## REGISTRATIONS OPEN FOR NEW POSTAL DIPLOMACY GAMES NOW

In response to numerous requests from GRAUSTARK's readers, I have finally decided to open two new postal Diplomacy games in this publication. Most of the present games are drawing towards definite decisions, and the page squeeze in GRAUSTARK will soon be relieved.

Owing to the approaching increase in postal rates, and the higher cost of stencils, the entry fee for these new games will be increased to \$3.50. I regret that this step is necessary, but it is now becoming apparent that the average postal Diplomacy game lasts from 12 to 15 game years. Your subscription/entry fee will bring you all issues of GRAUSTARK up to the conclusion of the game. As long as you are active in the game, your copy will come by air mail if time will be saved thereby.

These games will follow the postal Diplomacy rules published in GRAUSTARK #100. Copies of this issue are still available for 25¢. Other back issues, from #101 to the present, are available for 10¢ each. Many of these include rule interpretations and articles on strategy, as well as moves of present games, and of course our ever-popular press releases.

The first eighteen entries to come in will be accepted. Of these, seven will go into each game, and the last four entries to arrive will be accepted as stand-bys, two to each game. As the players in 1966R and 1966AA know, the first two stand-bys have an excellent chance of getting into the game. Stand-bys will get GRAUSTARK under the same conditions as the regular players do.

Players will be apportioned among the two games so that as few as possible from a given geographical area will be in the same game. Only if difficulties develop in filling the board for the second game will players in the first game be permitted to enter it as well. Please let me know, with your entry fee, whether you are willing to be a stand-by if both games are filled. If you don't wish to be a stand-by, let me know whether you want your entry fee applied to a subscription (at 10 issues for \$1.00) or refunded.

If you will have a different address this summer, please send in your summer address along with your present one when you enter the game. Let me know when the summer address becomes applicable, so that the other players can keep in touch with you.

If seven entries over a sufficient geographical spread come in by 27 May, the country assignments for the first game will go out by then. Forthcoming issues of GRAUSTARK will appear on the following schedule:

GRAUSTARK #128: 20 May 1967, with moves of present games.

GRAUSTARK #129: 27 May 1967. A one-page issue with country assignments. Players in the new game will have 3 weeks to line up their alliances.

GRAUSTARK #130: 3 June 1967, with moves of present games.

GRAUSTARK #131: 17 June 1967, with moves of present games, and "Spring 1901" moves of the first of the two new games.

Assignments for the second new game will go out when the board is full. Players in the two games will be informed of the identities of the stand-by players as soon after that as is practical.

ELBA: Remnants of the French Second Army arrived on this tiny Mediterranean island, brought over from the Tuscan mainland by Fratelli Fesch, Smugglers by Special Appointment to the Corsican Republic. According to the terms of the French surrender to German troops in Piedmont, Elba and Corsica will remain neutral under the rule of Luciano Fesch, President and Bandit-in-Chief of the newly founded Corsican Republic. The few

remaining French soldiers have been permitted to emigrate to Corsica if they pledge to cease bearing arms for the duration of the war. It is reported that this pledge is largely a moot point, since most of the French army's small arms have been stolen by the men of Corsica, and their short arms have been put out of action by the women of that island.

CARTAGENA: Lord Cornplaster, Admiral of the Mediterranean Squadron, today suggested bringing one or two battleships out of mothballs. "The better to stop all those supplies reaching Austria via North Africa."

AJACCIO: General de Bilité, highest-ranking surviving French officer, today doubted that the recent order of Admiral Cornplaster will be needed to stop supplies from reaching the Austrians. "It has been our experience that any supplies shipped to armed forces in the Mediterranean will end up in the hands of these banditti," he said. "I know for a fact that President Fesch is using my epaulettes for hairbrushes."

## DIPLOMACY ON THE CHESSBOARD

In his collection The Pleasures of Chess, the British chess columnist who writes under the name of "Assaic" tells of a problem which was published in Germany during the First World War. This problem is designed to show the correctness of the 1914 German invasion of Belgium, in violation of international agreements providing for that country's neutrality.

In the problem Germany, of course, is White. She has a King on QN2, a Rook on Q3, Bishops on K2 and KN1, a Knight on Q4, and a Pawn on QR3. The Allies, as Black, have a King on QB4, a Bishop on Q2, a Knight on QN2, and Pawns on QR3, QR4, QN5, QB2, K3, and KB4. White's QR4 is "Belgium", and as such inviolably neutral.

White has an easy win with the following possibilities: 1. N-N5ch, K-B3; 2. N-R7 mate; or 1. N-N5ch, K-B5; 2. R-K6 mate; or - and here's the critical set of moves - 1. N-N5ch, KxN; 2. R-K6. Now, if Black honors the agreement to keep "Belgium" neutral, this last move is mate. However, White cannot trust Black not to retreat with 2. ... K-R5. Therefore White begins by occupying "Belgium" himself with 1. R-R4, and warns Black not to resist this occupation. Black, however, ignores the kindly German warning and plays 1. ... BxP. White responds with 2. N-N5ch, followed by a quick checkmate.

"IF YOU WOULD HAVE PEACE, PREPARE FOR WAR"

"In 755 an event happened which closed the era of peace. Emperor Constantine V, son and successor to Leo III, an iconoclast like his father and like him an able military leader idolized by his troops, decided to fortify the Thracian border for any future eventuality. He therefore had a chain of strong forts built in Thrace along the Bulgarian border, and settled there several thousands of Syrians and Armenians on whose loyalty he could depend. This move met with hostility on the part of the Bulgars, who saw in it a violation of the provisions of the treaty of 716. They demanded some kind of compensation, and when Constantine refused a war started between the empire and the Bulgars which was to last, with intermissions, for several decades." - George Vernadsky, Ancient Russia

"The question now is not whether we should sacrifice every other consideration to the continuance of an insecure peace. What sort of peace must that be in which there is no security? War is preferable to such a peace, because it is a shorter and surer way to that which the House has undoubtedly in view as its ultimate object - a secure and lasting peace." - William Pitt Jr., Prime Minister of Great Britain, urging to the House of Commons on 12 February 1793 the declaration of a war that was to last almost continually for 22 years.

A sympathetic modern treatment of the legend is provided by Emmarel Royidis in his novel Pope Joan.

To add to the fun, Brannan "assigns" these countries to players who are not in the game.

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Yet another new Diplomacy 'zine is the Cerebral Nebula, which has thus far published two issues. In addition to regular postal Diplomacy, Cerebral Nebula will shortly begin a game of Rod Walker's "Imperialism VII". Fees for all games, regular or variant, are \$2.00. 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I would like to review Larry Peery's new Diplomacy publication Xenogogic here, but it cannot be read. I do not mean that it must be read in a strong light, like Big Brother, or that guesswork must pad out the text, as with Xeno. I mean that it, quite literally, cannot be read.

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Xeno? That's a new 'zine on a 3-D space warfare game inspired by the popular TV science-fiction program Star Trek. It is published by Charles Brannan, 3044A Telegraph Ave., Berkeley, Calif. 94705, who should be contacted for further information.

This is not the 3-D chess game in which the captain and Mr. Spock are engaged on Star Trek. Incidentally, on Batman Bruce Wayne and Dick Grayson have been observed playing a 3-d chess game like Star Trek's, but with more pieces. It is my belief that this same game, presently played between Batman and Robin, is still in progress on the "Enterprise" of Star Trek between their presumptive descendants, Captain Kirk and Mr. Spock. After all, 3-D chess notoriously takes a long time to play, and there are fewer pieces on the Star Trek board.
