THE DIPLOMATIC FOUR

ROBERT J. WARD, Apt. 7, 2421 P Street, Sacramento, Calif. 95816; I find your analysis of the conservative position in National Review (see GRANSTADT #230, p. 11) interesting but unfair in several respects. First, you miss the disparity among Conservative thought. There has been, and still is in this country, a dualism within the Conservative movement. One side is that of European Conservatives, basically authoritarian thought. This side places the prime stress on order, with or without law, and is usually represented in the pages of National Review by von Mises, Hayek, de Munnich, and occasionally by L. Brent Bowell. The other mainstream position is a Libertarian conservative position philosophically derived from 18th century Liberalism. This places major stress on the individual, limiting of state power, and tends in its extreme manifestations towards anarchism. This position is more usually expressed by publications of the Intellectual Society of Individualists (which I understand has recently seen the inconsistency of a "synthesis" of individualists and imposed itself). The exponent in the pages of National Review is Russell Kirk (on occasion) and a figure whose first name escapes me at the moment.

(He is one of the men named Frank Meyer who writes for conservative publications. One is undoubtedly libertarian while the other, whom I last saw in the now-defunct National Review, is a strong traditionalist. This is almost as bad as the two Winston Churchills of the late William Lindsay. Incidentally, in case of confusion, the Winston Churchill referred to in the end matters on p. 6 of Sir Winston Spencer-Churchill, L. C., M. P., etc., etc.)

These two groups have, until recently, been held together by a common fear of Communism. Thus the individualists have brought a certain state control to combat the greater evil of total state control in Communism (their argument, not mine). The first group, while having little common ground, has agreed to support the Libertarian candidate (as G. Collier) in order to achieve a position of power within the movement. Subsequent of course shows their fusion particularly in his hard anti-free foreign policy while dismantling the state at home.

(One wonders how Collier as President would have exemplified this "fusion" while carrying into effect his policy, declared in his last victory, of the reconquest of Africa by whites. "Dismantling the state at home" would scarcely be his way of dealing with the Black revolt that this policy would produce.)

Finally however the libertarian movement has made a great many marriages of convenience with the radical left. See for example NIE magazine of November 1970, and the two or three issues just prior. Some in fact were even involved in various Vietnam borderland activities. They have always opposed the state as an unwarranted infringement on individual rights. In time this has caused debates on the left as to whether to accept this help.

Soberly, your argument that National Review speaks for American Conservatism is suspect. ((At least it speaks for some American Conservatives than NIE, New Individualist Review and Left Right combined.)) Young Americans for Freedom is a Buckley organization, owned and controlled group. For the convenience of a few years ago was split by this very issue, which read the conservatives. (Remembering that some year the GOP convention split just as bitterly over the issue of revolutionary legislation versus personal revolt (i. e., hippie dropout, specifically on concerning or confounding drugs). The Conservatives movement is even varied than you give it credit for. This is not so now as you might think. One of the original members of the Free Speech Coalition at Berkeley was the Dr. Young Publications, which on now a conservative news outlet.

(Yes, we have them like that here too. Prof. Sidney Hook is not an outspoken defender of the rights of freedom of speech and association at college campuses, which he is apt to be challenged by the peace movement. When last heard from on issues of public policy, Hook wanted to blackball all Communists from the teaching profession.)

One argument of course is that these libertarians are liberals, the don't know it, but as a member of the group who objects violently to that some "liberals" self-proclaim as NIE are doing and have done I won't buy the label.

Treat him gently. Only he, Joseph Alsop, and John F. Roche are left out of a once mighty horde.

((In practice, I would say that about 90% of the membership of any given conservative movement consists of traditionalists who are willing to use all the force of the state to preserve some way of life that seems desirable to them. Alliances of convenience between traditionalist and libertarian Conservatives occur because the former don't trust the people who presumably exert power, and the latter don't trust anybody who exerts power. When Conservatives get power, the alliance vanishes, and libertarians form similar alliances of convenience with the liberal-to-radical groups.

((My own belief is that the state is a tool, to be judged like any other tool solely according to the use that is made of it. In 1964, when libertarian Conservatives argued against the Civil Rights Act on the grounds that it gave too much power to the federal government, they in effect allied themselves with those who believe Negroes to be a sort of upright ape. The libertarian who denies certain powers to the government leaves them to be exercised by private persons, unshocked by any consideration of the public good.))

The seat will go to Agnew, thus getting him off the 1972 ticket without causing Agnewed pain to the right-wing Republicans whose appetite for pay meat had the President specialise in satisfying.

Apparently the best way to become popular with people is to club 'em over the head. Or at least Lindsay has discovered. In 1966 he tried a legislative solution of a student strike at Columbia University, sending his police or cops to club protesters and unfortunates students alike. And then throwing a dose out of a window. As a result, apparently he found his way to becoming the most popular political figure. (The New York Times, 14 Feb. 1971) Following Lindsay were Governor Rockefeller, Mayor Koch, and Mayor John Lindsay. All of them voted for the Club of Raging Revolution.

The United Nations is currently soliciting national ratifications on a treaty banning nuclear weapons from the seabed. But the United States has refused to allow delegates of the Mongolian People's Republic to come to Washington to sign the treaty -- presumably because the Mongolian People's Republic is at least 1000 miles from the nearest seaboard. A recent issue of the New York Post showed three uniformed firemen apparently hustling three bearded, long-haired men in curious costumes through a burned-out building. In GRAUSTARK #232 I spoke of a chain of command that runs from the American and Saigonese troops in Indo-China up through the President of the United States and to the Joint Chiefs of Staff. This was not sarcasm but a recognition of how Vietnam policy is actually made. On 27 December 1965 President Johnson telephoned Washington from his ranch in Texas to ask when the pause in bombing North Vietnam is due to end. He didn't want any had to ask someone above him in the chain of command. Details of the incident will be found in Drew Pearson's recently published book The Last Great American in Vietnam.

Back in 1909 the old Santos Bazaar was in vogue a suspicion world that Japan was embarked on a policy of world conquest. HISTORY OF THE TOUR AND A BALTIC KINGDOM

V. The Fundschiruk People's Republic

In the latter part of the 8th century a horde of warrior archers entered the Balkan Passes through a mountain pass traditionally called "The Gates of Alexander's Gap" and swarmed over the eastern portions of this remote kingdom. Under the leadership of Ar-pud the Footpad they ravaged the settled peoples of the region, who learned to fear the banner of nine donkey bells. Finally the Fundschiruk were defeated by a rare show of unity among the other four peoples, and were confined to approximately their present holdings by the Battle of Bauli Bay, in which the Fundschiruk King Ualik the Ugly was slain in single combat by Sir Tindy the Purest, the greatest champion of the Knights of the Trapezoidal Table. (Various authorities place this battle anywhere from 943 to 1007, and Dr. A. Otto Ualik denies that it ever happened.)

Etymologically the Fundschiruk are related to the Hungs, the Magyars, the Turks, the Slavs, the Finns, the Lithuanians, the Ussatians, the Vlachs, and the Georgians, owing to certain customs of nomad hospitality in vogue during their days as wanderers. After a brief interregnum (1017-1345) their domain was occupied by the de Dalmatini dynasty, founded by Leo Balan Beyasid Ivan de Dalmatini, famous as the only man ever banished from Constantinople on moral charges.

For the next five centuries the Kingdom of Fundschiruk obtained a reputation as the most liberal country in Europe. This was the case not out of any abstract devotion to the principles of liberty by the de Dalmatini dynasty, but because Fundschiruk officials were either too lazy or too venal to enforce various laws restricting freedom of speech, religion, association, trade, or travel. Voltaire, who never visited the country, praised it frequently for "the breath of liberty which blows continually through the rugged hills and picturesque towns". "And through the holes in the inhabitants' clothes, across the open palms of the officials, and out of the lungs of its consumptives," Friedrich the Great is said to have responded.

With the anti-revolutionary reaction of 1849 in full swing, King Lejos VI decided to tighten up his administration. He did so, to such good effect that within ten years the revolutionary Ivo Garbul had translated the words of Marx into Fundschiruk and founded an active revolutionary movement. Successive repression, oddily enough, strengthened the revolutionaries' fervor. Through the Marshall's sent them to the gold mines, from which they smuggled out enough gold to finance a great increase in their activities. One day the King ordered them torn in pieces by wild horses, but this simply raised the price of draft horses - whose chief breeder, Dejna Garbul, succeeded her father as a leader of the revolutionary movement.

The success of a revolutionary take-over in 1902 was followed within a few months by a counter-revolution, which split the movement into six factions each of whom blamed the others for the failure. After the Russian Revolution three of these factions joined the Communist International, while the others affiliated respectively with the Socialist International, the right Anarchist Christian Marxist Anarchist Brotherhood, and the Royal Secret Police.

After the Stalin-Trotsky split, the Communist Party in Fundschiruk was taken over by the Trotskyite leader Boguslav Garbul, son of Dejna Garbul and the Crown Prince of Gore-roy. King Eustace the Useless thereafter abandoned the unequal struggle against his own incompetence and turned the government over to General Anagnostopoulos, leader of the Socialist National Iron Fist (SNIF) movement. The effectiveness of the SNIF persecution of the Garbulians can be measured in the fact that membership in the revolutionary organization rose from 700 in 1930 to 16,000 in 1945. A major role in this change was played by General Anagnostopoulos' propaganda campaign to identify all opposition to SNIF with Garbulian Communism. After the Revolution, Chairman of People's Committee Matishav Garbul credited this policy with making the Revolution possible.

Both sides ignored Fundschiruk during World War II - Hitler because he regarded the SNIF government as sympathetic to his own doctrines, and Stalin because he rejected the Garbulians as Trotskyites. (In fact, Soviet troops carefully bypassed Fundschiruk and the whole Balkan Massif during the liberation of the Balkans, lest their own be infected by Trotskyite heresies.)

The Revolution of 1947 overthrew SKOP. General Arangostopoulos died of shock when the United States refused to send aid on the grounds that Garbul was not a real Communist. The royal family fled into exile; the present pretender is a waiter at the Schlosserberst Kaffeehaus in Vienna. Matiaslav Garbul became the new Head of State; he is the son of Bogdanav Garbul and Aleksandra Kollontai.

Although professing the doctrines of Marx, Lenin, Trotsky, and Garbul (whose pictures appear at all public functions) the Pundschirukis have relapsed to many of the ways of life of the monarchy. The implementation of a Marxist economy has been hampered by the fact that the Pundschirukis have never bothered to mint or print their own money, being content to use that of neighboring countries. ("Besides," observed Treasury Minister Ivan Gotny to a reporter over the tables at Monte Carlo, "who of our own people could we trust to run the mint?")

At present Pundschiruk does not maintain diplomatic relations with any Communist state, regarding all of them as fallen away in disrepute from proper Marxist-Leninist status. A similar situation exists with the management of the city, but it has been worsened indirectly by Police Minister Straussopf's 1969 decree closing all Chinese restaurants and laundries.

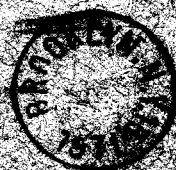
Altho among the nations of the Balkan Massif, the Pundschiruk People's Republic maintains a space program. However, this program's effectiveness is rather limited by the fact that Pundschiruk astronomy is still taught in the country's sole institution of higher education, the Academy for Trivial and Quativial Studies.

The country's capital, Grunskrup, provides examples of all schools of architecture from degenerate Rococo through Low Gothic to Stalinist Modernism, all in poor states of repair. Most commerce is routed along the Star River, which is navigable downstream. (No Pundschiruk has ever bothered to determine whether it is navigable upstream.) Principal imports are insufficiently warned tourists, and money obtained by a version of the "Spanish prisoner" swindle which can be traced back to the 11th century; principal exports are air pollution, water pollution, barbarian tracts, and epidemics.
