Also a note about Charles Reinsel's address. It should read exactly as follows to avoid confusion and delay: "Charles N. Reinsel, 120 Eighth Ave., Clarion, Penn. 16214." Both the middle initial and the zip are necessary.

Lately there has been put forward, by the Kappell Report and earlier, by Former Postmaster-General Lawrence O'Brien, the proposal that the Post Office be changed into a Postal Corporation, to be run by government as a business, not a hobby. This sort of thing is obviously to the benefit of Postal Diplomacy. I suggest that it would be a good idea for all of us to write letters supporting the P.C. Good targets would be your Senators, your Congressman, Postmaster-General Watson, and the Presidential Candidate of your choice.

The more pressure that be put on the government to establish a Postal Corporation, the better.

Skipping to another subject which fills me with ire, the subject of Gun Control came up in our county last week. The opponents of such legislation packed the auditorium of one of our local high schools, shouting down the few pro-control speakers who could be found, and destroying any hope for such legislation in Montgomery County. And in August another Gun Control Ordinance was defeated in Prince Georges County, on the other side of D.C.

In spite of the fact that the majority of the people seem to want Gun Control, this continues to happen. The reason is merely that the "Gun Nuts" are organized to protect something they are far from apathetic about, and the rest of us are neither organized nor, on the average, very passionate about our beliefs.

An organized minority can almost always defeat an unorganized or apathetic majority. The success of the "Gun Nuts", the Russians in Czechoslovakia, and the Viet Cong in South Vietnam are all examples of this truism.

When you get to the chart, you will notice a few corrections. These take into account the mixup over the location of the Italian naval yard (it is in Rome, not Naples), and the fact that Turkey got the yields for Assyria last time.

Sort of along these lines, it would be a great help to me if you would at least write down the location of all your pieces with each set of orders, whether they are moving or not. It helps considerably when I am gamesmastering the game.

Also, I might note that the Italian fishing fleets are in the Gulf of Lyon, as I neglected to include the move 10 ff Tyn-Lyo an issue or two ago.

The Austrian Fleet Adriatic, having no orders, was annihilated, and the Russian Fleet Sevastopol, dislodged and without a space open for retreat, is also annihilated. The situation in Sevastopol is an application of the "Boardman Dilemma" or "Miller Rule". By my House-rule 2(b), the support of F Sev was not cut, even though it was dislodged and destroyed. The support was not needed, but the

principle holds true none the less. If there had been a move such as A Bul-Rum it would not have succeeded.

The rating list is absent from this issue because I'm in the process of bringing the player lists up to date, and haven't had time to work on the country listings.

Larry Peery (4567 Virginia Avenue, San Diego, Cal.) is running a survey of the player's opinions on the various bulletins. Your opinions, of course, will be kept strictly confidential.

John McCallum's excellent compendium of rulings on the disputed situations is one of the most needed jobs in Postal Diplomacy. Leave it to John to get it done. His Brobdingnag remains, if not the best, at least one of the best, bulletins around.

Just as a matter of information, he is correct on all his rules for Glock, with the following additions:

(1) Glock uses the Koning Rule. I.e., the dislodged force does not stand off a unit moving up behind the dislodging force.

(2) Glock also rules the same way on the Wells' Extension of Koning's Rule. That is, the number of supports the dislodged unit may have had is irrelevant.

(3) Glock does not allow a direct change of a fleet and army belonging to the same power. "The Changing of the Guard". Thus F Bel-Pic, A Pic-Bel.

(4) Glock does allow exchange of provinces via convoy, and conveying through contiguous provinces. That is, A Bel-Pic, F Eng (C) A Bel-Pic, F Pic-Bel, and A Bel-Pic, F Eng (C) A Bel-Pic.
