SCOTT CAMERON (Austria-Hungary): In winning this game there were two things I had to accomplish. First I had to eliminate Russia & Turkey & become the dominant power in the east. Second, I had to break up a strong English-French alliance to clear the

way to making A-H the dominant power on the beard.

In eliminating Russia & Turkey I was greatly aided by the fact that the Russian player was a novice & that he was not corducting any correspondence. At first this forced me into an A/T alliance but, since A/T alliances generally end with a successful Turkish stab, I wanted out of this alliance as quickly as possible. For that reson I kept peppering the Tsar with letters hoping against hope to get a response from him & was finally rewarded with a letter which eventually led to a strong A/R alliance My position at that point was very good. I knew Turkey & Russia couldn't be allied since the Turk had long ago stopped trying to contact the Tsar & I knew that a Russian alliance with another player (i. e. Germany or Italy) was unlikely for the same reas sons. I could then pick my own course, secure in the knowledge that my two neighbors would be making the moves they told me they make and that a stab of me was unlikely. Accordingly, I stabbed Turkey &, with Russian help, polished him off. I then turned on my erstwhile Russian ally &, with English help, eliminated him.

While I was engaged in reducing Turkey in the east, a new problem arose in the west. An E/F alliance had been formed & France had put several fleets into the Med. Italy was on the verge of elimination & I knew I would be next. It was vital that I get England to stab France & get those French fleets turned north. My breaking up of E/F was facilitated by the fact that England had been building nothing but fleets & so had only one army with which to attack the interior of Europe, obviously a hopeless case. It was only necessary for me to point out to the English player that he would never expand beyong eight or ten centers while France would surely win the game. England did the only thing he could - stab France - & after that I felt that victory was

mine to win or lose.

I compliment the other players on an interesting game filled with a lot of fler ible diplomacy. I also apologize to all the people I stabbed. When I saw I had drawn A-H in this game I decided to go for the win & I never wavered in my decision.

ROBERT PEART (Turkey): This was my very first Postal Diplomacy game in any zine and I learned a lot waile having a great deal of fun. I received my first Diplomacy correspondence from Scott Cameron and for that reason I must have, unfortunately,

felt a certain amount of loyalty and trust towards him.

After Scott had broken our alliance by moving on Turkey I approached Russia and Italy. Russia felt he had more to gain by allying with a strong Austria rather than a weak Turkey even though Austria's position showed that his next victim would probably be the also weak Russia. Plans were made and agreed to on the phone with Italy (Pal ter) which Italy sould have made me lose only one center, Italy gain one or two centers and Austria stay even. He, of course, NMRed out of the game. Then, when France's plea for co-operation between Russia and Turkey was not agreeable to Russia I was doomed to the ever growing, powerful Austrian who very neatly made his way to Congratulations to Scott and thanks to John and the other players for a good game.

He now reportedly spends his time banging his forehead into walls in between his dart throwing escapades wherein he throws 9" long, needle-sharp darts at A) a detailed map of Philomath, Oregon, B) a United States Postal Service Emblem, and C) a smiling photograph of the one and only Bob Bragdon. Bob is smiling as he watches his troops throw German babies up into the air and catch them on their bayonettes "so they won't land on the hard ground and hurt themselves". The remains of the German government are now reportedly conrolled by Harpo the smiling Gorilla. Harpo, a pet of the Kaisers', plays with a Diplomacy board in his castle. At the end of the day, aids visit Harpo to feed him and the aids then look at the Diplomacy board. Where the units lie on the board are where they are ordered next season. An aid to Harpo had this to say about the situation: "Harpo's plans are somewhat unorthodox but they can't be any worse than that fool Ellis'es. least Harpo may get his orders innn, eugh..." A 9" long dart penetrated the aid's cranium and the aid falls to the floor. A crazed laughing scream echos from the parlor where Kaiser Ellis now lives. Harpo loyally picks the dart out of the bloody corpse's head and brings it to "master" who pats Harpo on the head and then quickly locks and bars his door as aids rush up to see what is happening. It appears that the Kaiser has gone mad indeed.

OVER THE BOARD AND AROUND THE RULES

As far as I was concerned, the major event of Atlanticon 84 (3-5 August) was the Diplomacy tournament, which together with Robert Sacks I refereed. On the first day of play, Saturday the 4th, there were 8 boards involving, naturally, 56 players. The tournament started in one of the Towson State College classroom buildings at 4 PM. Some people wondered at this rather late our, but it has been the experience of several war-gaming tournaments that a bigger turnout shows for Diplomacy when it begins late in the day, than when it begins at 10 or 11 in the morning. The first session ran to 11 PM, and the second session began from 9 to 10 the next morning, as people straggled in and a new room had to be found.

Atlanticon 84 was generally well run, but the air conditioning gave out in the originally scheduled room, and as it was an unusually hot weekend we annexed for the second session a room originally reserved for some Avalon-Hill function. No one from A-H ever showed up to claim it, and so all went well. The second round attracted 35 people for 5 boards, and unusually large number for a second round. It is not necessary to attend both rounds to win a prize, but some people who may not have done so well on Saturday, or had conscientious objections towards recognizing the hour of 9 AM Sunday, understandably found other things to do on the last day of the tournament.

The tournament once again showed the efficiency and fairness of Robert Sacks' scoring system. Within the time constraints of a weekend tournament, games rarely go to an 18-center victory by one player. None of these 13 did, and all had to be adjudicated as draws. There were two 2-way draws, seven 3-ways, one 4-way, one 5-way, and 2 stalemates.

For only the second time, the same player got two best-of-country awards. Tony Heart not only won the tournament, but got Best France and Best Russia in his two games. Doug Byrnes came in second, and was also Best England. A surprise third-place finisher was a newcomer, Paul Kenny, who had a little trouble the first day as his local group had apparently been playing a variant rule whereby passing through a previously unclaimed supply center in Spring guaranteed you possession of it in Mall. But he stayed in the game and his scores on the two days gave him third place. Mark Klansek got Best Austria and fifth place, Jeff Robertson got Gest Turkey and seventh place, and Brad Wilson got Best Germany on the second day. (This was vigorously contested, since the first day's best Germany was so low that everyone realized it would be easy to beat on Sunday.)

The most complicated adjudication occured on the first day, when a 2-way draw was claimed on one of the boards. Jim York, a mill-hand from North Carolina who was quite a contrast to the usual crowd of war-game convention addicts, tried to justify his claim that a victory was possible for the alliance of which he was a leading member. The opposing alliance, headed by John Caruso, merely had to prove that they could meet all of York's plans and block them. York unuscessfully protested that the Caruso alliance had to prove a draw. Robert and I held him to the rules - the Caruso didn't have to prove a draw, but York had to prove a win. After projecting the game several moves into the future, York was unable to support his claim, and the game ended as a 5-way draw. It was good enough, however, to win Best Italy for York.

To judge from the questions of some players, there are a lot of groups of Diplomacy players who allow variants from the actual rules. The case cited above, of allowing possession of a supply center just for passing through it on a Spring move, is an example. Other groups apparently allow convoyed retreats, convoyed supports, or draws that do not include all survivors. There were also questions raised about the "Beleaguered Garrison" rule (Rule IX.5), and whether a unit can cut support against it by attacking the supporting piece (Rule X.8) There was even an attempt to order a piece to move, and to order another piece to support it holding in case the move should fail. This is explicitly forbidden by Rule IX.6.

There was also some trouble with the particular tournament rules. Like the problems with the Rulebook, they arose mainly from an inability to read and comprehend a passage of English prose. For example, on the first day one table of players agreed on a draw, put the pieces away, and then informed the referees that the game

was a draw. This explicitly contradicted the tournament rules, which said that all draws must be checked with a referee. The game had to be reconstituted from the last sets of written moves, and only then could a draw be established. The scoring system also drew some criticism despite its simplicity. This simply involves adding together the numbers of supply centers possessed at the end of each game year, giving the last a weight of 10, and also adding together the number of years themselves, again giving the last a weight of 10. For example, refer to the final report of postal Diplomacy game 1983L, on the front page of GRAUSTARK #496. To establish the score of the Englist player in that game, just add the supply centers from 1901 on: 4 plus 5 plus 6 plus 6 plus 7 plus 8 plus 11 plus 10 plus (10 times 10) - since the last year is to be given a weight of 10. This gives a total of 157. Then add the years from 1901 to 1909; that would be nine, but the last year is given a weight of 10, so we instead have 18. Dividing 157 by 18 gives a result of 8.722, which would be the English score in this game. Bonuses are given for winning (10 points) or for sharing in a draw (10 divided by the number of people sharing). The "draws include all survivors" rule (abbreviated by some as "DTAS") is not followed in the tournament owing to time pressures

There was a very interesting talk by John Sapienza, with numerous comments from the audience, about the Christian campaign to ban Dungeons & Dragons and other Fantasy Role-Playing (FRP) games. There is a report of Sapienza's talk, and my own comments on how to deal with this stupid campaign, in EMPIRE #197. (Send a 20¢ stamp if you'd like a copy.)

A couple of obligations left over from Atlanticon still have to be dealt with. On 4 August Robert and I found, in the Diplomacy gaming room, a drawstring bag which was obviously lost by a FRP gamer. Normally I would say that the owner can have the bag by identifying the contents. However, it is well-known that FRP gamers use such bags to carry the large numbers of various shapes of dice which these games require. Therefore, I am asking the owner to identify the color of the bag, the color of its drawstring, and the number of thirty-sided dice in the bag. I would also appreciate \$2 for postage to send it back to him or her. Since not too many FRP gamers read GRAUSTARK, I would appreciate it if readers could pass the information on to any FRP 'zines with which they may be familiar.

While at Atlanticon, I promised someone a copy of the rules to Chaosium's game King Arthur's Knights. Unfortunately, I failed to write down the name of the person

who made this request of me. Could he or she please write and jog my memory?

On Saturday 11 August, President Reagan was about to give His weekly radio address to us His people. Testing the microphone, He said: "My fellow Americans, I'm pleased to tell you today that I've signed legislation that will outlaw Russia forever.

We begin bombing in five minutes."

For reasons completely opaque to most people, these unexceptionable remarks caused a storm of protest. But what is so remarkable about a President and Commander-in-Chief of the Great Big United States of America threatening the Soviet Union with nuclear destruction? The last eight Presidents have overseen plans for the Great Big United States of America to attack the Soviet Union with nuclear weapons. (See Peter Pringle & William Arkin, S. I. O. P.: The Secret U. S. Plan for Nuclear War, which was reviewed in GRAUSTARK 486.)

The M-X missile program makes no sense as a weapon unless it is used for a first, or pre-emptive, strike. Furthermore, the Great Big United States of America, under the leadership of Our President, is presently putting into place a "Star Wars" nuclear defense program, an absolutely impenetrable shield, which will destroy in flight any missile aimed at our superior nation by any malcontent who resents our global supremacy. Once this shield, this "astrodome", is in place, the Great Big United States of America will be able to plaster any nation with nuclear missiles and not have to fear

the slightest retaliation.

A week later, Our President was again testing a microphone. After a week of wailing by Pacifists who traitorously think that an American nuclear attack on the Soviet Union could in any way be "wrong", he again put into words the concepts that are closest to his heart.
