Phone (1-403-)526-7963 between 6:00 and 10:00 MST. Present games include 1979-HZ 1982-AR, 1983-AE, 1984-AJ, and 1984-HW (formerly "Water"). Subscriptions are 60c per issue, with U.S. money at par. Any subber is welcome to join my standby list which presently includes Acheson, Berrigan*, Cusack, Diehl*, Gautron*, Gabriel*, Karnes, Ronald*, and Tinker* (priority to those asterisk'ed, who are playing fewer than two games here at the moment).

The newest game, "Xylene", has three entries at this typing, so I doubt it will fill by the time this issue goes out. \$9.00 each for those interested; preflists are optional, but you'd best put something in unless you WANT to play the Italians, and even then, why not make it official?

Faithful (and long-suffering) readers may have noted a substantial improvement in legibility beginning on p. 4 of last issue. I received a new shipment of printer tapes in time to reproduce that page, and future issues should be better than past ones in that respect. Next time, I won't let myself run down to the point where I have to rely on "retread" ribbons (though WD-40 does a reasonably good job when only limited runs are necessary).

I was going to put my initial comments on the "Water" players into last issue, then thought they were entitled to at least one full period of negotiation without having my opinions horning in (Also, I ran out of space last time) So here, two weeks before the deadline, is my initial assessment of early prospects for each player:

AUSTRIA (DAVE CARTER): Well-known to most Canadians as the publisher of SLEEP-LESS KNIGHTS. Dave has also slyly accumulated the largest number of Calhamer points of the playing field, almost all in games ending within the past two years. Consider also that he was branded a "wimp" in FSF #159 for rarely winning a came, and you will get an idea of how active Dave has had to be recently to put together 7.86 CPs. Perhaps he rarely wins, but I daresay it's equally rare that he's left out at the finish.

Il need that kind of staying power in the Austrian hot-seat. If opening coies are fairly traditional, he must first tackle his neighbours to the east; he has a hard, though well-defined, choice there. Both Russia and Turkey are former mublishers themselves; he's probably more personally familiar with Ren, but he hay find Harry more of a philosophical soul-mate if their similar draws-to-wins ratio is meaningful. Or can he afford to postpone an immediate choice in the east to pick up centers quietly, or strike westward?

(2/1, 7/2, 5/3, 2/4, 1/5), (This is the Galhamer point record I have for each player, i.e. Dave has two wins, 7 two-way draws, 5 three-way draws, etc.) ELAND (STEVE BERRIGAN): Steve hasn't established the hobby-wide track record

of some of his opponents here, but got the nod on the basis of his FSF programme as a most tenacious player when the going gets tough. I suspect his oppositions often fall flat, since he's frequently in trouble by 1903; becomes to click at that point, and I'd take an even-money bet that he two-center position will still be around five years later! His sole win was sted in FSF a couple of years back, from a standby position that was really on tropes when he took it over. If he gets through the opening with an ally and fix position, look for him to come on strongly later.

England was therefore a good choice to put at the head of his pref list: istrengths and weaknesses neatly balance his own and should give him a steady normance throughout. He'll likely have to negotiate mainly with two high-lie U.S. players in France and Germany; initial success will probably depend dersuading each to attack the other with the eager help of po' li'l unknown to li Mark and Paul feel any sense of fellowship amidst a sea of Canadians, liob will be that much tougher. (1/1, 1/2, 1/3)

FRANCE (MARK BERCH): This man probably needs the least introduction of any of the players. Publisher of DIPLOMACY DIGEST and ubiquitous contributor to DIPLOMACY WORLD, Mark has been a household word throughout the hobby for several years. But how well does he play? Four wins and 5.73 CPs suggest he's no slouch and rather more aggressive than most of this field. A disappointing result in the recent DW demo game may have tarnished his reputation somewhat, but a single game is a poor reflection of ability. He's played one game in FSF, winning in impressive style over some other strong finishers.

Mark's article on the French openings in DW last year may bear some study by his neighbours. France was astonishingly unpopular in this game's pref lists Mark and I both consider it the most flexible of nations—perhaps the strongest in the right hands. Overall, if I had to pick one of the seven as having the best chance of a good game here, I'd have to go with Mark's France.

(4/1, 2/2, 1/3, 2/5)

GERMANY (PAUL RAUTERBERG): Of all the players, Paul is the only one I scarcely know. He publishes THIRTY MILES OF BAD ROAD, one of the better U.S. zines, and has established an excellent playing record with 5.66 CPs. He's the only one that's never played in FSF before, so his style and fortunes are of particular interest to me. As Germany he'll have ample opportunity to steer himself right or wrong!—and his principal early neighbours (F/E/R) could hardly offer him a more differing mix of playing styles and backgrounds. (2/1, 3/2, 3/3, 4/4, 1/6) ITALY (DON TINKER): Frankly, I had to think especially hard before putting Don

into this one. His CP total suggests that he won't be a match for most of the other players here. Ultimately I passed over applicants with considerably better records, and I'm not sure I can tell you why. Italy is hardly a piece of cake to play, either, though it's rarely attacked outright in the opening. I've never played against him (have I, Don? Nothing memorable, anyhow) but he's been in FSF for several years. I get the impression of a good, prompt, and enthusiastic writer from his orders, which are always legible and on time; and more importantly, though he hasn't had notable success yet, his moves have a flavour that I regard as more than just competent. Reputation-wise, he has much to gain and little to lose from participation here; so in one sense he could become the most dangerous player here if he gains an initial foothold. As Italy, that may be relatively easy; can he then hold his own in the middlegame where Italian positions traditionally get left behind? (2/2, 1/3)

RUSSIA (HARRY DREWS): Harry was one of the most capable Canadian players in the mid-70s; perhaps his major contribution as co-editor of the immortal PAROLYSM was his articles on play-of-the-game---the kind of analysis that has all hu disappeared from the hobby these days. I don't recall him ever doing poorly if a game, but he lacked the killer instinct and almost invariably ended up with prof a draw. Couple that with Dave Carter's similar record, and I'd be surprise to see this game end up as a solo victory; anyone who DOES win will have to but out full value for it!

I think Harry has set himself a challenge in choosing Russia, though. Of all the countries, Russia probably benefits the most from an adventurous etyl, something incompatible with the old Harry. Of course, he's been out of active play for some years and may have changed—or may deliberately treat this as a chance to blow off steam in a final fling, totally heedless of reputation. His doubtless the player that most spectators will be watching; how will an unrequistructed '70s player make out today? (1/1, 2/2, 2/3, 4/4, 2/5)

TURKEY (RON BROWN): Until its fold about six months ago, Ron's SNAFU! was ownfer the best Canadian zines. With relatively few completed games, Ron has a established himself as one of the premier Canadian players: in contrast to he northern neighbours here, he tends to win a lot. On the level of game philosy and style, then, the most interesting early development will be the R/A/T shout: can Ron persuade "drawers" to attack each other in alliance with a "win! ... or not? Of course, in a game at this level, personal relationships are like

to be more important than reputation and records, still, I'll be most interested in endgame comments on what principally influenced these players $(2/1,\ 2/2,\ 1/3)$

PRINCIPAL SPRING 1901 PREDICTION: No "surprising" moves. Even those players that are temperamentally inclined to go out on a limb early will likely save these tactics for games where an inferior level of opposition will permit recovery from a bad opening strategy. Initially, I expect the same "problem" here as in the DW demo games: with an eye to the multitudes of spectators, no player wants to leave himself open to be pasted too thoroughly, so the moves may lack "spice" I would regard anything out of the ordinary as indicative of a "what the hell" attitude. Overall, look for a cautious pickup of neutrals in 1901, perhaps with no fights/alliances obvious by yearend; in 1902, the "witches" (E/T) may have the most difficulty in finding allies among their neighbours, who share more characteristics with each other and may regard the "witches" as odd-men-out.

With all available factors considered, I can weight the positions according to my estimate of their chances, out of a total of 100; sort of a "percentage chance of a Calhamer point". For pre-Spring 1901, this comes out to A=15, E=12, F=18, G=14, I=11, R=16, T=14.

(All this was drafted when the gamestart first went out, well before any orders came in. Let's see now what happened after weeks of negotiations:)

1984-HW ("Water"): NOT OFTEN THAT EVERY MOVE SUCCEEDS, EVEN IN SPRING 1901!
Austria (Dave Carter): A Bud-Ser, A Vie-Bud, F Tri-Alb.
England (Steve Berrigan): A Lvp-Yor, F Edi-Nwg, F Lon-Nth.
France (Mark Berch): F Bre-Mid, A Par-Pic, A Mar-Bur.
Germany (Paul Rauterberg): F Kie-Den, A Ber-Kie, A Mun-Ruh.
Italy (Don Tinker): F Nap-Ion, A Rom-Ven, A Ven-Tyo.
Russia (Harry Drews): F StP(sc)-Bot, A War-Ukr, A Mos H, F Sev-Rum.
Turkey (Ron Brown): F Ank-Con, A Con-Bul, A Smy-Ank.

As I said, all moves succeed. Paul, I should note that your ONLY set of orders came in on Thursday, i.e. the day before the deadline. It wouldn't have needed much more of a glitch in the postal service for you to have been NMR. I STRONGLY urge everyone to send preliminary orders upon receipt of each season's results, to be amended later. (Most of you do that anyhow, but Paul's new here....)

I don't think I've sent you guys copies of my houserules, either. I'll try to remember to include a set with this issue; if I forget again, remind me.
Only one scrap of press:

Turkey-Kraken: I hope you weren't looking for new openings, like A Smy-Syr and F Con-Ank! Maybe someday, but not this time.

Kraken: That's what I thought (see above).

Turkey-World: Ah, ha, the old Brown Sultan again, eh? He has many personas, from the benign dictator who sends belly dancers to his allies, to the raving lunatic who will send an army to Edinburgh if he's cheesed off enough. Which will he be? Even he doesn't know.

Kraken: Give him Holland, guys, you wouldn't want to cheese him off.

GM ANALYSIS, Spring 1901: I seem to have got off to a fairly good start with the prediction that SO1 wouldn't feature any really startling moves—though the fireworks could easily begin this Fall ahead of my original projections. Harry has already served notice that his style is still unaggressive and his tactics a bit unusual by today's standards. A Mos H is rarely seen, but looks exactly the right order for this opening where the unit could be needed anywhere. The demilitarization of Bla suggests it won't be headed south in the Fall, anyhow.

Dave is probably the most disappointed man on the board. The Italian moves are not unusual in themselves, but his own orders suggest that he wasn't expecting them, which looks bad. It's inconvenient at best to be defending a vacated

Vie/Tri against Italian armies, while R/T have apparently taken some positive diplomatic steps to prevent hostilities between them. Austria hasn't suffered anything so crude as A War-Gal, but it certainly seems that he must do the most effective talking over the next few seasons to catch up.

Italy has come the closest to boldness with his moves: if he continues in the same vein, it may pay dividends in the Fall, but an enemy made so early may stall him thereafter. Interesting that the dramatic spotlight has been stolen, at least for the moment, by the least experienced player—but perhaps that was to be expected, since Don is most likely to be operating on the "what the hell" attitude mentioned above!

Mark seems intent on Bel, and barring some pretty tall cooperation between E/G, he'll likely get it this Fall. The peaceful, "cookbook" moves give no real hint of how negotiations are going in the northwest; though France's northward motion will leave Italy breathing easier. Could F/I cooperate against Mun? It's possible, but the overall situation has left both of them with what appear to be more promising options elsewhere. In Paul's shoes, I'd return A Ruh-Mun since Germany is unlikely to gain either Bel or Swe, but use A Kie to take Hol unless he has good reason to suspect that Mun is in serious danger from F/I. While the questions remain, though, I wouldn't antagonize Russia with F Den-Swe.

However, Italy in particular is unlikely to pass the East for the North unless he has a "deep" alliance with both Austria and France--which could in turn put Dave's orders in a completely different light. Harry could even be surprised by a supported attack against Rum if Dave plays such a gamble to the limit! All that remains an unlikely possibility, though: look instead for battle over Tri/Vie this Fall, with relative calm elsewhere as most of the neutrals are snapped up. Under this scenario, England will take Nwy, France gets Bel and his choice of Spa or Por, Germany grabs Hol and Den, and Russia nips into Rum and probably Swe. As Turkey, I would give A Bul-Gre, F Con-Bul(probably sc) a try: it's better than even money, I think, that he can pick up two that way, though an R/A stab could be disastrous. Italy takes Tun, and....

The I/A frontier is tactically the most interesting, assuming they are at war. Even A Ser 5 F Alb-Tri, A Bud-Vie doesn't guarantee the safety of Austria's home centers, if Ron can be persuaded to cut support with A Bul-Ser. But on the other hand, F Alb-Gre, A Ser-Tri, and A Bud either -Vie or S A Ser-Tri could give Austria two builds against even an all-out attack by the Italian armies if Don guesses wrong and Ron is content to sit in Bul. As Italy, even A Tyo-Vie, A Ven-Tyo merits some thought if he's expecting A Ser-Tri. The most one can say is that both Italy and Turkey have good shots at a second build at Austria's expense; Dave could still take two, but could also be held to none---a single build is most likely there.

Profound, eh?

ZINE PLUGS: Now here's a couple of new zines that COULD use a mention, unlike m plugs of last issue for well-established ones:

CONFERENCE CALL (Bruce McIntyre, 6191 Winch St., Burnaby, B.C.) I have the #1 issue put out in late November, so really should have mentioned it last time. Billed as "Vancouver's finest Dipzine": he's thinking too small, it's actually the best zine in all of B.C., if I'm not forgetting one. It's really intended for phone games, and most of the first (4-page) issue is devoted to introducing himself, etc., but I'm most impressed by the reproduction, similar to NFA's (see plugs last issue), and Bruce writes entertainingly. Could become an excellent one if he chooses to get more involved with the postal hobby. THE CANADIAN DIPLOMAT (Robert Acheson, P.O. Box 4622, Station S.E., Edmonton,

Alta. TôE 2AO) Robert has been around as a player for a loosong time: I'm confident enough about his publishing effort to have gotten into his first gam as a player. Slick it is not (well, physically better than this zine, but that says nothing!), but these days I prefer something solid and unpretentious.

THE RUNESTONE POLL "VERDICT"

I went through my version of this controversy last issue, so won't repeat any of that here; I should, however, apologize to Jim Meinel et al. for implying that they might be keeping the controversy alive to save themselves some embarrassment over having started it in the first place. Further letters from Jim and others have convinced me, that they are, at least, being intellectually honest.

When writing for EUROPA EXPRESS in December, I suggested that if Bruce and his collective opponents could each put together a list of supporters by the beginning of February, the hobby would be in a better position to decide on the practicality of leaving the 1985 poll in Bruce's hands. At the time, I had envisaged each side producing their own lists and publicizing them in zines willing to give space to the matter; instead, a lot of people have sent their opinions to ME for collation! Well, thanks to all who wrote, but as several people have already predicted, I'm not much further ahead

I have a couple of dozen "votes" against Bruce, most of them associated with preprinted ballots put out by either Terry Tallman or Kathy Byrne. This proves that their subscribers are loyal and willing to accept their version of events, and, obviously, unwilling to vote in Bruce's poll. but doesn't say much about hobby opinion beyond those zines. Bruce has taken a different tack, making a list of those publishers who support him and those who don't, without asking them to contact me directly. Jim Meinel has done the same: combining the lists suggests that publishers are still generally behind Bruce by about a 3-to-1 margin. However, this method doesn't address the relative enthusiasm of those pubbers and their subbers in plugging/voting for a poll that has been marred by so much controversy. The "anti" group seems more committed to their stand, on the average -- but is this "average" meaningful? Two zines, VDD and EE, together accounted for 60-75% of the total ballots cast in the RUNESTONE poll in the past two years; anti-Bruce publishers plugged it just as hard while it was with me, but based on past results, will their equally enthusiastic boycott hurt the poll significantly? On balance, despite the substantial list put together by Bruce's opposition. I can't see a change of custodianship improving the response to the 1985 poll at this point...

So, I for one am not going to do anything about the status quo. Further, I will be plugging and voting in Bruce's version of the poll this year, to the same extent I would have if this controversy had not arisen. However, this does not imply unconditional support for Bruce. I simply cannot believe that he was unaware of the magnitude of negative response that was in the wings when he volunteered to take over the poll. We specifically discussed his "controversiality" before the transfer was formalized, since it was (and is) my only concern about his custodianship. The only thing he offered at that time was assurances that "I can handle it"—no idea of what "it" might become. To that extent I feel he pulled a fast one on me and the hobby so I have a better reason to accept stories of similar dealings told by a few of Bruce's opponents. Bruce has phoned me several times in the past couple of months, and always. I thought, hung up rather dissatified with my responses. No wonder—they must have reflected my disinclination to take his statements at face value any more.

disinclination to take his statements at face value any more.

However, he's not been the first and won't be the last to treat the whole hobby like a giant Diplomacy game. Some of his present opponents don't do a bad job of this themselves. I think it's inappropriate, and I don't have the time or interest to play that game; but it's not something to ruin a hobby service over. I don't intend to get all worked up over the more outrageous stuff that Bruce has been accused of without proof, though that's an individual decision.

Amid all the hullabaloo, everyone seems to have forgotten that the results from the poll aren't statistically significant anyhow. I wouldn't have lost interest myself if I thought the poll was worth the effort needed to run it. Why Bruce or anyone else would bother to fight over it is beyond me--so, if any of you insist on degrading it further as an adjunct to your personal feuds, could you please do so without taking up any more of my time? Many thanks...
