THE FALL AND RISE OF THE TURKISH GOVERNMENT IN 1980CZ

I know, if you are reading this article in CRAUSTARK, that you are not likely to be ignorant of the game of Diplomacy, but if you happen to be a friend of relative of the person to whom GRAUSTARK is sent, it's quite possible that you don't have the foggiest idea of what the game of Diplomacy is all about. It's also likely that you believe Diplomacy is, at best, a waste of time, and at worst, a training ground for

future warmongers.

Neither of the above is true. Diplomacy is a war game, and for some, anything to do with war will always be evil and any game will always be a waste of time. I take the position, however, that Diplomacy is not just any game, no more than Chess, Backgammon, Parcheesi, Monopoly, Poker, or Zork are just any games. Instead, Diplomacy is a great game. As such, it provides diversion at the simplest level. If your life is fascinating, then you don't require diversion. For the rest of us, diversion offers us a chance to be somewhere else, be someone else, love something else, and in general pretend that we're masters of the universe instead of cogs in the machine.

Great games go a step beyond diversion. They seem to capture some part of reality, and allow us to manipulate it and taste it and be crushed by it at our leisure and at low cost. Great games are fascinating; they take on a life of their own. Playing them, we sometimes experience things that we have never experienced before and probably never will again. As usual, I jump to metaphysical conclusions from simple facts, but if you doubt my assertions, pay attention to what happened to me in 1980CZ.

1980CZ was one of the three games I played in the 1980 Postal Diplomacy Tournament. While playing the game, I called it "1980 Crazy". My country was Turkey.

My opening strategy was simple. I forthrightly proclaimed to the three countries on my border that I wanted to ally with two of my neighbors and attack the third. I figured that my neighbors would clamor to hop on the bandwagon rather than chance the alternative of being the odd man out. I couldn't have been more wrong.

Russia responded and said he was willing to ally for an attack on Austria. I heard nothing at all from either Austria or Italy. Not wanting to alienate Russia, who was being a bit unr asonable, but at least communicating, I let him take the

Black Sea in the opening move.

Both the Austrian and Italian players missed the first move and were replaced. Hoping to get my game plan going, I wrote Italy, letting him know of my willingness to go against Austria with Russia and then against Russia, provided I had a dependable ally with him. Apparently the number of standby players for the tournament was small. At any rate, the two new players stuck together like strands of yesterday's spaghetti.

Russia had incredibly good luck in the Fall 1901 moves and obtained four builds. The Russian builds sent a shock wave through the game that roughly equalled the shock that would hit the stock market if California slid into the sea* Everyone on the board told me that I had to stop my alliance with Russia and join them in attacking him. When I asked what I would get out of it, there was a silence that could be heard all the way to Kansas.** Maturally, I refused to attack my only ally, and hoping for better terms, I told everyone so. Italy was sympathetic and tried very hard to make me think his Lepanto moves were really his way of helping me take Greece.

By Fall 1902, Russian forces were penetrating Germany's eastern frontier, and four Russian units were meeting a German counterattack in Scandinavia. At the same time, the French government started a fast slide into civil disorder. Germany, who was depending on France in every way - to help take out England, stave off Russia and ultimately control the Italian and Austrian alliance - followed on the heels of France into civil disorder.

I was still loyally allied with Russia, and was doing my best to stand off the

concerted attacks of I aly by sea and Austria by land. I was also hoping to find a

more promising course of action.

In Spring 1903, Russia attacked me. Naturally, there was no way I could defend Turkey effectively from attacks on three sides. My fate looked bleak. About this time, to divert myself from my diversion, I began writing press about the Sultan and his private yacht the Wrath of Allah. While the Sultan's fortunes were ebbing, his Teelings were running high.

By Winter 1903, Russian fleets were threatening the English coast, and Russian armies were running wild in Germany and France. Russia had only one problem. Austria

was starting to mount an effective attack against his southwest frontier.

I began to examine the board closely to see what my options were. My resources were scant. England sounded promising for an ally, but he was weak and far away. had two armies and two fleets. I was surrounded with my back to the wall. I was under no illusions about the real intentions of my enemies. Italy, at about this time, had decided that dividing Turkey with three was small time compared with the loot that avaited him in France. He sent a fleet and army west.

In 1904, as Turkey was crumbling under the blows of her attackers, Russia, in a piece of idiocy I have rarely seen, passed into civil disorder. Only four players remained. The two biggest ones were attacking me, and the fourth was so weak that he needed plenty of time just to dislodge the immobilized units around him. There wasn't

a center within reach that I could have for the taking, or for the asking.

Without one's homeland, a player can do little in Diplomacy. In this case, it was a foregone conclusion that if I continued to defend my homeland, I would be eliminated soon. If I had one center, far from my homeland, I would be considered a nuisance, something that would have to be dealt with eventually and in due course, but not a pressing matter. Diplomacy is funny that way. When you have five centers, you can be conveniently attacked, but when you are out of the way of the main conflict and down to one center with no hope for a comeback, it usually takes more effort than you're worth to get rid of you altogether.

Tunis was the only center I could reach before it was too late. Furthermore, in this game, with Italy keeping Austria honest in Turkey and hoping to find the pot of

gold in the West, Tunis offered some solid hope of sheltered waters.

I bided my time and at the best opportunity tried for the Tonian Bea. Success:

That fall I took Naples to repay with trouble the trouble Italy had caused me.

By Winter 1906, Tunis was my new home. I wrote Italy a nice letter, saying let's let byegones be byegones, and graphically portraying how little ambition I had and how I hoped just to survive in this game. He wrote back to tell me that if I was a good boy and didn't bother him, my survival was alright with him. Talways wanted to be a choirboy, so naturally I agreed.

Next, I turned my attention full-time to England. "I want to get these guys bad," I said, "and I'll do anything to help you win." He bought it because he needed it. Help from a one-center power is nothing to scoff at, if you've only got three centers yourself; however, with France, Germany and Russia in civil disorder, England's

potential was tremendous.

In later games, the English player turned out to be a very good player and scores today high up on the rating polls, but in this game, he was a rookie and I had to lead him by the hand. Perhaps he didn't need as much advice as I gave him, but he allowed me to give him advice, and my advice was good. England was of no use to me unless he became a major power, and I stayed up late many nights analyzing the board to make sure he knew how to use every edge he had.

By 1909, British armies were storming through the French countryside, and British fleets were steaming through the Straits of Gibraltar. Naturally, I helped by bouncing back to port an Italian fleet that hoped to make the Tyrrhenian Sea. England

was on a roll, and he began to speak in glowing terms of winning the game.

Meanwhile, my old friends Austria and Italy had cleaned up Russia, the Balkans, Turkey, and eastern Germany. Also, about the time that England captured Paris, they began to fight among themselves.

I was getting worried. The game would soon be over, and Turkey, would only be a

survivor with the center. I put through urgent calls to Italy and Austria telling them that their inability to cooperate would cost us the game. I made them a simple proposition. Both of them were to puppet for me, and I would see that they didn't make gains against each other and would be able to make a stand against England. My only requirement was that they should support me in the draw. To my surprise, they went along with it.

Thus, it came about that for one glorious year in Turkey's history, the Sultan, while stranded on a foreign shore with no homeland and no significant military power, nonetheless, ruled the world. I dictated moves to Italy and Austria, and I was England's closest and trusted advisor. Is it any wonder that England's steamroller came to a sudden halt at Malta, Milan, Munich, Berlin, and Saint Petersburg?

I consoled him as a trusted counselor must do, and I asked him, since there was no hope for a win, if he would support Turkey in the draw. This was the only favor I

ever asked him, and being a kind hearted chap, he didn't refuse.

In Spring 1913, the game ended in a four-way draw. Normally, four-way draws are not a cause for great celebration, but the Sultan, aboard his private yacht the Wrath of Allah, celebrated with wild women, champagne, and caviar.

THE MINISTRY OF MISCELLANY

GRAUSTARK, the Very First bulletin for the postal play of Diplomacy, is published every fourth Saturday by John Boardman, 234 East 19th Street, Brooklyn, New York 11226. Diplomacy was invented by Allan B. Calhamer and is published by Avalon-Hill Inc. of Baltimore. Postal Diplomacy games are available in GRAUSTARK for a game fee of \$20. This game fee includes your subscription as long as the game lasts, whether or not you are eliminated from it. With your entry fee, send in a list of the countries you'd like to play, in your order of preference. The rules for postal Diplomacy were published in GRAUSTARK 437. If you do not have a copy, send for one when you send in your entry fee. Subscriptions for non-players are 9 issues for \$6. Back issues from 405 (the beginning of 1984) are 10 issues for \$2. (A few issues from earlier years are available.)

Last November, with some misgivings, I changed the postal Diplomacy deadlines in GRAUSTARK from 3 to 4 weeks. This did not materially reduce the number of late or missing moves. The player who thinks that everything can be phoned in on Thursday night before the deadline will still do so, whether those Thursday nights are 3 or 4 weeks apart. And numerous players in New England and the greater Paltimore-Washington area will still labor under the delusion that a letter can be counted on to get from them to New York City in less than a week.

So how has it worked out? In the ten issues prior to this change of deadline period, there were 42 missed moves. (It is counted as 2 missed moves if, in the same issue, the same player misses moves in 2 different games.) Since GRAUSTARK went to a four-week deadline, there have been ten issues, and in them there were 57 missed moves. It has become quite obvious that, whatever may have been the cause of all these missed moves, the three-week deadline was not one of them.

I am not at this time going to return to the three-week deadline. However, I would like to have the comments of readers on this point, and I will print them in future issues.

This will probably be the last oversize issue of CRAUSTARK for several months, as the academic year just began. This means that press releases may have to vait an issue for publication, particularly if there is a game end, game reviews, or a large number of "Fall" moves in the issue.

If you have to phone in your moves - a procedure which I do not recommend - my home telephone number is 718-693-1579, and my office number in 718-780-5180. However, I am not likely to be home on Monday and Wednesday evenings before 9 PM, and it is very difficult to reach me on Fridays at all.

your message or gift. Except that there are a few problems.

On 19 August, messenger Mark Stancapiano, 28, dressed up as Rambo, and carried a phony Soviet assault rifle, was spotted "on his way to deliver a letter to a law office across from the court building." (A lot of lawyers subscribe to GRAUSTARK; perhaps one of them could tell me whether this is standard procedure.) Three dozen offi cers converged on the court building, including one who shot himself in the foot while trying to get off an elevator. This was the only casualty; Stancapiano was taken into custody without incident and charged with "disorderly conduct".

All things considered, it might have been better if Stancapiano had dressed up, not as Stallone in Rambo, but as Stallone in his earlier hit A Party at Kitty and

Stud's.

(New York Times & Newsday, 20 August 1985)

No one should underestimate the extent to which people are willing to go in support of our armed forces and their Commander-in-Chief. In an editorial on 17 August, the New York Post gave its full support to Atyorney General Edwin Meese's war on drugs. However, his burning of 300,000 marijuana plants and seizure of 620 poppies is left open to the criticism that "marijuana is like moonshine. Once the 'revenooers' leave, the growers are right back in the fields."

The Post's recommendations on this problem are entirely in keeping with the R. Emmett Tyrell column it printed 3 years ago, urging President Reagan to call out the armed forces and dismiss a refractory Congress. "If Uncle Sam is really serious about the drup problem," the editorial concludes, "he'll turn the army loose with orders to

take no prisoners."

In other words, as recommended by one of America's largest newspapers, no arrests are to be made; suspects are simply to be shot dead on sight by the U.S. Army. No prisoners are to be taken. If a large segment of public opinion, possibly a majority segment (as if that mattered any more) is willing to support such rigorous methods against the growers of marijuana, what will be done to the purveyors of the far more dangerous drug of Pacifism? What will be done, overseas, to those nations of persist in defying the imperial will of the Great Big United States of America?

On the 11th of last August, Our President, Commander-in-Chief, Alpha Male, and Supreme War Leader promised us His people that He would bomb the Soviet Union. It was because of this promise that a large majority of the electorate concurred in the ritual of His re-election. There is no limit whatever to the stringency with which Our. Presi

dent will act, or in which we His people will support him. Cet used to that.

It is to be expected that newspapers like the New York Post will support our Promi dent and our armed forces. The Post is a conservative Republican newspaper, if you will pardon the redundancy. But when similar language is borne by the liberal weekly

Were Yorker, you know that a trend is shaping up that extends all across the so-called "political spectrum". Yet this is what William Praff wrote, in the New Yorker of 27 liay 1985:

"Mr. Reagan declared a national emergency' because 'of extraordinary threat to the national security' posed by Nicaragua. The Sandinista leaders, by their intolerance and ideological intoxication, risk eventually destroying their own position, as Nicaraguan leaders have persistently done during the country's intermittent episodes of freedom. Mr. Reagan walks the path of his predecessors. History is with him. The Nicaraguans know that their destiny is to submit."

However, not everyone is so enthusiastic about the forthcoming subjugation of the insolent Nicaraguans by the armed forces of the Great Big United States of America Yet it is a surprise to find this carping criticism coming from an author who owes a great prosperity to American readers, and to the present-day international setting. Frederick Forsyth is famous for his spy novels, but in an interview published in the Saturday Review of July-August 1985, this ingrate gave us the following opinion:

"It's not always easy to retain a conviction that using the Contras to pick up a regional magistrate who happens to be a Sandinista and pulling his testicles off is really serving democracy."

Forsyth should realize, as should the Nicaraguans, that there is no limit at all to what the Great Big United States of America will do in order to ensure that its will shall prevail. Whatever it takes to bring the Nicaraguans to their knees, will be done. If testicles are insufficient, eyes, ears, and fingers will follow.

Forsyth's lily-livered approach to the Central American War deserves the fullhearted condemnation of the American people. A boycott of his novels should be sufficient to bring him into line. I suggest it to everyone who is thrown into a state
of patriotic indignation by his above-quoted words.

John H. Merriman's collection For Want of a Horse: Choice & Chance in History (The Stephen Greene Press, Lexington, Mass., 1985) looks good at first glance. This is a series of articles by various historians, in the tradition of J. C. Squires's 1930 classic If; or, History Rewritten. But it falls far short of the original, and shares with it an exaggerated notion about the role of the individual in history. We are asked to believe that the Stuart Dynasty would have remained on the British throne forever if the wind had not brought William of Orange to England in 1688. One author thinks that if Pocahontas had not saved the life of Captain John Smith, Virginia might not have become a slave state. (This leaves aside the question of the veracity of Smith's account.) Another thinks that World War I would not have taken place if the Archduke Franz Ferdinand had escaped the bungled, amateurish plot against him. Nor do they have real history straight. One of the contributors to this volume asserts that King Louis XVI and Queen Marie Antoinette were executed on the same day. Another believes that the treatment of Catholic tenants by Protestant landlords in 19th-century Ireland is a major grievance of today's Irish Catholic rebels.

There is also a preposterous story, of whose authenticity I stand in doubt, about how Mayor James "Last Hurrah" Curley is supposed to have assured the nomination of Franklin Delano Roosevelt by disguising himself as a Puerto Rican. Another tale from the same state nearly 2 centuries earlier explains how easily the American Revolution could have been forfended. However, as Barbara Tuchman points out in The liarch of Folly: From Troy to Vietnam, the British government of those days was aflicted by the sort of terminal foolishness against which the stars in their courses are helpless. Left unatalyzed in either book, and still not to my knowledge given a thorough examination, is the hypothesis that the British commanders "threw" the American Revolution because they feared that if King George III could suppress the rights of Americans, the rights of Britons would be next on his agenda.

THE REIGN OF SENILIO THE GREAT - XXX

When Senilio the Great was elevated to the throne of the Temporary Roman Empire in 1381 at the age of 97, hopes were high that he could restore the Empire to its former greatness. This small nation of The Four And A Half Kingdoms regarded itself, and still regards itself, as the only true and legitimate Roman Empire. It was and is an article of faith among its inhabitants that someday it will restore itself in all its glory over all the regions it had ruled in antiquity. Under the law of the Temporary Roman Empire, such nations as Italy, France, and England are mere temporary usurpers of territories that rightfully belong to the Empire, and will someday be returned to its rule.

The old dynasty, upon whose extinction Senilio the Great was elevated to the throne, had fought its share of wars. However, Senilio the Great and his supporters chose to regard its emperors as weak-willed, incompetent near-traitors who had given up hope that the Empire could ever be restored to its former glory. But after he had been on the Imperial Throne for four years, voices were heard that S nilio the Great

was also failing to restore the Roman Empire.

Eventually these malcontents gathered themselves into a group called Gesta Romanorum ("Roman Events"). Among themselves they debated why, more than five years after the elevation of Senilio the Great to the Imperial Purple, nearly a year after his triumphal Re-Coronation, imperial legions were not marching through Gallia, Graecia,

Aegyptus, Britannia, and all the other temporarily lost provinces.

The members of Gesta Romanorum concluded that the Emperor Senilio the Great was himself dedicated to the restoration of the Empire and the suppression of the subversive Christian sect, but that some of his advisers were diverting him away from this great destiny, secretly working against him, or negligently carrying out his policies and orders. It was their remedy to identify these advisers and root them out of the imperial service. Although not in total agreement with one another, chroniclers give the names of the principal members of Gesta Romanorum as the Emperor's major-domo Buchanus, the brothers Buccleius, the converted Jews Submontanus and Susanna Dominica, and the very devout Senator Helminthus.

At first they fixed upon the former major-domo, Missus, and procured his exile to the Chancery, a department of government from which few men ever emerged alive and in good reputation. When matters did not change to their satisfaction, they procured the

dismissal of the assistants of Missus, Pistorius and Urinatorius.

With these men gone, the policies of Senilio the Great were still too moderate and not forceful enough for the Gesta Romanorum. Johanna Ecclesiae Patrici was dismissed from her high government position, the title of which is still a matter of debate among historians. Various lesser office holders, also suspected of seducing Senilio the Great away from the restoration of the Roman Empire, were also dismissed through the machinations of the Gesta Romanorum.

Much to this group's dismay, all these changes in the Emperor's cabinet and staff did not set the legions marching, or send any Christians to the Circus Minimus, or lead to any improvement in the Temporary Roman Empire's economy, foreign policy, or military posture. Gesta Romanorum merely concluded that they had not yet rooted out all the "closet moderates" ("modici vestiarii") who were giving the Emperor bad advice.

As the leaders of Gesta Romanorum were preparing a manifesto demanding the dismissal of the Prefect for Foreign Affairs, Prefectius, one of their younger members, Tyrrhellius, rushed in and gasped out that he knew the adviser who was really leading the Emperor astray.

"Who is it?" Buchanus demanded. "Never mind Prefectius! Once we get rid of this one, the glories of the Roman Empire are certain to be restored." The others eagerly demanded from Tyrrhellius the name of the culprit.

"It's Nancia Poppaea Evita!" Tyrrhellius gasped. "The Empress!"

I'd like to point out that the consequences of not voting in an INVR=yes situation are very severe (the possible end of the game), while an NVR=no merely forces the players to play one more season. NVR=no and draws include all survivors are the two best houserules, please don't change them.

((I'11 stay with the present situation for the time being. It's been my experience that if one player is holding out against a draw to which the others agree, his identity seldom remains in doubt for very long. And "draws include all survivors" is not

a GRAUSTARK house rule, but a rule of Diplomacy.))

SCOTT TENDERING: A couple of years ago I was reading books from a library about how good SPI games were. Then, I went to my local hobby store to see if they carried any of their games. To my dismay, SPI was out of business. What I please would like to know is how (and why) did SPI die?! Like I said, this question has been killing me

for years.

((Simulations Publications Inc. spread itself rather thin my comparison with its principal competitor, Avalon-Hill. More games were published, but the boards and pieces were not of comparable quantity. Then a difference of opinion developed between SPI's stockholders, and one group which constituted a small majority decided to sell their interest to Tactical Studies Rules Inc. (TSR) When this deal was closed in 1982, rumors got around that each side was pulling a fast one on the other. The majority stockholders failed to tell TSR about thousands of dollars of claims that the minority stockholders had against SPI for designing games. And TSR used the assignments of voting rights that they'd bought to throw out of SPI the stockholder-employees who'd rented them these rights. TSR also refused to honor subscriptions to SPI's publications. A lawyer and war-gamer who heard about these peculiar arrangements informed me that, unless a deal was cut, someone would go to jail over these transactions.

((To this day, TSR has published a private version of the incident, when it bothers to say anything at all to war-gamers about the matter. For the current state of the affair, I refer readers to Dr. John Farewell, Game Exchange, 61 Midland Ave., Stamford, Conn. 06906. He is also a good source for information on the SPI games that TSR has not reprinted in new editions. Another source of information about out-of-print games is Earl E. Whiskeyman Jr., The Gamer's 'Zine, Connecticut Came Club, 27 Mark St., Milford, Conn. 06460. And some of these games may be for sale by Lou Zocchi, 01956 Pass Rd., Gulfport, Miss. 39501. Several months ago, some back-issue SPI games were still available from Bill Forrester, 535 NW 31st Avc., Gainesville, Fla. 32609.))

These men have repeatedly published forged 'zines attributed to other people, and when caught out have had the effrontery to defend such comment. Whenever we deal with Linsey or Coughlan, we are dealing with proven, admitted, unregenerate forgers. That is the

starting point with them.

((One of their first forgeries was a 'zine that purported to be an issue of John Michalski's Brutus Bulletin. Several people seem to have collaborated in it besides them, including David Perlmutter, who has since dropped out of Diplomacy, and Rod Walker, who has since apologized to the hobby. Over Michalski's name, Cough Pan propagated some viciously racist statements about blacks. While Michalski was an outspoken conservative, he is not to the best of my knowledge a racist. Coughlan's attempt to make him seem one cannot be endorsed or excused by any human being whose opinion is worthy of respect. Coughlan later claimed to excuse this conduct by saying that he himself is black. I have never been so unfortunate as to meet him, but I do not believe this for a minute. Michalski has since dropped out of postal Diplomacy. He told me that this was for financial reasons, but I cannot help feeling that dismay over this forgery may have been part of it.

((A few months ago, Kathy and John suffered a fire at their place, and they have since not been able to locate the letter which Linsey sent to Kathy's daughter. Since Kathy saw this letter and I didn't, I now have to refer to her and John's publications for its text. If you want further information about this letter, you will have to apply to them. If you want to check Linsey's assertion that no such letter ever existed, you will simply have to make your own decision as to who is the more honest and reliable person - Pruce Linsey or Kathy Byrne. This is not a difficult decision for

most postal Diplomacy players.

((Incidentally, it was on Kathy's urging that I sent Bruce the remainder of his GRAUSTARK subscription. Since she was the injured party, I saw no reason to continue a policy which she was willing to abandon. In GRAUSTARK #508 I explained why Bruce's personal pathology made it unlikely that he could comprehend the idea that he was capable of doing anything wrong.

((Those circulars, whoever may have written them, were vitiated by the fact that they were signed by Linsey's and Coughlan's names. Dick Martin's letter in The Not for Hire #3, which just came out, really covers the whole issue so thoroughly that I can add nothing to it. See my reply to Ed Wrobel's letter on page 12 for the address.

((Incidentally, one of our hobby's older troublespots has broken out again. Page 12 of The Not for Hire #3 is an announcement by "Bernie Oaklyn" of a new postal gaming 'zine, The Edge of Creation. In fact, no such person as "Bernie Oaklyn" exists. This is one of the many, many pseudonyms of Buddy Tretick, who is so crooked that a dog would have to turn around to bite him twice on the same leg. Steve Langley, the publisher of The Not for Hire, was obviously not in the hobby when Tretick's dishonesty was our major topic of conversation, or he wouldn't have run this ad. Tretick plays in his own games under fake names, does not print moves of people he doesn't like, and falsely informs players that everyone but himself has voted for a draw. Tretick is the wellhead from which such streams and Linsey and Coughlan originated.))
