

The answer to last month's puzzle is $\sqrt{5} - 1$. One way to solve it:



Given: Triangle ABC such that angle ACB=900, angle ABC=540, angle BAC=360, and length of AC=1. Construct BD such that angle DBA=36°. Construct DE such that angle EDB=36°. Construct AF bisecting angle EAD. We can now calculate the following angles: DBC=18°, BDC=72°, ADE=72°, DEB=108°. AED=72°, EAF=180. DAF=18°, AFE=90°, AFD=90°. Let x = length of DC. This makes length of AD = 1 - x. Triangle AED is isosceles, so length of AE = 1 - xTriangle DBA is isosceles, so length of DB = 1 - x. Therefore, triangles AFD, AFE, and BCD are all congruent, so length of FD = x, and length of FE= x Triangle EDB is isosceles, so length of EB = 2x. This makes the length of AB = 1 + x. Using the Pythagorean Theorem:

$$(1 + x)^2 - 1 = (1 - x)^2 - x^2$$
.

This reduces to: $x^2 + 4x - 1 = 0$. It is now a simple matter to solve for x by using the Quadratic Formula. I'll leave the rest of the solution up to you.

Your final challenge of 1987 is to form as many eight-letter words as you can, subject to the following rules: Start with a seven-letter word and add any letter you wish. Then rearrange the letters to form your eight-letter word. Repeat the process as often as you can, using the same seven-letter word with a different additional letter. All words used must appear in my unabridged dictionary and must not contain capital letters, hyphens, or apostrophes. I'll award 20 points for each correct word, so this is your chance to score big. Deadline for solutions is January 22, 1988.

Endgame Statement

Doug Baker (Turkey): This is not a game I am very proud of. I started off attacking Russia on the very first turn, and since England and Germany did the same, James Early as the Russian never really had a chance. Italy (Jim Petersen) and I had agreed to work against Austria after the first few turns. The Austrian caught in the middle, never had much of a chance either since by then Russia was too weak to help him.

I made my biggest mistake when Italy NMRed and I attacked him out of frustration. I should have stuck with my Italian ally. The attack on Italy bogged down through a combination of my bad guesses, poor play, and stout Italian resistance by Jim and Lu Henry.

By the time I got past Naples, England had already moved into the Mediterranean and I was stymied there. I never could seem to establish any diplomatic relations with England or Germany. Stan Plummer (Germany) even went so far as to continue attacking me after England (Melinda Holley) wiped out his home centers. By the time Fred Townsend entered the game as the replacement for Germany, I was glad to accept a three-way draw. Not a very pretty game in my opinion. This was the first time I ever played Turkey.

Players are sometimes confused about when conditional orders are permitted. You may write orders conditional on any event which will occur before your orders are to be executed. Thus, winter builds and removals may be made conditional on another player's fall retreat; and spring orders may be made conditional on winter builds and removals as well as on fall retreats. You may not make a build conditional on another player's build/removal, for these events occur simultaneously.

I also point out that a player may build only in those home centers which are under his control.
