ROME (3 Dec. 1905): Pope Becker met with Czar Burley today here in Rome. Both leaders expressed pleasure at the way the war was progressing. Pope Becker stated that the Black Plague would be driven out of France in a short period. He congratulated the Czar on his brilliant attack on the Yellow Scum in the East. He cautioned the Czar not to become too involved in the Turkish harems since there is much fighting to be done in the north. THE DIPLOMATIC POUCH

DAVID LINDSAY (31 August): With the demise of WWI-C [in GRAUSTARK

#217] it seems there may be a few loose ends to tie up...

First off, I originally agreed to the draw because I was sure that Ron could win the game, and when he offered me a chance of breaking even I accepted it. You see, the victory conditions are a 2/3 majority of all pieces on the board or capturing all enemy capitals. The word 'pieces was what made me accept the draw. Since Ron could build up U. S. units as long as he had the Mid-Atlantic I thought that he could accumulate enough of them to gain a 2/3 majority. However, looking at the conference map with the positions on it I see I was mistaken. By my calculations Ron would need 37 units, or 26 more than he has now; unfortunately he doesn't have enough space to put them all. So that way of gaining victory is out. And both of you are correct in saying that the game is now stalemated militarily. It is a 'classic' situation, first commented upon - though in different circumstances - by McCallum in Brobdingnag some time ago, as impregnable to assaults because it is not out flankable. So it seems that the game is a true draw, though if Ron had room for the American troops it would not be.

One of the more interesting features of the WWI variant is the ease with which strategy may be formulated: no treacherous allies, no sneaky maneuvers, no involved plans to get X to stab Y. Just maneuver your units to gain a certain goal. In fact the game has a chess-like simplicity in number of pieces and spaces. But like chess the game does have quite a few opportunities for clever maneuvering and gambits of various natures. One idea that immediately struck me when I saw the game was the possibility of using a computer to analyze the game. I can't prove it, but I suspect Dave Johnston may have hit upon the idea also because of the way he moved his troopers: Germany was reduced quickly and efficiently and I was unable to make any advances anywhere but Russia. I suppose I should ask Dave about this, but I doubt is he would have time to reply.

[Maybe he was using a ouija board. See GRAUSTARKS #169 and #218.]
Anyway, this brings me to another point. I suspect that Dave's
moves and Ron's too are the best that could be made under the circumstances. And shedding the skin of modesty like a snake I think mine made the
best of the situation. If this is so, and John could check this by looking at the other games, then it would seem that WWI is a draw if played
correctly. I strongly suspect it is, though a computer could probably
tell us for sure. Anyway, comments...on this would be greatly appreciated.

That seems to be it. I'd like to thank both of you [a copy of this letter went to Ron Salcedo, Lindsay's opponent] for making this game possible and also enjoyable. I've enjoyed my fantasies of power and hope Ron enjoyed his; hopefully John enjoyed seeing press releases from Grande Casino. Thanks, fellows, and maybe we can have a reunion in 10 years or so and play the damn thing over again. Until then tennis, anyone?

This interpretation has already been discussed in GRAUSTARKS #218

and #220. I stand by my interpretations in those issues.

ANDREW PHILLIPS (3 September): Do you really believe the crud you're laying down? Anyone who believes that "our society" has a "huge and deseperate class of the poor" and only a "thin crust" of middle class is

simply not in touch!

I say what I see. Anyone who walks north along Park Avenue from, say 70th Street to 120th Street - a distance of only 2½ miles - can see that our society still has the same intolerable contrast between the immeasurably wealthy and the hopelessly poor as it did at the turn of the century. One can take such a walk in any American city, and see such a centrast. Only an inadequate welfare system stands between our cities and social revolution, and inflation is making that welfare system more inadequate every day. If we now have anarchists, bombings, riots, assassinations, and high crime rates, just as the society of The Proud Tower did, it is because the same causes produce the same results. The society of 1900 and the society of 1970 differ only in such trivial matters as the skin color of the urban poor, the occupations of the middle class which scorns them, and the media which make different social classes aware of one another's way of life.]

Some strange people on your "New Blood" list [in GRAUSTARK #219]. Mischel and Rosenfeld have been playing at least a year, and Krigsman has

been publishing for months -

They re new as far as my records go.

On the rules: I do not think George Heap's points about the Beshara Rule [in GRAUSTARK #218] are particularly well taken. First, a unit which "may not move" may still have an effect at its destination. Note the same words are used under "Conflicts" as under "The Convoy Order". Secondly, he fails to back up the assertion he makes in the sentence preceding his examples. Thirdly, A Bel-Lon is no more a legal order without a corresponding convoy order than A Bel-Mos - the applicable sentence requires both.

Actually, I don't think this is a question that can be resolved solely on the basis of a literal reading of the Rulebook alone. You merely have to decide what you consider reasonable. Consider: A Lon-Bel: F Eng C A Lon Bel /d/ A Hol-Bel. If you assert that a stand-off has occured, it would seem to follow that if A Hol-Bel was changed to A Hol holds, A Lon-Bel would no longer be stood off. Unopposed, it should - by analogy -

succeed. Now, looking at the situation from the "coarse mosts viewpoints such a result is not unreasonable given the period of time over which the actions take place. Unfortunately or fortunately, as the case may be,

such a result contradicts the Rules. Clest la guerre -

Please clarify your ruling on George's fourth example. This was the came situation as is discussed in Charles Wells! letter in this issue. If you really hold the Austro-Hungarian units cannot act against each other, you have to deal with the fact that the rules state that such moves are "of no effect"; thus: AUSTRIA-HUNGARY: A Vie-Tri, A Bud-Tri; ITALY: A Ven-Tri. Such a ruling would contradict the Sample Game [in the Rulebook] but that's been no object in the past, has it?

Under these circumstances I would have underlined all three of those moves. If three units, each with no support, all try to get to the same

space, none of them succeeds.

What would be your rulings in the foolowing cases?

WHO OWNS THE FLAG?

"Nebuchadnezzar spake and said unto them, Is it true, O Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, do not ye serve my gods, nor worship the golden image which I have set up?" - Daniel iii, 14

"This board will not sit here and listen to anyone who won't stand and salute the flag...Anyone who will not salute the flag of the United States of America has no right to ask anything of its government." - Joseph C. Irwin, Director, Monmouth County (N. J.) Board of Freeholders, New York <u>Times</u>, 20 August 1970

There was once a time when the flag of the United States of America belonged to all of its citizens, without regard to their political opinions. It was a flag born in revolution, standing not so much for a tract of land as for certain ideas which the govern-

ment of that land once pledged to uphold.

Now it has become a partisan banner, and the tiny minority of war-lovers wave it as they smash the heads of women and children in the streets. However, these same war queers object to the use of the flag by people who prefer peace and want it now. It seems to be proper to wear a flag sticker on your car window or a "hard hat", particularly when accompanied by a pro-war slogan or the name of a pro-war candidate. But it is improper, it seems, to wear a necktie with a flag pattern, or to use the flag in con-

junction with a peace symbol.

What the war queers roout to do is obvious. They want the flag to have all the prestige that it has as a national symbol, and at the same time to attach this prestige to their own faction. This, of course, is impossible. Neither a sinking ship nor a sinking cause can be kept above water by nailing the flag to its mast. All that will happen is that the flag will go down along with the cause to which it has been attached. If people feel shame at the sight of their country's flag, the blame belongs with the men who appropriated that flag and flew it to justify the Mylai massacre, the clubbing of peace demonstrators, and the suppression of the peace movement's duty - not right but duty - of free speech.

The American Civil Liberties Union has been swamped in recent months by flag cases. According to an article in the September issue of their monthly <u>Civil Liberties</u>, people

have been arrested for the following acts:

1. Sewing a flag to the roof of a car. (This is perilously close to the flying of flags from car antennas, which is quite common.)

2. Sawing a flag to a jacket, thus "mutilating" it.

3. Wearing the flag as a kerchief, covering the head in a traditional symbol of mourning.

4. Being present when a flag was burned. (Testimony of witnesses was conflicting

even on this point.)

5. Sale or use of a flag superimposed on a dove, or with a peace symbol on it, or with the 50 stars arranged in the shape of a peace symbol. (There is, incidentally, no law specifying the way in which the 50 stars may be arranged on the canton of the U. S. flag.)

6. Wearing clothing in flag patterns.

7. Showing up for a pre-induction physical wearing nothing but a flag. (The induction claimed that if the government was going to ship him back wrapped in a flag, they

may as well send him out the same way.)

In fact, according to the Indiana director of the ACIU, "One of the most frequent kinds of harassment is that in which a motorcyclist wearing a flag on his jacket is

stopped by a policeman wearing a flag sown on his sleeve." (New York Daily News, 23

August 1970)

And drivers for United Parcel Service and the New York Telephone Company have been told that they can use flag stickers on their vehicles and buttons on their clothes, but no others. Flags displayed in such a way as to indicate support for peace are forbidden. A telephone company spokesman put it very frankly when he said, "If the flag is consid-

ered to be favorable to any one side, then that's too bad. That's the symbol of this country." Idke many Establishment positions, this one pretends to impartiality while taking sides. The flag is intended to be at once everybody's symbol, and the emblem of

the war-lovers.

Naturally, this is doing well for the flag business - we may recall that ancient Roman shoemakers organized frequent parades so that shoes would wear out faster, giving them more business. Several flag manufacturers report record sales, including the small-size flags called "grave-markers". One of them, Emmanuel Weiner of Art Flag Co., told the New York Post that "even though patrictism was increasing, the flag business was dying because now people aren't entering the trade." (22 May 1970) "I have a 20-year-old son, but he's in college, dodging the draft," Weiner said, "and he won't even come here and look at the place."

other people with a cash interest in the flag include Gulf Oil, which is distributing free flag decals at its stations. Gulf Oil received \$95,942,000 in military contracts in fiscal 1969, so presumably they have good reason to feel patriotic. (Fran Manuskin,

letter, New York Post, 29 May 1970)

Burlington County, New Jersey, harbors more of this peculiar sort of patriot. On 8 July 1970 the County Board of Freeholders voted uranimously to require all county-owned cars to carry flag decals with the slogan "Our Flag: Love It or Leave". (Parenthetically, one wonders why such people get mad when young men take them up on their offer and head for Canadal) But later the vote was revoked when it turned out that the flags with the slogans had been provided by the Elks Club. This whites-only organization has as much right to fly the U. S. flag as Charles Manson does to call himself "Christ". (New York Post, 9 and 23 July, 1970)

But the most outrageous use of the flag is now taking place in New York. A splinter party that claims to be the true exiled pretender to the Republican Party feels that the major party candidates for U. S. Senator are not sufficiently bloodthirsty. This group, the Conservative Party, has nominated James Buckley, and his candidacy is being assiduously pushed by National Review, whose editor is his brother William. (The James Buckley candidacy is a godsond for another James Buckley, so publisher of the pernographic weekly Servy. His obscenity case is being held up until after the election, lest two James Buckleys in the headlines at once prove confusing to both Conservatives and porn readers.)

Instead of the Democratic jacks or the Republican insteadon, the Conservatives have adopted as a symbol nothing less than the flag of the United States of America. Their stickers and posters bear nothing but the flag and the word "Buckley". The Conservatives,

allegedly a "law-and-order" party, seem to have no use for the following laws

"The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatseever. It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed on paper mpkins or boxes or anything that is designed for temporary use and discard; or used in any portion of a costume or athletic uniform." - U. S. Code 36, Section 176 In addition, a New York state law says it is a misdemeaner "to place a representation of the flag on an envelope or business stationery and to use that stationery for business purposes or correspondence, precisely what Buckley has done". (New York Post, 11 August 1970)

At this point the whole flag issue reaches absolute chaos. Naturally, no legal action is going to be taken against Buckley or his party, no matter how many assistant district attorneys try to make themselves reputations by prosecuting housewives who have peace symbols superimposed on their car's flag stickers. All that will happen to him is that, despite long news reports in the same newspapers that tried to make Goorge Wallace

a "third major candidate" in 1968, Buckley will run a poor third.

But a curious sort of revenge is shaping up against those who have tried to make display of our flag a substitute for defending an indefensible war. Eventually a President of the United States - maybe even the present one - will be forced to the realization that only an immediate withdrawal of all US troops from Vietnam will save his political career. Naturally, the war queers will assail him as a "sell-out", "back-stabber", and "traiter". And, equally naturally, that President's supporters will wave the flag, claim that he is acting in the national interest, and call the hard-line hard-hats "unpatraction".

Then what a change we will seed. Whenever that flag is waved in support of the Prosident's unilateral withdrawal policy, war queers will bee it, hiss it, tear it, and burn it. For, as anyone who has ever watched or listened to them can verify, they do not leve their country and its flag so much as they love war, bloodshed, destruction, and death. If the flag of the United States is ever waved in the name of peace, they will burn it in the name of "victory" over whatever Sinister International Conspiracy is popular at the time.

Until that happens, those who want to love both peace and America can show it in a number of ways. Separate flag and peace stickers can be displayed, as recommended by Dean and Gerda Koontz. (CRAUSTARK #218, p. 4) There is a flag decal in which the 50 stars are arranged like a peace symbol. Or, since the American invasion of Vietnam has placed this country in great internal distress, it is perfectly permissible to display the United States flag upside down. This does not east contempt on the flag, but instead is an internationally recognized symbol of distress. Prosecutions based on such display of the flag have been uniformly — and quickly — thrown out of court.
