The deadline for "Spring 1901" moves is NOON, SATURDAY 11 DECEMBER 1976. Any player who does not have the GRAUSTARK postal Diplomacy rules should send for #346, in which they were last reprinted. If you wish other players to contact you by phone, please send in your phone number.

This one page of GRAUSTARK #355 will be sent in advance to the players so they can get negotiations under weigh. I am happy to be able to report that the six players who stated country preferences got either first or second choice, despite a wide spread of preference. Counting first place as 6 points, second as 5, etc., the preferences were Turkey 27, Russia 25, England 24, France 19, Germany 14, Austria-Hungary 13, Italy 5 - despite the fact that Italy has nice leads in 1975H & 1975AP, and is still going in 3 of the 4 other current 1975 games.

NOW HEAR THIS!

Over the past few months, many postal Diplomacy players in GRAUSTARK have become very sloppy about getting moves in on time. This means that several games have had to go to press with moves missing. It also means that it takes longer and longer to prepare an issue of GRAUSTARK for printing, particular with even-numbered issues when EMPIRE is also going to press.

Many players have tried to make up for laziness by phoning in moves at the last minute. Since GRAUSTARK deadlines are on Saturday noons, this means that hasty long-distance phone calls come in late Friday night, or even on Saturday morning. The last straw was the last issue, when I was still typing stencils at 4 in the afternoon while five collators waited for something to do.

With my full approval and encouragement, my wife is no longer taking Friday phone calls full of moves that should have been mailed in days earlier. (I am so seldom home on Friday nights that I rarely get them myself.) I have stopped making last-minute collect calls to players who are notoriously move-missers, though I will still do it if a player with a good record should be unheard-from on deadline morning.

This warning is particularly important at this time of year, because heavy Christmas mail may delay the next couple of moves. Players should also note that the deadline for GRAUSTARK #357 is New Year's Day, on which there is no mail delivery. Deadlines on that date will also be noon, however.

The earlier your moves come in, the sooner I can cut and print the pages of GRAUSTARK, and the sooner it will get into the mail. Since there is only one mailbox pickup here on Saturday, and one on Sunday, an early mailing of GRAUSTARK can mean that you will receive it a day earlier. If you are bothered by insufficient negotiation time or mistaken adjudications due to hurried preparation and late mailing of GRAUSTARK, the remedy lies largely in your own hands,

THE JIMMY CARTER DEMOCRATIC ESSAY CONTEST AND WAR POOL

President-Elect Carter's recent victory, and the certainty of war which follows from it, will make it possible for alert, creative, or lucky GRAUSTARK readers to get something for nothing. Two contests are hereby announced, open to all readers: an essay contest and a pool on the location of the next war.

The essay contest asks readers to tell, within certain reasonable restrictions, why Democratic administrations are necessarily war-time administrations. The topic is formally set thus:

"Explain, in 2000 words or less, why the election of a Democratic President of the United States of America is always followed by a war which involves American armed forces."

The deadline for this contest is TUESDAY 15 FEBRUARY 1977. The winner will receive two free entries in GRAUSTARK postal Diplomacy games, or the equivalent in entry fees for games in GRAUSTARK's sister publication EMPIRE. The winning essay will be printed in GRAUSTARK.

The following ideas are suggested as points which contestants may wish to make in their essays. Other reasons may of course also be included.

1. Whenever the world's economic system is in trouble, it sets up social forces which bring Democratic administrations to power in the United States, and militaristic groups to power in other countries. Thus, Democrats are running the US when someone gets militaristic enough to want to fight us.
 2. Republicans represent "old money" while Democrats represent "new money". "New money" got that way through profiting from social upheavals, and war represents a first-rate money-making opportunity.
 3. Wages always go sharply up during war-time, and the strong role played by organized labor in the Democratic Party means that pressures towards war are always greater when the Democrats are in power.
 4. Democrats favor the centralization of more power in the federal government, and no activity centralizes power in the government so much as war does.
 5. Democrats favor projects that give employment out of public money to people at the lowest economic levels. Since soldiers are always recruited from the lowest economic levels, war is the easiest way to provide that employment.
 6. New immigrants and their immediate descendants are always interested in the "Old Country"; and readily advocate that the United States go to war to help the "Old Country". Such people have a much larger voice in the Democratic than in the Republican Party.
 7. Democratic policy in Congress is made by very senior southerners who are often anti-black. Since blacks are represented in the armed forces at a higher proportion than in the general population, Democrats see war as a way of getting rid of them.
 8. Democrats are more likely than Republicans to attract people of high ideals, who enunciate broad moral principles as a guide to practical action. Historically, this sort of thing has always led to war and violence.
 9. Democrats habitually mismanage government, and war in the name of "National Unity" is a good way to avoid being held responsible for this mismanagement.
 10. The American people honestly and sincerely prefer war to peace, and as the majority party the Democrats are putting this policy into effect.
 11. For nearly a hundred years, the Democrats have been devoted to inflating the currency, and war is the most effective producer of inflation.
 12. Foreign leaders see Democratic administrations as being weak, vulnerable, and pacifistic, and therefore always attack us when the Democrats are in power.
- In addition to these conditions, two lines of argument are going to have to be specifically excluded from the essay contest, as leading in no useful direction. These are:

1. "There is no necessary causal linkage between Democratic administrations and war." Such a notion as this rejects the entire 20th-century history of the United States of America.

2. "War in general, and the Carter Administration's war in particular, is wrong." The notion that peace is preferable to war is a notion that has been firmly rejected by the government of the United States of America, and it is therefore morally wrong. I am not going to publish any statement that could be regarded as opposition to the absolute right of His Excellency the President, Commander-in-Chief, and Supreme War Leader of the United States of America to make war at any time, by any means, and against any enemy that he selects. In setting this policy I am doing a favor to those people who would otherwise be so misguided as to utter such opinions. They will not be tolerated; anyone who doubts this should take a look at President-Elect Carter's record during the Vietnam War.

Essays that argue either or both of the positions placed above in quotes will not be admitted into the contest, and are likely in the future to prove highly dangerous to the authors.

But, you say, you have no skill in composition? In that case, GRAUSTARK has another contest for you. This is, to guess the country in which United States troops will first be sent following President Carter's inauguration. This is how you do it.

1. Send in \$1 and the name of the first foreign country into which United States Army or Marine Corps troops will be sent, following President Carter's inauguration on 20 January 1977.

2. Contestants may send in any number of entries, so long as each entry specifies a different country and is accompanied by \$1.

3. Upon the beginning of the war, the total amount sent in for the War Pool will be divided equally among the people who guessed the right target country, and mailed back to them, less postage costs.

4. The contest closes on Wednesday 19 January 1977, and all entries must be received by then.

5. By "country" is meant a de facto sovereign nation existing as of 20 November 1976. If, for example, the troops should be sent to Tulkarm, in the region which Israel annexed from Jordan in 1967, the winning country will be Israel rather than Jordan since Israel exercises de facto sovereignty in Tulkarm. Similarly, if troops are sent to Belfast, "Great Britain" rather than "Ireland" will be the winning country. If K.A.I. should declare its independence from South Africa after 20 November, "South Africa" wins, but if the declaration takes place between now and the time this issue goes to press, any US troops sent into regions controlled by the rebels will be considered to have invaded Namibia. "Zimbabwe" shall be taken as meaning "Rhodesia" and vice versa.

6. The troops sent must be regular, reserve, or National Guard troops of the United States of America, and must be operating on the ground. Locally recruited guerrillas, mercenaries in US pay, bombing the region from the air or shelling it from the sea, do not count as US military action for the purposes of this contest.

7. The winning country will be the country in which the US troops are physically located, not the country they are fighting or on whose benefit they are fighting. If, for example, US troops invade Iraq to fight Iranians for the benefit of Saudi Arabia and to impress the Russians, Iraq and no other will be the winning country.

8. The Gamesmaster will have the final decision in case of any doubt.

All entries in both contests should be sent to John Boardman, 234 East 19th Street, Brooklyn, New York 11226 before the deadline. For example, let us suppose that Lebanon is the winning country, and 15 out of 25 entrants picked it. The \$25 will be divided into 15 equal parts of \$1.66 each (fractions go to the management), and so after postage is subtracted each winner will receive \$1.53.

After entries close, the number of entries specified for each country will be published in GRAUSTARK, though not the entrants' names. Names of winning entrants will be published when the war begins.

Don't let war be a thing from which only the rich and powerful profit. Join the GRAUSTARK War Pool and take in your own little bundle from the next war.

1975CQ - A VERY BRIEF REVIEW

This postal Diplomacy game was announced in GRAUSTARK #328 on 3 May 1975, and the first moves were published 4 weeks later in #330. It ended with an English victory in "Fall 1909" in #354, published on 30 October 1976. The supply center chart is:
