This being the case, the Italian A Ven was not dislodged, and was thus able to support the Italian attack into the province from which Venice was being attacked. This attack succeeded. SALAMI: When Charles II of England and etc. takes over France will he call himself King Charles III of France, England, and etc.? If so wasn't King Charles the III of France nicknamed Charles the Simple?

VATICAN CITY: The most gracious Pope Pushius IX declared that "It is good the Italians are trying to take Spain because now we can burn the people who were running the Inquisition." All detractors take note.

SOFIA (via Constantinople): Bulgaria has polygyny! King Pavlo I of this country announced that fact today. He said that this decision was encouraged by Sultan Abdul Hamid II of Turkey, Syria, and Persia.

ANAKHIT, SKANDALUTZ (CONIM): Total mobilization was ordered in this kingdom following the Italian government's stated desire to wage war where its soldiers could 1) chase women, 2) get a good suntan, and 3) drink lots of wine. "We don't know why they left out the loaf of bread," said one government spokesman, "but in all respects this threat can only refer to us." When asked what mobilization in Skandalutz meant, the spokesman replied, "Twice the usual number of caterers at the Solstice Festival."

VIENNA (CONIM): Demands continued for a punitive expedition to the Principality of Wogastisburger-Neustadt following the speeches of Assembly Deputy Franz Joe Magyarty. In recent weeks Magyartyism has swept the Dual Monarchy in the wake of treasonous utterances concerning Marxism by Obermajor Hans Pfeffertopf of W-N, nominally a fief of the Dual Monarchy. With cries of "Twenty Decades of Treason," Magyarty supporters demonstrated in favor of reasserting Austro-Hungarian control over the Balkan Massif Nation. Action of some form seemed inevitable.

GRANDE CASINO, BEAUCOUILLON (CONIM): Tradian was heavy around the Grand Ducal Bourse amid rumors of an Austro-Italian assault upon the Balkan Massif and recent upheaval in other parts of the Continent. The lira and mark remained strong, while the franc plummeted and the Four And A Half Kingdoms finished at 4 1/8, down 3/8. Meanwhile, Count d'Avino, this country's "grey eminence", discounted the war threats. "The Italian statement about wine, women, and sunshine could apply to a dozen half-baked principalities, our own included," he said. "Meanwhile," d'Avino continued, "I wouldn't put much faith in that pipsqueak Magraty. We remember him from the last time Beaucouillon received a surge of Austro-Hungarian stragglers. The Countess kept calling him 'Tail Gunner' Joe. Let's not discuss why," requested d'Avino as he spun the roulette wheel with reckless abandon.

## THE TRI-CENTENNIAL

The famous Bicentennial Year is upon us, and for the next several months we will be faced with the problem of how best to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the founding of the United States of America. This is something of a dilemma. On the one hand, it is desirable that public commemorations be made. They help to stimulate a feeling of solidarity among the citizens of a state. The cause us to forget individual differences of opinion and status, and submerge these concerns in the common purpose of the nation. But on the other hand, a specific commemoration of the events which created the United States of America will inevitably stir up social turmoil of a sort which we have just put down, and whose resuscitation would be highly undesirable.

It cannot be denied that the United States of America began as a violent armed revolution against the greatest Empire the world had yet known, set in motion by self-serving agitators, and assisted by the money, arms, and men of that Empire's enemies. We have seen altogether too much of that sort of thing in the past decade, and it is not desirable that such men be honored. The radicals of our own time spare no pains to compare themselves with the revolutionaries of two centuries ago. Communist literature is dispensed in New York City through the "Jefferson Book Shop"; a poster "Wanted for Treason: George Washington" may be purchased at radical boutiques; a magazine article compares (to their credit!) the British supporters of the Americans with the American supporters of the Vietnamese; a poster attacks the suppression of the Kent State Revolt by showing a mixed group of redcoats and National Guardsmen shooting down a mixed group of colonial Americans and student Pacifists. This sort of thing is absolutely incompatible with the loyalty which Americans owe their nation and its imperial role in the world.

In 1776 the British Empire did not know how to deal with this sort of thing - which is why there is no longer a British Empire. Had they known, as our present and recent Presidents know, that any opposition to the nation's military policy must be instantly, violently, and totally suppressed, there would today be not an American Empire but an Anglo-American one, and George Washington and Thomas Jefferson would be buried in a common obloquy with Louis Riel, Roger Casement, and William Joyce.

Instead of dwelling on the America of two centuries ago, it might be better to consider the America of 1876, the America of 1976, and the America of 2076. In 1876 our nation had already advanced materially towards its obvious present goal of world domination. Even in one century it had extended from the Atlantic to the Pacific and the Arctic. Though still one among several powers of approximately equal importance, it was already supreme in the Western Hemisphere, and an object of awe to the Eastern. Its economy was second only to Great Britain's, and would soon overtake it. The portents of future hegemony were there for all to see, and were triumphantly shouted forth to all the world at the Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia.

By 1976 this hegemony is no dream, but a nearly accomplished fact. It is not only in South America but in Europe, Asia, and Africa that the power of the United States of America is a major factor in world politics and arms. If an Asian government is overthrown, or an African colony is set "free", the interests of the United States of America in the event are an instant subject of concern not only in the region, but also in Washington, Moscow, Beijing, Brussels, and other world capitals.

Since 1945 the guiding spirit and single explanation of American military and foreign policy has clearly been the politico-economic domination of the whole world. (No other assumption causes all these events to fall into a single pattern so neatly.) First the colonial empires of the western European powers have been liquidated, and then these nominally independent nations have been penetrated by the immense economic power of the United States. When local people resist, they meet a fate which has been seen in Guatemala, Greece, Bangladesh, Thailand, South Korea, and Chile, and will now be seen in Indo-China as soon as time can be spared to settle with that peninsula's obstreperous and ungrateful inhabitants. More particularly, it will be seen in Angola, that a few troublemakers in and out of Congress can accomplish nothing; American troops are already in action to secure Angola for the Empire, and more are on the way.

A few Pacifists have apparently decided to imitate their folly of the 1960's by opposing this next war. I have already seen people wearing buttons which read "Hands Off Angola". Before they commit themselves to this suicidal folly, they might go commune with the "Hands Off Vietnam" crowd, which is now living in exile in Sweden and Canada, or filling several U. S. graveyards and prisons, or, having abandoned this nonsense, now may be found handing out tracts for pure water, Krishna, feminism, Jesus, or some other cause which does not endanger the forward march of the American Empire.

What, then, can we anticipate for 2076? If the extrapolation from 1876 to 1976 is carried forward for another hundred years, by the Tricentennial celebration the domination of the United States of America over the entire human species will have long been an accomplished fact. The great investment which today's Americans are making in guns, planes, missiles, ships, and nuclear weapons will be returned to us in the form of cheap and limitless raw materials from the subject regions of the Empire, providing Americans with a standard of living high even by today's standards. Those who want to make peace because war 'lowers the standard of living' will be silenced by the endless torrent of cheap goods won by the force of our arms and the prowess of our armed forces.

This is no fantasy; it is taking place now. Those who resist will be heard of by future generations, if at all, as topics of ridicule. The American media use this as the first line of attack against Pacifist folly. Only if ridicule fails to make Pacifism ineffective are the soldiers called out, for we are a humane people. Americans are urgently counseled not to make the least resistance to our government's plans for world conquest. As the events of the past decade show, the patience of our Presidents is not limitless - but their power is.

## NEW POSTAL RATES

To defray the ever-increasing costs of delaying the mail, the United States Postal "Service" has recently announced an increase in postal rates. As of present writing, this increase is being held up in the courts, but as it will soon be rammed through, I have summarized the new rates below. It is not particularly easy to get hold of them; one source, the 1976 World Almanac, gives the new aerogramme rate as 22¢ on p. 980 and as 18¢ on p. 984. But here they are, as best I can determine. It should be noted that the United States no longer has a domestic air mail service, with resulting delays in copies of GRAUSTARK that are mailed to the south and far west. "P" stands for the Priority Mail Rate, which is \$1.56 to Zones 1, 2, and 3, \$1.58 to Zone 4, \$1.60 to Zone 5, \$1.62 to Zone 6, \$1.64 to Zone 7, and \$1.67 to Zone 8 and foreign countries. The "Foreign" rates apply to all countries except Canada and Mexico, which have their own rate schedule. Of the two Foreign Air Mail rates, "I" applies to the Western, and "II" to the Eastern, Hemisphere. Surface post cards to the US, Canada, and Mexico are 9¢; air post cards to the two latter countries are 14¢. To all other countries surface post cards are 12¢, air post cards are 21¢, and aerogrammes are (probably) 22¢.

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We apparently have one remedy is food prices continue to rise. The motivation behind the anti-busing riots in Boston can easily be found - if you ask the demonstrators themselves. According to Mary McGoroy's column in the New York Post of 2 December 1975, epithets containing the word "nigger" are chalked and painted all over the neighborhood. In one case a high school football coach flatly urged his white players to "get the niggers in school tomorrow". Never mind the rhetoric that is heard in court - get down to the neighborhoods and ask the people directly involved, why they're doing what they're doing.

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"Consider your reference...to Rev. 7:9 where the number saved was 'a great multitude which no man could number'. From this Dr. Matrix concludes that the set of saved souls must be infinite and uncountable.

"If Dr. Matrix were not so obtuse, he would realize that God in her infinite wisdom meant the words in her book to be taken literally. 'No man could number' means just that: men could not number but women could.

It recently got a little fuller of them, when Caudillo Franco died and left Spain to Juan Carlos de Borbon, a direct lineal descendant of Queen Isabella II and whoever her lover was that night. (One of the candidates was the American ambassador, General Sickles.) But the accession of Juan Carlos I, or "Juan the Brief" as he is called locally, did not mean a net gain for the cause of royalty. Just a few days later, King Savang Vatthana of Laos was given his unconditional release by his kinsman, Comrade Prince Souphanouvong, the new Communist Prime Minister. During the 1964 presidential campaign, some newspaper columnist dragged out of obscurity a Thackeray novel whose protagonist was named "Barry Lyndon". After getting a laugh estimated at 0.001 on the Richter scale, Barry Lyndon sank back into an obscurity from which he has recently been rescued by Stanley Kubrick. A splendidly ballyhooed film called Barry Lyndon is now coming out, starring Ryan O'Neal as the title role, a sort of 19th-century Tom Jones.

Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn, whose appearance on these shores has evoked a lot of enthusiasm from people who ought to know better, is starting to cut his throat with his own tongue as I predicted in GRAUSTARK #333. In his New York Post column of 6 December 1975, Dollar Bill Buckley scolds his erstwhile hero for (1.) questioning the Warren Report's absolute accuracy, and (2.) saying that Prime Minister Kissinger is so afraid of nuclear war that he is caving in to the Communists in an attempt to avoid it. Buckley calls his Russian counterpart's attention to the Prime Minister's book Nuclear Weapons and Foreign Policy, which should cure him of the notion that Henry Kissinger is a less dedicated anti-Communist than, say, Solzhenitsyn or Buckley.

If Solzhenitsyn doesn't believe Buckley, he might ask Pham Van Dong in Hanoi whether he thinks that Prime Minister Kissinger is fearful of war.

Ever since its foundation in 1948, Israel has been selling State of Israel bonds to foreign supporters. These bonds are sold through the Development Corporation for Israel, and may not be redeemed except in Israel until 1990. In effect, bonds as they mature are paid off from the proceeds of selling bonds, but so far Zionist enthusiasm is outrunning the laws of economics, and seems as if it will continue to do so.

Naturally, the DCI has an office in Boston. Under the terms of its lease, it pays the landlord \$1,500 a month in Israel bonds. But they now have a new landlord. In September 17 downtown Boston office buildings were bought by the United Realty Corporation of Kuwait.

The rent is still being paid in these bonds, which go from the DCI to the building's management corporation to the law firm of Hale and Dorr. "It's up to them to get the money to the Kuwaitis," says the president of the management corporation. And, as the New York Times of 7 December 1975 observed in reporting this item, "There will have to be an Israel in 15 years if Kuwait is to get its cash."

Thirty years ago, when I was futilely chasing nookie in the Methodist Youth Federation, it occurred to me in my few respites from this pursuit that there was an awful lot of Pacifist sentiment floating around the Methodists. Naturally, many missionaries have exercised their duties as US citizens by providing our government with important information about the foreign regions where they work. But now the Methodists are apparently going to show their Pacifistic streak again. According to the New York Times of 21 December 1975, the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church has threatened its missionaries with dismissal if they obey their obligations as citizens to provide information to the Central Intelligence Agency.

The arrogance of these religious fanatics almost passes belief. Fortunately, the United States government has ways of dealing with such dissidents. In 1967, the Internal Revenue Service began cancelling the tax exemptions of Pacifist groups. If a major religious denomination finds its holdings threatened with tax assessment because it undertakes to challenge America's imperial role in the world, it will quickly fall into line.
