ZFOD, HERNIA: Duke Noseboard expressed a weariness that was almost relief today, as he realized the end was near for the gallant men of Hernia, who were serving in almost every Austrian army. "We could see it coming," they (the Duke) said. "The real trouble started when The Great Gamemaster in the Sky turned a deaf ear to our plea. We wouldn't address supplications to him, because every time we tried, the letter came back marked 'I refuse to accept this stamp!'"

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Horniated Press): Postmaster-General Zip announced the issuance of a new stamp - plain gray with the legend "U. S. Postage 6¢". Zip said it was designed especially for Diplomacy players.

BROOKLYN, N. Y. (Horniated Press): A letter bearing the new gray Diplomacy stamp was returned to the Post Office here, marked "Take off the 'U. S.!'"

WASHINGTON, D. C. (HP): The latest Diplomacy stamp, bearing only the legend "postage 6¢" was issued today. Postmaster-General Zip crossed his fingers.

BROOKLYN, N. Y. (HP): This time it said "Grey is a Confederate color..."

WASHINGTON, D. C. (HP): By special act of Congress, all Diplomacy players were granted franking privileges starting tomorrow. Zip was careful to point out that these privileges were limited to Diplomacy communications only, and would not allow anyone to mail comic books free.

FT. LAUDERDALE, FLA. (HP): Letters were returned to the Post Office here from Brooklyn, bearing a postal worker's notation "signature illegible".

WASHINGTON (20 Jan. 1903, Reuters): To the disappointment of prize-fight fans, the Constistytion Hall debate has failed to materialize. Mark Rude went into a monumental rage when he heard he was identified with Students for a Democratic Society. "Society, in whatever form, is an evil instrument of fascistmilitaristcapitalistbourgeois class oppression! There can never be freedom until society is destroyed!"

Bill Linden declined on the grounds that "My lungs are not strong enough for the demands presented by modern, ah, politics. Strange, how current political tactics resemble a hog-calling contest."

WASHINGTON (URRP): President Figasus J. Pig said at a press conference that he has no objection to politics resembling a hog-calling contest. "It depends upon what the hog is being called," he said. He also announced that, on the advice of Secretary of Defense Melvin Lard, he has ordered the construction of a CBM (Cani-Ballistic Missile) system to protect something-or-other - no one has told him what.

## ANALYSIS OF TELEPHONE DIPLOMACY GAME #1 (1963FD)

by John Beshara, Gamesmaster

Now that Telephone Diplomacy #1 ended in the third 5-man stalemate in mail Diplomacy records it can be said that the play generally was of poor technical quality. Other than Italy's change in alliances in 1902 and 1906 there were no deviations in the original pattern of foes and friends. Outwardly the firmness of relationships would tend to indicate long-range strategic development, but rather it was a laissez-faire sort of movement or non-movement. Missing amid the calculations of the players was that "time is of the essence" and supply centers do not make a kingdom.

Yes, there were occasional exceptions: France during the first three years played as brilliantly as he did badly thereafter; Italy's finest years were his last.

France and England comprised the Northern Powers and went through Germany and Russia virtually unopposed. At the same time Russia and Turkey were locked in combat against Italy and Austria-Hungary, with little movement on either side. Italy, realizing France was but a breath away, vainly attempted to form a partnership with Turkey and/or Russia to quickly dispose of Austria-Hungary so that he could defend the Mediterranean against France, but neither Turkey nor Russia would accept rational terms. Italy also tried to press his ally, Austria-Hungary, into more aggressive tactics against Russia and Turkey, but Austria-Hungary refused for fear he would be pounded on by Italy once he strayed from his home bases.

When at last Russia and Turkey came to their senses, the best they and Italy could do was hope the Northern Powers would continue to play badly. The Southern Powers were allowed through their opponents' errors to annihilate Austria-Hungary and develop the stalemate planned by Italy, primarily because everyone was more concerned with destroying Austria-Hungary than anything else.

The decision to accept the stalemate was a strained one for England. By continuing the play he could easily develop a position which in a year's time would allow him to take six of France's supply centers, giving him a total of 15 units. Not only was he loathe to turn on his "savior" but he did not think he could thereafter gain the additional three units needed to win, and thus by his treachery lose his stalemate. What he did not know was that, with fleets in Portugal, the Mid-Atlantic, and Brest, he was virtually assured of a stalemate anyway. Other than a twinge of guilt, what could he lose?

What was distressing to me was the defensive posture many countries took in the early stages. It is axiomatic in this game that if you are going to be pounded upon by a combination of stronger power, you are eventually going to be destroyed. In the early stages it is necessary to hope and be brave - hope for friends, move aggressively on that assumption, and take the initiative. If you are unable to form alliances you will be destroyed perhaps a little sooner, but without taking the initial risk and attempting to gain offensive momentum, even with alliances you cannot win for time is the one unnegotiable enemy.

## THE MINISTRY OF MISCELLANY

John Beshara will be in Las Vegas from 21 to 31 March. This will not affect his play in the moves of 1967U and 1968CL which fall due on 5 April. However, he plans to leave on 5 April for a one-month cruise to the Mediterranean. During that period his moves in 1968CL will be played by Don Berman, 178 Ocean Parkway, Brooklyn, N. Y. 11218. Play in 1967U will be suspended until John's return, since the balance in that game is so sensitive, the game so near conclusion, and the number of players so small.

JOHN KONING, 318 S. Belle Vista, Youngstown, Ohio 44509: ((In reply to a query on game records)) There are 33 games numbered previously to 1967U still in progress, of which 11 are variants of one kind or another.

1965P, in Lonely Mountain, is longer than 1967U; it's in 1919. Other long games are 1965Q in Wild 'n' Woolly (1914), 1966Y in Lonely Mountain (1914), and 1967A in Trantor (1914).

The longest won postal game was 1965Q in Graustark, which ended in 1922 as a tie between England and Turkey.

The longest game won there are 4, all of which ended in 1918:

1963B -- Ruritania -- won by Russianin 1918

1965M -- Gostagiana/ADAG -- won by France in 1918

1966A -- Lonely Mountain -- won by France in 1918

1966L -- Big Brother -- won by Germany in 1918

NORMAN McLEOD, 906 Kimberwicke Rd., McLean, Va, 22101: I am a Capricorn, I chose Dunvegan only because I was desperate for a name which had not been "used", and I have never defended present American policy (though I am not yet 100% of your mind)...I turned D. ((I'm very sorry to have mis-understood or mis-recalled your views on the American invasion of Vietnam. The astrological "guesses" in #179 were also in error in Charles Johnson's case. He, it turns out, is a Cancer -- which I suppose may account for his recent move from the Y. M. C. A. to East Village.

((The place to have looked for those assassins was in the Dictionary of National Biography and its French equivalent. There is an entry for Kalyayev in the Bolshoiá Sovvetskaya. Bonnier La Chapelle, author of the most recent of these assassinations, may not have got into the standard reference works; see Tannenbaum's history of the Action Française for details.))

Here's a rules question: Suppose Turkey moves A Bud-Rum, F Bla S A Bud-Rum. Does a Russian move A Rum-Bud prevent a retreat A Vie-Bud? I think it should, since you do not play Koning's rule, therefore an unsupported move A Vie-Bud would have succeeded. Logically speaking, how can Vienna retreat to Budapest if it could not have moved to Budapest?

((If the only moves were RUSSIA: A Rum-Bud; TURKEY: A Bud-Rum, F Bla S A Bud-Rum, then the Russian move fails and the Turkish moves succeed. Budapest is left vacant, but not on account of a stand-off. Thus a dislodged unit in a space adjacent to Budapest is free to retreat to Budapest -- except; of course, for the Russian army dislodged from Rumania.

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((If, in addition to the above moves, anyone had made an unsupported move A Vie-Bud, that move would have failed. It would have failed because it was stood off by the Russian A Rum-Bud. Budapest, under these conditions, is vacant owing to a stand-off, and no one can now retreat there.))

BRENTON VER-PLCEG, US bunchanumbers, Co C, 125th Sig. Bn., 25th Inf. Div., APO San Francisco, Calif. 96225: Old "gold tooth" is making a name for himself, eh? It's been several months now, and I believe he was killed in an enemy-induced helicopter crash, though it's only second-hand information from a fellow in his unit, who I talked to only yesterday...

While barbarisms like this are certainly the exception, and, as far as I can ascertain, are decreasing due to official sanctions, they still can occur, be-

cause very few are really concerned, and languidly enforce these restrictions only to protect themselves.

I understand that this war's effect on American soldiery is unique. That is: this sort of thing has not previously been as common as it is in Vietnam. The reasons are not particularly obscure...

((I'm glad to hear that the Vietnamese people are catching up with guys like "Gold Tooth". The next step may be formal extraditions, now that some nations are beginning to recognize the National Liberation Front as the government of South Vietnam. Cuba is one such. Suppose that some American veteran of Vietnam, whose military record is made public in a citation for a medal, is a passenger on a plane hijacked to Cuba for reasons unconnected to his case. The Cuban government would honor an extradition agreement with the body it regards as the South Vietnamese government, and send him there to stand trial for murder, using newspaper accounts of the medal award as evidence. There would be a nice hoo-crow over this one.))

JOHN McCALLUM, "A" Quarters, S. E. S., Ralston, Alberta: Acelanda will likely fold with the next issue as the remaining game is being cancelled the players not wanting to continue it... John Koning tells me that Jutland Jollies will fold after its next issue. Koning will take over most of its games but I will take over the game that Koning is in.

((For further information on defunct and folding Diplomacy bulletins, see Rod Walker's Erehwon, which gives quite complete information.))

ROD WALKER, 1575-A White Drive, Rantoul, Ill. 61866: It is amazing, but a revealing commentary on your political state of mind, that you could read my statement on modern economic imperialism, and then equate it with the old territorial imperialism -- and then take the statement of Lodge pere and presume to prove from them that Lodge fils feels that the Vietnamese are his inferiors. I trust you do not treat your academic subject with the same sort of cavalier sloppiness.

((The above paragraph, referring to material published in GRAUSTARKs #176 and #178, seems to indicate that Walker is a functional illiterate of almost gemignanic proportions. The Harper's article in which Henry Cabot Lodge tried to justify foreign rule of the Philippines, and the tropics in general, on the economic self-interest and racial superiority of the European powers, was written by the younger Lodge -- the one who is today "negotiating" with the Vietnamese in Paris. This fact appears in the January 1930 Harper's which printed the article, and in my own comments on it in GRAUSTARK #178. Nor did Lodge justify imperialism on territorial grounds. He felt that it was a legitimate act of self-interest on the part of the imperial powers, and that the needs of the subject peoples need not be consulted in the process. This is precisely the theory of what Walker calls "modern economic imperialism". The fact that the colony is permitted to have its own flag, army, and other trappings of sovereignty is neither new nor relevant. Ellsworth Bunker is America's satrap in Saigon just as assuredly as any British "adviser" ever spoke London's will to the rajah who nominally ruled some small Indian state.))

At any rate, far from collapsing, the new imperialism is gaining ground. The game's players already include the U.S., Russia, China (to some extent), England, France, West Germany, and (also to some extent) Canada and Australia. As I said, it is less troublesome to buy countries than to conquer them and far more profitable to administer their economies than their politics. The Ivory Coast, for example, is owned by France, while Spain is owned by the United States. Russia owns a lot of countries in Europe and even some in the Middle East and Africa. These countries are merely little corporations which change their holding companies from time to time. How they run their internal affairs is up to them. The idea is similar to the Japanese concept of the Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity Sphere, save that the dependent nations could from time to time change their masters.

On the other hand, our exploitation of uninhabited planets will draw off a lot of the aggressive energy now expended in wars. I sincerely hope we will be far-sighted enough to claim the entire moon on the basis of our first landing

there. The Soviet Union will obviously challenge this, which will make for a highly interesting conflict later. No doubt you will find your usual tract (sic) objection to that too, perhaps on the ground that we ought not to treat Martian lichen as untermenschen...

((The report of the Special Study Group made this same point, but came to the conclusion that the space program would not provide a suitable "equivalent of war" because it does not command the urgency that war spending does. However, this can be fixed easily. Just as our government has contrived a mythical "Communist menace" to justify a vast subsidization of heavy industry with armaments spending, so it can with equal ease fabricate a sinister menace of octopus men from Lower Centaurus to justify vast expenditures for interstellar ABM's.

((A later letter continues.))

My recollection of the article in question, from reading it in 1966, was that it was written by the elder Lodge... However, assuming that the younger Lodge wrote the thing, I suggest that the opinions expressed nearly 40 years ago, by a man 21 years old, ((he was 27)) might have changed considerably over the years of public service, punctuated by a world war. I would like to know by what magic power you ascertain that Lodge's opinions have not changed since 1930, when his recent public pronouncements would tend to indicate the opposite? ((His recent public pronouncements, as I have pointed out in Kippie, have been those of a screaming hawk.)) In any event, one can hardly apply pronouncements dealing with a colonial Philippines to an independent Vietnam.

Further, I cannot see what the economic aspects of territorial imperialism has in common with the substitution of economic imperialism for the old wasteful territorial sort. Countries can be bought and sold without ever interfering with their nominal independence. They can have as many constitutions, revolutions, and regimes as they wish, although the Great Powers desire a certain amount of political stability, and will no doubt take steps to enforce this, as has already been done in the Congo. Why this has not been done in Nigeria I cannot quite understand, but there is apparently some initial displaced sympathy for the Ibos in some quarters, and this has been enhanced by the rather wretched treatment the Ibos have received at the hands of the central government during its prosecution of the war. Hopefully, Biafra will go the way of Katanga and we can all get back to the business of making money.

I cannot understand what sentient life has to do with planetary exploitation. It ought to be fairly simple, for instance, to make money from the Moon and Mars, as well as (perhaps) some of the asteroids and the moons of Jupiter and Saturn. Venus may pose more difficulty if it turns out to be as hot as it seems and to have a weather as violent as we now suspect. Naturally, exploitation of planets outside this system will have to await the development of translight speeds. ((You'll get unicorns in stag shows first.)) If some of these bodies turn out to be habitable by us, then we can think of colonization.

JOHN BESHARA, Apt. 1021, 155 W. 68th St., New York, N. Y. 10023: There is a rather interesting tactical problem in the North Sea battle ((in 1968CL)) vis-a-vis Miller's Rule:

Presuming Russia is cooperating with Germany, using Miller's Rule Germany is guaranteed the North without any chance of losing Belgium:

GERMANY: F Bel-North Sea; F Hol S F Bel-North Sea; A Bur-Bel.

RUSSIA: F Norway S GERMAN F Bel-North Sea.

Since GRAUSTARK does not use Miller's Rule, there is no way to be sure of getting the North Sea without losing Belgium. However, there is a way of getting the North Sea and still be sure of keeping Belgium:

GERMANY: F Bel-North Sea; A Bur-Bel; F Hol S A Bur-Bel.

RUSSIA: F Norway S GERMAN F Bel-North Sea

These moves are tactically slightly better than

GERMANY: F Bel-North Sea; F Hol S F Bel-North Sea.

RUSSIA: F Norway-North Sea.

The German army in Burgundy is ineffectual but should support Belgium in case the

army in Burgundy does not cut support, for should Russia fail to aid Germany, Belgium is in jeopardy. Here again, Miller's Rule is advantageous to the attacking (usually stronger) power.

((These comments referred to the situation existing in 1968CL prior to the "Fall 1902" moves. As it turned out, the allies played:

GERMANY: F Hol-North Sea; F Bel S F Hol-North Sea; A Bur S F Bel.

RUSSIA: F Norway S GERMAN F Hol-North Sea.

Though all of these moves except "A Bur S F Bel" succeeded, Germany lost Belgium. England played F North Sea-Bel; F Eng S F North-Sea-Bel, which combined with a French A Par-Bur; A Gas S A Par-Bur to dislodge both the German fleet in Belgium and the German army in Burgundy.))

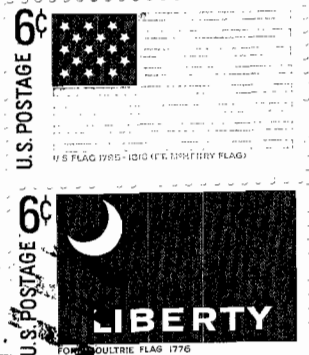
