ROME: The Government of Tribune Romulus Reagani today announced the signing of a treaty of mutual trade and assistance with Austria at Fiume. Under its terms the Italians are to continue to occupy Trieste for one year to pay occupation costs and then return it to Austria control. The Austrians in turn have signed a mutual assistance pact covering the Mediterranean area.

PALACE OF THE GOLDEN HORN (April 1904): Austria-Hungary having made restitution for her treacherous attack on Turkish territories, the war has been ended with honor on both sides. The new government of Austria has pledged friendship to the Turkish people, and the Sultan has entered a similar agreement with Vienna.

Meanwhile, the Fleets of the Faithful press ever westwards to avenge the attack made by Italy on Turkish naval forces.

TRIESTE: The American consul in Trieste, Fiorollo H. LaGuardia, informally gave reporters his reaction to the Austro-Italian treaty signed in Fiume. Looking about at the destruction caused during the Austrian re-occupation of the port city, he said, "Imagine what they would have done if they'd been at war?"

MARSEILLES: If the Kaiser doesn't cease his senseless attack on the French Republic we will pull the stopper from the drain of the Atlantic Ocean and, thereby, strand his entire fleet in drydock.

roncy, all in solid monies, obtained through several means. A run of excellent luck on the Beaucouillon roulette tables, the sale of thirty square kilometres of land to the new American-run "Pleasureland" in Liechtenstein (not, as the name suggests, an adjunct of Disneyland), and a very advantageous sum accrued from the leasing (for 99-year periods with options to renew) of the Emperor's thirty-six mistresses to that same Liechtenstein "Victual Valley", as one crude minister was heard to have put it, combine to place the Austrian sub-nation in its best financial state since the beginning of the war.

Although military operations will probably be curtailed after the present year, subversion and intimidation of the shaky enemies continues. Meanwhile, several well-placed bets on the Dodgers threaten to raise the capabilities of the Habsburg underground even higher.

GRANDE CASINO, BEAUCOUILLO (14 May 1908): Count Avino, the "gray eminence" of the tiny Grand Duchy of Beaucouillon, today confirmed rumors that the tottering Austro-Hungarian government had won 15,000 ducats at roulette in the Grand Ducal Bourse. "This was, of course, immediately reflecting in a fall in the odds against Austria-Hungary in the war," he told reporters. "Since word got around Beaucouillon of this coup, the Austro-Hungarian odds fell from 75-1 to 74-1."

BRESLAU (30 May 1908): General Count Oblovoff, commander of the Russian Third Army, today made a triumphal entry into this Silesian city at the head of the army which he has commanded for the past five months. The Count, a tall, handsome, expansive man, told the worried citizens of Breslau that they had nothing to fear from his victorious army. "From the frozen wastes of Galicia we have marched into fertile Silesia to liberate you from the yoke of the German Empire."

"The German Empire collapsed three years ago!" someone shouted from the crowd.

"From the exactions of the Italian invaders, then."

"The Italians ran for the border years ago!"

"Would you believe Liechtenstein?"

"Liechtenstein has been bought by a rich American and converted into a military
-- er -- house of discretion."

"It has? Follow me, my gallant warriors! On to Liechtenstein!"

GRANDE CASINO, BEAUCOUILLO (31 May 1908): Prince Pivo, the Italian Ambassador, today denounced a deal whereby the Austro-Hungarian underground government sold 30 square kilometers of Austrian territory to Liechtenstein. "Since, in point of fact, Italy is in military occupation of the Tyrolian region, this alleged sale is null and void and of no force and effect."

VADUZ, LIECHTENSTEIN (4 June 1908): Upon hearing that the Italian Ambassador to Beaucouillon had denounced the sale of a small Austrian border region to Liechtenstein, the Hon. Jasper Pike, Liechtenstein's new owner, issued an ultimatum to the Italian government. "Unless the government in Rome repudiates Prince Pivo's statement," said the wealthy American Ambassador to Beaucouillon, "access to the amenities of Liechtenstein will be cut off to all Italian troops. Our three staff bouncers, who include members of the former Liechtenstein government, will enforce this order. This is nothing new to me. I once had the same trouble when they tried to close down my houses in New York, but after I forbid my Madames to admit members of the Board of Aldermen, the pressure went off fast."

GRANDE CASINO, BEAUCOUILLO (6 June 1908): Prince Pivo today formally retracted his statement of 31 May on the recent Austro-Liechtenstein Treaty. "No representative of the Italian government," he said, "would wish to do anything to lower the morale of Italian soldiers. Since the acquisition of new territory will permit the new owner of Liechtenstein better to serve our troops, the Italian government has no objections to the transaction."

VADUZ, LIECHTENSTEIN (9 July 1908): Jasper Pike today announced a recruiting campaign for his new establishment. The campaign was begun after word reached here the Count Oblovoff was leading the Russian Third Army towards Liechtenstein to partake of the local amusements. "This will unquestionably be the greatest crisis I have ever faced in my years of experience in this business," said Pike. "Oblovoff

is a man of formidable capacity, and at the head of an entire Russian army he will certainly strain Liechtenstein's capacities."

"Capacities!" exclaimed Countess Rubilovsky, Pike's chief Madame. "Is that what they're calling them nowadays?"

GRANDE CASINO, BEAUCCUILLON (19 July 1908): For several years Henry Pike, nephew of American Ambassador Jasper Pike, has headed the American Sports and Games division of the Grand Ducal Bourse. This has been an undemanding position, as most of the aristocratic clientele of Beauccuillon seems such plebeian American amusements as the crap tables and the betting lines on baseball.

Now all that is changed. "The Austro-Hungarian underground government bet its 15,000 ducats of roulette winnings on the Brooklyn Dodgers," Henry Pike explained. "The Dodgers haven't won a championship since 1900, and haven't finished in the first division since 1902. Last year they were fifth, and this year they're even worse. They've hit more grounders from Tinker to Evers to Chance than any other team in the National League."

VALUZ, LIECHTENSTEIN (31 July 1908): Jasper Pike and Countess Rubilovsky expressed pleasure at the response for their calls for recruits to meet the threat of the expected Russian invasion. "Particularly gratifying has been the response from Beauccuillon," said the Countess, laying aside a small cigar with a suspicious odor. "This ought to dispel those rumors that I left Beauccuillon on bad terms with dear Cosimo. Why, his own sister, Princess Sonia, has volunteered to help us out. So have Lady Hottham, the Duchess of Ischitbay, Lady Czerny, and other members of the Beauccuillon diplomatic corps."

At that moment Pike rushed in, waving a telegram. "We've got another volunteer from Beauccuillon!" he shouted. "Do you remember Maggie Choates?"

"You mean that Hollywood star who's on her way there to marry Cosimo?"

"Yes. Well, owing to the war, her travel agency routed her through Liechtenstein. She'll be arriving in a couple of days. And she says she particularly wants to meet the famous Count Oblowoff!"

MARXISM IN GRAUSTARK

Merged with GRAUSTARK is FREDONIA, a former Diplomacy 'zine which carried reports on 1964B during its progress. Like most postal Diplomacy 'zines, FREDONIA was named after a mythical nation - in this case the central European republic in which the Marx Brothers cavorted in their 1933 picture Duck Soup. A brief account of this film appeared in GRAUSTARK #100. Now, thanks to a new book to which Mike Aita referred me, I am able to correct and amplify that account. The book is The Marx Brothers - Their World of Comedy, a paperback by Allen Eyles.

Eyles regards Duck Soup as the best of their films; "It represents the only occasion that the team were guided by a director with a real genius for comedy: Leo McCarey... (and) the only Marx film to have a completely mythical background: a postage-stamp republic called Freedonia." It is not the earliest film in which the Marxes appear with Margaret Dumont; it is simply the earliest such film which I had seen. Groucho, on the center of the stage ("It might seem too absurd if Groucho were President of the U. S. A.; there is no difficulty in accepting him as the leader of a mythical country.") manages to start a war between Freedonia and neighboring Sylvania despite a desire for peace on the part of both countries - a satire on the grim business of real-life diplomacy and what C. Wright Mills called "crackpot realism". The Sylvanian Ambassador Trentino is played by Louis Calhern; though not wishing war, he is trying to bend Groucho to his will by means of a beautiful female spy played by Raquel Torres. In the end of the film, Trentino is taken prisoner by the four Marxes and subjected to a firing squad of ripe apples.

Eyles describes the mirror scene as one of many in the Marx Brothers films which raise a crisis of identity. Mockery of pomposity, and crises of identity, are the dominant themes of the films. Eyles even compares Groucho's con-man technique to that of the late Joseph McCarthy, pointing out in an aside that two of McCarthy's sidekicks, Urban P. Van Susteren and Otis Comillion, sound like they might be names taken by Groucho Marx in his film roles.

ROD WALKER, FV 3 129 356, TUSLOG Det. #183, APO New York, N. Y. 09254: I am very glad that you are going to curtail political discussions in GRAUSTARK. While they are very interesting, people tend to get bitter about them, because they tend to believe that what they think is reality is, in truth, what's happening. In politics, particularly, that is a very foolish belief. Furthermore, most discussion on the subject, say, of Vietnam...are neither sober nor very rational. And even those who are best informed on the subject are by no means unanimous in their opinions. You have meticulously printed both sides; but the result has more often been an evil-tempered shouting match than anything which I would care to label a "discussion". I have not noticed that a pooling of mutual ignorance tends to produce any enlightenment.

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What is James Wright's problem? From the way he's reacted to the IDF you'd think it was the antichrist or something. He's gotten so worked up over it that any day, now, I expect a revolution that the IDF is part of the ICC (International Conformist conspiracy) (International Catholic Clique) (International Cogwheel Club) (something) or maybe personally recommended by B. L. Zobub, Esq., himself. However, all this heat and angry motion is caused because, in his opinion, the thing is unnecessary. So are coffee, electricity, and western civilization - we could live without those, too. However, being unnecessary is no great evil, and I really wish that he would provide a more lucid discussion than previously, since I'm sure he's capable of it. No one was ever harmed by a little constructive, rational criticism.

I want, however, to second very loudly Mr. Wright's observations about rating systems. I liked the idea at first, but his argument concerning gang-ups is a good one. There are people in Diplomacy whose minds work in that fashion, unfortunately, so that propositions that run "let's got so-and-so because he wins a lot" are not uncommon in this game. I wish it were otherwise, because I, personally, play for the fun of it rather than to set any new and startling record. In fact, a rating system is unfair to all players because it becomes an additional element in the conduct of the game.

In any event, I doubt that a rating system could be developed which could be completely fair to all persons, and there would be a tendency to "play for the record", which I would find most contrary to the spirit of the game.

I did, by the way, work on a system which might be a pretty fair one - it took your center-years and divided by the total number of years, then added in bonus points, similar to Reinsel's system, for winning; staying in until the end, staying in more than 10 years, and (a negative score) for being eliminated within the first five years. It proved to be so complicated I gave up the idea.
