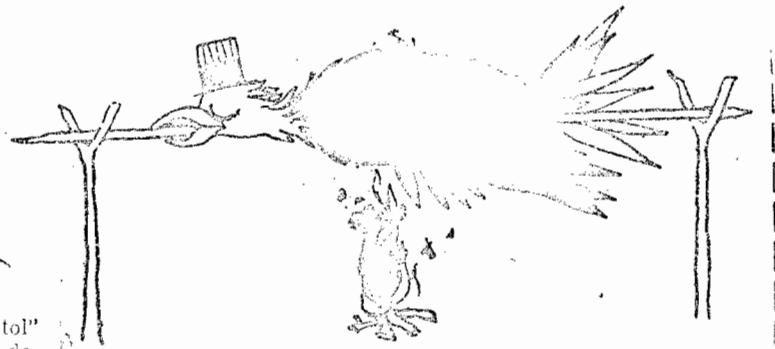

Sirs:

There appear to be doubts in some people's minds over the nature of the war we are now waging. Apparently some wish to see it as simply a "civil war" arising from the unwillingness of privileged elements in the South to accept the verdict of national sentiment. Those who hold this view argue that the Southern leaders, by rejecting national elections, left their opponents no alternative but the use of force.

This is a mistaken analysis, if only in that it ignores the international character of the struggle. The so-called "liberation" movement is worldwide. (One need only recall recent events in British Africa or look closely at trends in Brazil.) But more importantly, this naive wish to see the war as an internal affair in which outsiders shouldn't intervene, overlooks the extent to which the North and South have evolved into distinct societies. Any attempt to reunify them now by force, in accordance with the North's program, would turn the South into a garrison state in which present leadership will be systematically excluded, established customs altered by fiat, and the economy ruined through the breakup of the productive plantations. Those who doubt that the North's intention is to destroy Southern institutions and liquidate a whole social class need only read the proclamation recently issued by the Northern president (who is not, I might add, the benign grandfatherly figure his beard would suggest).

No, under these conditions, the South is fully justified in soliciting foreign assistance in its battle to maintain the right to choose its own form of government. Indeed, the internationally-recognized principle of self-determination would seem to require that all nations avowing this principle come to the South's aid.

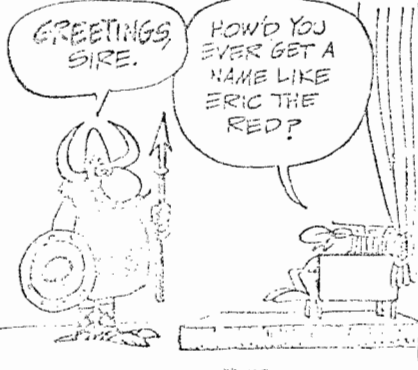
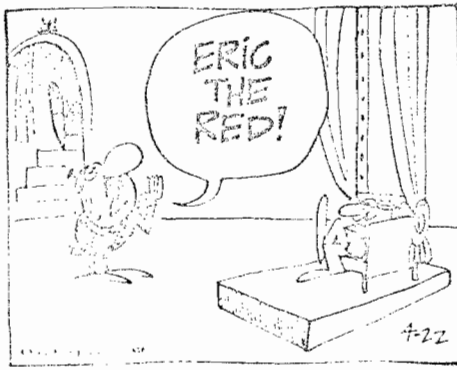

#### 1970M - PRESS RELEASES

MUNICH: The Kaiser today viewed with disgust the conflict with Italy and Austria. The Kaiser said, "Why can't they fight over something reasonable, like women, or even horses - but over religion is insane." Also, the Kaiser didn't like Italy for a neighbor, at least that close.

LONDON: We will fight them in the fields, we will fight them in the hills...

MOSCOW: The Czar acknowledges the "preferential" treatment of the Austrian High Command and suggests that the future of the empire may be found in Lamentations 1:10 (Living Psalms):

"Her enemies have plundered her completely, taking everything precious she owns. She has seen foreign nations violate her sacred Temple - foreigners You had forbidden even to enter."

ROME (4 May 1902): The Church regrets the invasion of Austria, but we are sure that by now, you can see why we are here. How else can you rid the hillsides of the invading hordes sent there by the Czar? We do not regret the rape of your women, even though some of them were a little young.

NAPLES to CONSTANTINOPLE: The Pope is sure by now that Turkey is in a sad state of affairs. Not only did the Sultan receive word late in the year that the whole of Europe was in a state of total mobility, but now, what do you do if the Russians retreat to the Black Sea?

CONSTANTINOPLE (3 Mar. 1906): Sultan Teez Akbar declared today all Russian warships were being removed from Black Sea ports in preparation for his Fall vacation on the Crimean Peninsula. A special invitation was extended to Premier Boyer-Lesuaev to join the Sultan in order to finalize plans for carving up Europe. The Sultan promised to have 60 of his prize harem girls on hand for entertainment. Informed Sources say the Sultan has hopes the French Premier might become so overwhelmed with Turkish wine, women and song that Turkey might receive the largest share of Europe.

PARIS (4 Mar. 1906): Premier Boyer-Lesuaev today gratefully accepted the Sultan's kind invitation for a Crimean conference. "While I am not unaware of the special charms of Turkish women (having come in the Casbah many times), I am taking the 40 best members of my bodyguard with me, since 60 girls will not be enough to provide for me during a long stay," declared the satyric Premier, whose normal routine of females consists of 100.

PARIS (23 Mar. 1906): Premier Boyer-Lesuaev today apologized to the English Ambassador, the Earl of Morrall, for doubting British loyalty. He promised to restore London to British rule as soon as possible, while putting the vile Russe-Germanic hordes to flight. "Our Mid-Atlantic fleet is merely a reminder to any who oppose us up North that all they can hope for is annihilation," stated the confident French leader. The Earl and the Premier left to attend the Shocking-Pink Berets' Regimental Dinner and are expected to return in 3 weeks' time.

## THE "WORLD WAR I" VARIANT

Variant Diplomacy games have not flourished in GRAUSTARK, with one exception. A few years ago I tried to set up a two-man game in which each player would represent one of the actual alliances of the First World War, leaving neutral the countries which actually kept out of that conflict. The result was the "WWI" variant, whose rules were printed in GRAUSTARK #107.

Italy, the only one of the seven powers which was still at peace by the end of 1914, presented a bit of a problem. Though committed by treaty to the Central Powers, the Italian government of 1914 very sensibly decided for neutrality. But this was not enough for the Entente, which wanted a base from which to launch warfare against the Central Powers' vulnerable Balkan possessions and satellites. So British agents bribed a Socialist editor named Mussolini to abandon his previous pacifist stance and come out for Italian alliance with the Entente. (One wonders what the British may have thought of their bargain a quarter-century later.)

In this variant, the loyalties of Italy are determined by the flip of a coin following the initial "Fall 1914" moves. So far five games of this variant have been undertaken, whose players are named below. An asterisk indicates the attachment of Italy. Two of

the three latter games are still in progress. No further WWI games will be begun, as I am not tremendously interested in this variant, and feel that anything useful that may result from its play will be evident in the existing games.

The WWI games will be conducted by carbon copy, and the results will be published from time to time in GRAUSTARK as space is available. The "Fall-Winter 1914" moves of WWI-C appeared in #200, p. 37. The "1915" moves were printed in #201, p. 9. See #203 for "1915" builds and removals. Ron Salcedo then took over the Entente.
