



THE MINISTRY OF MISCELLANY

Sometimes it seems a little futile to write satire for this publication. The actual course of events far outstrips anything that could occur to the satirist.

The latest evidence that truth is stranger than satire is an attempt to promote President Nixon for the 1972 Nobel Peace Prize. This amazing display of arrogance seems to have originated in the office of Senator Hugh Scott, the minority leader. (Michael Blaine, Village Voice, 13 July 1972; Mary McGrory, New York Post, 5 August 1972) Scott's press secretary, Robert Hetherington, is putting together evidence to submit on behalf of this claim. "The man has really moved in the direction of closing things off," he says, "I mean, people are still being killed in accidents or crossing the street... It's not exactly the same thing but I do think the war will be significantly scaldd down." The hope is to get the award announced, not as usual in February, but in October, just before the election.

Naturally, Scott's seconder is Secretary of Defense Laird. Their line of argument will compare what peaceful Nixon did, to what he might have done - H-Bombs on Hanoi and the rest of it. However, as Ms. McGrory points out, this line of argument puts forth an even stronger claim for Lyndon

Johnson!

Part II

When we left Our Herces, John and Red were plodding through the trakkless wastes of United States interventionist policy in the Russian Civil War of 1917-20. Attempting to reconstruct the crime, John claimed that the United States was an accomplice in the effort to rape the Russian Revolution. On the contrary, Rod said that Great Britain, France, and Japan were the criminals, and that the United States were merely advising Russia to "Lie still and enjoy it". As we rejoin them, Rod is sending a succession of letters containing exhibits designed to prove his point. John is taking the exhibits and entering them to prove his case.

Walker's letters are in quotation marks, and my comments are in double parentheses.

The first part of this discussion appeared in GRAUSTANK #270.

((29 April 1972)) "Again I repeat, if you wish to discuss an academic problem, try using some academically respectable sources. Whatever you've been mucking around in can't

even get its dates right."

((Walker's objection here is chiefly to The Great Conspiracy by Michael Sayers and Alfred E. Kahn. This book, though written in a flambouyant style, is copiously documented from just the sort of 'academically respectable sources' that Walker demands. As far as I know, the only error of import in it is the authors' contention that the Tukhachevsky letters were genuine. Only years after the writing of this book, 1946, did it come out that they were forgeries engineered by Reinhardt Heydrich to make it appear that the Soviet General Staff was in cah ots with Hitler.

((The reas n that "the Sayers & Kahn book is not taken seriously in the academic community" is that it does not endorse the Sinister-Monolithic-International-Communist-Con-

spiracy viewpoint that until recently was dominant in academic circles.))

((23 May 1972)) Re: the Siberia thing (#204). What is there to respond to? You are not interested in truth. You are merely interested in bolstering a preconceived polemical position without any regard to whether it is right or wrong or what. Any fool can run through miscellaneous books and yank stuff out of context." ((These last three words are a favorite resort of a man bested in argument on the evidence.)) "Any teeny-bopper can do that, and your methods are no better. Nor is your position on the matter. You may or may

not be a good physicist, but you are no historian, so why pretend? "The fact of the matter is indisputable clear. The Allied Intervention in Siberia was decided upon by England, France, and Japan over the objections of Wilson. He agreed to it only after it was clear that it would take place anyway, partly to preserve the unified front of the Allies (although the U. S. was only an 'Associated Power') and partly to make sure that he had some hand in preventing a partition of Russia. Every scholar who has examined this question has come to the same conclusion: Unterberger, Kennan, Fischer, White, Link, Filene. Even Gordon Levin and Arno Mayer, the leading revisionist historians, have had to conclude that Wilson's antipathy for Bolshevism made it impossible for him to counter Anglo-Japanese imperialism by supporting Lenin's government (as Jullitt had recommended), and that he was therefore forced to employ American power directly, and in Russia, for this purpose. This conclusion is, I believe, quite accurate. Wilson did not want a partition of Russia, and he had only two ways of preventing it: aid the Bolsheviks or interpose American power in such a way as to seem to be cooperating with the Allies but in fact interfering with them. He was in no mood to take the former course, not only because he despised the Bolsheviks, but because he could not afford to break up the anti-German alliance over an issue of marginal importance but on which the French were adament,

"I realize that this does not fit your preconceived notions of what happened. The least you can do is follow Mark Twain's dictum of getting your facts straight before you distort them according to your pleasure. Your problem is that you view history in the same way Anthony Comstock viewed literature and art. I am truly sorry for you.

((10 June 1972)) "No doubt you are capable of taking whole pages out of context. In the Siberian case, you seem to be sticking to sentences and paragraphs. Nothing you have quoted casts the least light on Wilson's motivations, and the intimferences you have drawn

are usually incorrect.

"I believe you should learn to distinguish between the North Russian and the Siberian affairs. American forces in North Russia were entirely under British command, and were in the area upon the invitation of the Arkhangel'sk and Murmansk soviets - governmental bodies which even Lenin recognized as legitimate until they decided to oppose him."

((As Walker and I have both pointed out, the basic elements of American policy in the Russian intervention were laid out in President Wilson's memorandum of 17 July 1918. They included a support of the Czech Legion against its enemies - which in practice at that date meant the Bolsheviks, since the Czechs had just seized Vladivostok from the Bolshevik government. At that time the Czechs were working with Admiral Kolchak's counter-revolutionary government, variously seated at Samara, Omsk, or wherever the Bolsheviks hadn't come yet. General Graves, in charge of the Siberian operation, gave the memorandum a very restrictive interpretation, and when the State Department told him to support Kolchak, he replied that he was under the jurisdiction of the War Department. (See GRAUSTARK #264 for this material.) Colonel Stewart, who commanded the 339th Regt. in North Russia, did not interpret his orders quite so rigorously, and turned the whole operation into an anti-Bolshevik crusade.

((Public Law 86-90, passed by Congress in 1959, delineates the regions into which the USSR is to be partitioned. Every year on the anniversary of its passage it is reaffirmed and commemorated by the US government. The USSR, naturally, regards it as an important proof of the aggressive intent of the US towards their country. What would be the effect in this country of a decree of the Supreme Soviet that the US be partitioned among Mexico, Cuba, the Kingdom of Hawaii, the Republics of Texas, California, and Indian Stream, and a couple dozen Indian tribes?))

((4 August)) Still grasping at straws, I see. Now that you have found out that the "Baker" quote was by Wilson, let me give you its real name. It is part of the "Aide-Memoire" ((translated into English as "memorandum" in Part I of this colloquy)) which Wilson wrote on Siberia. It had nothing to do with North Russia, so your fantasies about how it might be interpreted on the Murmansk front barely qualify as useless.

Now, as to your apparently favorite line, about "joining their Slavic kinsmen". Yes, indeed. Wilson meant, as the context and relavent ((sic)) documents make clear, the so-called "Slavic Legion" on the Western front. He did not mean the Kolchak forces, as the documents of the period also show - Wilson was adamant that the Czechs must move east.

((At the time the cited memorandum was written, the Grechs had just scized control of Vladivostok. "Move cast"? Swimming is not an accom-

plishment much cultivated in landlocked Czechoslovakia.))

If you believe Semyonov (or Kalmykov) worked for Kolchak, or was even considered as working for Kolchak, you're crazy. He established his own "independent" government (at Chita and elsewhere). Kolchak hated Semyonov and constantly intrigued to get rid of him. ((Eisenhower wasn't too fond of Patton and Montgomery either.)) And if you think Ungarn-Stornberg typifies anything but Ungarn-Stornberg, you are also crazy. Your willful misinterpretations of history are pathetic - but funny.

THE DIPLOMATIC POUCH

WILLIAM F. DEBERG, WO, OPS Dept., 485-42-1621, USS Oklahoma City (CLG-5), FPO San Francisco, Calif. 96601 ((7 June)): I have recently joined The Diplomacy Association. In my letter requesting membership I mentioned that replicas of the diplomatic crests printed on stationery or made up as rubber stamps would add much of an authentic air to playing the game. Mr. Beshara recommended that I write you as "a pro in that area".

The problem for me is one of locating samples suitable for photo copy of the authentic diplomatic stationery of each country in the pre-1914 period. My sources here aboard

ship are limited.

It would be desirable to design the crests using the eriginal patterns yet leave some means of permitting each player to add some motto or personal touch to set him apart and avoid any possible conflict over copyright or possible confusion between games.

To reduce cost it would be desirable to have the crests suitable for making into rubber stamps for envelopes or persons like myself who do not have access to printing facilities.

Any assistance you can give me in locating suitable copies of the eriginal crest would be greatly appreciated. If I do manage to come up with a workable system I will submit it to The Diplomacy Association in article form for general player comment.

((I have already made what answer I can to W. O. DeBerg's query, and ask other

readers of GRAUSTARK to do the same.))

JOHN PIGGOTT, Jesus College, Cambridge, CB5 6BL, England: The ((postal code)) system is being phased in ever a number of years, and I think Beaconsfield ((where Hartley Patterson lives)) will be one of the last places to get one. It may interest you to know that London postal clerks are being advised to ignore the post codes of incoming letters for the moment, instead to use the old postal district designations which are far simpler to use.

((The Canadian postal code system is also being introduced region by region, by contrast with the US ZIPCode system which was installed everywhere at the same time.))

Accordingly, I think it would be desirable for players to know exactly when you will be reachable, and when possible, when you won't be (I notice you have done this before). It might help if, perhaps, you periodically published your hours on Friday night and Saturday morning. Despite my complaints, you are doing a basically very good job of CM'ing, and I am enjoying playing in your game.
