GM-Just a brief note that NBR(no build returned) does NOT count as a missed turn for NMI purposes(HR12). Also, I would like to mention that the post office claims to deliver 80% or more of the mail within adjacent zip codes overnight, to most next adjacent zip codes in two days and cross-country(anywhere in continental US) within 3 days. This means that there is a 20% chance that your letter or postcard will NOT be delivered within that timeframe. If you are cutting it close, mailing your orders just in time to meet the deadline providing that the postal service meets its usual delivery schedule, you are taking a 20% chance of a missed deadline each time. Mail early, you can always mail an additional set of orders later(See also HR10).

Also, I would like to mention that I did not call for spring 1902 orders this time because I wanted to give all of the players time to renegotiate since a standby player took over for Fra and it was very early in the game and the situation is still wide open.

SMASHING ARMY VICTORY...KING AGREES TO FIELD MARSHALL'S PROPOSAL TO FOLLOW UP VICTORY WITH MAJOR OFFENSIVE...LAFAYETTE BECOMES VISCOUNT...SANTINI TENURE AS COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC SAFETY SHORT LIVED AS IS SANTINI(GP): The army met with great success this season as the Earl Lafayette led the Royal North Highland Border Regiment in a devastating charge against the Italians who had seriously weakened their army by throwing themselves against a formidable frontier regiment defending the border. The General was mentioned prominently in dispatches and as a result was honored with the title of Viscount by a grateful monarch. Also mentioned in dispatches for their gallantry were Messrs. Gerard and Poisson. The entire army was well rewarded when the Italians were unable to evacuate some of the wealthier citizens of certain towns in the area. After word of the victory was received the Field Marshall sought an audience with the King and convinced his majesty that this victory should be immediately exploited and His Royal Highness agreed ordering a Spring campaign. The Second, Third and Fourth Brigades are ordered to present themselves for service at the beginning of the season to serve in the 1st and 2nd divisions in the Field Army.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer spent a great deal in church this season praying for the soul of his recently departed uncle Ivan who left him a small sum of money. The New Year's Eve party thrown by the Baron was attended by the Crown Prince and his cronies but apparently everyone else in Paris was otherwise occupied. The Baron was rumored to have been waylaid outside of a notorious local nightspot this season.

Also making himself known widely to the shady ladies of Paris was newcomer Calieu Calais who impressed all by immediately situating himself in elegant accomodations. There can, however, be no question of his piety as he was seen spending a great deal of time in the confessional this season.

Finally returning Paris the Chevalier LeMoyne was elected Director of the Rich Man's Party and spent most of the rest of the season in the practice salons of Messrs. Binet and Bertrand polishing his skills at arms. He did take time out to steal the heart Of Mlle. Olivia though she was heard to mutter petulantly, in February, that she didn't appreciate playing second fiddle to a sabre.

M. Poisson had a terrible season while in Paris as the Cardinal's Party became dominant and the poor man was unable to overcome the indignity of dropping dreadfully in estimation of society. To add insult to injury his mistress turned her affection to M. LeMoyne despite tearful promises that he would entertain her royally at next season's Ball. M. Poisson spent most of the season hiding away at the practice fields and eventually decided to leave Paris altogether for the front. Fortunately his luck changed considerably in battle and besides filling his pockets with Italian gold and jewels he regained his former rank of captain for his bravery. It is rumored about town that M. Poisson considers it a point of honor to duel only with daggers unless he is defending the honor of his mistress for which he considers his two handed sword an appropriate weapon.

Things were topsy turvy in the government this season as Fr. Santini was appointed to Commissioner of Public Safety, having received considerable support from local citizens. Immediately upon receiving the appointment he announced the arrest of both Pierre St. Robes and Calieu Calais for being part of a conspiracy to commit treason having written anti-royalist graffiti on the walls of the Cathedral of Notre Dame. The trials were to have taken place in the first week of March. Unfortunately for the Chevalier his tenure was short lived as in the second week of February he encountered M. Bic on the doorstep of Mlle. Katherine and in the ensuing crossing of swords the former Italian priest was mortally wounded and dispatched with a vicious kick from the Marquis who is rapidly becoming known as one of the deadliest opponents in all of Paris.

second week of March after the usual week of celebration.

TAFFYWACKER KNIGHTED AT PALACE - MUTINY FAILS - CANTAB PROF NAMED
CORONER, FEARED MAD - OFFICERS NAMED IN PATERNITY SUITS

In a glittering ceremony at Whitehall, Major Percival Taffywacker was created Knight of the Garter, along with a dozen of London's wealthiest merchants. Exchequer sources report the fees will help bolster the depleted Royal Treasury. Taffywacker celebrated with his beloved Lady Olivia and Col Herbie Hambone, running up a £750 bar tab at the Cavendish Club in the process.

Aboard HMS Scorpion, Lt. C. Fletcher was killed leading an abortive mutiny. Capt Carey is reported to have put the entire crew on bread and water. Admiralty sources claim Scorpion has been deliberately manned with every screwball, goldbrick and trouble-maker in the fleet. Royal Military Commission may investigate.

Friends of Cambridge Prof Llewellyn ap Morgan, whom the Lord Mayor appointed Coroner in September, are said to be concerned about the good doctor's bizarre and erratic behaviour of late. Not that there was anything wrong with the professor's lectures, far from it: Morgan's October lecture on "Putrefecation and Decay" was a real spellbinder. But the doctor has completely abandoned his research into typhoid treatment to pursue a mysterious woman named Heloise. No one knows who she is, but rumours were enough for Lady Sarah, who has broken off their relationship.

Meanwhile, papers were filed in Middlesex Civil Court alleging that two prominent army officers had fathered illegitimate children. Brig D F O'Connor is the putative father of the distaff son of Dame Franc Flynnne and Lt Col H H Hambone is said to have sired the daughter of Lady Alice Adams.

On a more romantic note, the Earl of Talbott announced the engagement of his daughter, Lady Tess, to Ens John Reginald Parksbrow of HMS Royal Sovereign. The groom's hopes for a Valentine's Day wedding were dashed by Church regulations forbidding celebration of weddings during Lent. The Happy couple have three options: a late January date; waiting for the return of the Home Fleet in May; or using a non-conformist minister. The bride's father, who was himself an ensign aboard the original Royal Sovereign in '88, is said to favour a traditional navy wedding in May on the flagship's quarterdeck.

NAVAL NOTES: London newcomer Mark Addlebury, first son of a well-to-do Hastings gentleman is reportedly interested in a career as a butcher -- uh, surgeon in the RN...Bombay squadron is rumoured to have had an inconclusive engagement with a Dutch flotilla. Details are sketchy, but Royal Oak is said to have taken another prize, much to the disgust of sailors aboard HMS St Andrew.

It appears that Col Miles Hendon was not so badly wounded as to preclude a vigorous social life. In October, he brought the five fractious subalterns who provided the "entertainment" as his last party to his new club, the Mermaid, where he lectured them on the proper conduct at social events and feted them on the finest wines. Coincidentally, Hendon announced a party at his club the first week in December for "officers who served in the late German campaign and all loyal supporters of the King".

In a surprise move, Brig "Fighting Fitz" O'Connor has been named to command the Irish Brigade. O'Connor is the brigade's first Catholic commander since FM O'Reilly led it from 1620-24. Displaced incumbent H F Knox is rumoured to be seeking a duel, but no date has been set.

NOTES FROM THE JOURNAL OF THE ROYAL ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY - Edited by LORD HARRISON BURKE, Summer, 1833

NOTE: ALL items in this column are RUMOR, therefore they are subject to error. No piece of information may be considered accurate until published by the explorer upon return to Europe.

- IN EUROPE

A group of anonymous businessmen announced through a spokesman that they plan to begin to open up Africa to the sportsman by sponsoring the exploration and exploitation of the African wildlife. The spokesman for the Society to Save Endangered Species also introduced the Society's first explorer, Big Game Hunter, one Fenisque C. Perceival, Fenisque, a man of diminutive stature, was towered over by his breach loading rifled musket. Fenisque said "I may be small, but I carry a big gun." He also said that he echoed the Society's intent as expressed in his slogan, "I hunt them down to the very last one." He said he is off to Calabar.

- IN AFRICA

Delighted to have discovered the source of the river he explored, GUIDO VITTORIO SCONZINESE heads down river. His expedition moves through hex 298, a desert hex with incident. He does have trouble in hex 274, a mountain hex, when one of his canoes tips over, losing 44 rations and 16 gifts. After praying for guidance, he decides to cache a canoe and dismiss his bearers. He continues on to hex 275, which is also a mountain hex, with a 180 ft. cataract. He camps at the cataract, preparing to walk around it next turn, and continue into hex 251. He encounters three scouts from a slaver party heading inland, but nothing happens as they avoid him. His hunters each provide the expedition with 2 rations each.

LADY CAROLINE NELSON continues down river from hex 574 to hex 560, which she thought was a veldt hex, but is most surprised when she discovers that hex 560 is a swamp!

Not being able to continue, she contemplates what would have happened if she had only had canoes or had found natives, then she could have followed the river. The hunting is good, however, and feeds everyone.

Rumors abound from Luanda that a naked, starving, half-crazed white man was seen by several natives being chased through the Jungle by slavers, just east of the port, but this has not been confirmed, nor has the location of ALFRED H. MCGUFFIN been established.

DR. NOTS G. NIVIL heads east into hex 359, which he discovers is a mountain hex, with the highest peaks being 10,300 ft. He finds a river source heading in direction 3 into hex 399. He manages to feed himself this turn before deciding to move on.

DR. HYPO GUY CEMIA moves from hex 160 into hex 136. He discovers that hex 136 is a Jungle, but he believes that he will soon find the beginning of the great African Desert, which lies beyond. Providing rations has been no problem for the expedition. He also manages to avoid a small band of slavers.

ORTE'GO DE DAGO, having found the source of the Cuene river, decides to head overland, North East. He buys a guide, 90 rations, and six bearers from the Basundi Tribe. After caching his canoe, he heads off into hex 604, which he discovers is a mountain hex with peaks of 12,400 ft. He encounters eight warriors of the Kavirondo Tribe. He uses 8 gifts to gain the right to trade with the Tribe. He finds that bearers want 2 gifts to hire, Askaris want 6 gifts to hire on and guides want 4 gifts. One gift will buy one ration. He has little problem feeding his small army, this time. He may study the Kavirondo Tribe next turn.

MADEMOISELLE ROXY LARUE wanders up stream into hex 576, which she discovers is a mountain hex with the highest peak being 11,200 ft. She discovers a previously unknown cache beside the river containing a canoe, 10 gifts and a musket. She picks up the musket and heads out to look for some interesting specimens.

PROFFESSOR HUMBERT HUMBERT gets his act together and finds his way back to hex 452, which is a veldt hex on the Rufiji river. He finds his cache. Picking up a musket, he vows to get the "...bastards who stole his true love."

Well, there you have it. There is still much work to be done, and I just haven't had the time during these past few months to do much on this. That seems to be a common complaint, alas, but true. This program is not a standalone program. It is one of four programs which for a complete system to handle DIPLOMACY adjudication and the file handling necessary to keep track of a game. The first program, DIPINITL, will be published at a later date. The second program DIPORDERS, was published previously. This completes the publication of the third in this series, DIPADJUD, and the fourth program DIPUTIL, will also be published later.

DIPINITL is used to set up a new game and to initialize all of the various files and records necessary to adjudicate the game.

DIPORDERS is used to enter and hold each seasons orders. All seasons may be saved if desired for later review and playback.

DIPADJUD is used to adjudicate the season's moves. The results of each season's adjudication may be saved for future review and playback if desired.

DIPUTIL is used to handle interseason play; retreats, disbands, builds, and to reset the output from DIPADJUD for the next seasons input. The positions of each power may be saved for review and playback if desired at each point in each season of every game. The actual output files are quite small. A complete game could easily be saved on one 5 1/4 disk.

LOCAL NEWS: The Connecticut Game Club held its monthly meeting this month on December 9th instead of the scheduled date of 12/8 because a scheduling conflict forced the loss of the club's usual meeting place for that date. In an unusual occurrence, the WESTPORT COMMUNITY YOUTH CENTER pre-empted the CGC's scheduled meeting with an event of their own (that is, run by their own youth-adult council). Janet Berkeley, COMMUNITY YOUTH CO-ORDINATOR indicated that this was the prerogative of the youth-adult council which had jurisdiction over the facilities, however, she did indicate that ample notice would be given in the future and that an extra effort would be made to provide alternative facilities in the event we would have to find another site for any future meeting. She also assured us that we were welcome to continue to use the facilities and that this was, indeed, an unusual situation. Since the CGC has been meeting at the WESTPORT CYC for almost five years and providing the CYC with one of its longest continuously active youth funtions, we certainly hope so.

In a more positive note, the December meeting did attract 21 participants, a smaller than usual crowd, but the annual Turkey-game give-away and the King Kamahamaha tournaments were successes nonetheless. In the Turkey-game give-away, each participant bring his or her biggest turkey of a game, wraps it and puts some peotic clue as to the game or contents on the outside along with the retail value of the game. The person who brings the game worth the most gets first choice of all the other games(sorry...you MUST take one of the games home with you! You never can tell...one gamer's turkey... Finally, in an exciting two round event, the finalist an Connecticut State Champion King Kamahamaha winner is none other than your's truly, who ha: this ...trophy to prove. The only problem is that I am require to keep the ...thing dusted off til next year. Oh, well, I can always hope that next year I'll lose!
