PRESIDENTIAL POLITICS

Citing a lack of support from the established powers of the Republican party, Massachusettes Congressman Jim Makuc has withdrawn his name from consideration for the Republican Presidential Nomination. The withdrawal of the moderate Makuc leaves only one Easterner as a possible nominee for the Republicans, and that is Maryland Governor Dick Martin. Martin, however, also seems to be reluctant to toss his hat in the ring, and did no campaigning in any of the first three caucus states.

Martin and former California Senator Ty Bare have apparantly gained the most from Makuc's withdrawal. A recent poll of the National Republican Executive Committee (NREC) reveals that Seven of Makuc's nine delegates have now switched to one of those two candidates. Martin now has fairly wide range support, and almost 1/4 of the delegates from the NREC, but the front runner is the ultra conservative Congressman from Texas, Dave Prick. At last count Frick had 25 delegates, and the recent trend of the party toward more conservative candidates may give him more than enough impetus to capture the nomination. Also in the race for the Republicans are Senator Jim Meinel of Alaska, and Wisconsin Senator James Wall.

Burgess continued to campaign in Oklahoma, spending the week in Oklahoma City, and set up an organization in New Hampshire. Wilcox heads for the south and spends four days in Miami, one in Tampa, and two in Pt. Lauderdale. He spends five days in OK City, and one each in Tulsa and Sioux City. Larzelere spent seven days in Manchester, and declared candidacy in New Hampshire, Florida, and Massachusettes. Gaughan set up an organization in New Hampshire, and declared his candidacy in New Hampshire, Massachusettes, and Florida. The Senator from Wisconsin, James Wall, continues to campaign in Iowa, spending three days in Cedar Rapids, and one each in Waterloo, Sioux City, and Dubuque. On the seventh day he headed for Jackson, Mississippi.

WEEK MINUS TWO:

Hare opened an organization in New Hampshire, but still hasn't started his travel efforts yet. Wall spent one more day in Jackson, then moved on to Oklahoma City for six days.

WEEK MINUS ONE:

Another two candidates tossed hats into the ring, as Dave Prick, the ultra conservative Congressman from Houston, Texas, and Jim Meinel, the conservative senior Senator from Alaska announced their intentions to seek the nomination. Prick immediately set up organizations in Iowa, Mississsippi, and Oklahoma. He then travelled through all three states, spending one day each in Cedar Rapids, Sioux City, Biloxi, Pascagoula, OK City, Tulsa, and Lawton. Meinel set up organizations in New Hampshire and Massachusettes, then travelled in OK City-1, Tulsa, Lawton, and Dubuque-1/2, Cedar Rapids-1, Jackson, Biloxi, and Pascagoula-1/2, and Manchester-3. Wall spent four days in Oklahoma City, then three in Tulsa. Hare finally starts to make personal appearances, spending one day each in Manchester, Sioux City, and Oklahoma City. WEEK ONE:

Wall spent six days in Tules, and one in Lawton to round out his campaign just previous to the first test for the candidates. Hare put in a full week of travel, spending two more days in Oklahoma City, then three in Tules, and one each in Waterloo and Des Moines, Frick opened organizations in Illinois, Alabama, Massachusettes, New Hampshire, and Florida. He spent the week travelling through nine different cities, stopping in Des Moines, Waterloo, Jackson, Manchester, Boston, Worcester, Springfield, New Bedford, and West Palm Beach. Meinel sets up an organization in Florida, then maintains his brutal travel schedule by visiting Tules-1 and 1/2, Lawton-1/2, OK City-1 and 1/2, Sioux City-1/2, Des Moines 1 and 1/2, and Manchester 1 and 1/2. All the candidates have declared for New Hampshire, Florida, and Massachusettes.

- 1) What happens when the Windfall II and Draft II issues come up? A) The first half counterparts of those two issues will be considered dead issues and should be ignored. I know that that isn't the way Jake played it, but since several of the later primaries don't have voter points for those issues, I don't have much of a choice.
- 2) If you visit 2 cities in one day is each worth 1/2 what it would be worth otherwise? That is, can you be in bes Moines for 3 and 1/2 days and Dubuque 1/2 day, thereby getting 1/2 a candidate day in Dubuque?
 A) The travel is based on getting votes through personal
- A) The travel is based on getting votes through personal appearances and voter impressions of how important each candidate views their burg. If one candidate visits a city twice as much as another, he gets twice as many votes. It isn't based on the number of hours one spends as much as the amount of time reletive to the other candidates. Half a day (which is the amallest unit I will allow for the game) in Dubuque may have won all the votes.

LETTER COLUMN

I got this in the mail a few days ago, and I thought that the <u>feuilletonist's Forum</u> would be the perfect place to debate this issue. As with other constructives, I will wait until next issue before I reply.

CONSTRUCTIVE

It was recently announced that Randolph Smyth, Custodian of the North American Zine and Gamemaster Polls (aka the "Runestone" Poll) has transferred his custodianship of this eight year hobby institution to Bruce Linsey, former publisher of the now folded Voice of Doom. It is my atrongest belief that Randolph has unwittinly perpetuated a gross injustice and breach of faith upon our hobby by not opening up the process to the general hobby of choosing a successor. I do not believe that Bruce will be either a capable or effective custodian of the polls. My desire with this letter is to make this clearly unacceptable situation known to as many people as possible and to draw support for a new Custodian to run the polls.

There are two major reasons why Bruce is not suited to be the custodian of the Leeder Poll. The first relates to his personal qualities and the second to his reputation in the hobby and the effect that will have on the success of the poll. A failing in either instance should be grounds enough for disqualification as an effective custodian, and in this case he clearly fails both tests.

First a word about Randolph's transfer to Bruce. I am not faulting or blaming Randolph for his decision to let Bruce run it. He was obviously unaware of the storm of protest this would cause in the hobby. This is not surprising that he should be so unaware. The Runestone Poll was first started by John Leeder, a Canadian, and was excellently run for several years by him. Last year it was transferred to Randolph Smyth and he ran it for one year. I think it is safe to say that Canadian players and publishers are a little isolated and out of touch with the American part of the North American diplomacy hobby and this has not necessarily been a shortcoming. This insulation from the general mainstream added the legitimacy of the Polls by providing a neutral addy in which to conduct it. But that same insulation prevented Randolph from knowing enough about current events and enabled Bruce to portray himself in a slanted light to Randolph. It wasn't his fault, but we are left with a serious problem nonetheless.

For he chose an individual who has had some serious charges leveled against him and they are not being answered directly. Many of you are aware of the charges being thrown about. Most of my information, like yours, is second hand. But I do know one charge that is true myself where Bruce has lied to coverup a crime he did. He has in the past said he didn't charge long distance phone calls to other people without them knowing about it. I asked him on the phone last month if it was true. He said, to me, yes, he did charge a number of calls to a business phone number his brother provided him with. He was caught by the phone company and forced to pay for the calls. He says he won't do it again. Uh huh. If he's recanted to me on this point, how long until the other charges are substantiated?

This may not be proof enough for you or a serious enough crime to cause you to feel he shouldn't run the Runstone Poll. Pine, I don't feel I'm going to change anyone's minds with this letter. But the second reason he isn't suited, his reputation, is a serious impediment in itself. I would like to point out that irregardless of whether these charges are true or not there are a large number of people, myself are not going to send ballots to

and will thus effectively boycott the Runestone Poll even though that is not what we want to do as it is a worthwhile and entertaining activity. But I will not send him a ballot or plug it one bit.

What I am proposing is that we find someone who would like to run the Runestone Poll and offer him/her our support. (I'll volunteer if no one else does but I'd rather not) All of the people who would not vote with Bruce Linsey running it could vote here. We wouldn't call it a "counter" Runestone Poll, or a "second" poll or even the "real" poll. Just the Runestone Poll. Plug it as normal, only this one with a legitimate Custodian with his address.

This sort of this is not without precedent in the hobby's history. Several years ago Rod Walker believed, for one reason or another, that the hobby would be better off with two Game Openings Announcements services. So he started his own and now we have two. And we probably are better off with two. The same is true here — as it stands, we could lose up to fifty percent of the participation in the Poll if there was only one Custodian. Why not have two and get everyone to vote?

I would like to hear your comments and (hopefully) your support for this project. The Runestone Poll really belongs to all of the hobby members, to be assumed and conducted with the approval of <u>us</u>. A unilateral and uninformed transfer to a person who cannot possibly run the Poll in an effective manner is not a legitimate transfer. I intend to enlist whatever support I can to find someone else run the Runestone Poll and return it to a respected and well participated poll of the hobby's zines and gamemasters.

That's it for this issue. the rebuttals will be printed next time. It is unfortunate that this particular issue brings up attacks on Bruce personally, because I will not allow this zine to become a medium for feuds.
