A. Detains.

South, the declarer at four hearts, must limit his trump losers to three to fulfill his contract. The main danger is a 4-1 heart split. The contract can't be made if a defender holds four hearts with all three honors. But if someone has a singleton honor, South can prevail by leading a low heart on the first round. This drives out West's king. Later, South leads the heart jack to East's queen, then the ten to East's acc. Finally, South extracts East's last heart, the eight, with his nine.
