Then the eighth son said: I will be a Tax Collector, and will make ye to pay revenue when ye buy anything in another city, and will make ye to pay a portion of all ye produce at home, that the King may have money to gild his crown, and the General to buy powder, and the Admiral to dye his totem, and the Bishop to build a temple, and the Senator to patch his togā, and the Lawyer to pay his jurymen, and the Policeman that he may not require to commit burglary, and myself for inspecting, appraising, assessing and levying upon ye, and relieving ye of your surplus, which would cause ye much worry and bring ye into many temptations.

Then the ninth son said: I will be a Banker, and will guard your money when ye do not

need it, and will lend it to you at interest when ye do need it.

Then the tenth son said: I will be a Salesman and Advertising Expert, to cause ye to buy what ye do not require, to persuade ye to buy more than ye require, to keep ye from buying better and cheaper substitutes, and to flatter ye for the taste displayed in buying the goods that I sell.

Then the eleventh son said: I will be a Movie Actor, and will look handsome, and will drink champagne, and will have seven wives, and will never need to think, and will get a

million dollars a year to keep all other people from thinking.

Then the twelfth son said: I will be an Editor, to tell ye all about the Movie Actor's divorces, and the excellence of the motor cars the Salesman sells, and the Banker's philanthropy, and the Tax Collector's patriotic function, and the Policeman's majesty, and the Lawyer's elequence, and the Senator's wisdom, and the Bishop's holiness, and how many ships the Admiral hath sunk, and how many cities the General hath burnt, and why ye must hate the people in those ships and cities, because your King is greater than their King, and your Totem more beautiful than their Totem, and your Bishop's God more sublime than their Bishop's God. And I will explain how all this hath come to pass, which is Civilization.

Then the thirteenth son said: I know not what I shall do. For I am the thirteenth son. And the stargazers and soothsayers and wise women have declared that thirteen is an

__fortunate number.

Then his brothers of one accord said unto him: Be of good cheer, for thou art cur brother, and we will find thee something to do. The King needeth someone to keep his crown polished, and the General cannot make his own cannon. Thou mayest build a Dreadnaught for the Admiral and a Cathedral for the Bishop. Thou must vote for the Senator, and thou shalt make the cloth of the Lawyer's coat. The Policeman requireth thee to exercise his right arm, and the Tax Collector must assess some one who cannot dodge him or secure exemption. The Banker needeth thee for a depositor, and the Salesman cannot sell anything unless thou producest it. The Movie Actor must have somebody to gaze upon him; the Editor somebody to believe the words of his pen. All of them must be fed; thou shalt furnish the food. All of them must be housed; thou shalt build the homes. All of them must be warmed; thou shalt dig the coal. Thus, verily, thou dost not live in vain, even though thou art the thirteenth son!

THE DIPLOMATIC POUCH

((Dates of letters are given where known. Comments of the editor are enclosed in double brackets.))

JEREMIAH B. MODEL, 3434 20th Ave. South, Minneapolis, Minn. 55407 (20 July 1971): I find your recent opinion with respect to resistance disturbing. You feel that Kent State et al indicate that there is presently a bald violent repression of dissent going on in this country. Aside from the fact that I think this is not quite true (and this is a matter of judgment) I am puzzled at your apparent attitude in light of this: resistance is so dangerous that it is futile.

This is precisely wrong: the greater the repression the more necessary resistance is, danger or no danger. Failure to resist and acquiescence is exactly what the government would want: this behaviour insures the continuance of tyrrany. ((And of life.)) Resistance, although perhaps not always successful, admits at least some hope and some possibi-

lity of the end of the regime.

Respect for the danger involved is necessary for the success of any resistance; to

allow fear to paralyze resistance is foolish.

((Well, everyone had a fine emotional binge in May 1970 after the killings at Kent, Ohio and Jackson, Mississippi. But since then not one of the killers has so much as been arrested. All relevant law enforcement authorities up to and including the Attorney General have completely exonerated them. On the contrary, some of the survivors of these attacks have been imprisoned.

((These facts have come across to the student population, whose political activity has slacked off drastically now that the government's position is clear. It is obvious by now that the army could repeat Kent State anywhere in the country with no adverse effects at all to itself or its Commander-in-Chief. In retrospect, the peace movement can be faulted for not realizing that the government which will kill to make a war, will also

kill to preserve the war.

((For supplementary reading, look up the speech that Josephus quotes the Jewish King Herod Agrippa II as having made on the outbreak of the Jewish Revolt of 66. This speech is probably a later invention of Josephus, but it does accurately represent the views of the king and his collaborationist court. The king very soberly compares the forces available to the Roman Empire and to the Jewish rebels, and points out how nations considerably superior to the Jews in numbers, resources, and military expertise accept the Roman yoke.

((Despite this level-headed warning, the revolt went on. Its result was a massacre that the Jews took 19 centuries to recover from. Granted, the Jews of today regard Simeon bar-Giora and the other rebels as heroic martyrs, but it is easy to romanticize the virtues and sufferings of the long dead. It would not have been so pleasant to experience it in one's cwn person.

((Yet this is what the advocates of resistance would have us do today. Thank you, no.))
Some time ago you ran a contest which involved a fantasy about Nixon balling his
daughters on TV. You asked your readers to write a justification in the manner of Nixon's
usual apologists. ((This seemed reasonable, since some GRAUSTARK readers show a facility
in justifying anything that President Nixon does. Oddly enough, none of them had anything
prepared for this case.))

Your dream has come true, at least to some extent, when you think about it. Richard Nixon is visiting "The People's Republic of China". Think about it. Think about how fanciful this sounded or would have sounded last year, say. And listen to Dicky's fellow Repub-

licans! Richard Nixon, ex-pimp for Joe McCarthy, is going to Red China!

I still can't comprehend it fully.

I can't for the life of me understand either 1) what he expects to accomplish by going there; they certainly won't agree on a damn thing, and 2) how the hell does he reconcile this within the context of his political career?

I think I know why the Chinese are doing this. They don't care what if anything is

said. They just want to freak out the Russians.

((High policy is not quite this trivially grounded. Look how the alliances have been choosing up sides across Asia in recent months. On one side are the United States, China, South Vietnam, Pakistan, the fragments of SEATO, Iran, and Israel. On the other side are the Soviet Union, Japan, India, Bang-Bang-Dish, North Vietnam, and the Arab states. Into this grand design fits everything from squabbles over Persian Gulf islands to the skeptical remarks in Hanoi newspapers concerning Nixon's trip to China. Every Japanese ship that enters Haiphong Harbor and every Kalashnikov rifle that an Arab guerrilla shoots at an Israeli Socialist is part of one great, cynical monument to the memory of Nicolo Machiavelli.

((The estimated lifetime of this Grand Design is approximately equal to that of Mau

Dze-dung.))

One last remark. Rod Walker's letter in #243 was totally incredible.

First, his remarks about race war were astonishing for the blindness they display. The United States has ALWAYS been paranoid in a racist way towards the orient. Why was Japanese

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expansionism in the twenties called "Yellow Peril" while the Soviet "threat" was called Communism? Why were the Japanese interred in concentration camps while the German -Americans were allowed to run free, even if they held Bund meetings? (John, you might recall some of these in New York. What happened

to their deaders during the war, by the way?)

((I wasn't living in New York during the war; but in California. There the war was regarded as mainly against Japan; Germany was just a sideshow. Some of the Bundist leaders were indicted for sedition, but a mistrial was declared when the judge died, and the government did not prosecute again. For details about Bundist leaders and this trial, see Avedis Derounian's books <u>Under Cover</u> and <u>The Plotters</u>, published under the pen name "John Roy Carlson".))

Rod, if you can imagine the US using the atom bomb on Germany in 1945, rather than Japan; if you can see the US using napalm, white phosphorous, 2,4-D and other highly toxic defoliants and gases, if you can imagine free-fine general in Theory and hadron to the Theory and the Theor

fire zones in Tuscany and body counts in Italy, where American involvement is not inconceivable as John pointed out some issues back (("The Italian Civil War of 197X", #231)); if you can imagine all this and picture it without flinching, then I might understand why you belittle the racist opinion of this war.

But if you hesitate for one moment, if somehow defoliation of the Po or irradiation of the Rhine cause you to pause for just one small instant, then you will understand, or should, what racism and racist war is.

Do you think Richard Nixon might hesitate? How about any random senator?

((A few demurrals. First, the atomic bomb was not used against Germany solely because it did not exist when Germany surrendered on 8 May 1945. The first successful test was in New Mexico Late in July. Atomic bombs were dropped on Japan on 6 and 9 August. The enthusiasm for the war was so great, and the hatred of Germany so general, that I cannot imagine the US not using the atomic bomb on Germany had it been available.

((White phosphorous was used against Germany, as part of the so-called "R. A. F. Calling Cards". I am fairly certain that napalm was used on both Japan and Germany, and I be-

lieve that 2.4-D did not exist at that time.))

Rod's justification of the war in terms of Chinese expansionism are internally inconsistent, as well as being wrong. Consider: Rod said that Communism has nothing to do with this war. OK, then, the fact that North Vietnam is Communist and that China is Communist is irrelevant. That is just as coincidental. Now there are no Chinese troops in Indochina, as nearly everyone in the world except the most imaginative will admit. So how does this indicate that China is establishing a hegemony over Vietnam? "Oh," you say, "there may not any troops, but there are advisors, and China is aiding Vietnam." But all this means is that China and Vietnam are at most allied. They're friends. SO WHAT THE HELL IS SO GODDAMN ABNORMAL ABOUT TWO COUNTRIES WHO SHARE A BORDER AND IDEOLOGY TO BE ALLIED? Now, if you're worried about China taking over Vietnam, conquering it, so to speak, then you might have a case. The Vietnamese run North Vietnam, so this hasn't happened yet. WHEN CHINA INVADES VIETNAM, AND COL. GIAP ASKS FOR OUR AID, THEN BY ALL MEANS, LET US FEND OFF CHINA.

What we are doing, then, is going 10,000 miles and blasting the shit out of Vietnam to keep it from being friends with its neighbor, allied, if you prefer, but it is still insane. Maybe the Russians should be alarmed at the degenerating situation in Canada? After

all, the Canadians are allied with their enemy, the US!

Of course, I assume, as you have, that "Communism" is irrelevant.

The final insanity that Rod displayed was his return to the old argument that the President knows more than any of us - it's just all secret. This argument is flatly invalid and inconsistent. Consider:

The argument is given that the President has at his disposal a set of facts which undoubtedly would prove the action in Vietnam justifiable, but for reasons of security, he cannot reveal them.

These reasons are convincing and compelling, they justify the war; yet the country would be in danger if they were revealed.

So the country is not in danger now, without revealing the reasons? The secrecy and confusion have so bewildered and angered people that the country is dangerously polarized and has pockets which are on the verge of revolution. The President is assumed to be lying most of the time, and Congress is either afraid or disgusted. What danger could the revelation of these facts pose which would be so great as to cutweigh the good in uniting the country and restoring faith in the government?

A fact which might endanger our security is one which might be used against us. Are you saying that our reasons for being in Vietnam must remain secret or else somebody might use them against us? If those facts justify our actions so completely, how could they pos-

sibly be used against us?

I don't understand, Rod. You're too much.

ROD WALKER, 4719 Felton, San Diego, Calif. 92116 (10 Oct. 1971): The nice thing about Realpolitik is that it is not Traumpolitik. You ask about Pakistan, which is an interesting problem. The amazing thing about it is that East Pakistan waited so long to rise up. The Bengali of the east have little to do with the Urdu-speakers of the west save in religion. I feel reasonably certain that the Bengali will continue to press sporadically for independence until they achieve it. I suspect that this will spill across the border and take in all of Bengal - in which case, there will be an interesting struggle over Assam, Tripura, and so on.

((The Indians came in and saved the Bengalis from Pakistan. Who is going to save the

Bengalis from the Indians?))

I see no reason to interfere in all this. If the Chinese attempt to meddle, they will probably bungle it, as they are went to do. If they are successful, and even if they are ultimately not successful, we may expect the Russians to oppose them, so why should we? The question of who rules Bengal is immaterial. It is an area of enormous industrial potential, and political disorders there will retard industrialization. That may or may not be good from our point of view, but we may as well count on the retardation. The Bengali are shrewd businessmen, and if they obtained a solid, industrial base, they could give Japan and the US a sharp fight. Good, honest competition is hardly an evil, and the creation of a strong, aggressive Bengal would do much to balance things cut in the East. ((When did you ever know a trading nation to stand still for "good, honest competition" if they could possibly suppress it?)) However, since the Bengali will have to achieve this themselves—no amount of propping will do it for them— I see no reason for us to become involved in

active encouragement or support. Covert support, of course, is something else again. I sometimes think we aren't sneaky enough.

((Note: These lines were written before the Anderson Papers were revealed.))

I suggest therefore that the US should remain officially neutral, but recognize de facto any Bengali regime which gets a decent start toward control of the Gangetic Delta. In other words, we should do nothing to offend the Bengali. Once they are established, a formal, correct, and increasingly friendly embassy should be established, along with some judiciously placed bribes. If we are lucky, Bengal will sell us iron ore from their incredibly huge deposits (now in India.)

((This implies that American arms will be used to guarantee Eengali conquest of

those Indian ore deposits, and we're off and running into another Vietham.))

But why fight for (or against) the inevitable? What a waste of time and money. The great danger is that a festering Bengal situation could provoke a war between Russia and China if it were properly timed. I suppose we ought to hope for a resolution of the situation by 1980.

Isn't that awful? Realpolitik doesn't mean depending on your armies all the time after all. ((Who's going to get those iron ore deposits for your pals in Bang-Bang-Dish? Old Uncle Sucker again?)) It is I suppose wicked to suggest that the US will benefit no matter what happens in Bengal, but I think that is the case. Now, if we can just figure out a way to get Russia and China to wipe each other out without involving us - Bengal may be the ticket; who knows? ((Quite the little ray of sunshine, aren't you?)) I am sure you raively relieve that Bengal is none of our business, but that is silly. It is vitally important to us, despite our need to remain openly relatively inert.

That is the beauty of a multi-polar power balance: they also gain who also sit and wait. America needs lots of forebearance over the next decade or so, and you radical populists will be just dandy for providing the public pressure for the policies we need. If we work it right, you will help make the American Empire of the 1990s better, more co-

hesive, and more powerful than it was in the 1950s. Thanks, John. .

ROBERT BRYAN LIPTON, 556 Green Place, Woodmore, N. Y. 11598 (undated): You seem to have a talent for ignoring facts that go counter to your theories. Forces in southeast Asia now number about 200,000, which is <u>slightly</u> less than the half million peak. Buchwald had a column in which, when there is but one soldier left in southeast Asia, he attacks China. Between the fact that there are less men in the area, that deaths are down, and that expenditures are also, I would tend to stay ((sic)) that the war is winding down.

(The facts of the matter are that the Defense Department budget has been steadily rising during this alleged "US withdrawal" from Indo-China. And there are considerably more that 200,000 US troops there now. Any soldier who is paid, armed, and trained by the US is a US soldier, no matter what uniform he wears or language he speaks. "Vietnamization", as its own defenders admit, means using US resources to hire other than Americans, to keep the war going. But these men are American troops just as assuredly as the Hessians whom our ancesters whipped were British troops.))

Sidelight: Dr. Anzalone tells me that the forces in Vietnam are not the hardy warriers fighting the twenty four hour/day war that we are led to believe. They are often moved up to two hundred niles by helicopter, land at 9 AM, and are picked up at five, to "go back to their ice cream". The hardship enters in the fact that the ice cream often melts before they can get at it.

Throwing out Sihanouk; the international situation is analogous to that of the beginning of the 20th century, with it's "spheres of influence". Russia is at about the same strength, the US has replaced Britain, and Red China Austria-Hungary.

(14 Oct. 1971): You have, in all the issues of GRAUSTARK that I have read, attacked

the US government on charges of inhumanity.

Now, I will readily admit that the government is cruel. It is often inhuman. But the fact is, it's a government. I'm sure that you realize, in accordance with Finagle's law as applied to changeable systems - Any change will be bad - that any government set up to handle two hundred million people, will have to be either very centralized, as our country is becoming, or very loosely organized, as the larger states were up until about one thousand years ago - the reman empire, the Moslem domains - unless the state is led by a man with true personality.

Unfortunately, the country doesn't have that type of leader. We haven't had one in

this country, since McKinley was president. And you know how he went.

Before one complains about one system, it is really necessary to have a deep understanding of the flaws in the system, and the reason for those flaws. Your complaint seems to be that the government is repressive. Why is it repressive? Can you think of a system that can govern one fifth of a million people, with much less cruelty than this one? One that can do it better, quicker, and with less money needed. If you can, please tell me, because if you have a system that will work, I will support it wholeheartedly. (I am not being sarcastic.)

Anarchy is ridiculous. People want to be led, and will follow the first self-assertive meglomaniac who tells them what to do, whether it's shooting a dozen innocent civilians, or killing five million jews ((sic)), or disrupting all the schools in a given area, or even bitching about the government. After a while under this system, one has four or five states

living in an uneasy truce, waiting only an excuse to start a war.

I am interested, not in problems, but answers. I have problems enough. But no one seems to have any answers that will work.

((The best we can do at this stage is to specify certain things that must be avoided in statecraft. Chief among these is war. It's a negative approach, but the best available. And even this is only theoretical, since any government will decide that it's cheaper to

shoot pacifists than to make their economies independent of war.))

(18 Oct. 1971): You sound as if you are between Scylla and Charydis ((sic)): Your conscience tells you to act against a government you feel tyrannical, and your knowledge tells you that it's useless to act. Not being the martyr type, all you can do is beat your chest and shout "Mea culpa, it's not." I appreciate your dilemma, even though I don't believe that there is a solution. The Kennedy president started the build-up in earnest. Johnson continued it, and his actions in the middle part of his administration will evershadow his efforts at helping the country. (You may have forgotten that immediately following Kennedy's death; Johnson used his position to ram through a number of bills - things like the head start program - that Kennedy had been unable to get passed.) Nixon has been winding down the war: There are now less american ((sic)) deaths in viet Nam ((sic)) than in a city of the size of our forces there.

((The average bomb tonnage dropped on Indo-China by the US in Nixon's three years is

greater than the average bomb tonnage dropped during Johnson's last three years.))

(No.))
(undated): Is it necessary to be next to both the invading army and the invaded territory to support? ((No.)) For example, imagine Turkey is in Serbia and Italy is in Venice, with Austria occupying Trieste. Can the Serbian army support the Venetian army into Trieste? ((Yes, if the support is not cut by an attack on Serbia from elsewhere.))
