The only real democratic contest this week was in the state of Louisiana. The other contest in Indiana featured three candidates, two of which have dropped from the race because of financial problems. Senator Stephen Wilcox managed to take more than 50% in Louisiana, which only further proves his strangle hold on the South.

The state had very little spent on Media, and the margin of victory was attributed to last weeks whistlestop tour by the conservative Democrat, along with the strategic use of his stand in favor of Military Draft Registration.

Next weeks battles in the South Atlantic states and the Border states have Wilcox labelled as the heavy favorite in both. The momentum from this weeks win in the only contested race may make Wilcox impossible to beat. With all candidates trying to save money for the decisive western states, it will take an expensive media blitz to beat the Texas Senator next week.

FRICK CONTINUES DOMINANCE IN SOUTH

Conservative Texans did well in the neighboring state of Louisiana today, as Congressman Dave Frick returned to a full schedule of campaigning to win. The campaign was much closer than had been expected, mostly because of the lack of a strong showing in any of the recent elections by Congressman Frick. As a result, he was forced to buy 3 media shares, and he is now terribly strapped for cash.

In spite of his money problems, Frick announced that he was intending to stay in the race by opening organizations in both Kentucky and California which hold elections in the final week of the primary. campaign. Unless he can gain quite a few contributions, Frick does not presently have enough money to maintain those organizations for more than a few weeks. In addition he is facing a tough campaign in his home state of Texas.

The Hare campaign was bitterly disappointed by the loss. In the middle of the week as Hare campaigned in opposition to the Draft, Frick announced that he would have voted against the measure in Congress. Frick said his opposition was purely due to the cost of conducting registration. "If we get into a situation where there is a legitimate need for troops, the American people will respond as they always have, and come to the aid of their country. As a country, we have no business in a conflict that we can't raise enough volunteers to fight," the candidate said.

HALVERSTADT FAILS TO BREAK 501 GAUGHAN PICKS UP 30 CFP IN CONTRIBUTIONS

Despite the fact that he had no active opposition, Colorado Governor Jake Halverstadt only polled 49% of the vote in today's Indiana primary. Former California Governor Pete Gaughan claimed the results as a victory for his bankrupt campaign. In opinion polls taken the day of the election as people exited the voting booths Gaughan beat Halverstadt 61% to 33% among those who could name the top issues that had been debated all week. Halverstadt had beaten the issue advantage through the use of his organization and last weeks visits to the three most populous Indiana cities.

Contacted in Kansas City where he is campaigning for next weeks Border States regional caucuses, Halverstadt pointed out that he had not spent any money on advertising, and he was able to gain 70 CFP in donations. "In fact, I actually made money this week. I spent less than I got. I can see how the voters who preferred the bankrupt campaigns this week would have a hard time voting for someone as frugal as myself."

Gaughan's campaign was helped out of some of its debt by Indiana Democrats who contributed 30 CPP to his cause. "If we can raise enough money to pay off our present debt and be able to afford registering for the California primary, then we may still have a chance here. This race is wide open!" Time is against him however, with only next weeks caucuses and the Pennsylvania primary to go before his name no longer appears on any ballots.

HARE WINS IN ANOTHER SQUEAKER WALL LESS THAN A POINT BEHIND; YOUNG ONE AND A HALF POINTS BACK

Indiana Republicans failed to give any of the candidates a mandate today, as only i and one half of a per cent separated first and third. Former California Senator Ty Hare was able to get a slight edge, mostly from his advantage in media, and as a result gained all 54 of the states delegates. Indiana is a winner-take-all primary state. These delegates gave Hare the delegate lead in what may become a see-saw battle with Wall.

California Senator Dan Young saw his win streak end at two. Had the candidate purchased just one more media share at the minimum price of 21 CFP, he would have won todays primary. The boost in his doantions should have more than made up for the additional cost. Still, with the primary race almost half way over, Young is in by far the best financial shape. Analysts see a very rocky Convention coming up, since it now appears unlikely that any candidate will have enough delegates to lock up the nomination.

Congressman Frick of Texas spent most of his energy and money campaigning in Louisiana, and had not even visited Indiana.







The French troops marched from the port of Veracruz toward the capital and at Puebla, some 80 miles southeast of Mexico City, met the peasant army led by Gen. Ignacio Zaragoza on

Cinco de Mayo.

The Mexicans won and that victory has been the reason for a national celebration for the past 123 years in much the same manner as the Fourth of July is celebrated in the United States.
