This issue is late for several reasons: (1) I've been busy: They are not partial to sitting around around here, (2) Duplicating facilities have been hard to locate (inexpensive ones, anyway), and (3) My mail had to be forwarded, so I did not want anyone to miss the deadline because of my selfish desire for an education. After all, what could be more important than Diplomacy?

BEAR VALLEY WIND RIVER SHOSHONI: Chief Big Wind expressed regret over the vacillation of his friends, the Dakotas, and announced he was sending a Shoshoni war party into the land of the Teton Sioux to protect them against the crushing Apaches. He said the war party would withdraw as soon as the Dakota Chief straightened himself out and resumed the war against the common enemy from the east. He also issued a stern warning to the Iroquois against encroaching further against the lands of the Sioux. All hail the god of Wind! Long may he blow!

VIENNA (October 24, 1914): In the Wien Times-Dispatch-Press-Telegram-Vindicator this appeared an article written by the internationally renowned Austrian Financier and trade expert Count von Grosserpeniepinch. In his article the Count discounted the arguments of those "experts" who believe Europe is on the verge of war. ~~Count~~ Count von Grosserpeniepinch argues that even though man enjoys slaughtering his fellow men man enjoys more the pleasures of the flesh. And a few just enjoy the sound only gold and silver coin make when counted. So man will always equate the last benefit received from a blood bath with the cost. Given the current state of war technology, modern war is terribly expensive. Modern war would of necessity be fought with tens of millions of men. It costs 750 crowns to equip and train a single soldier. To equip, train and supply an army of millions would bankrupt even the most wealthy power of Europe. Man is too greedy to squander his treasures in such a manner. ~~There~~ There will always be war, for man enjoys killing. But war will be limited. The Count concluded "I look for small border clashes and a few colonial conflicts. But major world wars are a thing of the past."

VIENNA (October 25): The Foreign Ministry announced that a note was delivered to Serbia requesting an apology for the recent series of border incidents. A payment of 1,500,000 crowns was also requested for damages suffered by the district of Slobbovia. It seems Serbian troops stationed in the Serbian district of Dogpatch raided Slobbovia. No reason can be given for the raids, but they could lead to massive retaliation by Austria. Again no reason can be given for the interest Vienna now has in the affairs of Slobbovia.

Would you believe I have already planted the insidious seed of Dippydom here at MIT?? Would you believe our entire floor stayed up until two a.m. playing a game last week? This horrible and deadly creation is known locally as the "Flunk-out Machine": It takes more than an hour to play one complete turn. They have armies, fleets, and guard armies, about 330 supply centers, and board as big as a dinner table. I hope to have a report, with comprehensive (ha-Ha) rules in a future issue. I actually rather doubt that a game of it has ever been completed. I have personally watched three games of it get to about April, 1914 starting from January, but have never been privileged to see it end. ---dl
