Origins was invented by Jim Dunnigan, editor of the bimonthly war-gaming zine, Strategy & Tactics.

In addition to carrying five postal games of Origins, each issue of

FREEDONIA has at least one complete game played across the board - usually at the <u>Strategy & Tactics</u> gaming sessions or the Brooklyn College war-gaming group, of which more later. FREEDONIA also carries articles on other games. The current issue has an account of a choss game played between a physicist and a computer, and an article by Gary Fellman about the strategy of the popular Parker Brothers game Risk. A SERIES OF PROGRESSIVE STALEMATE POSITIONS

by Robert Bryan Lipton

After the reaction to my article on northern stalemate positions, I have been badgered to write one on the southern position. Surprisingly, I found not one, but two logical progressions. The more unlikely one goes first:

I.

Position #1

Supply Centers: Ank, Con, Por, Smy, Spa, Tun. (6)

Units and moves: A Spa, A Con, A Arm & F NAf hold; A Por & F Wes S A Spa, I believe that this is the smallest possible southern stalemate position. Note that no enemy fleets can be tolerated in the Mediterranean; this is an unlikely stalemate, but possible. Except for changing armies to fleets, there can be no variations.

Position #2

Supply Centers: Ank, Con, Nap, Por, Rom, Smy, Spa, Tun. (8)

Units and moves: A Spa, A Rom, F NAf, A Con & A Arm hold; A Por & F Wes S A Spa; A Apu S A Rom.

This expansion onto the Italian peninsula can be extended to include Venice by having the following units and moves in Italy: Λ Ven holds: Λ Tus & Λ Apu S Λ Ven.

Position #3

Supply Centers: Ank, Bul, Con, Gre, Nap, Por, Rom, Ser, Smy, Spa, Tun, Ven. (12)

Units and moves: A Arm, A Ser, A Ven, A Spa & F NAf hold; A Bul & A Alb S A Ser; A Tus & A Apu S A Ven; A Por & F Wes S A Spa

As can be seen, this Stalemate position has an extra supply center; a living Russia can be guarded against by changing Λ Arm to F Arm and having it support a fleet in the Black Ses. (I'm not suggesting you do this in the middle of a game. Opponents tend to frown on this sort of thing.) Or, instead of this, Piedmont can be taken and held by having Λ Tus support Λ Pie, and Λ Apu supporting Λ Ven. It's all a matter of personal taste although...

Position #4

Supply Centers: Ank, Bul, Con, Gre, Mar, Nap, Por, Rom, Ser, Smy, Spa, Tun, Ven. (13)

Units and moves: A Arm, A Ser, A Ven, A Mar, A Spa, F Wes & F NAf hold; A Alb & A Bul S A Ser; A Pie S A Ven; F Lyo S A Mar; A Por S A Spal This individual position is important because it links up the Italian and Iberian fronts. As I remarked in my previous article on stalemates (GRAUSTARK #268) this is desirable, since it cuts down on the number of units needed in defensive maneuvers. For instance, that army in Marseilles frees the fleet in the Western Mediterranean (or Portugal, if a fleet is there) for an attack on the Mid-Atlantic.

As another variation, an added army in Trieste, supported from Venice and Albania, not only adds another supply center, but links up the Balkan front with the Italian. The variation with the fleets in the Black Sea

and Armenia links up all lines.

Position #5

Supply Centers: Ank, Bul, Con, Gre, Mar, Nap, Por, Rom, Rum, Ser, Smy, Spa, Tri, Tun, Ven. (15)

Units and moves: A Arm, A Rum, A Tri, A Ven, A Pie, A Mar, A Spa, F Wes, & F. NAf hold; F Bla & A Ser S A Rum; A Ven & A Alb S A Tri; F Lyo S A Mar; A Por S A Spa.

What? Better than half of the units are just sitting. Something's rotten in the South. Wrong! Holds are used when the units are not necessary for defensive purposes other than just being there. If there wasn t a unit in Armenia, then troops could pour down from Sevastopol, ruining the bases of southern resistance. But, that army in Armenia could be doing something like attacking Sevastopol; if it gets in, the situation becomes the following variation: A Arm S A Sev. That's it. You now have sixteen units. Where can you get the seventeenth?

Position #6

Supply Centers: Ank, Bud, Bul, Con, Gre, Mar, Nap, Rom, Rum, Ser, Smy, Spa, Tri, Tun, Von, Vic. (17)

Units and moves: A Arm, A Rum, A Vie, A Tyr, A Mar, A Spa, F Wes & F NAT holds A Bul & F Bla S A Rum; A Bud S A Vie; A Pie S A Tyr; F Lyo S A Mar; A Por S A Spa.

Now, pick up Sevastopol, and you've won! I don't mean to imply that this is the only series of statemate positions for the South. Although the South needs more units (6) than the North (4) for its smallest stalemate, this seems to be compensated by interesting series of positions, like the one that follows!

Position #1 Supply Conters: Ank, Bud, Bul, Con, Gre, Nap, Rom, Rum, Ser, Smy, Tri, Von, Vie. (13)

Units and moves: A Arm, A Rum, A Vie, A Tyr, A Tus & F Ion hold; A Bul & F Bla S A Rum; A Bud S A Vie; A Tri & A Ven S A Tyr; A Rom S A Tus; F Nap S F Ion

Notice that, although this is the beginning of a stalemate progression, and, indeed, is the most common one for the South, it is the most difficult one to reach, needing thirteen supply centers, all of them used to support a unit.

Variations are numerous. (1.) Change A Rom in fer F Tyr, and have both F Ion & F Nap support it: (2.) Change A Bul in for A Gal, A Ven in for A Pie, and A Tri for A Bohl Then have A Vie & A Bud support A Gal, have A Tyr support A Boh, and have A Tus support A Pie, and there is a new stalemate. It's also more comforting to realize that the only supply center in danger is Rumania.

Position #2

Supply Centers: Ank, Bud, Bul, Con, Gre, Nap, Rom, Rum, Sor, Sev, Smy, Tri, Tun, Von, Vie. (15)

Units and moves: A Sev. A Gal. A Boh. A Pic, F Tyr, & F Tun hold; A Rum & A Bud S A Gal; A Tyr S A Boh; A Tus S A Pic; F Nap S F Tyr; F Ion S F Tun.

Variations grow numerous now; put an army in the Ukraine, support it with Sovastopol, and you can throw away the fleet in the Black Sea and the army in Budapest.

In the Mediterranean, the fleets take on this configuration: F Wes & F Lyo hold; F NAf S F Wes; F Tyr S F Lyo! You no longer need A Tus to support A Pick

Position #3

Supply Centers: Ank, Bud, Bul, Con, Gre, Mos, Nap, Rom, Rum, Ser, Sev, Tri, Tun, Von, Vie, War! (17)

Units and moves! A Mos, A War, A Boh, A Pie, F Lyo & F Wes hold; A Sev S A Mos; A Ukr & A Gal S A War; A Tyr S A Boh; F Tyr S F Lyo; F NAf S

At this point, you have a number of spare armics and floets. You might try gotting one in Silosia, then having A Boh and A Gal support it. At the next supply center, you pass the victory criterion.

Finally, the last part of this; you may have noticed that all southern stalomates control either the Italian peninsula, all of the Mediterranean, or both. But, working on hints fropped by John Beshara, concerning game 1967U, in which he and the late George Heap held out against the Italians and Germans for such a long time that the game took twenty-seven "years", I have discovered a stalemate position that requires neither:

Supply Centers: Ank, Bor, Bud, Bul, Con, Gre, Mos, Mun, Rum, Rum, Ser, Sev, Smy, Tri, Ven, Vie, War. (17)
Units and moves: A Livonia, A Ber, A Mun, A Ven & F Ion hold; A Mos & A War S A Livonia; A Pru S A Ber; A Sil & A Boh S A Mun; A Tyr, A Tri, & F Adr S A Ven; F Gre, F Acg, & F Eas S F Ion.
