ARCHIE, HARRY, AND GEORGE

The US government and the news media probably have by now a settled routine for assassinations and attempted assassinations. At the first news, time is cleared on TV, pre-arranged statements which express sympathy and point to those "really" responsible are taken out of the files, and legal and medical experts are tapped for information.

It is only natural that the government and the media be prepared. They are, after all, chiefly responsible for the assassinations in the first place. When the government of the United States of America decrees that certain faraway persons whose existence inconvenience it must be killed, who can blame an introverted failure in a furnished room, or a crack-brained refugee, who decides the same thing. When the most popular television show in the country beams its message of bigotry into millions of homes, week after week, its producers are responsible for the minds that crack under this barrage.

Candid historians blame Griffiths' film Birth of a Nation and the racist writings of Madison Grant and Lothrop Stoddard for the wave of nativist and anti-Negro bigotry that swelled around 1920, producing the National Origins Quota Act and a revival of the moribund Ku Klux Klan. Julius Streicher's scurrilous rag Der Stürmer was a major factor in promoting the rise of the Nazis. And the CBS TV show All in the Family must bear the responsibility for much of the current white bias against blacks, and the black conviction that whites are unwilling to concede them the least equality.

The usual rebuttal to this accusation is that All in the Family makes fun of ethnic bigotry, that better intergroup relations in this country will follow because the star of the nation's most popular TV show makes, week after week, wisecracks about "Hebes", "Spics", "Coons", "Polacks", "Fairies", "Pinkos", and "Hippies". Are we to take this rebuttal seriously? Do you really imagine that a low-income WASP will look at All in the Family and then say to himself, "Gee, Archie made a fool of himself telling Jew jokes; maybe I'd better not do it any more."? Quite the contrary; such a viewer is more likely to sit there hollering, "Right on, Archie baby!" or whatever the Square translation of that phrase is.

What do right-wingers such as the John Birch Society really think about All in the Family? We don't have far to look, for the JBS has been quite explicit in the 26 January 1972 issue of their weekly Review of the News. Bircher Lillian Boehme says that they see Archie as "one of their own, angry and frustrated at being the fall guy for radicals and freeloaders". She is quite right in saying that "it's a pretty safe guess that Archie Bunker's huge following, to whom All in the Family is a Saturday-night institution, doesn't consist primarily of bushy-haired radicals and country-club 'Liberals' gathered to decry, debunk, and despise him in a weekly orgy of cathartic hate."

Archiemania has recently broken out in a new place. Like Elmer Zilch, Pogo, Jimmie Durante, and Pigasus J. Pig, he is now "running for the presidency". A massive tide of t-shirts, beer mugs, buttons, posters, and bumper stickers has inundated department stores and specialty shops. "The Beer Party Candidate" has such slogans as "It Might As Well Be Bunker" (with which I don't disagree) and "In Your Heart You Know He's Extremely Right". "In making Archie's intolerance socially acceptable," Harriet van Horne incisively writes, "we are easing the way for further intolerance... Archie Bunker has probably done more for bigotry and regressive thinking than anybody in America, including John Wayne and Spiro Agnew." (New York Post, 1 April 1972)

What do the media think of all this flap over All in the Family? Well, on 14 May 1972 Emmy awards were given to the show, three of its actors, the director, and the writer. Television has not only given birth to this monstrosity, but is proud of it.

Hollywood has not lagged far behind. One of the most loudly ballyhooed films of 1971 is a shoot-em-up called Dirty Harry. Its hero, a San Francisco police inspector named Harry Callahan, operates in the tradition of Mike Hammer. ("By Christ, I'm not letting the killer go through the tedious process of the law. Some snotty lawyer will screw the whole thing... I'm the law." Mickey Spillane, I, the Jury) When Harry shoots a man on suspicion, or stomps a murder suspect's wounded leg to get information from him, he becomes the hero as opposed to a bleeding-heart District Attorney who protests, "That man

had rights." "Rights," apparently, are things which keep obviously Evil people from getting What They Deserve, and the sooner we get rid of the "legal technicalities" written into the Constitution by a bunch of 18th-century revolutionaries, the better off we'll be.

The murderer, who is painted in the necessary colors by having him the patently guilty killer of women and children, gets off because Harry didn't bother with the "formality" of a search warrant. He then gets himself deliberately beaten up so he can accuse the police of "brutality". (The message is clearly intended to be that all complaints of police brutality are phony, even when the victim has the scars and bruises to prove it.)

In a stinging attack in the March 1972 issue of Civil Liberties, Gerard W. O'Connor of ACLU gets to the real point. "Dirty Harry...is not cinematic art but political propaganda. The movie attempts to wash the liberal brain and rend the middle-American heart. According to Dirty Harry, the law protects the criminally insane and punishes the aggressively virtuous. Only when an Avenger operates outside the law will justice be won...Force or violence cannot be appeased, negotiated, or reasoned with." This is

Whenever a question of the increasingly violent character of American life comes up, attention should not be allowed to stray from the fact that the biggest purveyor of violence in the world today is the government of the United States of America. The man who mugs you for heroin money probably got both his habit and his training in unarmed combat in Vietnam. The burglar who steals something convertible into eating money is unemployed because the money that could have given him a job has gone to kill Asians. The kid who slugs you for no good reason sees no future in abiding by the rules of a society which offers him only a uniform and a grave. If virtually identical candidates refuse to deal with the needs of society, frustrated men may strike them down as one strikes against a blank wall.

Violence at the top of society breeds violence at the bottom - violence from which the men at the top are not immune. During his presidency, John F. Kennedy discussed with the CIA plans for the assassination of Fidel Castro. Three weeks before his own death, a military coup under his authorization assassinated President Diem and his brother-in-law. George Lincoln Rockwell was shot dead by one of his own followers, a youth of Greek extraction whose fellow-Nazis made snide humor about his swarthy complexion. # 502

George Wallace to a great extent created the conditions which led to the attempt on his life. His public pronouncements over the years have constituted a declaration of war on the Bill of Rights, and on large ethnic and political factions. He and his followers have frequently urged violence against their opposition, and it must not be forgotten that Martin Luther King was murdered by a Wallace campaign worker. Let the record be kept clear:

"Mr. Wallace...is being haunted by a statement last year that was printed in the Times of London. The newspaper quoted him as having said that Southerners, like the British, were Anglo-Saxons, but that the North was populated by 'Poles, Italians, Germans, and other lesser breeds.'" - New York Times, 3 April 1964. See also editorial, Milwaukee Journal, 22 March 1964

"Let us rise to the call of the freedom-loving blood that is in us. In the name of the greatest people that have ever trod this earth, I draw the line in the dust and toss the gauntlet before the feet of tyranny. And I say, Segregation now! Segregation tomorrow! "I believe in free speech, but not if it disrupts the morale of the troops." - George Wallace, quoted East Village Other, 1 December 1967

BERLIN (14 May 1903): The German Foreign Office announced its intentions with regard to Italy in a special proclamation today. Chancellor von Bismuth-Bülow said, "The Italians have shown through their willingness to withdraw from the Tyrol that there is no need for saber-rattling on our part. Therefore, we have recommended to the General Staff the withdrawal of the provisional force sent to the Tyrol."

"In light of these developments in Europe, the Foreign Office, acting with the approval of the Kaiser, announces its willingness to establish new cultural contacts with both Italy and Austria in order to promote a spirit of peace among the Central Powers of Europe."

BERLIN (15 May 1903): The German General Staff announced today that the army sent to the Tyrol for joint exercises with Austria was being recalled to Germany. However, it was noted that should it again be required, the General Staff was ready to dispatch another force of equal size to the area should aggression there reoccur.

When asked about the seemingly hostile actions of the French on the border of Holland, a spokesman for the entire General Staff said, "It would be very foolish for the French to provoke us into war. Any more attacks upon the German troops in either the provinces of Germany or Germany itself would be tantamount to a declaration of war."

HYDUNDERABAD (URRP): Maharajah Kamasutra IX confirmed garbled reports from Turkey that this tiny Indian state has established a Consulate in that country. attempt to kill him I regard as bitterly ironic.

Not being in public life, I do not intend to shed hypocritical tears over the fate which befell George Wallace on 15 May 1972. He worked hard for this painful remuneration, and he deserves it all. He has not suffered anything he was unwilling to inflict on others, for he once said of demonstrators, "I think they ought to be jerked away and put under a good jail and treated and manhandled pretty roughly." (New York Times, 5 October 1968) In particular, he has made what I can only interpret as a direct threat against my life. During his last campaign, he said, "When I become your President the first thing my Attorney General will do is get an indictment against any college professor calling for a Viet Cong victory and put him under a good federal jail." (New York Post, 16 September 1968) Not in jail, mind you, but under it. As a college professor who believes that the best of several unhappy alternatives left to Vietnam is its unification under the only government capable of ruling without the support of foreign troops, I presume that I am the sort of person Wallace has in mind.

I am not disposed to think charitably about men who threaten my life. I have no regrets about the attempt to kill George Wallace, except that it was not successful. As matters stand now, we are likely to be worse off than before. At present Wallace has all the advantages of being a martyr, and of being alive. If the vicious may be compared with the honorable, he is a sort of southern equivalent of the 19th-century abolitionist martyr Charles Sumner, with all of Sumner's drive and rancor.

If by some combination of fanaticism, money, and pity George Wallace should become President of the United States, we cannot excuse ourselves by pleading ignorance of his plans. He is quite candid about what he believes, and what he will do to us if he becomes President. And, if he does, we'll deserve it.

THE RIP-OFF ROLL - IV

PAUL J. WOOD, 24613 Harmon, St. Clair Shores, Mich. 48080 (5 May 1972): I've got a real winner for your "Rip Off Roll" column. I've been meaning to write to you about this long ago, but the longer I wait, the better it gets.

The matter involves the entry by John Van De Graf and myself in a Youngstown Variant game started in John Mensinger's World News and War Report. We each paid \$3.25 for entry into his game and have received a total of two issues since sending our money in October, 1971. A chronology of events is given below to illustrate our point:

October 1971: Received a complimentary copy of issue #5 of WN&WR. This issue had just been sent but was labeled "September 1971", and inside it was explained that it was a month late and this might happen once in a while. We were a bit apprehensive about sending the money but Mensinger told me he would refund our money if it happened very often and we didn't like it. How could we lose? (HAI!)

December 1971: Issue #6 arrived. A month late again. I called Mensinger and asked for a refund but since it was on the way I said I would wait out another time since he promised a refund for sure if it was late again. The Youngstown game started with this issue.

February 1972: Finally received issue #7 (renamed Running River #1). The issue was dated January but wasn't received until February 13; deadline for next turn's move was, get this, January 30, 1972. Another call (I have a WATS line at work) uncovered the fact that the Postal Service had screwed up and we would receive a note extending the deadline until February 29. Naturally, no note was received.

March, 1972: I wrote a letter to the Gamesmaster asking for a refund and sent a copy to our "new Gamesmaster", Ben Goss. As I mailed my letter, an in-between-issue came which stated that a new publisher (Goss) would be putting out the games. Mensinger would still be Gamesmastering some of them, but Goss would now be in charge. In the issue, all players were asked to send in a copy of their last moves so he could continue the games (asking for repeat moves not only means they lost the old ones, it just isn't fair). Besides, the issue was postmarked March 23, and he wanted the moves in by March 28 or 30 (depending on the game you were in).

May 1972: No word. No new issue or moves or anything. Not even a cover-up issue.

this time. It has been a month and a half since hearing from them despite both of us writing and asking for a refund.

To sum it up: we have received two issues since sending in our entry fees in October. We have asked repeatedly for a refund but have either been given lame excuses or received no answer at all. Other players in the game are disgusted too. We are initiating a petition to get a new Gamesmaster, and we hope to also get a refund on the portion not spent on the two issues.

I hope you can publish this in GRAUSTARK as a warning to other players as you have done for others in the past. I guess what really kills me is that they are still advertising game openings. They aren't even responsible enough to handle the ones they've got let alone try for more. This is why a warning is needed. Gamesmasters involved with this publication are John Mensinger, someone named Frame, Ben Goss, and Bill Roche. 'Zine titles that have been used are World News & War Report, Running River, and The Monthly Zap. A total of eleven games are covered by these guys (or maybe really only one). At their current rates, someone has pocketed \$137.50. Not bad for a few hours' work.

((No, indeed; it's more than Hankin and Peery together stole. Space will be available in the next GRAUSTARK should any of the accused persons wish an opportunity for rebuttal. Failing this, GRAUSTARK suspends trade relations with WN&WR and its successors.))

THE DIPLOMATIC POUCH

CONRAD von METZKE, P. O. Box #342, San Diego, Calif. 92102 (12 May 1972): GRAUSTARK #264 showed up today - five days transit. Oh, we do have a yokel P. O.

Your postal synopsis, p. 9, is moderately inaccurate. Let me offer the following corrections:

1. All mail to Canada and Mexico goes by domestic rates in all cases EXCEPT PARCEL POST, and only up to a point. The one-dollar maximum letter rate (under 1 pound) is not true of Canada and Mexico. In these cases the progression goes 8¢ (or 11¢ air) per ounce, no maximum cut-off.

2. Third class domestic mail may indeed be sealed, provided one endorses the item "third class" on the address face. This does not apply to foreign.

3. There is indeed a "third class air mail" rate for foreign. (Not for domestic; you're right there.) It's the A. O. rate, "air ordinary", commonly referred to as the small packet rate. For most of Europe the rate is 50¢ first 2 oz., 2¢ each addl. 2 oz., maximum 2 lbs. for most countries. Russia, Asia, Africa, and Pacific rate 60¢ first 2, 30¢ addl. 2. Mexico and Latin America are lower but I've forgotten the specifics. No such rate to Canada. Must be unsealed and endorsed "Air Printed Matter", "Small Packet", "A. O.", or a combination.

((Many thanks for this information. However, the general postal rate increase which will apparently take place later this year may change many of these rates. Though I have heard a 9¢ per ounce rate mentioned for first-class domestic surface mail, a postal clerk with whom I talked last week said he believed it would be to 10¢, and before the end of the year. The United Nations Postal Administration has announced that it will not retire its 13¢ air mail stamp, formerly the rate for international air postcards and aerogrammes. This, the UNPA said, is in anticipation of new US rates - presumably meaning that 13¢ per ounce will be the new domestic air rate for first-class mail. Previous rumors had made this increase only to 12¢. So, since a 7¢ stamp will shortly be introduced, the new rates are apparently going to be 7¢ for postcards, 10¢ an ounce for first-class surface mail, and 13¢ an ounce for air mail.

((Present postcard rates, which I inadvertently left out of last issue's listings, are 6¢ for domestic surface, 9¢ for domestic air, 10¢ for international surface, and 15¢ for international air. Aerogrammes are also 15¢.))

MARK MURRAY, 12 Shawomet Ave., Warwick, R. I. 02889: Can an army be conveyed by a fleet in a port (e. g., A Nap-Tus; F Rom C A Nap-Tus)? Can an army be conveyed through Constantinople or Kiel? ((No.))

I think you have read too much into Nixon's toast in Shanghai (GRAUSTARK #261). Just because the United States expresses "dedication to a principle" doesn't mean it's going to do anything if the principle is violated. We are dedicated to the principles of "democracy" and self-determination, for instance, but at the same time support Portugal, Greece, and Pakistan, to name a few. We do what is in our national interest (not necessarily a bad thing), and in any conflict between our interests and our principles, interests will usually triumph. In my humble opinion, we (and the world) will have much to lose in a Russo-Chinese war, and for that reason should try and prevent it or, if worse comes to worse, stay out of it. I don't think any U. S. President is going to be so stupid as involve us in a Russo-Chinese war, regardless of what "principles" he has dedicated us to. The toast was more likely intended as a propaganda ploy to dissuade the Kremlin from doing anything naughty, and nothing more. "Unqualified pledge" indeed!

Besides, you know how Nixon lives up to his principles.

I don't suppose I've convinced you of anything, as you seem determined to read the most absurd things into news items so that they will support your opinions. But you do act as a catalyst of sorts, and therefore make GRAUSTARK a most interesting 'zine. Your political views can be termed blessings in disguise.

((This letter raises a frequent issue: To what extent can the words of a public figure be regarded as statements of his intention? I have frequently had occasion to use a man's words against him, and when this happens one of his admirers will inevitably pop up and say, "He really didn't mean that, you know". I prefer to give a man the benefit of the doubt. Unless he has an open and notorious record of acting in opposition to his words, I tend to take the word as an expression of the thought. This is particularly true if, as with Richard Nixon, the deeds agree with the words. I don't think we've had a President since Herbert Hoover whose performance in office agrees so well with his campaign speeches, or whose deeds are in such harmony with his words. He is thus greatly to be preferred to such a man as Woodrow Wilson, whose words and deeds during the American invasion of Siberia have been a frequent topic of discussion in these pages recently. While Wilson spoke for non-intervention, his deeds and those of his subordinates strongly supported anti-Soviet intervention.

((Eight years ago, during the Goldwater primary campaign in New Hampshire, a young Goldwater campaigner fretted to his superiors in horrified tones that the reporters were taking down every word the candidate was saying. Those sayings eventually helped defeat him. I have no doubt that I will get similar complaints about the George Wallace remarks cited elsewhere in this issue. And then of course there is George McGovern, desperately trying to make everyone forget that he has a record of support for the American invasion of Vietnam that is almost as long as the casualty list. You should hear the local McGoverniks hem and haw when I cite the evidence for this!))
