MAGAZINE TITLES

A flicker of memory engenders an idea. Someone - Burt Labelle, I believe - suggested I do a listing of all Diplomacy magazines by title, indicating the source of the name. Well, why not?

In the early days of the hobby there was a bit of a tradition to name 'zines after mythical, fictional or otherwise imagined geographic locations. This tradition was broken almost immediately by the two local 'zines WITDIP and WORDIP (1963-4), but on a mass-distribution level the first title to go at variance was STAB in 1965. Since then, the pattern has broken down in wholesale fashion, though the thread of the old tradition still lives and spawns occasional new 'traditional' titles even now. But it must be said that, at this writing, there is no pattern of any consequence left in the naming of Diplomacy magazines; sources are as varied as the magazines themselves.

Following is a list of all Diplomacy-related newsletters known to me and the source of the name unless obvious on the surface. I would be grateful if readers who can supply sources for titles marked 'unknown' or equivalent would advise, and I'll update as possible later on. In addition, if I've omitted any titles altogether, please tell me. (Sub'zines and organisational journals are intentionally excluded.)

ADAG - A semi-acronym from the French phrase 'A droite, a gauche', which means 'to the left, to the right' and underlines the publisher's well-known neutrality.

Albion - An appropriate name for England's first Diplomacy journal, since 'Albion,' whatever its actual definition, has come to be synonymous with 'England.'

Andromeda Chronicle - No, not the book title about the mysterious disease; this comes from a science-fiction novel by Fred and Geoffrey Hoyle; Andromeda, of course, is a real 'place.'

Anschluss - a German word meaning 'union' or 'joining-together.'

I presume it was selected because this magazine offers to run any war game at all.

Aquarius - This being the age thereof, the title strikes me as indicating modernity. It might also indicate watery content, though Aquarius is not a water sign, which might indicate schizophrenia.

Arena - just exactly what it seems to signify. A place to play games.

Armadillo - It's in the dictionary, and that is all there is to it.

Arrakis - A planet name taken from Frank Herbert's novel DUNE.

Atlantis - eh, come on!

Avanti - Italian (?Latin?) for 'forward.'

Backstab - yes.

BDC Journal - obvious. BDC is British Diplomacy Club.

Bellicus - My Latin is faulty but the root word is 'war.'

Berserker - I think this one is self-evident, but....

Big Brother - and doesn't he wish he were!

Big D - I'll give you a hint; If I published this it would be Big VM.

Obviously it is time I broke down and invested in a decent machine. But instead I shall get my 1947 Smith-Corona fixed and struggle with it. Meanwhile, my apologies.

If anyone is as yet unaware, the new Director of the Orphan Games Project is Gregory A. Warden, 4305 Baltimore Avenue, Philadelphia, PA. 19104. I respectfully urge all Gamesmasters to begin trading their publications with Greg (he offers his quite superb EN PASSANT); without massive cooperation in this respect he cannot hope to achieve worthwhile results.

Every now and again I ought to mention that the Associate Custodian of the International Boardman Numbers is Fred C. Winter, P.O. Box 604, Madison, WI. 53701. Should I, for any reason, drop away from the Diplomacy scene, Fred is waiting to pick up the pieces as quickly and accurately as possible. If at any time you, as a Gamesmaster, are advised by Mr. Winter that he has assumed the duties of this job, regardless of whether you hear from me or not, said notice may be considered official and operative. I beg you all to cooperate at such time with Fred in the same magnificent way you have been with me.

Speaking again of orphaned games, Richard Hull (TANGELO EXPRESS) has ceased publication and has offered the sum of \$50 plus his spirit duplicator to anyone willing to take over the magazine in toto. As it turns out, in toto excludes the '1776' variant game, which has been adopted by Richard Vedder and is being resumed in QUO VADIS. Anyone interested in the rest of Mr. Hull's offer should contact Greg Warden, address above.

And again of orphans, it is important to consider the rare instance of a Gamesmaster, forced to close down shop, who breaks the normal rules of abandonment and actually takes care of his commitments. In the last few months we have seen three exemplary individuals take just such a mature course: John Lavrey (IPOLOEA), Mark Neidmark (LARCUS et al.), and Stephen Bell (CARETBAGGER - I'm distributing the money for Steve, so be patient until my next check order arrives). Far from the breed of vanishing crook that we have come to abhor in this hobby, these three have made financial settlements and aided the transfer process no end. I sincerely hope this surge of integrity lately is indicative of a trend. (I'm. Obviously Rich Hull should be included in this list of 'good guys'.)
