BLACK FOREST (March 15, 1906): Richard Niksohn, visiting royalty from Amerika 1972 and local agent of the lord Saurohn, has offered Kaiser Gutgulf the services of his lord in the war against the English infidels. Albeit hesitant to accept such aid (association with Niksohn and Saurohn is said to warp the mind, along with other harmful side effects), Gutgulf noted that they are fitting partners to pit against the recently acquired allies of England (word has it that King Lipson followed the advice of his disgruntled subjects, went to the suggested place, and enlisted the aid of the hordes of Hades).

Gutgulf, however, complained that Lipson's terms of allegiance were much less demanding than his own; whereas Lipson was required only to sign a standard lease on his karma, Gutgulf must wear two tokens of his new allies: a Spiro T. watch, noted for putting its foot in its mouth every hour, and a cheap ring with a tendency to become invisible.

DIPLOMACY ASSOCIATION'S FIRST POSTAL DIPLOMACY WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNEY

1. Forty-nine entries will be seeded into seven games. The purpose of seeding the players is to divide, as equally as possible, the strongest players among the seven games, to avoid having any two players from the same area and to avoid collusion. Each of the winners of the seven games will then compete in the finals for the honor of being Diplomacy's World Champion.
2. There will be one or more additional games to provide alternate winners to play in the finals, if there are stalemates in any of the first seven games, and to be standbys in the finals.
3. Rules: (1) The rules will be essentially those of the 1971 Rulebook with some variations. (2) Anyone is eligible to compete. (3) There will be at least one standby player for each game. (4) The games will be conducted in Atlantis by Gamesmaster Chris Schleicher. (5) In the event of any disputes, clarifications, or modifications of any nature during the contest, the final arbiter will be the Chairman of the Board of THE DIPLOMACY ASSOCIATION, John J. Beshara.
4. Prizes: (1) Winners of all games and the best player in all stalemated games receive their choice of a wargame manufactured by Games Research Inc., through the courtesy of its President, John R. Moot. (2) For the World Champion, a beautiful, engraved trophy donated by John Beshara; a free entry in one game each in GRAUSTARK, Liaisons Dangereuses, Atlantis, and Erewhon given by John Boardman, Len Lakofka, Chris Schleicher, and Rod Walker respectively; a free entry in the next Hoosier Archives multiple winner trophy game, courtesy of Walt Buchanan; a one year subscription to Boast and Stench given by Herb Barents; plus valuable surprise prize donated by THE DIPLOMACY ASSOCIATION. (3) Herb Barents is giving the runner-up a one year subscription to Boast and is also giving a free game in Boast to the first player eliminated in each of the first seven games, "so losers may be winners too". This organization of postal and over-the-board Diplomacy fans assists new players to get started in the game. WAZIR #4 contains an article on the design of the game-board by Diplomacy inventor Allan B. Calhamer, a continuation of the discussion on stalemate positions, an interpretation of the convoy rules (which often present puzzles to new players), and an article on "Fallacies of Ratings and Polls" by Dick Miller. "THE WITCHES ARE COMING! THE WITCHES ARE COMING!"

"You shall not allow a sorceress to live." - Exodus 22:18

"Witchcraft actually did exist and was widely practiced in seventeenth-century New England." - Chadwick Hansen, Witchcraft at Salem, 1969

By the beginning of the eighteenth century, educated opinion in Europe was beginning to reject the fanciful tales of witchcraft which had until then been widely believed. The entire apparatus of pacts with the devil, spells to dry up cattle or unman males, and orgies on mountaintops on Walpurgisnacht was banished to fantasy fiction, the stage, and murmurings around peasant firesides on stormy nights.

The present-day reaction against technological civilization has seen some pretty wild manifestations, ranging from tribal communes through "ecology" to Creative Anachronism. But the wildest is a revival of belief in witchcraft - and in, of all places, the armed forces of the United States and its subject allies. On 14 June 1972 the United States Air Force was sued by a female lieutenant who had been dismissed for witchcraft. (New York Times, 15 June 1972) Erika Uehlinger's alleged practice of witchcraft was one item cited in "alleging her unfitness as an officer". The commander of the Texas air base where she was stationed, Major Roger Bell, gave his evidence for this charge in the following words: "It was generally known here that she professed witchcraft."

The whole thing apparently started when Lieut. Uehlinger "filed a long report to the inspector general alleging security violations, improper management and unsanitary living conditions at the base".

However, if the armed forces believe in witchcraft the next step is to put it to military use. This is presently being tried by the 54th Infantry Brigade of the "Cambodian" Army trained and paid by the United States for service against Prince Sihanouk, that country's Prime Minister. Captain Mam Prom Mony, who for 25 years was a Buddhist monk, is training these Cambodians "how to use charms and spells to ward off enemy bullets". This officer is confident of victory, saying that "The other side has recruited village witch doctors, but the Communists don't have any leading magicians in their ranks." (New York Times, 13 August 1972) This belief in the military efficacy of witchcraft and astrology runs all the way up to Lon Nol, the American straw boss in Phnompenh and ruler of as much of Cambodia as his army physically covers. "Several of Lon Nol's closest army companions, reliable informants say, have undergone minor surgery to have diamonds, sapphires, and rubies as well as small gold pins implanted under their skin. Others wear diamond rings, believing that precious stones are powerful talismans against enemy bullets."

However, this new sort of American war effort might run into trouble with fundamentalist religion, previously a major support of the war policy. An evangelist named Morris Cerullo has set up a "witchmobile" which will tour the country trying to dissuade young people from practicing witchcraft. (New York Times, 6 August 1972) According to Cerullo, "at least 10 million Americans dabble in the occult and...100,000 more worship the devil". His group, "World Evangelism Inc.", will try to stem this tide by displaying such diabolical devices as "voodoo oils, a Satanic altar, a goat's hoof", etc. Coming in November is a book, called The Backside of Satan.

Sometimes this tomfoolery tries to disguise itself in 20th-century language by calling itself "parapsychology". It is in this guise that it is being promoted by one of the leading intellectual vagabonds of our time, Arthur Koestler. Koestler made his name about 30 years ago by writing a book, Darkness at Noon, which has achieved in anti-Communist mythology the same status that Fanny Hill has in pornography. Darkness at Noon is carefully compounded of all the ingredients calculated to appeal to readers fearful of sinister international conspiracies - the underground dungeon,

the brutal interrogator, the "soft" interrogator (from which O'Brien in 1984 was obviously copied), and a trial scene. Darkness at Noon did for anti-Communism what The Protocols of the Learned Elders of Zion had done for anti-Semitism, and Koestler's career was made.

His other triumphs were of a comparable character. Just after the founding of Israel he went there, and endeared himself to its inhabitants by urging that they abandon Hebrew, or at least "Latinize" its alphabet. He wrote a biography of the 16th-century astronomer Johann Kepler which was generally condemned by scientists as missing several points about Kepler's life and work.

Now, with the publication of his latest book The Roots of Coincidence, Koestler seems to have broken out in a new place. Picking up from a biography of the pseudoscientific faker Paul Kammerer, who forged "evidence" for the inheritability of acquired characteristics, he comes out for the Lamarck-Kammerer-Lysenko notions and against a bogeyman which he is pleased to call "neo-Darwinism". He peddles the belief that modern physics offers a rationalization for "Extra-Sensory Perception", and then goes off into private musings about "self-transcending emotions", "sub-wholes" and "holons", and a lot of cheapjack mysticism.

Christopher Lehmann-Haupt, who reviewed this farrago in the New York Times of 11 August 1972, seems to hold a widespread belief that "experiments...have demonstrated beyond a statistical doubt that...people communicate telepathically with each other". For the facts in the case, it is necessary to peer behind the public-relations efforts of the advocates of latter-day witchcraft, and check Daniel Cohen's summation of the evidence in his Myths of the Space Age. Cohen demonstrates that there is actually very little serious research on "parapsychology", and that even among psychologists its acceptance is infinitesimal.

This, of course, is not going to stop either the proponents or the opponents of the "witchcraft" revival.

The ineffable arrogance of Dr. M. T. Mehdi, secretary-general of the Action Committee on American-Arab Relations, has surfaced again. After 11 Israeli athletes, including one born in Cleveland, were murdered by Arabian fanatics, the Governor of Ohio ordered flags flown at half-staff in that state. This, according to a telegram of protest by Dr. Mehdi, was "ridiculous and insulting to all the people of Ohio and America at large". (New York Post, 8 September 1972)

"In a popularity poll staged by Madame Tussaud's in London, Dracula tied for fifth place in the 'hate and fear' section with Mr. Enoch Powell." - London Daily Mirror

Some union friends have tried to tell me that the AFL-CIO support of the war is a personal aberration of George Meany, and does not mean that the whole organization which he heads is militaristic. However, they are contradicted by John Griner, president of the American Federation of Government Employees and a member of the AFL-CIO's executive board.

In April 1971, several locals of the AFGE in the Washington area voted to join a peace march. Griner came down hard. He ordered these locals to expunge their resolutions of support, and gave them 90 days to do so. Three of those locals refused his ultimatum, and were placed in "receivership". The Democratic contempt for the intelligence and memory of the American people has just hit a new low. A couple of weeks ago I received a fund appeal from something called "The Committee for Twelve", which is asking money to help 12 Democratic challengers replace 12 incumbent Republican Hawks. The clear implication is that this act will materially assist the drive for peace.

Well, for starters the endorsers of this appeal are Senators McGovern and Kennedy, and Representatives Udall and Edwards. All four of these men voted for the war - that is, for Public Law 88-408, which Attorney-General Katzenbach called "the constitutional equivalent of a declaration of war". (Congressional Record, Vol. 110, Part 14, pp. 18470 & 18555). Of the "Twelve" one, Richard McCarthy of New York, served in Congress in 1965-71. This was too late for Public Law 88-408, but on 2 March 1967 he voted

THE BEAKER PEOPLE LIBATION FRONT

National liberation movements for oppressed minorities are all the rage these days. They get to be most complex in regions which have been repeatedly invaded. For example, in Latin America older revolutionary movements claimed as heroes Boliver and San Martín, who led the independence movements against Spain. But now Indian leaders like Tupac Amaru are the heroes. Similarly, in France a government composed of people who led the fight against German occupation is faced with a Breton liberation movement complaining about French occupation. And in the Middle East...

However, one of the most extensively conquered and reconquered places in the world has been the British Isles. There has been a history of Saxon resentment against Norman or Danish conquest, and Keltic resentment against Saxon conquest. There are active nationalist movements in Ulster, Scotland, Wales, and even Cornwall and the Isle of Wight. The Cornish nationalist movement is reviving the Cornish language, extinct since about 1800, and the Vectis Nationalist Party is running candidates in support of the independence of this last refuge of English paganism.

But there were people in the British Isles even before the coming of the Kelts. Therefore, on the evening of Saturday 16 September, at the home of Franklin and Ann Dietz in Oradell, New Jersey, the Beaker People Libation Front was formed. This movement vows to restore the Beaker People to their rightful place in the world. Our principal means of struggle will be to, in their memory, empty as many beakers as possible.

The Founding Members of the Beaker People Libation Front are Brian Burley, Frederick Lerner, and John Boardman. Upon resolving the formation of this national liberation struggle, we immediately went out and drained several beakers at a nearby bar. Toasts were drunk to the glories of Stonehenge (built by the Beaker People), and confusion to the invading Keltic oppressors and others who have usurped the land and heritage of the Beaker People.

MOSCOW (COULDBE): Has it ever accured to anyone that every one else in this place is a figment of Herb Barents' imagination? Think about it!

DESERET (United Rabble Rousing Press): The Bangs Leslie Tapscott Institute of Unapplied Philosophy today announced that the Bishop George Berkeley Prize would be given this year to Dutchboy Barents, the power behind the Russian throne. The Institute did not give any reasons for its award, declaring that reason was contrary to the principles upon which it was founded.
