## AND 'ROUND AND 'ROUND IT GOES - I

Many postal Diplomacy players have come in through science-fiction fandom. The notion of an alternate history, of the world which would have resulted from a different outcome for some crucial historical event, is appealing in both science-fiction and war-gaming fandom. This is the first in a series of articles by Bob Lipton, reviewing books on this theme.

One of the many plot ideas in science-fiction is the 'Wheels of If' idea. This plot is based on taking a certain turning point in history, and forecasting the results that would have occurred if the event had not been the same as our world's.

Purists insist that the first of this type of story was published in 1919 by a lady named Gertrude Bennett. (The story, The Heads of Cerberus, was published under the pseudonym 'Francis Stevens', no doubt to avoid annoying the male chauvinist pigs.) However, the trend towards this novel was almost definitely established by Murray Leinster (Will F. Jenkins) in his novel Sidewise in Time. Since then, the theme has been used effectively many times. One of the best practitioners of this form is L. Sprague de Camp.

The Wheels of If is a collection of De Camp's early stories, reissued by Berkeley in 1970. Including the title novelette, there are seven stories, but the only important two are Wheels of If and the short story The Snarly Man, which is the adventure of an immortal Neanderthaler in New York City.

De Camp is not one to do things by half measures. The difference between our universe and the alternate one are twofold. The Arabs, it seems, were the victors at the Battle of Tours, and King Oswiu of Northumberland accepted the Columbanige Heresy.

What's that? Did I hear someone say "The Who of What accepted the Which?" Be patient.

First of all, the importance of the Battle of Tours has been vastly overrated. Despite its huge size, the Arab army was merely a raiding party. If they had won, they would have taken back some gold and other valuables. Since they lost, they returned to the areas definitely under Arab control.

But, despite the Frankish victory in this world, Arab dominion over Septimania\* was not usurped until 759.

It is interesting that De Camp has such a low opinion of the Franks, despite being of French ancestry\*\*. The Franks were not geniuses at governing, it is true, but they did a far better job than the Lombards, or the Saxons, or the Bavarians.

The Columbanige Heresy might have had a grave effect on the history of the world. It differed from Orthodox Christianity mainly in the assignment of the date of Easter. Its area of strength was Ireland, the sections of modern Scotland that were held by the recently converted Picts, and Wales. Oswiu in accepting the spiritual overlordship of Rome helped to stamp out one of the last major heresies that would arise in Christianity until the problems with iconoclasm arose later.

The danger of the Columbanige Heresy was that in isolated Britain it might have formed the nucleus for a major, permanent division of Christianity. Such a division might have had a grave effect when the time for the Crusades rolled around.

As to the story: Allister Park, a young district attorney in New York, finds that he keeps waking up in different worlds each morning. When this distressing situation has stopped, he finds himself in the 'Bretwaldate of Vinland', in a world where the colonization of North America was a going proposition by the eleventh century.

Park is not everly interested in this world; he wants to get back to his own, where he is in line for City District Attorney. But it seems that he got into this

world through a man who was working for the opponents of the man whose place he has taken: Bishop Ib Scoglund. The Bishop has been working for the civil rights of the Indians (called 'Skrellings' here). To get back to New York, Park must fight the police, the local government, the national government, and the director of the nut-house where the man who got him here has been placed.

In solving these problems, it is necessary for Park to take over local and national government, start a civil war, and have a neighboring Indian nation attack Vinland.

Meanwhile, as with all De Camp novels, there is plenty of local color. Park is pulled into court for indecent exposure. (His navel was showing.). There's a drunken Indian who has acrophobia, and much more in this tightly written novel.

The world evolves naturally from the changes in history, and De Camp knows his history. He makes the bits he throws in (not enough to be boring) realistic and fascinating.

One final point, to demonstrate De Camp's erudition: The language in the novel is a blend of Anglo-Saxon, Norwegian, and Keltic, just as the culture is. For instance, the unvoiced guttural fricative (written 'gh' and pronounced as the German 'ch') is retained in the language. Some of the words are different: 'jinn' is substituted for 'match'. Considering the success of the Moslems in this world, this is entirely logical.

And all of it is logical. And fascinating. Buy the book, and you'll see what I mean.

THE MINISTRY OF MISCELLANY

As the last issue of GRAUSTARK was in preparation, rumors were floating all over the place about a "truce" or "ceasefire" that was miraculously going to end the war in Vietnam. At the time I wondered whether it might necessitate some changes in the pessimistic views I expressed in that issue's "Miscellany" column and the article "The End of Argument".

I needn't have concerned myself. The agreement itself virtually guarantees a continuation of the war in Indochina. Although President Nixon called it "Peace with Honor", it contains nothing that a Dove could call "Peace" or a Hawk could call "Honor".

Although the Vietnamese made concessions, the agreement actually represents a stunning victory for them. All the armed might of the most powerful nation the world has ever known was insufficient to force a withdrawal of the forces of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam from the southern part of that country. There are still about 115,000 Vietnamese troops there, under no requirement to withdraw. Furthermore, in practice there is no way that they can be prevented from supplying or reinforcing themselves.

Also, there are at least as many American troops in Thailand, under the same lack of restrictions. They are already in combat with Thai guerrillas. American planes, on the day after the truce went into effect, pestered Laos with one of the heaviest bombardments of the war. The American war against southeastern Asia is still going on.

These facts have not been slow to impress themselves upon the consciousness of local Hawks. Already protests have been heard from right-wing Republicans, the group that was trying to replace President Nixon with Representative Ashbrook in last year's primaries. Their mythology is that Nixon is a basically well-meaning man who was led astray by the evil Harvard Jew Henry Kissinger. As it becomes apparent that the Vietnamese people are still going to overthrow that gang of Saigon boodlers that calls itself a "government", this crowd will escalate its demands that the war resume. Already, in his New York Post column of 1 February 1973, Jack Anderson reports that "The secret estimate of the Joint Chiefs is that the ceasefire will break down and the Communists ultimately will gain control of all Vietnam."

And, since this is why the US went to war in Indochina in the first place, the war will resume. Besides, on the day the truce was announced the stock market dropped 14 points for its biggest decline in 17 months. Obviously, this will not be allowed to continue.

But, since the armed forces show an increasing disinclination to fight, the only resort left to the government will be "Big Eddie". So...

Months ago I had planned to write something about the Watergate espionage in this column. And then the thing began ramifying all over the place, and eventually I suppose somebody will write a book about it.

The trial was as fishy as the trial of James Earl Ray. The defendants either pled guilty, or were found guilty in great haste. No one other than themselves and a few witnesses were implicated. The chain of command that led upwards from G. Gordon Liddy was never revealed. The whole deal is reminiscent of these trials in which a Mafia triggerman is brought to book. He pleads guilty, serves his time, and leaves without ever revealing why he did what he did. And he gets paid off by his organization for

the time he serves on its behalf, just as the Watergate defendants will be. (The figure of \$1,000 per month is cited by Jack Anderson, New York Post, 15 January 1973.)

The only effort to get at the facts of the case seems to have been made by the judge. He was unimpressed by the defendants' argument that they "had been motivated by a fear of violence against Republicans planned by 'radical' groups linked to the Democrats." (New York Times, 25 January 1973) Hunt, a defendant who pled guilty, was even more fulsome. "Anything I may have done I did for what I believed to be the best interests of my country," was his explanation. (New York Post, 12 January 1973) Dollar Bill Buckley stands firmly behind Hunt. In his New York Post column of 19 September 1972 he wrote: "Barker said that he knows no man to whom his country should be more grateful than Howard Hunt. I concur. I have known the gentleman for 21 years and am the godfather of three of his children. Hunt is not a trifler - yet his involvement in the venture...tends to magnify rather than diminish the significance of the case."

Buckley himself provides the best window anyone has yet found into the inner motivations of the case. Quoting his fellow-conservative James Jackson Kilpatrick, he goes on to say, "The Castro government, foreseeing its economic excommunication from the Soviet Union, decided late this spring to make a deal with McGovern's Democratic Party. A very straightforward deal based on the tactical need of the McGovern people for money with which to wage the presidential campaign, and the strategic need of Cuba for more and more economic help in the years to come. Someone inside the Castro government - so the story goes - tipped off a prominent Republican to the fact that the deal would be secretly consummated at the Watergate, perhaps on the very day of June 17. The recipient of this information requisitioned a suitcase full of money with which to pay professionals to bug the Democratic headquarters."

And there you have it - the 1972 version of the old "Moscow gold" hoax!

(Barker, incidentally, pled guilty to all charges. As Buckley said, "He stressed that...nobody could succeed in making him talk about the supersecret mission in the Watergate Office Building." And nobody has.)

This was scarcely an isolated incident. In California the Republicans were out to bring members of the Wallaceite-Bircher splinter "American Independent Party" into their own party by persuading them to re-register as Republicans. If enough of them did this, the AIP would be ruled off the ballot, to the ultimate benefit of the Republicans. The plan was set up by former Attorney General John Mitchell and two other prominent Republicans, Jeb Stuart Magruder and Robert J. Walters, and a local man, Jack B. Lindsay. Their plan was to hire local Nazis (National Socialist White People's Party, a splinter of George Lincoln Rockwell's organization) to do the legwork. Joseph P. Tomassi, the Nazi leader, later spilled the whole thing because Walters was holding back on the money. The story was broken in the Los Angeles Free Press of 3 November 1972, complete with the photostat of a check for \$100, to Tomassi from Walters. Walters, despite the check photostat, denied everything.

Also in southern California, the office of the Democratic candidate for Congress from the 28th District was burgled and the political and financial files removed. (Los Angeles Free Press, 29 September 1972) And the Secret Service men assigned to guard Senator McGovern during the campaign turned in reports about McGovern to President Nixon. (New York Times, 3 November 1972) Forged letters plagued the primary campaigns of Senators Muskie and Jackson. (New York Times, 24 October 1972) And James McCord, another Watergate defendant, helped draft a "National Watchlist" as part of a censorship plan. "The list would include 'information the censors will look for as they open letters, monitor broadcasts, and question travelers.'" (New York Post, 23 October 1972)

But most of the threads in these great national mysteries seem to lead to the Cuban emigre community in Florida, New Orleans, and Washington. This was true not only of Watergate but also of the CIA, the Kennedy assassination, the abortive plot to shell the UN building, and the so-called "Squad 19" that was going to stir up violence at the Republican National Convention. Diligent investigation into these points has been made by Mae Brussell, whose forthcoming book will be well worth the reading. STANDARD DIPLOMACY OPENINGS

by Eric Verheiden

Certain Diplomacy openings tend to occur with an exceptionally high frequency. Typically, they offer maximum possibilities for occupation of neutral and enemy supply centers as well as key spaces for attack and defense.

England

1. F Lon-Nth; F Edi-Nrg; A Liv-Yor.
2. F Lon-Nth; F Edi-Nrg; A Liv-Edi.

The resulting position from either opening allows for a supported convoy to insure ownership of Norway in the Fall.

Movement to Yorkshire is a conservative, defensive measure. Its purpose is to defend London should France enter the Channel. But when France is not so hostile, it restricts England to convoy via the North Sea and reduces offensive capabilities on the Continent. While it is a superior defense, the effort is usually wasted since France seldom attempts to occupy the Channel initially; in that unlikely happenstance, a better defense is F Lon-Eng.

There are numerous merits in maneuverability by movement to Edinburgh. Even if London is threatened, F Nth can convoy A Edi-Lon to defend, though F Nth-Lon is preferred.

France

1. F Bre-Mid; A Par-Bur; A Mar S A Par-Bur.
2. F Bre-Mid; A Par-Bur; A Mar-Spa.

Either opening allows the occupation of both Spain and Portugal in 1901. Barring the English stab of F Lon-Eng, France is assured of two builds. France can better defend against the stab by moving Paris to Picardy or Gascony. In the former instance, France is unable to properly defend Marseilles against Italy; in the latter instance, France barter away prerogatives to Belgium; and in both instances, France cannot cope with German penetration into Burgundy.

France is an innately difficult country to destroy. Even with a modicum of aid, France can hold Portugal, Spain, and Marseilles against a combined English/German thrust. Since the Eastern Powers rightly fear intrusion into the Mediterranean by the Western Powers, France can usually expect assistance against such aggression.

Ordering A Mar S A Par-Bur is preferred, insuring success. It gives France three options: A Bur-Bel, A Bur-Mun, A Bur-Mar. Most often Belgium is the goal.

The move of A Mar-Spa is customarily made with the intention of taking Portugal in the Fall combined with F Mid-Spa(s.c.). This is dangerous because it isolates A Por for a year. But it can also be rewarding when there is a strong German alliance and no threat from England or Italy, for France can build fleets in Marseilles and Brest in a sharp lunge against Italy or England. With these moves, Italy is especially vulnerable and the most desirable prey.

Germany

1. A Mun-Ruh; A Ber-Kie; F Kie-Den.
2. A Mun-Ruh; A Ber-Kie; F Kie-Hol.

It is Germany's unique displeasure of being immediately subject to encroachment by every country except Turkey. Because of this hazard, the German position is indefinitely tenuous. Too often German players assume the mantle of Holy Roman Emperors when they should exude the gentility of a Prince Consort. And just as often France and Eng-

land fail to capitalize on the strategic position of Germany in being able to pounce upon Italy and Austria.

Russia is a natural ally for Germany. Their interests mesh. In the long term, if Germany establishes a rapport whereby England battles in Scandinavia without overly embroiling Germany, and if Germany also swings France against Italy, Germany can nibble here and there. This security on Germany's western flank permits a healthy consolidation of power.

Because Germany is a house of cards, it must probe with discretion. Thus, F Kie-Den preserves the option of bouncing Russia in Sweden on the Fall move, or supporting Russia in Sweden subsequently.

While F Kie-Hol is Germany's best bet for three builds in 1901, the units are awkwardly placed. Three builds are bound to make too many neighbors unhappy and the Emperor may find himself playing solitaire with his cards.
