An issue that has had a lot of talk here at the office has been child abuse and government remedies. If you watched 60 Minutes on Sunday the mixth you saw my boss, State Rep. Terral Smith, talking about a client he defended who was falsely accused of child molestation, and how her life has been drastically affected by the charges. In Minnesota 20 couples had their children taken away from them because they had been charged with child abuse or plestation. A year later none of them have their children back.

# **Democrats**

Maryland Senator Mark Largelers spent a record 368 CFP to win the Massachusetts primary today. Three quarters of the money was spent on media as the liberal Senator tried to create a more moderate position by advertising his pro-Draft Registration stand. The results worked out well for him, as did his campaign awings through the smaller towns of Massachusetts. Largelers garnered 23% of the vote and also picked up 161 CFP in contributions.

The more moderate Colorado Governor Jake Halverstadt used his position on the Nuclear Moratorium and the recent Three Mila Island incident to pull in 21% and a second place finish. Halverstadt had hoped to do better here, as evidenced by the extensive amount of time he spent travelling the state as well as the terrific organization he had here. But the spending blits by Larzelere caught him by surprise. There were some very tense early morning moments as the Governor testered back and forth over the 20% mark as the returns came in. A cheer went up at 3:49 a.m. when the Pittsfield returns put him over to stay. "Not winning is quite a disappointment, but after seven weeks of working on this campaign I don't know if I could have taken not managing the 20%," the head of the Massachusetts campaign said.

Governor Gaughan came in two percentage points behind Halverstadt, and five behind the leader, despite his surprise move of campaigning on the new Windfall II issue. "Our message never seemed to get across to the voters until this last week," the candidate said. "If we had just one more week we may have been able to pull this out." Few of the campaign workers were disappointed with the outcome, especially in light of being out spent three to one.

Governor Burgess of Rhode Island came in a dismal third; staffers had hoped a last minute swing through the state and advertising stressing the regional ties would pull up the slumping campaign. Even more disappointing than the loss was dropping to third in the overall delegate totals. Although he attempted to push his stands on the Draft Registration, his views were swallowed up by the media campaign of Senator Larzelers. The candidate held a day after news conference and said, "We will be spending this week off reevaluating our campaign and our methods. We will have to find a way to distinguish ourselves from the other candidates, especially Senator Larzelers. If we can do that in Illinois and New York I am sure we can get back on track again."

Conservative Senator Stephen Wilcox brought up the rear in this eastern liberal state, as was expected by his campaign staffers. "All the conservatives here vote Republican, and 15% of those don't like any of the Republican candidates. If the Democratic party is going to win in November, we are going to have to have a conservative on the ticket," the candidate said at a news conference in Syracuse, New York. As election night wore on some of the Wilcox staffers began hoping for a 15% finish and thereby qualify for some of Massachusetts' 111 delegates. The final results show Wilcox just .55% below that figure.

No preference took only 6.2% in the Democratic primary.

# Republicans

Former Senator Ty Hare picked up his third win and the delegate lead in this weeks primary in Massachusetts. The Californian also gets credit for the hat trick, since he managed to rake in all the available campaign contributions. The win was a combination of issues and media resulting in a ten point victory over second place Congressman Dave Frick.

Frick did surprisingly well in this northeastern state, but the "Frick the World" organization was intensely disappointed that they missed out on campaign contributions by 76/100ths of a percentage point. Frick is now the only candidate on either side to have dropped below the 1000 CFP mark, and aides are getting worried about the financial situation.

Third place went to Dan Young of California who wasn't willing to spend the money it would have taken to win here; his four media bids were all too low to win any media time beyond the time share quaranteed by law. The candidate did travel extensively, and pulled a surprising number of votes out of the Boston suburbs. His statewide campaign manager was vary proud of the effort and organization put into the campaign. The California Republican stated, "I look forward to winning this state in the General election, once we get this nominating business out of the way." Republican insiders say he may be too moderate on key issues to gain the nomination, especially during the recent conservative swing in the party.

The no-preference ballot was significant in the voting, garnering 15% of the vote. Wisconsin Senator James Wall beat only the non-campaigning Dick Martin, but spent very little time or money in the state, so the defeat was hardly a surprise. Instead he put his energy into a campaign swing through Florida, the site of next weeks primary, and his money went into organizations for Louisiana and Indiana.

The Martin campaign has come to a halt, and he has been ordered by the Election Commission to return all the unused campaign funds. Citing a lack of enthusiasm in the hoped for "Draft Martin" bid, the Maryland Governor became the second casualty on the Republican side. The Governor himself expressed no disappointment, saying that his place was, "right here in Maryland, with the people I love." Unfortunately for the Governor, he was vacationing in Arizona when he said it.

Paradoxically, the new front runner has all but dropped out of the Florida primary, and closed his organization offices there earlier this week. "All of the other three major candidates have had stronger organizations and more personal exposure. I just can't see spending a lot of money in a winner-take-all situation that I will probably lose anyway," the Senator reportedly said during his victory party. The Hare campaign has hinted at possibly contesting the Florida delegates at the convention. An interesting side note is that as a California legislator Hare voted for the California winner-take-all on three separate occasions.

The voter points are split among both parties, but should both parties have as many as nine spotlight issues? I am inclined to say yes, that every spotlight issue is included, regardless of which party named it, but I will also put this to a vote. Since this is a question concerning the seating of delegates it will be left to a conglomerate of both the National Committees.

PLEASE VOTE BY NEXT DEADLINE: Should all issues spotlighted be included in the vote totals for both parties in the open primary states?

3) Why did James Wall only get 6 momentum points when he won two elections the previous week? Since there were 18 Dem decision points shouldn't there be 18 GOP points as well? The momentum bonus is considered free publicity from the win. There is no reason for parity between the parties on this point, since it will not affect the outcome of the general election. The same thing occurred this week since the Dems had a virtual tie in New Hampshire between Pete and Jake, but only Ty got the bonus on the Republican side. I can't see a reason to change that, but I as open to discussion. Care to debate it?

4) Are you proposing elections in all states and regions at or

- 5) Are you crazy? Yes. Although it will take me some time to figure it out, I prefer having a national election with the winner chosen according to the number of electoral college votes he gets. I will publish the number of E.C. votes per state or region well before the election.
- 6) Are you going to work the travel and organization the same way? Very similar, as the last issue pointed out. We will split the campaign into several parts so that the candidates can watch the opposition and react. If it looks like the GOP isn't going to make much of a try for Massachusetts then the Dems may want to divert funds elsewhere. But I don't want to separate the election into groups of states with different deadlines because it completely changes the strategy.

Here are the comments I received concerning the General Election: Pete: The Veep should be 1/4 or 1/5 of the President. The value of travel is decreasing too much; if I visit California a month before the primary the voters will forget me, but a month before the General election is 'right on top' of the election!

Greg: How about selling media shares during each interim of the election? The candidates would get a better feel for what the intentions of the opposition are, and could react better.

That's it for the discussion of the General election proposal. By the next deadline I want to have some concrete proposals for discussion and votes on. The best process that I can suggest is for the original proposal to be considered a "bill" if you will, and any suggestions should be submitted as amendments. Pete, give me a specific rate of decline for the travel, because I agree with your premise, but I don't want to think of a new scale on my own.

My God! I just agreed with Pete Gaughan! Let's not make a habit of this!

Anyway, if you all would prefer, I can simply decide on my own and you will be stuck with whatever I come up with. I would like to get your input, but I am not afraid to act without it? A natural born leader, am I.

That is all I can think of for the notes section. Thanks to all of you who commented on my commentary two issues ago. I agree that it makes this a little more readable, but it also then becomes a little more difficult. I will continue these attempts, but I would like to ask that you all start sending me a few comments, press if you like, so that I have something to go on.
