Another reason you should avoid procrastinating is that I'm starting to weary under the six game load again. I'm considering dropping down to five, which means I would not open another game until two more end. And that probably won't be for some time yet.

It was a pleasure seeing so many of you at DipCon last weekend. I'm only sorry that I didn't get the chance to talk to all of the Frobozz readers in attendance. One of the highlights of the trip for me was obtaining the fourth place trophy in the Titan tournament. This is an amazing feat when you consider that I didn't play in the Titan tournament; in fact, I have never played Titan. But I did get the fourth place trophy... because Jeff Zarse left it in my car. Well, Jeff, what would you like me to do with your trophy? I will send it to you, if you wish, but I'm not sure I should. It looks pretty fragile to me; it could easily get broken into more than the three pieces it's in already. Maybe I ought to hand-deliver to you at the next MadCon. Or I could just proudly display it in my living room and pretend I'm a Titan champ. What do you think?

No one bothered to ask, but I have some extra space, so I'll go ahead explain something which I'm sure is of extreme interest to you all. Ahem. You'll remember last year I was concerned that the printer I use to publish Frobozz was scheduled to be replaced by a smaller model at the first of this year. The worst part of this was that the new printer was to be installed in a different building, which would have made it difficult, at best, for me to use. Well, the bosses who decide these things changed their minds (so what else is new) and had the new printer installed at the same location as the old one. This solved the main problem, but unfortunately, the new printer was not entirely software-compatible with the old one (despite Xerox's claims). Naturally, the main area of incompatibility affected the programs I use to publish Frobozz. We finally badgered Xerox into fixing their bug, so everything is fine now. In the interim, I had to modify my programs to avoid using features which did not work correctly on the new printer. If you've read this far, I assume you have at least some interest in this, so I may as well add that the old printer was a Xerox 9700, which cost about \$16,000 a month to lease. It was replaced by a Xerox 4050, because it costs much less. The 4050 is only about half as fast as the 9700 (60 pages per minute as opposed to 120), but the difference in quality is nearly unnoticable. In fact, it's difficult to determine by looking at which issue of Frobozz the cutover took place. Considering the volume of printing my company does, I'd say it was a good move to downgrade the printer in order to save some money.

In my quest to find new filler material, last month I asked how many of you enjoy the bridge puzzles I publish from time to time. The response was pretty dismal; only two of you bothered to mention it. Now, I happen to know that considerably more than two of you are bridge players. So what's the problem? Is it that you're not interested? Are the puzzles too easy? Too hard? Maybe you just forgot to voice your opinion? Whatever your thoughts, please let me know. How else can I give you what you want to see?

Is this page full, yet? Are we getting close? Let's face it. I've completely exhausted my supply of things to chatter about. I guess there's nothing left for me to do but publish the current standby list and then get on to the puzzles and maybe a few games of Diplomacy. The hands can be ranked from best to worst: tied for first through fourth places would be the four royal flushes, and so forth. The top forty hands appear in the table below. For the purposes of this puzzle, aces rank high only; 5-4-3-2-A is not a straight, just an ace-high. There are no wild cards. Your task:

- 1. Name one of the hands tied for 1,000th place.
- 2. Name one of the hands tied for 10,000th place.
- 3. Name one of the hands tied for 100,000th place.
- 4. Name one of the hands tied for 1,000,000th place.

The Scoreboard

For last month's puzzle, eleven points were awarded for each acceptable 12-letter word formed, and seven points were awarded for each 6-letter word. Steve Langley, Ted Davis, and Jim Lawniczak all scored a perfect 100 points. The runners-up: Melinda Holley, 78 points; Pete Kurucz and John Ricotta, 67 points; Bruce Linsey, 60 points; Rory Noble, 53 points.

Despite my best efforts to avoid it, two of the 6-letter words had anagrams: refund/funder and shower/whores. Full credit was given for either answer in each case. A couple of you found both "shower" and "whores", and one of you asked for extra credit for this feat. OK, calculate your extra credit as follows: Add the number of atoms in the sun to the number of stars in the galaxy and multiply the result by the number of times I visited Antarctica in 1986.

It was possible to form other 6-letter words, such as "towers" and "stipel". These words were given credit, though it made complete solution of the puzzle impossible. Words which were disallowed (as they were not in my dictionary) include "goited", "sathegrafted", "undergifteds", "metalportion", and the world's shortest 12-letter word, "prestidiaty".
