1975GW - PRESS RELEASES

LONDON: Charles III, King of England, Scotland, Norway, and Belgium, Lord of Ireland, and Emperor of India joined his fleet in London as it set off to reclaim the Channel. "The presence of the bloody French in the Channel is intolerable," intoned the dashing young monarch. "After all, it is called the English Channel." When asked by reporters what he thought of the slur on his intelligence which had appeared in the Italian press, the orilliant tactician replied, "That whole thing about whether my new name will become Charles III after I, with my good cousin Robert's support, teach those upstart French a lessen, shows the underlying stupidity of the Italian Press. As anyone with an iota of intelligence knows, there is an excellent precedent in this manner. When James VI of Scotland became King of England at his cousin Elizabeth's death, he became James I of England while remaining James VI of Scotland." When pressed as to how he planned on treating the Italianc, he responded, "By becoming Charles I, King of Italy, unless a proper retraction is printed." At this juncture the King begged the press's pardon, as he had a French Fleet to annihilate. He promised to go into detail as concerns certain other rumors next week."

DRZUNKDUMP, PUNDSCHDRUK (1 April 1903, URRP): Prof. Esther Hazy, Royal Historian of the Kingdom of Pundschdruk, today commented on the numbering problems that King Charles III of England will face if he becomes King of Italy. "Charlemagne claimed to be King of Italy," she told her history class at the Pundschdruki Academy of Trivial and Quadrivial Studies, "so that if the King of England makes his plans come true, he will at best be King Carle II. "However, this is relatively minor compared to the history of our own glorious nation. When King Boguslav III died in 1409, the claimants to the throne were his legitimate son Prince Ivan the Aggravating, his illegitimate son Ivan Aufulitch, and his brother Ivan Astikold. All three of them were promptly proclaimed King Ivan VI. For the next five years, their forces marched up and down the length and breadth of our land, all fighting each other in the name of 'King Ivan VI'. The climax was reached when three armies of mercenaries, all employed by Ivan the Aggravating, slaughtered each "other in the Battle of Szczrzujch, each believing that the others were employed by one of the other Ivans. No sooner was the article on pp. 6-8 on stencil than the New York Times came through with a book review (in the book review section of the issue of 11 January 1976) defending Senator Jackson against a hatchet job by one Peter J. Ognibene. The reviewer, Father Andrew M. Greeley, shows that Ognibene is comparing Jackson to everything from Richard Nixon to the shark in Jaws, and also attacks his wife for using too strong a hair spray.

The Times has seen which way the country is going and, tired of backing losing men and losing policies, is getting out in front.

Does anyone out there remember Marvin Rosenblum? Well, he's the fellow who, last summer, started organizing "Hands Across America" as his contribution to this Bicentennial tomfoolery. FNTER THE HERO

More is needed for a war than a lot of planes, bombs, guns, and soldiers. The psychological preparation of a people for a war effort is an important item as a nation undertakes to assert its sovereign will on the field of battle. A will to conquer must be instilled into the public, and this will must be focused behind a great war leader.

As the United States of America prepares to assert its supremacy upon the African continent, this necessary ingredient is also being brought forward. A man is wanted who can focus the will of a people at war as was done by Presidents Lincoln and Roosevelt, Prime Ministers Charchill, Ben-Luryon, or Stalin, or Kaiser Wilhelm II. The presidential election in November is going to produce him, and the signs of his advent are already present.

First, he is going to have to be a Democrat. The realities of the American political scene compel this, without regard to any merits of the Republican Party. For whatever reason, and whether it is a 'good' or 'bad' thing in some abstract sense, the majority of the American people is Democratic, and thus any leader who unites the ranks behind him will have to be a Democrat. The Democrats now control 61% of the Senate, 67% of the House of Representatives, 72% of the governorships, and a comparable proportion of state legislative seats. In the nation, and in almost every state, Republican victories have been due to a belief among normally Democratic voters that certain special circumstances justify a temporary shift to a particular candidate of the other party, and not to the existence of a large popular majority of Republicans.

This can be illustrated by congressional reaction to the Vietnam War, an operation now temporarily suspended so that the African/Mi dle Eastern cituation can be settled. As long as a Democratic President was our war leader, the large Democratic majority in Congress gave him loyal and unquestioning support. But out of the normal operations of partisan bias, they egan to oppose the same steps when taken by a Republican President.

The country cannot now afford such divisiveness. More to the point, neither can Congress, whose continuation as a part of the governmental structure depends on their cessation of opposition to the President of the United States and the men he has honored with his confidence. (This is why cooler heads suppressed the congressional attempts to cite Prime Minister Kissinger and the Scaretary of Commerce for contempt. Members of Congress are aware, or can have it carefully explained to them, what will happen to them and their lovely salaries and perquedities if they should put themselves in opposition to His Excellency the Presidence, "Sommander-in-Chief, and Supreme War Leader of the United States of America.)

This Democratic President, who will take the Oath of Office in 355 days, must have a majority comparable to Roosevelt's or Johnson's if he is to fulfill this mission. Such a majority will be provided by a public which not only admires him, but fears, hates, or despises his adversary. Towards this end, these adversaries are being built up by the media as begeyman from whom we will be saved by their electoral defeat.

For the Republicans, this will be very easy. Gerald Ford is being presented as a bumbling ideat, whose accidental presidency will collapse when he is defeated and disgraced in the primary elections by Ronald Reagan. ("President Gerald Ford, in the last months of 1975 became the country's leading target for jokes, an easy subject for comedians looking for quick laughs. Gone was all reverence for the White House and the No. 1 position in the land." - Werl Wilson, New York Post, 27 December 1975) Then it will be the Democrats turn. George Wallace is being pritrayed as a crippled, simplistic racist; Hubert Humphrey as an outdated prairie windbag; and Edward Kennedy as a slavering lecher, the brother and heir of slavering lechers.

Finally, after the conventions, Ronald Reagan will have the full force turned on him. He will be another Goldwater, by contrast with the moderate views and all-encompassing concern of his Democratic rival. Moderate Republicans will endorse the Democratic candidate, or maybe form a totally ineffectual third party. Tuesday 2 November will see the landslide election of the 39th President of the United States of America: Henry Martin Jackson. The man and the hour will have met.

This hard-working, straight-forward, patriotic man will succeed where Presidents Johnson and Nixon failed. He will make the American war effort in Africa everything

that President Roosevelt made the American war effort against the Axis, or that President Kennedy would have made of Vietnam had he lived. (Or so I interpret his Inaugural Address.) He can inspire the spirit of dedication and sacrifice which is necessary to a successful war effort, and which did not get across to the American people during the Vietnam War.

Nor will we see, under President Jackson, the spirit of dissent and dissidence that was abroad in those days. This was made clear by R. W. Apple Jr., whose article in the New York Times Magazine of 23 November 1975 was in effect the opening gun of the Jackson campaign. In 1967 he stopped speaking to a congressman from his state who renegod on support of the war. In 1972, with Pacifist sentiment growing in the Democratic Party, he said, "The American people are fed up with those who advocate amnesty." He made sure that not one vote from Washington's delegation to the 1972 Democratic convention went to McCorean. To his work at Democratic conventions he has insisted not merely on a major- 🐃 ity, but on unanimity. Nothing less will do in a nation as it goes to war.

As a Senator, Henry Jackson's chief identification has been with military policy and its subordinate branch, foreign policy. (President Nixon once asked him to be Secretary of Defense, a sure sign that his expertise will attract Republican as well as Democratic support.) "There exists a photograph of him, taken in his office," writes Apple, "in which he is surrounded by no fewer than nine missile models: This is he is smiling proudly, like a man surrounded by his children." While other Democratic candidates, even the once firmly pro-war Senator Humphrey, flirt with Pacifism, Senator Jackson maintains his identification with a strong military posture. This will assure him strong financial support and political backing from industry, labor, and the press, all of which were on record by largarmajerities in favor of the Vietnam War, and who have the same interest now in Africa. Indeed, Senator Jackson now has more financial backing than any other Democratic candidate save for the aberrant Wallaco.

His other stands also command considerable voter support. He is a firm O Optic friend of our subject ally Israel, and recognizes that Israel is a faithful N Nerves and deserving servant of America's imperial interests in the Middle East. He has recently come out against school integration, or 'busing' as it is now # 689 fashionable to call it. This stand can also be regarded as an effort to strengthen America's military position. Since the very beginning of the Republic, the backbone of the infantry has been the poor white from the city slums or the southern boondocks. Now that we have in effect a volunteer army, the good will of these people must be cultivated by such means as Senator Jackson is using. They are not going to be anxious to defend a country that insists their children should go to school with blacks. The merits of school integration, a cause I have worked for for over two decades, must be subordinated to the requirements of America's armed forces.

This, then, is the man to bring us together. Under President Jackson, the Democratic Party will rid itself of Wallace racists and Abzug Pacifists, to become once more the great provider of both guns and butter that it was during the New Deal. As President, Henry Jackson will command the support of business for his views on arms production, of labor for his support of bread-and-butter social welfare issues, of Jews for his views on Israel, of blacks for his support of civil rights, .. in short, of every American who does not interpret his or her citizenship as a license to oppose the country's President armed forces, and high imperial destiny.

For New Yorkers, Senator Jackson's election to the presidency will have a special meaning. In order to balance his ticket, this western Protestant will go looking for an eastern Catholic. He will find one in Albany: Governor Hugh Carey. Temperamentally, the two men are well attured to each other. The hearly, outgoing, Irish-American Carey will balance well with the serious, solid, introspective Jackson. Nor will the two men differ greatly on policy, particularly on military policy. When, in 1965, it became shockingly evident that some Americans believed they had a right to oppose their country when their country was at war, then-Representative Carey replied to this arrogance:

"Over the past weekend, in several regions of the country, we witnessed a deplorable spectacle of the new fifth column in America. I say this column is more than deplorable - it is despicable. Until I find a better name for this

column. I shall refer to it as the '5-A Vanguard'. This vanguard would aid and abet anyone against America.

"... The 5-A column is not truly a free movement. It is not a positive nor constructive movement.

"The Vice President of the United States indicated over this weekend that it is not a movement indigenous to the communities in which it is seen. He stated that there are indications that it is being controlled from without. As a controlled movement, I would question that it is entitled to the protection that it has thus far enjoyed from civil authority." - Congressional Record, Vol. 111, Part 20, p. 27205

As Vice-President, Hugh Carey would be in a position to do something about "protection ...from the civil authority" should anyone be so reckless to oppose the Angola War as they opposed the Vietnam War. He is in total agreement with Senator Jaekson on this; Apple quotes Jackson as saying, "We know who our friends and enemies are without keeping a list".
