Minister of Exports and Imports: "Our manufacturers just weren't prepared for this change. The Chancellor admonished any other country to refrain from aggression against Germany, clse full retri-

bution would be extracted.

ANAKHIT, SKANDALUTZ (URRP): There was mixed reaction in the Balkan Massif to the new government reported in England. The Queen of Skandalutz extended the warmest greetings to "Our Most Royal Brother, or Sister, or whatever, of England", and recalled that many gentlemen of his persuasion are enrolled in the Titanian Guard, whose duty it is to keep the King of Skandalutz from escaping his ritual obligation to be sacrificed to the Mother Goddess at the Winter Solstice festival. However, the reaction of the Prayoslavnian Patrimony of Polykarp was quite the opposite. The Patriarch announced that all Englishmen would be expelled from his country, "And we'll be glad to see the backs of them." In the Temporary Roman Empire, the Emperor Titanus Limpristus approunced his intention to make an immediate State Visit to England. was delayed, since the two countries went to war with each other yesterday.

LONDON, GREAT BRITAIN (IDUNNO): The British Government today announced the receipt of peace terms from the tyrannical Waj of Germany, asking England not to oppose German occupation of the North Sea. His Majesty agrees to this request if German fleets will permit British forces to move into Kiel, Munich, Berlin, Denmark, Holland, Paris...

LONDON, GREAT BRITAIN (British Press Agency (no wash and wear)): His Majesty, Robert, King of the British Nation, noted today that there seemed to be an attempt by the soi-disant 'Great Powers' to eradicate all nations whose rulers had any experience in war. Since even the superbly trained British forces cannot long hold out against the hordes of Russia and the whores of Germary, plans are being made to move to the United States. In the meantime, the Austrian Covernment, another victim of this international conspiracy, is invited to Britain to set up a government in exile. Meanwhile, the British Government wishes the Government of France luck, even if it was a lousy ally.

HYDUNDERABAD (United Rabble Rousing Press): Maharajah Kamasutra IX, absolute ruler of this small Indian state, today announced that the United States is going to come to the aid of his government against the subversive Peristaltic Movement, headed by the guerrilla leader Pandit the Bandit. "What factors will determine the side on which the U.S. intervenes?"

"Where we can get the best deal," Kissantell replied. "If we intervene on the stronger side, it will be over too soon, and we'll have to go back to a peacetime economy. The last time the U. S. had a peacetime economy was in the 1930's, and you know what things were like then. The difficulty in Hydunderabad is that both sides are so weak that it's hard to tell where we should intervene."

"Does the U. S. have any other interventions planned?"

"Well, for domestic purposes we'd like to get something going in a civil war in an African country. Then half the American people would approve because we're saving blacks, and the other half would approve because we're killing blacks."

At this point Kissantell called off the news conference to arrange a meeting with representatives of two feeding African tribes. Curiously, both had sent attractive young female ambassadors.

President Nixon gave the Chinese People's Republic a pair of muskoxen. To the Soviet Union he gave a chess set - a contrast which tells us a lot about those two countries and the estimation in which the United States holds them. The chess set was designed by Harry Burger Jr., and was inspired by the Nine Heroes Tapestries displayed in the Cloisters here in New York City.

The pieces are from 5 to 7 inches high, but the story (New York Times, 29 May 1972) did not say how the chessmen illustrate the Nine Heroes myths. They were done in porcelain. "Half the set is done in shades of pink and red, the other in blues and turquoise."

For those who want to speculate on how the set looks, the Nine Heroes or Nine Worthies were heroes selected by medieval mythographers as the summit of human virtues. Just to make them strictly symmetric, there were three pagans (Hector, Alexander, and Julius Caesar), three Jews (Joshua, David, and Judas Maccabeus), and three Christians (Arthur, Charlemagne, and Godfrey of Bouillon). In the tapestries, among the oldest which survive, they are represented in medieval European costume, surrounded by courtiers and soldiers from which the pawns of the set would probably be taken.

"In Lisbon when heretics were publicly burned, it sometimes happened that one of them, by a particularly edifying recantation, would be granted the boon of being strangled before being put into the flames. This would make the spectators so furious that authorities had great difficulty in preventing them from lynching the penitent and burning him on their own account. The spectacle of the writhing torments of the victim was, in fact, one of the principal pleasures to which the populace looked forward to enliven a somewhat drab existence. I cannot doubt that this pleasure greatly contributed to the general belief that the burning of heretics was a righteous act.

"The same sort of thing applies to war. People who are vigorous and brutal often find war enjoyable, provided that it is a victorious war and that there is not too much interference with rape and plunder. This is a great help in persuading people that wars are righteous." - Bertrand Russell

One of the Ecofreaks' current causes is the replacement of the internal combustion engine with a gas turbine engine which will allegedly run our motor vehicles with much less air pollution. An experimental gas turbine car costing \$250,000, part of a federal testing program costing \$500,000, is now being tried in New York City. Its proponents have high hopes for the vehicle, if anyone can manage to get it started. (New York Times, 29 May 1972) So far it has broken down eight times since the experiments began in February.

"In a dozen years of visiting the United States I have never known a time when I have been so conscious of a smouldering resentment burning away beneath the surface. It is almost as if all the less privileged now accept that life is stacked against them - that wherever the 'breaks' may go, they will never be allowed to fall into the lap of the little man. Under Lyndon Johnson there may have been despair but the despair was there because people had once had expectations. Under Richard Nixon few of those survive, and, consequently, if there is calm there is also total despondency.

"It is a despondency, too, of a particularly bitter variety...Perhaps for the first time in American history there is a growing belief that if you begin in rags you will always stay in them; if, on the other hand, you start with riches you will never lose them."

grift News and Tradition

After my article "The American Blimps" appeared in the last GRAUSTARK, a few readers have asked what became of the English branch of this celebrated military family. CoT. Marmaduke Hereward Blimp is now in command of Her Majesty's Umpty-third Regiment of Foot ("the Royal Patagonians") at Derry, Ulster. And his son, Maj. Hereward Marmaduke Blimp, whose birth was mentioned in the 1912 London Times item quoted by Graves, is en loan from the British Army as a special confidential military adviser to the Pakistani Army.

One sharp-eyed reader noted that the Civil War Blimp was recorded as having enlisted in the Confederate Army right after "Fort Summer was fired on". "Don't you mean Fort Sumter, in South Carolina?" Not at all. The first shots of the Rebellion were fired en 1 April 1861, Il days before the action at Fort Sumter. This action took place at a still in the mountains of what is now West Virginia, where an Internal Revenue agent named Wendell Lloyd Brown was trying to break up a moonshining ring. Finding the local mountaineers hostile, he deputized six black freedmen, seized the still, and named it. Fort Summer after the Abolitionist Senator who was beaten and crippled on the floor of the Senate by a southern Representative. The local moonshiners organized a raid on the Fort, but were driven off when Brown dug a trench around the position, filled it with the produce of the still, and lit it.

The past few years have seen some expertly prepared and executed political congames. In 1960 John Kennedy made much capital of a "missile gap" which proved later to have existed only in his imagination. In 1964 Lyndon Johnson successfully passed himself off as a peace candidate. In the subsequent years, liberal Democrats made much political advantage out of opposing a war that had been planned and executed entirely by liberal Democrats. And in 1968 Richard Nixon gained the presidency with a secret plan to end the war that never existed.

But George McGovern is putting all these efforts into the shade. Even as he makes his pilgrimage to the latest Holy Place of the Democratic Party - George Walface's bed side - he has managed to persuade millions of voters that he is a true lover of peace. His words have thus managed to persuade people that his deeds did not exist; or are capable of some innocent interpretation. He voted for the war in August 1964, and in 1967 he voted against a repeal of this "Gulf of Tonkin Resolution". He voted in favor of the Selective Service Act in 1967, and in the same debate voted against reducing the term of service, and against allowing registrants to be represented by attorneys in appeals. He refused Daniel Ellsberg's request to make the Pentagon Papers public. His New York City boss, Councilman Troy; is the head of something called "Support America's Vietnam Effort" ("SAVE", isn't that cute?), and has urged that peace demonstrators be beaten up.

Naturally, since the American people aren't buying this sort of war-mongering any more, McGovern and his supporters claim that he's had a "change of heart". But then, so do Humphrey and Nixon. Big deal.

Even when he urges getting out of Vietnam, McGovern sees nothing wrong in the policy that led to Vietnam and threatens to lead to more. Referring to the Thieu regime, he said: "If you are in a business that is bankrupt, you liquidate the firm instead of prolonging the agony." But he is quite willing to start up "the firm" in another part of the world, the Middle East, say. "I think that the granting of American military sales and credit sales is the least we could do. I have no moral problem at all in supporting jet aircraft sales to Israel." (New York Times Magazine, 21 Manch 1971; A. D. A. World, February 1972).

There are also disquieting rumors that McGovern is cuddling up to Mayer Daley and his bloc of 59 "unpledged" delegates. Any Daley deal would be a cynical break of faith with the peace demonstrators who were clubbed senseless by Daley's cops during the carefully choreographed nomination of Hubert Humphrey four years ago.

No rumor, but a sad fact, is the cynical deal now under way between McGovern and the forces behind George Wallace. (New York Times, 21 May 1972) McGovern will back the Wallace delegates if they decide to appeal to the convention floor their minority reports in various committees. According to McGovern's campaign manager, Frank Mankiewicz, "The Platform Committee requires a 10% dissent to file a minority report. And if he doesn't have 10% I'm inclined to give it to him. We'll just take some of our delegates and say, 'We'll join in your dissent so you can get your minority report to the floor.'" This means that, thanks to George McGovern, we will be treated to a full-scale debate on the floor of the Democratic Convention on whether Negroes are entitled to civil rights...this 24 years after the Biemiller Resolution, 18 years after the school desegregation decision, and f years after the passage of the Civil Rights Act.

(Nor is this part of an "anti-Establishment" alliance between McGovern and Wallace; according to the Harris Poll, "Humphrey was more the beneficiary than McGovern among voters whose first choice was Gov. George Wallace", by a 3-2 margin. (New York Post, 1

June 1972))

But, if McGovern is the latest front-runner in the political confidence racket, a new entry is breathing hot at his heels. Former Attorney-General Ramsey Clark, retired wire-tapper and prosecutor of Benjamin Spock, is trying to pass himself off as a champion of civil liberties. Obviously, if Nixon is re-elected, Clark is trying to get the reversion of liberal Democratic loyalties for 1976. Failing this lovely goal, there at least might be his old job back in a McGovern or Humphrey cabinet. Towards this end, he has produced a snowstorm of junk mail under the letterhead of the "Law Students Civil Rights Research Council". In the last few months I have received 8 or 10 of these appeals, professing to state Clark's concern for the legal rights of the poor.

When he was in office, it was a different story. "On Necember ? ((1967)), a highly publicized joint statement was released over the signatures of Attoryey General Ramsey Clark and General Hershey, announcing formation of a special unit in the Criminal Division... to speed up investigations and prosecutions of of vicilations of the Selective Service Act and related statutes... with special attention to violations of the 'counsel, aid, or abet' provision. " - Jessica Mitford, The Trial of Dr. Spock, p. 55.

"When McGovern was asked whether he 'could imagine Wallace holding a post in a Mc-Govern Administration,' he made it clear that he would not 'compromise his own positions'. But he added, 'If in the interest of national unity there was a role he could play, I wouldn't rule that out.'" - Clayton Fritchey, New York Post, 31 May 1972

"Robert Simpson, head of the National Hurricane Center, says that the 1972 hurricane season starts today." - New York Times, 1 June 1972

That evening President Nixon addressed a joint session of Congress. Do you suppose he was exercising the presidential prerogative of throwing out the first gust of wind?

"The Secret Service, in its desperate efforts to prevent political assassinations, keeps a close watch on more than 400 organizations, ranging from the Women's Liberation Movement to the Chinese Hand Laundry Alliance.

"The only trouble: a federal study of 81 assassination attempts reveals that the assailants were loners, not joiners. For instance, Arthur Herman Bremer...doesn't appear in the Secret Service's computerized files of 180,000 potential assassins." - Jack Anderson, New York Post, 31 May 1972

Perry Silverman, who resigned from 1971EB two weeks ago, has undertaken, a rather more momentous project. He is rathing a book on the dynamics of campus unrest.

"In a test of ZIP codes, six Associated Press bureaus nationwide mailed nearly eight hundred test letters to various other bureaus last week. Results: & times out of ten the

letters arrived at their destinations as fast or faster than ZIP coded letters mailed at the same time and place. Significantly, a similar survey conducted fifteen months earlifer resulted in approximately the same conclusions.

"In addition, the survey also indicated that spending the extra three cents for airmail doesn't necessarily guarantee quicker delivery. In 45 percent of the cases the airmail letters arrived at their destination at the same time as first class mail." -Metropolitan Review, 1 June 1972

"It has been said that to be elected President of the United States, one must occupy the middle of the road and middle-of-the-road candidates have been defined as men who do not want to make substantial changes in American life. In an essay of 25 words or less, explain why an electorate which is so vocally unhappy with so many aspects of American life prefers to vote for candidates who promise not to change anything " - " Russell Baker, New York Times, 1 June 1972

"Outside the US government, what is the biggest and most dedicated pro-war organization in America?" The answer to that one, in case you were wondering, is the AFL-CIO.

Our Boys in Plue (Collars) recently lost another one, but it wasn't for lack of trying. An organization headed by former Senator Gruening took a 2-page ad in the New York Times of 31 May 1972, advocating the impeachment of President Nixon for the various "high crimes and misdemeanors" involved in his Vietnam policy. But the advertisement nearly didn't get printed, because the Times' pressmen tried to get it removed or, failing that, threatened a wildcat strike. They finally printed it, "working under protest".

One anti-war action that everyone can perform with ample opportunity and little trouble is to cross an AFL-CR) union's picket line. Try it - you'El like it.

Ever since the US re-discovered China, there has been much talk in the press about the "marvels" of acupuncture. Recently these were explored - in the "First Western Remisphere Conference on Acupuncture, Kirilian Photography, and the Human Aura". Any questions? (Metropolitar Review, 1 June 1972)
