



Babbitt is an aberration; but there are things about him I find very likeable. As far as I know, he and former Indianapolis Mayor Hudnut are the only major politicians who have had the guts to come out against Social Security. I respect that. I'm predicting that Babbitt goes for the Vice-Presidency. I was really expecting the Republican primery to turn into a Kemp vs Bush race, but now it looks wors like Dole vs Bush. I like Dole. Lately with the campaign starting up, he is indulged in some bullshit, but that is to be expected. I'm counting on him to return to his "pragmatist" self if he makes it to the White House. Gephart pisses me off because he wants to keep subsidizing farmers and smokestack industries with tariffs and loan guarantees and other gimmicks. It would cost the taxpayers less if he would skip the bullshit and just give money to the farmers, etc. outright. But if he proposes that, he'll be laughed out of the primary, as well he should.

I've read a little bit about some Republican who is running a quiet, behind the scenes sort of campaign a la Gephart. I forget his name, but I recall he had a George Bush sort of resume' but even better. He was never in a terribly flashy position, but has lots of experience in cabinet positions and in the military I think and that sort of stuff. I seem to recall he was National Security Advisor under Ford. George Will did a piece on him about two weeks ago. Know anything about this? Anyway, I watch interestedly although I haven't any idea who I want to vote for.

I'm not even sure which party I like the best. I think I would vote for anybody who takes a real strong stand for living within our means. I'm really down on debt (also known as "credit"). I liked the description by an ordinarily uninspiring Playboy columnist: "Credit is the Cocaine of this culture, the artificial stimulant that flutters the heart and brightens the brain -- but at what expense?" Ironically, the only candidate who I've ever heard speak favorably and specifically about staying out of debt is Pat Robertson.

Well, almost anybody.

([I think you are more than likely referring to Alexander Haig. And for some reason I think you already know that. "I'm in charge" Haig doesn't have a chance. He is too cerebral in some cases, not nearly enough in others. He has quit every job he ever had, usually in a huff. After two or three bad news conferences he would become petulant and paramoid and be the next Mixon. Nothing the press likes more than a President they can hound up a tree.

That has been the most disappointing thing about Reagan's handling of the Iran affair -- his fear of the press. He should

have had weekly news conferences and shown them he couldn't be cowed. All hiding does is show that you have a reason to hide.

Gephart and Biden won't do nearly as well as Hart, Babbitt, and maybe Bradley. Bradley came in a surprising second in a poll of the southern states after Cuomo dropped out. For the Republicans, Bush had close to 50%, Dole and Baker traded seconds (Baker was taken out of the poll when he took over as Chief of Staff) and Kemp was almost gone. He won't do much better in the actual voting, especially now that one of brethren have fallen.

I am pretty much in agreement with you regarding the mechanics of the game [[Sorry to interrupt, but this letter has been here for a while. For instance, as a GM I wouldn't disqualify the perpetrator of a "Flying Dutchman" from a tournament game. Just take the unit off and play from there, any player that has to rely on tricks isn't a food enough diplomat to survive anyway, and will usually eliminate himself—and it's less trouble if you leave the eliminating to his fellow players. There are plenty of loopholes to give a player an "unfair" advantage, but the name of the game isn't Loophole (or, alas, Tactics). It's <u>Diplomacy</u>, and the best <u>Diplomat</u> should win.

Correct me if I am wrong, but Kennedy's "Bay of Pigs" was a plot concocted under Eisenhower that Kennedy couldn't pull the plug on. At least Kennedy was brave enough to accept full responsibility when it failed, rather than try to shovel it off on some underlings (a common tactic of the Reagan administration).

Hey, sending the Marines into Lebanon to be blown up was not a mistake. After all, Our President said it was the Right Thing To do. How can you blame that one on the liberals? After all, isn't Reagan Commander-in-Chief? Hadn't he been given a landslide mandate to execute foreign policy as he saw fit? Why should he be a mere pawn of the discredited liberals? Yes, if Carter had been as deft in handling Nicaragua as Reagan was in Haiti, the Philippines, Lebanon, and Grenada (oops, forget Lebanon and Grenada), then the world would be peachy keen right now.

While I don't have any figures at hand, calling this a non-war aconomy is somewhat misleading. Defense spending is very high for a typical peacetime economy. How does the current defense budget compare with that of, say, the early '70's as a percentage of the total budget?

When it comes down to it, what great achievement will Reagan be remembered for in years to come? What can he hold up to Carter's Camp David Accord as a comparable achievement? To date, he's been thoroughly mediocre and I expect that to continue.

Yes, Reagan vs FDR would have been an interesting race. After all, both have been dead for years now.

[(Congress revised Reagan's budget?!?!? Every year I here the same thing: "The President's budget is considered Dead On Arrival up on the Hill." There hasn't been a budget remotely close to what he has asked for. The liberals forced his hand in Lebanon starting with the over reaction to Viet Nam. The Congress gave LBJ a free hand with the Gulf of Tonkin resolution and then taught themselves a lesson by taking away almost all Presidential discretion in reacting to armed aggression or the use of troops. The troops in Beirut were ordered to leave their guns unloaded and act as peace officers. Anything stronger than that would have required a declaration of War. Since we didn't have anyone to declare war on, I don't think we should have had any troops there. But trying to rebuild Lebanon was a humanitarian gesture, right? And what was wrong with the way Grenada was handled?

I can't see a valid comparison between the CIA/Bush and the KGB/Andropov.

While the Republicans were losing the Senate, they were winning the governorships. The agenda is strong enough, we need better Senate candidates and better campaigns. Chavez ran a stupid and dirty campaign and she deserved to lose against even the most liberal Democrat.

As a percentage of the budget, the Defense budget is probably about the same or lower than the early 70's. As a percentage of the GNP, it is much lower. I don't have nay figures at hand either, and I don't want this to get into a bull slinging contest with you throwing your figures at me and me throwing mine at you. Why don't we instead discuss the policy behind the budget decisions. I agree with the President that the major function of the Pederal government should be the defense of the nation; leave all the rest to the States. So the defense budget shouldn't be the largest budget item, together with the State Department, it should be half the budget. The other half should be spent on the judicial system and minimal commerce regulation. Everything else should be handled by the states.

Well, well. Is there such a thing as a Republican Chief executive who can be trusted?

[[Let's see if I can take a quick shot at that one: It depends on which side has the best lawyer.

I take issue that either Governor Clements or President Reagan made a morally wrong decision. First, Clements did not approve of illegal payments. There is nothing illegal, to my knowledge, in paying football players to play football. The NCAA doesn't like it, and if you want to be in their organization you are supposed to obey their rules. SMU may have even had contractual problems with players they refused to pay! I keep saying SMU; actually it was "boosters" of course. Now if Clements can get a "booster" to give him enough money to build a new building for the psychology department, but risks losing the football program for a year by doing so, what would you have him do?

Just when I thought there was now to stop the Japanese from steadily widening their lead over American industry, I saw a headline in the paper that said "Japan to Open Its Doors to American Lawyers." That ought to do it.

I don't know which deputy undersecretary of what talked the Japanese into allowing American lawyers to practice over there, but whoever it was should be made the Secretary of State tomorrow. The Japanese had to have been aware of the sheer numbers of lawyers in America. According to statistics I saw a few years ago, American law schools turn out as many lawyers every year as there are lawyers in Japan all together. We're producing that many new ones annually on top of what is already, to put kindly as possible, a surplus. As any lawyer specializing in international trade could tell you, if you happened to be willing to pay him \$250 an hour plus expenses, those are the classic conditions that lead to dumping.

I suspect our guy softened up the Japanese by flooding Japanese television with old Perry Mason reruns, so that they'd think American lawyers are thoughtful men who, without giving much thought to their own fee, save innocent people from jail in the five minutes between the soy sauce commercial and the end of the show. Then, somehow, he suckered them into opening the doors.

I realize the headline writer was simply using a metaphor, but when I read that phrase about the doors I couldn't help envisioning a real door being opened. That response might have had something to do with my childhood: whenever my mother left us kids alone in the house, her parting words were, "Remember, don't open the door to any lawyers."

As I see it, the man who hears the knock is a small, exceedingly polite Japanese gentleman named Mr. Yamaguto -- the Chief Executive Officer of Kondetzu, a company so much more efficient than its American counterparts that it has a lock on contracts to provide 80% of the U.S. Army's tanks, the auditorium sound system for the miss America contest, and the official baseball for both major leagues. Mr. Yamaguto smiles as he goes to the door. He is expecting Perry Mason. He's thinking that Perry Mason just might have brought along that nice secretary of his. He opens the door. He bows. Twenty-six thousand American lawyers walk in.

Within a month, 14,000 of them are billing Kondetzu for legal services, at rates that range from \$200 to \$350 an hour. Legal expenses have forced the company to put off retooling of its

food-service division, and, for the first time in 10 years, it has lost the annual contract awarded for the supplying of apple pies to American Legion halls. Mr. Yamaguto has less and less time for management of the company, since he is often meeting with his lawyers or trying to figure out how to pay lawyers or defending himself from the lawyers hired by dissatisfied employees and dissident stockholders or giving depositions to lawyers in the negligence case several lawyers persuaded him to bring after he was bowled over at the door-opening and suffered what they call "potential psychoneurotic whiplash."

All over Japan, other small, exceedingly polite gentlemen have opened doors only to be trampled by hordes of American lawyers and billed for it. American imports increase as Japanese industry begins to sag under the weight of legal advice. Within a couple of years, Tokyo teenagers are walking around plugged into a version of the Walkman manufactured in Gary, Indiana. An American company now has the contract to provide replacement cars for the bullet train from Tokyo to Kyoto. No master sushi chef in Japan will work without a contract guaranteeing him an adequate supply of American knives — a contract hammered out by huge teams of American lawyers on both sides. Within five years, the economy of the Japanese is in such bad shape that you'd think they were the ones who lost the Second World War.

By that time, the way I figure it, the genius who negotiated this deal has been sent off to undermine some of out other competitors. American conglomerates and corporate raiders have been allowed into west Germany, and BMMs are beginning to come off the line with engine knocks and missing fenders, as management increasingly turns its attention to staving off a takeover bid by a company whose main line of work is the manufacture of frozen bratwurst dinners. Finally, with the dollar strong and Midwestern assembly lines humming, there is a headline that reflects the great negotiator's most spectacular triumph: "Soviet Union to Open Its doors to American Life Insurance Salesmen."
