THE LINES WERE ALREADY DRAWN

For several years the peace movement has been citing atrocities by American troops against the people of Vietnam - the wanton bombing of the Quynhlap Leprosarium, the butcheries at Manquang, Xuangoc, and Longphuoc, the murders of anyone from a village headman to President Diem who got in the way of U. S. policy, and the practice of dropping prisoners from helicopters. Now at last the tide of evidence for these evil deeds has hit the front page of every American newspaper.

A particularly poignant report from Songmy appeared in the New York Post of 2 December 1969. Robert G. Kaiser writes:

"The most dramatic new account comes from Nguyen Thi Ngoc Tuyet, a 19-year-old mother whose husband, a South Vietnamese soldier, was killed in action six months ago ... Tuyet said she saw a baby whose mother had been slain trying to open the mother's blouse to get at her breast for milk. While the baby was struggling with the blouse, an American soldier shot it, then stabbed it with his bayonet."

But what do American soldiers really think about being ordered to make this kind of slaughter. A recent Vietnam veteran, former Marine Corporal Fino Rivas, told reporter Perry Young in the same newspaper:

"One million of them ain't worth one of us. They should have killed all of them in that village and they had the right. I would have done the same thing. We should blow up all of those slant-eyed bastards... Those women and kids are the enemy too."

As everyone knows who followed the case of the "Green Beret Eight", the present U. S. government is not going to punish anyone for the Songmy massacre, or for the other atrocities which are now coming into the open as remorse or greed causes the murderers to break their long silence. But still the question of "Who is responsible?" dominates the nation. We should at this point avoid two equally unproductive extremes - the dishonorable discharge of one or two field officers as scapegoats, and the pious assertion (pace Hannah Arendt) that guilt is so widespread that it is futile to blame anybody.

The things done at Songmy are the responsibility of the men who commanded the American invasion of Vietnam. Under precisely similar circumstances, General Tomoyuki Yamashita was hanged for war crimes in 1946. He denied all knowledge of the atrocities committed in his Malayan campaign, but they had been committed under his command, and that was sufficient. As Justice Roberts said at the Nurnberg trials, we would be willing to have invoked against us the same standards we invoked at the war crimes trials.

But who sent the butchers of Songmy to Vietnam, and who taught the

PARIS (26 Sept. 1901): The German Ambassador, Count Heinrich von Schnickelfritz, accompanied by 3 comely secretaries, met today with Premier Charles Boyer-Lesuaave to request that the French First Army, now in Burgundy, be sent to Belgium. "We will not leave the Premier's side until the question is settled," declared the Count.

PARIS (8 Oct. 1901): An exhausted but happy M. Boyer-Lesuaave today issued the following statement to the press:

"After many intense discussions about the First Army with the German Ambassador and his staff, I have ordered the army to Belgium."

When asked the reason for his decision, the Premier, a true Frenchman in every sense, replied, "I never refuse women when they appeal to me."

"Spring 1909"

Eugene Prosnitz has pointed out a tremendous gaffe by the Gamesmaster in the adjudication of the "Spring 1909" moves in GRAUSTARK #197. Two Turkish armies, one in Marseilles and one in Tyrolia, were forced to retreat. The only space available for either retreat is Piedmont, so according to Ruling 8 in GRAUSTARK #190, both units are annihilated. At the same time, Russia retreats A Gal-War. Accordingly, the "Fall 1909" deadline is re-set to NOON, SATURDAY 20 DECEMBER 1969. Players who send in moves under these circumstances should indicate that the moves are revisions. Press releases begin on page 11.

Corporal Rivases to think as they do about Vietnamese? Those Americans who for years have been telling us that the invasion of Vietnam is right and proper helped sharpen the bayonets at Songmy. Before the massacre, the lines were already drawn between the lovers of life and the lovers of death. In 1964 eighty-nine Senators signed the death-warrant of the Madonna and Child of Songmy, when they voted for the Tonkin Gulf Resolution which two Presidents have treated as a substantive declaration of war. To their names were joined those of others who concurred in the policies that sent an American platoon to Songmy. These men cannot now escape the consequences of the deeds of their emissaries and representatives in Songmy.

The chain of guilt runs far back into our history.

Ralph Waldo Emerson said that America's mission is to "liberate the world". We know what this liberating mission did at Songmy.

Woodrow Wilson sought "to make the world safe for democracy". At Songmy we learned that he meant only the democracy of death.

Franklin Roosevelt said "We must be the great arsenal of democracy." The weapons from that arsenal were used at Songmy.

John F. Kennedy spoke of going any distance and bearing any burden to preserve what he called freedom. We know now how great the distance is, and how heavy the burden.

These American pretensions to a superior morality and a right to enforce it on other nations have now ground to a halt. The long-scorned Pacifists stalk weeping through the ruins of America's moral posture, and the Hawks do not dare look them in the eye. I have seen or heard no defense of the American invasion of Vietnam since the news of Songmy broke.

Whether they hold a bitter hate for what the Calley indictment calls "Oriental human beings", or merely believe that there are circumstances under which a nation may legitimately go to war, the Hawks have condoned these murders. The men who have defended this policy in the letter column of GRAUSTARK are among the guilty. Let us name them and shame them: Rodney Charles Walker. Charles Reinsel. Michael Smolik. John W. Smythe. William Lee Linden. Derek Nelson. Anders Swenson. Brian Libby. Philip Pritchard.

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Hal Naus and Ron Salcedo have written disclaimers about being classified with the Hawks in GRAUSTARK #194. I am happy to apologize to Hal Naus for making this error, which was based on his statement in Xenogonic I, #11 that "I did my term in hell, now let someone else take his turn." As a veteran of the Korean War, he states a fervent and heart-felt opposition to "the useless waste of human life that war produces". But Ron Salcedo, GRAUSTARK's pet Wallaceite, protests that "This does not make me a hawk. Wallace's position was to rely on the generals - if they thought we could win, we would try to win." Unfortunately for this position, in the same week the letter was written, Wallace did consult with both U. S. and Saigonese generals, and decided the war could be won. (Meet the Press, 30 November 1969: "Let the military decide".) Wallaceites are Hawks. Ipsa dixit.

Postal Diplomacy fans will be gratified to learn of a new journal which is not only accepting registrations for new games, but is actively seeking them. It is Rohan, the official Diplomacy 'zine of the National Organization of Wargamers (N. O. W.), and it is published by Kenneth Borecki, 19 Royal Road, Rockville Centre, N. Y. 11570. Subscriptions are 10 issues for \$1.25. There is a sliding scale for entry fees, ranging from \$1.00 for local Rohan members up to \$4.00 for N3F members. Write for details. In an interesting new feature, half the entry fee is refunded if the player doesn't last past "Spring 1903".

Borecki, in Vol. II, #16, announced the forthcoming publication of Gamers' Guide, a publication for the strategy gamer. The first issue should be out by now; GG is 10¢ per issue. GG will be monthly. N. O. W. News is also coming up from him, at 35¢ per issue.

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Harry Manogg now officially qualifies as a Dirty Old Man.

On 13 November 1969 he was arrested in his bookstore in Kankakee and charged with the "sale of harmful material to a minor". The "harmful material" seems to have been a rather unexceptionable nudie magazine, to judge from a brief story Harry sent from a local paper (which misspelled his name throughout). These rules were most recently published, with sample rulings, in GRAUSTARK #190, which like all back issues is 10¢. See #196 for Schleicher's address.

He writes that his new 'zine Brontosaurus will include two variants of Diplomacy with its next issue. Subscriptions are \$1.25 for 10 issues. The variants are Rajomacy, designed by Gary Gygax and based on ancient India, and Barbomancy, designed by Russell Tulp and based on barbaric Europe. (But so is original Diplomacy!) 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Brenton Ver Floeg's ZIP code in Vail, Colorado is not "80424" as reported in GRAUSTARK #197, but is 81657.

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The "advertisement" in GRAUSTARK #196, parodying the McCarthy "death hoax" with a Nixon "death hoax", occurred independently to one Peter A. Cimino, a columnist for the Brooklyn College student newspaper Calling Card. In a recent issue he speculated that Nixon is really dead, and is being impersonated by another man. His candidate for the "real" Nixon is "Herbert J. Tuface, an unsuccessful California used car salesman".

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Mata Hari, whose "great-granddaughter" was "interviewed" in GRAUSTARK #197, has once again had her story told - this time by an author who is fully aware that her reputation as a "spy" is one of history's most successful hoaxes. Gene Caesar tells her story in The Spies, a collection of articles edited by Robert G. Deindorfer (Fawcett Gold Medal, 75¢). This book also contains an account of Reino Hayhanen, a drunken Ingrian who gave away one of the most suc-

cessful Soviet espionage operations in the United States. He informed on his superior, the accomplished operative Rudolf Ivanovich Abel. Another writer tells in detail how the CIA and the Bolivian government captured Che Guevara, including Guevara's betrayal by the amateur intriguer Regis Debray, and his murder on the direct orders of the Commander-in-Chief of the Bolivian Army. Yet another article throws light on the Stalin purge of Marshal Tukhachevsky and most of the rest of the Soviet military leadership in 1937. According to Michael Sayers and Albert E. Kahn in The Great Conspiracy, most of the Soviet military leadership was involved in a treasonable correspondence with their opposite numbers in Nazi Germany, trying to arrange German support for a coup by Tukhachevsky in the interest of the exiled Trotsky. Henry Jordan and Richard Hanser show that the documents which evidenced this "treason" had been forged in Germany under the direction of the SS leader Reinhardt Heydrich, for the purpose of discrediting the Soviet military leadership.

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To go from factual to fictional espionage, Michael Kurland's new novel A Plague of Spies (Pyramid, 60¢) is highly recommended. The action takes place in the Grand Duchy of Alba, a sort of Balkan Monaco that apparently adjoins both Albania and Italy. Alba's capital, Graustark, is the center for large-scale gambling and small-scale international intrigue. The hero, a man with the unlikely name of Peter Carthage, works for an outfit with the even more unlikely name of War, Inc. While in Alba on a consultation job to prevent the machinations of a group of international jewel thieves, he meets an elderly Englishman named Smith, who is there to foil the schemes of an immensely sinister and immensely aged Chinese named - oh, you've heard this one before?

Kurland, who also writes science-fiction, has a little in-group humor in the book. Carthage and his girlfriend have been imprisoned by a group of sinister men disguised as Albanian monks. Not having a command of this obscure language, the author gives them as native expressions the names of numerous science-fiction writers, spelled backwards and chopped up into likely looking words. For example, one "monk" barks: "Ese eh cder gib asit terrag."

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The Gamesmaster has broken out in a few other places: a review of Sprague and Catherine de Camps' new book The Day of the Dinosaur in Amra #51 (George Scithers, P. O. Box 8243, Philadelphia, Penn. 19101; 50¢) and an account of the Lord Peter Wimsey stories of the late Dorothy Sayers in Unicorn (Karen Rockow, 1153 E. 26th St., Brooklyn, N. Y. 11210; 50¢). Also recently published is VISITATION #1, a publication of the Society for Creative Medievalism. VISITATION is part of your Gamesmaster's duties as Herald for the SCM, which consists of a few dozen people who like to get together and dress up in medieval outfits, practice jousting, minstrelsie, and other medieval arts, and show off their knowledge of obscure fields of knowledge. VISITATION #1 is 15¢; no subscriptions will be entered.

The editor continues to feel that the patriotism of his Hawk readers is falling away. It is now 4 months since the story of the Xuangoc Massacre in Vietnam broke, and none of the readers who used to be so ingenious in their defense of American policy in Vietnam have written in to justify it. To revive the flagging spirits of the Hawks, we present another set of pro-war quotations.

"It is an easy matter to teach the few simple technical details of bayonet combat, but an instructor's success will be measured by his ability to instill into his men the will and desire to use the bayonet. CONS TANTINOPLE (18 May 1908, SPP): A Bulletin issued from a one and a half room hovel in downtown Constantinople which apparent-

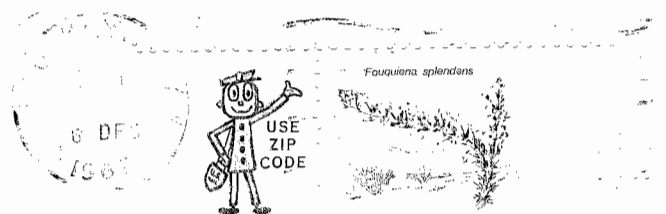

It is also known that there is a conviction that more wretchedly planned attacks would soon be knocking at the door of Tsar Boris himself. Russia's only natural defense is the horrid ugliness of its women."
