WHEN YOU SAY THAT, DRAW!

Several of the games now running in GRAUSTARK are reaching positions where draws seem a good idea to many of the players. Others have quite obviously reached the place where time could be saved by conceding victory to the player who is obviously going to win anyway in a couple more game years. There seems to be some misunderstanding as to what is involved in the vote of a concession or a draw.

Rule II states that "Players may terminate the game by mutual agreement before a winner is determined, in which case all players who still have pieces on the board share equally in a draw." This condition is sometimes called "DIAS" for "Draws Include All Survivors."

I have stressed this point because, in negotiations for draws in past GRAUSTARK games, some players have acted as if "DIAS" is a personal idiosyncracy of my own, which I have arbitrarily imposed upon Diplomacy. This requirement tfor a negotiated draw is as much a part of Diplomacy, as forward Pawn moves are a part of Chess. It is as if, before or during their current match for the world championship, **Eneto**li Karpov or Gary Kasparov had proposed that Pawns be allowed to move backwards, and had held up play until the opponent's unreasonable prejudice against such a rule had been overcome by much argument.

(Perhaps I shouldn't press this analogy too hard. Bobby Fisher and Viktor Korch-

noi would both have been capable of making such a stipulation.)

If, in the negotiations for a postal Diplomacy draw, some players feel that others should not share in the draw, their mode of procedure is clear - eliminate the unwanted players on the board, if they can.

If a proposal for a draw is offered in a game, Postal-Rule 21A requires that all players must vote for it for the draw to become effective. An abstention counts as a negative vote. The vote must be for that turn only; "A player may not give a vote which is good for more than one move at a time."

Usually the inevitability of a draw dawns, sooner or later, on the players. How-

ever, in the event that it does not, there is Postal Rule 21B:

"If three full game years go by, beginning with a 'Spring' move and including the winter' moves, without a piece being built, removed, or annihilated, and if no power gains or loses a net number of supply centers" then the game is declared a draw among the surviving players.

This rule is modeled after Chess's "fifty-move rule", which provides that a game is a draw if 50 moves go by without a piman being captured or a Pawn being moved. "A net number of supply centers" is provided so that two allies do not delay the draw by swapping a pair of supply centers back and forth. In the history of GRAUSTARK games, this rule has never been invoked. However, such a situation seems to be shaping up in 1983AJ. "Spring 1910" was the beginning of a period of deadlock such as that described in Postal Rule 21B, and that deadlock has now gone 14: of the necessary 3 years, as the players refuse to vote a draw.

People who have played in over-the-board Diplomacy tournaments know that rather different criteria are used for settling draws under those circumstances. These tournaments are played under time limitations, and cannot afford to wait out a tangled

board situation as we can in postal play.

In five of the fourteen Diplomacy games currently in progress in GRAUSTARK, one player has at least fourteen of the necessary eighteen supply centers. While there have been many close-fought games in the past where such a lead did not bring about a victory, players in those games should at least consider proposing and voting on a concession to that leader.

THE MINISTRY OF MISCELLANY

GRAUSTARK has just gone over to a four-week publishing cycle while my other postal war-gaming 'zine, EMPIRE, remains on a three-week schedule. This means that, every 12

weeks, the two publications will come out on the same day.

The first such day will be four weeks hence, when GRAUSTARK #502 and EMPIRE #204 come out on the same day. The games run in EMPIRE take much more time to adjudicate than do Diplomacy games, but that will be a holiday week, so I'll be able to get both 'zines done. The next such coincidence of publication dates comes on 23 March, which will present more problems, and I'll have to see at that time how this matter is working out. PLEASE STAND BY

When GRAUSTARK went to a four-week schedule with the 500th issue, I felt that at last the problem of late moves would be solved. Certainly everyone could get moves in

for a four-week deadline, couldn't they? Couldn't they?

Well, what happened was that five people missed their moves in a total of six positions in this present issue - the most immany months. And here we get one of the problems with longer deadlines - people tend to forget that they have a deadline due for moves, if the deadlines are too far apart.

Of the five people who missed moves, two were replaced by stand-by players in 1983AS. A third should have been replaced in 1983HF, but I made a mistake in that game. The person I called on had already been in that game, which is against Postal Rule 5. Therefore, that player's moves are missed again, and a different stand-by has

been called upon.

BERLIN: REICH REUNITED!! Yesterday, the florious 7th of November, the triumphant troops of the 3rd army liberated Munich! With perfect timing, too, for that day was

the birthday of our beloved Kaiser Mark, who turned 23.

The mood in Berlin was exhilirating. People thronged in the streets, laughing,

singing, and stoning POWs.

MUNICH (DAMN): The mood in Munich today, Nov. 8th, is somber. Much work remains to obe done in rebuilding the shattered city, razed, burnt, and looted by years of French and Austrian occupation. However, many students and workers are already flocking to Berlin, to enlist in a new army of vengeance.

The most surprising incident in the recapture of the city was the quick thrust by the Danube Flotilla, formerly the Vistula, formerly the Oder flotilla. Kaptain Karl Student, spokesman for the 4th army which assisted the 3rd in taking the city, commented, "I still don't understand the interest, especially the French interest, in this

flotilla!

PARIS (DAMN): An Imperial flag draped the Eifle? (I hate French words) - now the Hurwitz, tower today, as scores of Frenchmen cheered the arrival of the 1st army today, November 8th. Coming one day after the reunification of Germany, and the Kaiser's birthday, the victory is seen by many as the icing on the cake. Adrimal Rauterberg was captured attempting to sneak out in a jet aircraft. He was unsuccessful, probably because there are no jet aircraft in 1960. Scheduled for summary execution, the Kaiser ordered him committed to a mental institution instead. try. This means that any food given to the government of that nation will be used by the government to secure its control over the country. It should further be noticed that several parts of Ethiopia are in revolt against the Communistic government - the provinces of Eritrea and Tigre in the north, and the Somali-claimed Ogaden in the east. These revolts, like the revolts against the pro-Communist government of Nica-rague, have American support. By not sending food to the rebellious provinces the Ethiopian Communistic government can use the help sent by soft-hearted and compassionate ate Americans as a weapon against movements backed by America.

This means that anyone supporting famine relief in Ethiopia is going to be in for considerable trouble in the future. If you send a check to some innocent-sounding relief program in 1985, by 1988 you may find yourself explaining to an unsympathetic investigative agency, during an election year, buty you helped a Communistic government secure its control over rebellious provinces which had the support of the U.S. government. Don't getcaught in this trap!

Bill Hardiman (England) did not present a good case for his side so I formed a strong alliance with Jack Brawner (France), a very good player. As a matter of convenience, I worked with Roy Henricks (Russia) to gang upon England first. All was going well.

Then I started to get silly letters with multi-player distribution. I do not like negotiating with a group of countries in the semi-open. Negotiations should be one on one, with only a few exceptions. At that point my alliance withHenricks, who instigated much of this group letter policy, was shaky.

Once England was weakened, I went against Russia. I had no other avenue of growth

anyway.

Despite some stubborn defense I made steady headway. Throughout the game I was helped by opponent NMRs. On the one hand these NMRs help, but they also detract from the satisfaction of the struggle. Many times Jack could have stabbed, but he did not. My appreciation was genuine, and my intention for a two-way draw sincere. If a vote for a two-way draw with other survivors was possible I would definitely have voted for it. However, in this 'zine it is not, and two-way draws are difficult to effect. Itil Still, only when Jack NMRed did I decide to go for the win. Even then I could not lie to him and "telegraphed" my stab. With weak opposition in the east progress continued to the victory.

My thanks to you, John, for another enjoyable game and prompt distribution. Too had the 3-week deadline is no longer feasible, but I have the advantage of living in the middle of the country. My thanks to the other players, though I wish there were fewer NMRs.
