Then, the weakness of an Austrian/Turkish alliance came to the fore. Though the alliance had a majority of centers we could not break a stalemate line. No western power would join Austria/Turkey. realization, Turkey and Austria had a falling out, a real one. It was interesting for a while, but it let France gain a dominating position. At that point Turkey and Austria reconciled, and played for our own stalemate.

I congretulate Larry, Mike, Dave and Jerry for holding the line. Dave wrote often, and I felt deserved to be part of the draw. But it was not to be. My strategic mistake of not obtaining a western ally caused the game to bog down. Overall, it was very enjoyable, and of course superbly gamesmastered.

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Despite my announcement on page 3 of the last issue, not everyone got their 20th Anniversary Issue brought to them by the new Brooklyn Bridge centennial stamp. The press run was larger, and the packages weightier, than I had suspected, so I had to make do with other stamps.

I have decided not to buy Epyx's game Sword of Fargoal. ("Far Goal", get it?) While Epyx's own advertising literature doesn't mention the fact, the actual game box asserts that a joystick is needed to play the game. This means that, though it is billed as an adventure game, it actually requires those blazing reflexes that you may see at your neighborhood (and I do mean 'hood') game arcade.

These arcades, incidentally, were praised by President Reagan in his famous speech before the National Association of Evangelicals. He quite accurately pointed out how these games train the fast reflexes needed in time of war. They also reduce the enemy to a blip on a screen, thus eliminating those humanitarian feelings that can do so

much damage to the soldierly spirit.

Owo more people needs to be acknowledged in the collation of the 20th Anniversary Issue. Ira Donewitz dropped by, complete with a home-baked cake for the festivities. Ira was once a regular habitue of the collating sessions, and it's good to see him back. Nina Bogin, whose artwork enlivens APA-Q, also participated in assembling the issue.

I recently sprung for Avalon-Hill's new game Civilization, which sets up to 7 players against each other in the Mediterranean basin of about 3000 or 4000 years B. C. E. Their population markers must settle in a region located somewhere between Carthage and Mesopotamia inclusively, build cities and fleets, establish colonies, fend off onehanother's encroachments, and by adroit trade build up such desirable things as Astronomy, Drama, Law, Architecture, and Philosophy. (Curiously, the trade goods do not include slaves.) It is a first-rate "beer-and-pretzels" game, and I am vainly trying to figure out a way to adapt it to postal play. This is hampered by the lack of a notation for the spaces, and more so by the fact that the postal game will not be able to retain the trading rules, which are one of the games liveliest and most characteristic features. (If you've ever played the classic game Pit, you know how they work.) There are also disasters to be dealt with, including Famine, Civil War, Piracy, and little problems with Mounts Vesuvius, Aetna, and Thera.
