



HAMBURG, GERMANY: TO ALL FELLCY MCREERS: MOVEMENTS IN THE WORLD: The German Communist Party announced the formation of the Workers' Socialist Union, the WSU to govern Germany from now on. The WSU has the full loyalty and support of the GCP

The Workers' Socialist Union, the new government of Germany, announced the renewed successes of the Liberation Army. RATINGS->

I promised big surprises leaf issue in the ratings, and they're here, but first I would like to comment on a letter (or rather enclosure to his moves) that I got from Rick Brooks. He writes:

"Your ratings never surprise me. Such things are of no importance, of no real meaning. Luck is the major factor of the game. Three of the worst players in the game can drag the best down. In SCC //Don Miller's Foundation Game// Haramis collapsed and Huff didn't, so you have an edge. If Mockus does the same in GAA, I'm probably in a mess again. My play style is poor. I gamble like a drunken sailor until I get an edge, then play conservative...if I'm still around that is. And I'm near the top of your ratings. //He goes on to give an example from a game in progress// Maybe your silly rating system may have given him the idea that I was the man to beat //In that aforementioned game//"

Not commenting the the situation in that particular game you mention, but on the idea that rating systems urge people to attack the one on top: John Smythe has made this comment, and if anyone should know, he should. Perhaps this does happen, but the question is not ale rating systems bad because they do this, but "Do rating systems do this?" I for one think not. The situation exists, but, wouldn't it exist even if there were no rating systems? The fact that John Smythe is a godd player, or that John Jones is a had one would get communicated even if there were no ratings to do it. For example, I often get alliance offers that say not, "He's good, so ally with me and crush him," but "He's untrustworthy, ally with me etc.". far as I'm concerned, the matter of trustwerthiness is much more important than the matter of playing ability: You can alkays get a poor player to send in the moves you want if he is not worthy. But even the best player, if he is untrustworthy, will not get alliances. Given a choice between the two, I would pick the trustworthy poor player over the untrustworthy good player in any game.

As for your contention that luck is the most important factor in the game: if luck has managed to favor player X five times as often as player Z, then I will think that X has a better chance of winning if only because he is luckier.

Germany has won four and drawn one out of the last nine games, pulling up into fifth place. Turkey, for the first time since the very first game completed, has a rating less than 400.0, but England is unable to take advantage of it. Austria drops to last place for the first time, at last justifying the doubters; and Russia is now the victor in seven games, "drawing" three times.

I casually introduced myself, and prodeded to Gamesmaster the game to its end (about 5:30), in 1920, when France got Turkey to switch sides and destroy Austria.

Has anyone else heard of this variation?
