESS. Fear not, it is not dead. A short issue, containing the Winter 1501 builds will be out after New Years' Day. I will spend a few weeks replacing players who have dropped (there are lots of new Gamesmasters to invite) and resume regular publication as soon as all wrinkles are ironed out. An important wrinkle is the replacement of the current player of Poderkagg.
- 4. Variant Games. There are no current openings in any Pandemonium Publication 'zines except in UTOPIA, where there are still openings for the 10-man Youngstown Variant (which adds China, India, and Japan to the 7 Powers of Diphomacy). The fee is \$4. Registered: May, St.Cyr, White Reiter, Wittmann, Gemignani. This interesting game is the last I will be offering, save the game announced in item 8, below.
- 5. Stand-by Positions. Unlimited stand-by positions are currently available in all Pandemonium 'zines. The only pre-requisites are that (1) you have the maps (or I have available sets) and (2) you subscribe to, or otherwise already receive through game fee or trade, the 'zine in question. This includes EREHWON! Other 'zines (and games; I have maps if indicated with \*): ATLANTIS (10/\$1); Princeps, Imperialism IX, Imperialism XI. IONOKOME (10/\$1.50); Imperialism VII/\*VIIIR. UTOPIA (10/\$1); Imperialism VIII/\*VIIIR, \*Youngstown Variant. ZOTHIQUE (10/\$1); \*Feudalism. If you desire a stand-by position, and do not already receive the 'zine, enter a subscription and indicate where you would like to stand by. Players previously eliminated are eligible for stand-by positions, by the way.
- 6. Miasma on the Rules Front. I realize the Gamesmaster of a 'zine is the ultimate authority over what policies he will follow. However, when rules interpretations reach the point of actual rewriting, I feel obligated, if nothing else, to warn my readers about what is going on. Those who plan to join games in journals which have nutty rules ought, at least, to be forewarned about the conditions under which they will be playing. For this reason, EREHWON cannot at this time recommend games in SPALD, JR. or THE DIPLOMAT.
- a. "The annihilated Convoy". This rule appears in SPALD, JR. It states that if a convoying figure is dislocked and annihilated, the convoyed army is likewise annihilated. This directly contravenes the fules, which unequiocally state (p. 5), "If the fleet is dislocked on the rave, the army may not move." This statement takes in both conditions, a fleet dislocked and able to retreat, and a fleet dislocked and annihilated. The SPALD rule is not an autorpretation; it is a rewrite.
- b. "The Key Paic". This rule is used only in THE DIFLOMAT, contrary to any statements to the contrary therein. Jeff Key, whose THE VOICE was slated to use the "rule" named after him, has changed his mind. The "Key" Rule states that a unit which

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is ordered to move gives up its claim to the province it occupies. That means that if it is prevented from moving, it may be dislodged by a single unsupported attacking unit. This, too, contravenes the Rules, which state (p. 4), "If a unit is not ordered to move, or is prevented from moving, and another unit is ordered to its space, that unit may not move" (italics in the original). I realize, of course, that the group of players who founded the game (1967BD#) in THE DIPLOMAT had learned the rules while they were still being formulated by Dr. Calhamer, and, not having a copy, had to reconstruct them. It is now too late to do much about the technical variant status of 1967BD# (which I none-theless rate, since it's not that much of a variant). But there is no reason why Eric Just cannot conform to the Rules, as printed, in his new games.

- 7. New Rules?? The President of Cames Research, Inc., Mr. John R. Moot recently wrote to John McCallum, "I am arranging to have the rules revised" (BROBDINGNAG #89, p. 10). This is very important news. I assume that Dr. Calhamer will be involved in this job. Perhaps not. In any event, I think that the postal Dippy players have the largest vested interest in the game of any of Games Research's customers, and it seems appropriate that we should be consulted on any projected revisions. I strongly urge all of you to write Mr. Moot (at the address printed for G.R. on p. 1). Please indicate that you are very glad that revisions are at last to be made, and suggest that, at least, prominent postal Gamesmasters be contacted, either to prepare suggested drafts, or to read G.R.'s new draft and suggest corrections before it is printed. The Gamesmasters whose names come most readily to mind for this purpose (besides my fat self, that is) are: John McCallum, John Boardman, John Koning, Larry Paery, Conrad von Metzke, Charles Wells, and Don Miller. This ill-assorted and blood-besotted crew might do some good, n'est-ce pas? Anyway, write!
- 8. The Diplomacy Widow's Game. EREHWON announces a new regular 7-man, or 7-woman, rather, game, for Diplomacy widows only. To qualify, each entrant must (a) pay \$4 (obviously), (b) be female, (c) be married to, engaged to, or going steady with, a Diplomacy addict, (d) have been stood up or ignered on account of a Diplomacy game at least ence, (e) submit an affidavit stating that she thinks Diplomacy is the stupidest game ever invented, (f) never have played in any postal game previously (sorry, Jane Wells) (and Christine Brannan), and (g) conduct her own diplomacy, submit her own moves, and write her own propaganda. Paid reservations for the game are now being accepted by the Gamesmaster, my wife, Bonnie Walker, who qualifies under (b) through (f) above (especially (e). Bonnie, when asked what she would say to encourage her sister Dippy widows to enter, says "How do I know? I haven't told a lie that big since I was a little kid." Anyway, the game is for real, the game-fee is for real, and even Bonnie is for really going to be the Gamesmaster. Don't miss EREHWON's answer to distaff wrestling, coming to these pages (hopefully) soon!!
- 9. AEOLUS. For those of you who are worried, I have it on very good authority that the much-respected Dippy journal, AEOLUS, is alive and well in Argentina Florida. Monte Zelazny has been busy of late, and unable to publish. But AEOLUS #8 is already in the typewriter, and Monte plans to bring it cut in January. I had a welcome 'phone call from Monte on the night of the 18th, and this is what he told me. I know that AEOLUS has many well-wishers, and we will be glad to see it return to activity.
- 10. Imperialism VIIR. New maps for Imperialism VIIR are in the process of preparation. They will be run off in mimeo this month. A set of 6 interlocking maps, plus the rules and a one-page overall map, will be offered for  $50 \, \text{¢}$  (25 \tilde{\epsilon} for members of the NFFF Games Bureau). The one-page maps will be sold separately for  $10/30 \, \text{¢}$  ( $10/20 \, \text{¢}$  for NFFF G.B, members),  $20/50 \, \text{¢}$  ( $20/30 \, \text{¢}$ ), or  $1/10 \, \text{¢}$  ( $1/8 \, \text{¢}$ ). These maps will replace the older ditto maps, which tend to fade, which are still available at the old price of set/25 \tilde{\epsilon} until precent stocks are exhausted.
- 11. Xmas Cards. Many of you have sent me some very nice greeting cards this month, and I would like to thank you very much for them. Unfortunately, Bonnie and I are not sending out cards this year (as usual) because every year we are staggered by the prospective expense and wind up forgetting about it until it's too late. I do want to say, however, that we appreciate your remembrances. This larger and more gala than usual issue of EREHWON is my Yule gift and card to all EREHWON's many loyal and valued friends. Again, to repeat page 1, a very merry Yule!

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12. Rating Systems. It has been my intention to begin a short analysis of the current flock of rating systems. In the interest of other items, this feature of EREH-

WON has been delayed. A sort of first installment may be found on p. 7.

- the exact format required for the submission of moves. The game number, country, player, season, and game-year are mandatory. I am getting very tired of sets of moves which do not specify the game concerned and consequently having to play a guessing game to see what's going on. Moves that do not specify country being played are equally "amusing". BE WARNED! Moves which do not meet minimum requirements of Rule #10 will be returned to the sender and will not be used. I intend to be moderately lenient in this regard, but do not trust my good will too far. If you send me improper moves at the last minute, it will be the same as no moves at all, which is another reason for getting your moves in early. With deadlines a month apart, there is no reason why moves should still be arriving on the day after the deadline and, yet, the day after that. Again, I say, be warned. You cannot say you have not had sufficient notice, and I am not asking you to do anything beyond your capability (I hope).

# ENGLAND: FINAL PRESS RELEASE?



FRENCIANA: LEAGUE OF MINI-STATES TO PROTECT THEIR SMALLEST MEMBER

ANDORRA IA VIEJA (20 August 1911): Meeting in emergency executive session, the Grand Council of the League of Mini-States today voted to grant asylum to the former King of Frenciana, Louis XIX, his son, Louis XX, and their loyal Regent, the Duc de Greene. Accompanied by a small band of loyal retainers, the royal party made a valiant dash from Peeris, which is under siege by Confederate/English forces. Covering 600 miles in less than 4 days, they exhausted a huge number of horses and retainers who could not keep up. The King, His son, and the Duc are resting in the Andorran Palace following a session with the foreign ministers of the League. Radio Andorra reports:

"The Ministers of the League met yesterday at the request of the Maldive Islands to consider the charge that the invasion of Frenciana by the Confederate States of America and England constituted a direct violation of the International Covenant for the Preser-

Preservation of Peace (ICPP). His Excellency, Muhammad Didi III, charged that both nations had violated the ICPP and should be punished. After a few minutes of debade and clarification of what the nature of the punishment should be, the member states voted, 16-3-2, to establish sanctions against both nations and any nation supporting them.

"In a later session the delegate from Nauru demanded the League take action to halt the growing war in Europe between Germany and Turkey. After long and hard debate the League voted by a narrow margin (a 2/3 majority being required) to establish a military force to protect its members from both states. As part of the force, the following pleges were made: LIECHTENSTEIN, 500 bowmen; ANDOFRA, 250 bowmen, 10 knights; LUXEMBOURG, 1000 bowmen, 25 knights, 2 cannon; SAN

MARINO, 100 bowmen, 1 knight; MAIDIVE ISLANDS, 1 fishing boat armed with a 2" cannon; NAURU, 2 fishing boats armed with 1" cannon; GUYANA, 100 archers; RIFIFI, 100 slingers; ECUATORIAL GUINEA, 200 headhunters; SOUTH YEMEN, a camel corps of 100 men; ICELAND, 2 fishing boats armed with 2" guns." The naming of the Duc de Greene of Frenciana as the commander-in-chief of this force suggests that it may take more than a passive role in the war now in progress. /Puff, puff, puffity-puff, puff. CONFEDERATE STATES OF AMERICA: MINESVEEPER DAMAGED

PALMA, BALEARIC ISIANDS (15 October 1911): R. Milltown Nixon, Commander of the Confederate minesweeper Baba Yaga, was acquitted today by a court-martial of charges of criminal negligence. Captain Nixon was charged with running down and destroying a little fleet of peaceful fishing boats during naval maneuvers last month. However, testimony revealed some startling facts. Two of the boats were South Pacific cances. One of them was a dhow. All of them were shooting dried peas at the Baba Yaga out of "teeny-tiny cannons." "You might call them mini-cannons," said Captain Nixon. "Good heavens!" cried Commodore Augustus Perry, President of the Court, "that was the entire Mini-League Navy!! Well done, Captain!" Apparently, nothing now stands in the way of the projected Confederate invasion of Marseilles, Provence, Septimania, and other places.



VIENNA (1 November 1901): After months of threats at Vienna State University, the students have begun a hunger strike in protest against the Government's lenient policy toward Italy and its King, Maxius Raffertius. Led by their ledder, Eldrich von Clever, the students have vowed to refuse food until given a voice in governmental policy.

VIENNA (15 December 1901): After seeing the massive popular support behind the student strike, Emperor Franz Joseph today renounced the throne in favor of Eldrich. What his policies will be is not known at this moment.

BERLIN: The Swedish Embassy to the Wilhelmstrasse: Rumor, gentlemen, is frequently

BAKU (Imperial Russian Information Service): In yet another surprise attack, the Russian Imperial Garrison has been burned by the Armenian raiders that have been terroizing this region. In spite of the fact that most of the garrison was in the field at the time of the raid, Imperial losses are reportedly heavy.

6. "Key's" Rule. A special p. 4 to THE VOICE, Vol. II, #1, Jeff Key specifically rejects the rule named after him, already discussed in Announcement #6, this issue. I join with Jeff in encouraging the remaining Gamesmasters who use this rule, Eric Just and Bob Foster, to avoid using it in future games. In answer to Jeff's plea on current games which do use the rule, I have already observed that I include both the "Key Rule" games in my rating system, even though they are officially (and rightfully) considered variants. I disagree that the effects of the "Key Rule" are no greater than those of the Koning Rule. Koning Rule situations do not occur frequently in a game; however, "Key Rule" situations are almost sure to occur in nearly every move. Furthermore, as has already been observed, Ioning's Rule merely interprets the Rules, while "Key's Rule" rewrites them.

7. Conrad von Metake. Persistent rumors that Conrad has changed address have proved to be true. There are equally persistent rumors that the reason for this is

that Conrad has finally married. Conrad! Is that true? Sigh ...

8. The Right-Hand Rule. This is used in THE DIPLOMAT and THE VOICE, as a method of determining where a dislodged unit will retreat. As a method of speeding play, it is admirable. As a "legal" rule, it is nowhere. The Rules are explicit about who makes retreats, and where. I personally would not play in a game where this rule was used, as I want to make my own retreats. However, when used with conditional retreats submitted with moves, the Right-Hand Rule has some merit from the Gamesmaster's point of view, even if not from the player's. In any event, players should be aware of the use of this rule when they are considering new games to join.

# THULCANDRA REPRINTS

THULCANDRA, the Mensa Diplomacy journal, has been publishing exerpts from Fodor's Guide to Hernia, which I have been given permission to reprint. Today we have:

Chapter 7: Classical Hernian Erotology

In the Hernian capital, the printing and publishing of the classics of Hernian erotic literature has attained the status of big business. In fact, next to the sale of large gaily colored and glueless postage stamps to unwary collectors, sale of the ancient lore of Hernian erotic poetry and prose has been the primary factor in the Hernian economic miracle of the last 15 years,
