The above, as you see, is a new, and I think, better, way of showing the action of a season. It now includes the receipts that each player will receive as a result of the previous seasons actions. That figure is the actual amount each player is allowed to expend without going into debt.

However, it must be remembered that it is the column "Cash on Hand, Fall, 1915," which decides whether or not you are in industrial debt, etc., etc.

France is now in Industrial Debt, for instance, even though he will have credits to spend in Spring, 1916.

This system may be changed somewhat with the next issue; as we now have, in addition to the seven regular powers on the board, four puppet states: Algeria, Hekla, Kinland, and Serbia. Three cheers for Balkanization...

Germany: TO ALL WORKERS THROUGHOUT THE WORLD: The German Communist Party announces the ouster on August 22 of the vicious, oppressive Prussian autocrat, Kaiser Huff. The downtrodden German proletariat has labored under the guns and whips of the bloody Junkers for forty-four years. That was forty-four years too many.

The proletariat would not stand for it. Rebellion began after only six months of war with France. By early January of 1915 Berlin was in anarchy. Kiel, Hamburg, and Essen, as well as the few other cities the Kaiser had not already lost, had powerful popular movements organizing strikes, demonstrations, and resistance to the oppressors.

On April 6 came the decision by the Praesidium of the German Communist Party to organize an armed force to resist the Kaiser's brutal troops. Workers gleefully left the gloomy munitions factories and flocked in thousands to the banner of the Liberation Army. Thousands more deserted the Prussians and joined the Liberation Army.

Triumph was certain and rapid. By late June the Liberation Army and Communist Party had secured the administration of Berlin, and the Kaiser fled to the small town of Stendal to the west. He gathered much of his army around his person, but like an avenging angel the Liberation Army entered Stendal and, after a trial, the Kaiser was executed two days later. The day he died, August 22, was proclaimed a national holiday by the Praesidium of the Communist Party. Shortly after Kaiser Huff's death, Essen, Hamburg, Kiel, Bremen, Rostok, Cologne, and Nurnburg surrendered to the Liberation Army.

By early September the Communist Party was the unquestioned govern-

ment of Germany. This government immediately concluded peace with Russia, and began peace negotiations with Austria-Hungary. The government ungently requested peace with France at any price.

While the Liberation Army is in a position to hold off the invader, the Communist Party came to power on a promise of peace, and it keeps its promises. The Party and Government again request peace of France and Austria-Hungary.

German working men urge their brothers throughout the world to join them in overthrowal of the capitalist menace. Let us end this statement with the inspiring quotation from the Father of the International movement: You have nothing to lose but your chains!!
St. Petersburg: To London--The 34 agricultural credits ought to make up the difference between us. Yes, I will trade with Hekla. Please write about details.

To Vienna: Let there be peace between our two nations.

I repeat my comment that any nations bidding for a Scandinavian neutrals output will be punished.

London: To Russia--You can readily see I am prepared to support France in a war against you unless you allow me free access to Norway and send the 26 agricultural credits you owe me. Debts cannot be forgotten. I am not the United States of America. The industrial credits sent to France will cease when you comply with my wishes. But, to set your mind at ease, I have no desire to conquer Sweden. It is my hope that we may both profit from it.

To Turkey: "Beware of English Bearing gifts." They may want something in return. Write

Peaceonya, Dogpatch: This fair city of the prosperous province of Dogpatch is soon to become the capitol of the newest political entity of the Balkans. The ancient state of Serbia is no more. The territories and provinces that were once Serbia are now the territories and provinces of the fair state of Beatnik.

Balkan experts expect Beatnik to follow a neutralist line. Under the firm guidance of King Rusk and Foreign Minister Spock the small kingdom should be more than capable of meeting the rigors of current international politics.

Foreign Minister Spock is already renowned for his brilliant contributions to the maintenance of international law and order by creating harmony and understanding between dissident political elements in his home province. The fair city of Peaceonya after Spock's monumental efforts.

Peaceonya, Beatnik--a fair city for a fair state.

Paris: The French Republic wishes peace with Italy. It is stressed that no acts of aggression have committed by the French Military force. The construction of a French fleet in Tunis was undertaken for the defense of Algeria and not for offensive use against any Mediterranean nation. The people of France and their elected government wish to extend sincere wishes for peace to the Italian People and their sovereign. It is hoped that negotiations for disarmament in the Mediterranean and along the Franco-Italian border can be initiated and that they will lead to closer and more reasonable relations between France and Italy. The French nation wishes peace with all the Great Powers of Europe. Only in peace can Europe prosper.

Algiers: The Algerian Government desires peace with all nations. Algeria has not any desire to go to war and disrupt its plans for internal economic reform. The people of Algeria ask Austria-Hungary to mediate in proposed disarmament talks between the Republic of France and Italy.

Geneva: Swiss President Hermann Schurzmann commented on French proposals for disarmament. "It can only profit the Italians," he said. "France has surpluses that could aid Italy in its development."

Paris: The French government offers peace to Germany and proposed the following ultimatums.

1. Disenfranchisement of Kaiser Wilhelm, Freidrich Hohenzollern of Brandenburg-Prussia.
 2. Recognition of the provinces of Thüringen, Baden-Württemberg, Saxon-Anhalt, Hessen, and Rheinland-Pfalz as the Republic of Schwaben; and forfeiture of any claims to these lands or the lands of the Republic of France.
 3. Payment of 20 Industrial credits to the Republic of France as payment for the loss of French lives allied to the Southern Germany forces in the recent civil war against Kaiser Wilhelm.
 4. Payment of 20 Industrial credits to the treasury of the Republic of Schwaben for loss of German lives in the Civil War.
 5. Evacuation of all Military forces from the province of Kiel.
- In return, the Republic of France and the Republic of Schwaben will aid Northern Germany in its conflict against Austrian and Russian invaders and will recognize the Provinces of Brandenburg, Silesia, Prussia, and Kiel as Northern Germany and will recognize any representative government this province wishes to enfranchise. Military support will be initiated as soon as Northern Germany accepts the terms of this treaty or submits acceptable alternative proposals to the Republic of Schwaben and the Republic of France.

RATINGS OF THREE NEWLY COMPLETED GAMES:

Games 1966AM, 1966AU, and 1966AV have all been completed recently. The first two are the first two wins by Germany in Postal Diplomacy. Germany has previously drawn, but these are its first wins. It is the last country to win a Postal Diplomacy game, and needless to say two wins in a row certainly help that country's sagging ratings. 1966AM was won by Monte Zelazny, his second win, and 1966AU was won by Bud Pendergrass, his first. 1966AV was won by England, played by Charles Wells--he now has reached the dizzy pinnacle of four victories, and with this achieves an average gain of supply centers of one per year--extremely high. His gain of centers in his four victories has averaged close to two per year.

Congratulations to these three winners--may you have many more.
