THE MINISTRY OF MISCELLANY

GRAUSTARK is published every four weeks - and this will continue, despite some good cases made to the contrary. Some readers observe that they tend to overlook deadlines if they come too far apart. But others, particularly west of the Mississippi, would be put under too much time pressure if GRAUSTARK returned to the three-week deadline which was in effect until last November.

In several of the present games players are asked for moves by "IMMEDIATE RETURN IMIL". This requirement is sometimes made so that the game is not delayed by a "Spring" retreat, or by a "Winter" turn in which only one or two players have builds or removals. The same considerations that have led to the four-week deadline have also made immediate return mail more important if the games are not to be further slowed down.

And yet the concept of "immediate return mail" (or a telephone call) seems to give some people problems. Very elastic interpretations of this term seem to be in use. In such games, all players should be informed of the build, removal, or retreat as quickly as possible so that they can plan and negotiate their next moves.

If you are in a game in which another player has been asked for an immediate return move, it might be a good idea, if you feel you can do it, to send in alternative orders depending upon which of the available alternatives the other player should choose.

Two weeks ago, in the company of Albert A. Nofi and Dennis Casey, I visited the battleground at Gettysburg. A 2000-word account of this visit and my impressions of the battle and locality will appear in two weeks in THE VALOR OF IGNORANCE, my bulletin for the postal play of Pax Britannica. I would rather have put it into GRAU-STARK, but there is not enough space here if the one-ounce limit is to be maintained. Besides, of my three war-gaming fanzines, THE VALOR OF IGNORANCE deals with the era closest in time to the Slaveholders' Rebellion.

If you get my science-fiction and fantasy fanzine DAGON, you'll find the report in today's issue, #325, as well. Otherwise, send a 22¢-stamped, self-addressed envelope for THE VALOR OF IGNORANCE "4, in which the report will appear.

The so-called 40th issue of <u>Diplomacy World</u>, which was recently mailed out, is of course a fake. If Brux Linsey says he wasn't involved in its production, he lies. If Gary Coughlan says he wasn't involved in its production, he lies. If Mark Berch says he wasn't involved in its production, he lies. If Buddy Tretick says that he was not involved as inspirer and preceptor of the aforementioned gang of forgers, he lies.

But then, we're all used to that sort of thing already.

Has anyone noticed the remarkable similarities between the French attack on New Lealand and the Israeli attack on Tunisia? the group of young Great Neck players who came into the hobby a few years ago. This is his first win in GRAUSTARK. Unfortunately, pressure of college work forces him to withdraw from GRAUSTARK play for the time being.

Reviews of this game appear on pp. 8 and 9. In a sense, 1982IM is a "re-run" of 1981HM. In that game, five of the 1982IM players and two others went at each other, and a classic "Russo-Italian Steamroller" developed. The Russian and Italian players wanted to draw the game between them, without first going to the bother of eliminating the three other survivors. This is contrary to the rules of Diplomacy, and so eventually 1981HM was "thrown" to Hector Roybal, playing Russia. They then went at it again, with the five players who sought a second round all playing different countries from those they had played in 1901HM.

For the roster of this game see p. 9. The players from 1981HM are Belliveau, Corbin, Ellis, Ferguson, and Roybal. Roybal's resignation seems to have been the result of a dispute or fit of pique, but the reviews are silent on this point.

1982III - GAME REVIEW!

RANDY ELLIS (Germany): Here is my endgame statement for 1982IM. I want to thank you for running the game with your usual meticulous precision.

Alas, I seem to have lost all of my back issues of GRAUSTARK when I moved back from Lawrence to Kansas City this spring. Thus, please forgive me if my comments here are rather vague since I am forced to rely upon my memory of this lively game rather than the records. Oh well! Anyway, this game began with Ken Corbin, the English player, openly declaring war upon me. I attempted to enlist French assistance against England but John Ferguson was occupied by Italy's all-out assault in 1901-02. I was frustrated that John would not even supply one unit to fight England; especially considering that the Italian player foolishly opted to bypass Tunis in 1901 thus keeping Italy at a measley 3 centers. In any case, I made a fatal decision. I decided that John and Ken were allied and I declared war on France while still fighting England. I thought I could do well as long as Italy distracted France and I think I would have done relatively well had not Bob Bragdon intervened. Bob, the irascible Russian Czar, was faced with an Austro-Turkish alliance and was in desperate straights. I reasoned that Bob would leave me alone since ha had his hands full in the South. Bob took a gamble and stebbed me by occupying Silesia. His gamble worked well as John supported him into Munich while England took Denmark from me. I was now down to 3 weak centers and completely at the mercy of England/France/Russia. Figuring I had nothing to lose, I wrote to Ken Corbin offering my country as a puppet state in return for survival. Much to my surprise, he accepted!! He also convinced the French and Russians to quit picking on me! I was astounded! In any case, I played the role of subserviant suppet for a couple years. Gradually, I pressed the issue and was granted more and more autonomy until, at last, I was recognized as a fullfledged and equal member of the mighty E-F-G-R alliance. Italy, Austria, and Turkey fought well but they were no match against a united West / Russia. Italy and Austria gradually were annexed while Turkey (first Hector Roybal and then Lawrence Chafetz) fought desperately to maintain strength. It soon became obvious that the mighty E-F-G-R would end soon as Turkey was reduced to fewer and fewer centers. Although I briefly talked to Russia and England of alliances after Turkey's demise, I negotiated more seriously with John Ferguson's Feance. John and I both felt that Ken and Bob were too close - too "tight" if you will as allies. Rightly or wrongly, we made preparations for the big stab. I should have known what the result would be. Anyway, we both tried to convince Chafetz to side with us before we stabbed. Chafetz would not respond. We stabbed anyway, and if I don't say so myself, I think it was a fairly good stab. We took Belgium, Budapest, and an Italian center (Naples?) from England all in 1 season. I hoped Russia would side with us but predictably, he turned on me with fury. Ken concentrated on attacking me while allowing France to enter England proper unmolerted. I was in trouble and was more so when at a critical point the USP"S" failed to deliver my orders and I committed a critical NMR. From that point on, victory was well beyond my grasp. Don't get me wrong; I think I would have lost anyway. I have to hand it to Ken and Bob; they cooperated very well against me and they succeeded om getting Turkey's crucial aid. The NMR simply caused me to die faster than I would have otherwise. Anyway, I opted to try to give John the victory by throwing what centers I could to him. I think I failed but we'll see. Anyway, I would like to thank all of you for a most enjoyable game. I look forward to meeting all of you again sometime; perhaps next time the results will be different!

1982IM - GAME REVIEWS

BOB BRAGDON (Russia): Congratulations to John Ferguson (France) on an outstanding game & a much-deserved victory. '82IM had several interesting features. It lasted 17 years but saw only two major shifts in alliances. The alliance that dominated most of the game was an unusual grouping - France, England, Germany & Russia! The players included several colorful, domineering characters, but the one who finally emerged victorious was the quiet French fox.

My own drift into the F/E/G/R partnership resulted from early troubles with Austria, Turkey, & Germany. The revelation in 1902 that Austria was not a friend but an enemy (like the other two) forced me to seek an arrangement with the only other country in a position to help - England. Fortunately for me, England also needed help:

the Anglo-French campaign against Germany was bogged down.

The resultant E/F/R agreement, engineered by Ken Corbin (England), was close to a stroke of brilliance on his part. England supported me into Denmark, enabling me to keep enough units to stalemate Austria & Turkey. In return, I supported France into Munich, crippling Germany and facing him with a two-front war. Randy Ellis (Germany) quickly sought entry into our alliance in order to survive. Suddenly, the fading fortunes of E, F, & R had become a 4-way alliance that nothing could stop.

Nothing except internal quarrels - & they almost did us in several times. Usually, Ken was the peacemaker. Once, Randy wisely avoided a build when my suspicions had been aroused by a misunderstanding over a center. I did what I could to raise Randy's morale, under siege from Turkish and Austrian press accusing him of treachery. I still believe that such accusations were wrong; Randy's switch of alliances had been provoked by his former "friends" sitting on the sidelines while he did most of the work & took the brunt of the battle. He would have been a fool if he had let himself be eliminated because of a misplaced sense of loyalty to such "friends".

Subduing Italy, Austria, & Turkey was very slow going, however. Much time was taken in breaching their near-stalemate lines and in edging E/F fleets into the Med.

When the last of the three opponents, Turkey, had been nearly eliminated, the French fox emerged. John 1982IM - GRADSTARK, John Boardman John had seemingly taken a back seat in alliance coordination previously. Now he took the lead in proposing a F/G/R move against England. I demurred, partly because my hands were still tied up with Tur-. key, partly because an anti-English stab was unpalatable; Ken Mad, after all, saved my bacon in 1902.

The rest was a gradual French approach to victory. F & G hit England; I sided with E, making peace with Turkey, who then joined us. The resulting East-West war naturally favored the Powers at extreme east and

most. First Germany, then England was eliminated. Larry Chafetz ... (Turkey) and I may have had chances to stop France short of 18 centers. Perhaps I could have somehow arranged a vital fleet build in St. P at some point; perhaps Larry was a bit slow in getting some of his units into battle. In any case, in the crucial concluding moves I definitely goofed in leaving Munich undefended & John outsmarted me around Scandinavia and St.P.

Nice going, John. Add this win to your Cornell accom; lishments! Thanks to all, Friend & foe alike, for a most colorful game. But complexities of partnership can be interesting and rewarding.

JOHN FERGUSON (France): Before I begin, I would like to give credit to the ally who, more than any other, helped me to win this

game. This ally was, of course, the United States Postal Service.

The Post Office eliminated my other ally, Randy Ellis, and also eliminated by opponent, Ken Crbin. As a matter of fact, I may not have won this game without its valuable assistance. I don't feel the satisfaction that I would have felt if Diplomacy had been the major factor, as opposed to postal inefficiency.

Although I have only been playing postal Diplomacy for five years, I think that I can safely say that this game was one of the most poculiar games ever to have been played in GRAUSTARK. It was a rematch of 1980HM with 4 of the original 7 players participating. I started off lousy: one one build after 1901. Italy and Germany were attacking me, and I was a virtual puppet of Ken Corbin's. It was only the success of the Austrian-Turkish alliance that allowed Ken Corbin to coordinate a successful alliance between England, Germany, Russia and France against Italy, Austria and Turkey. Since we outnumbered them, it was only a matter of time (A long time) before we successfully broke their power. After the downfall of Italy, and Austria, it seemed that the "Alliance" had broken into two factions: French-German and Anglo-Russian. Randy and I conversed quite often. I had met Randy at an Origins in Baltimore a few years earlier, and we trusted each other much more than Bragdon and Corbin. This lead to our successful stab of Corbin around 1910 (I don't have the back issues with me so I can't be sure of the date). Soon after, my pal the postman failed to deliver Randy's orders during a crucial turn, allowing Bragdon to capitalize. Randy became quite upset, and decided that since he was going to die, he would rather have me be the benefactor rather than Bragdon who had taken Berlin carlier in the game. From then on, diplomacy played no role in the game as it was "me against the world." With the help of Mr. Postman, who eliminated Ken Corbin, I have arrived at the current state of affairs. As I said earlier, I am happy to win, but not happy about the role of NMR's in my victory. This will probably have been my last game in GRAUSTARK for some years to come (if not forever) since I have found Cornell to be far more challenging than high school. I am forced to study more in order to receive worse grades (sigh!) I certainly don't have the needed four or five hours per week to spend letter writing at the beginning of a Diplomacy game. So good bye, good luck, and may the blessings of "Our President, Commander-in-Chief, Alpha Male, and Supreme War Leader of the Great Big United States of America" be with you.

JIM MCCARTHY (England): As a late entrant I know little about this game. When I took over England I wrote the other three participants asking for an update and making proposals. Bill Drakert and Peter J. La Rocco replied and each gave a capsule review. Thank you both. No one wanted my proposals so I faced a three way alliance. France fell and Russia decided to go for the win. Austria's revenge for the ensuing Russian stab was to offer to work with England for a draw and to give me the win otherwise. A most generous offer, Bill. Thanks. I enjoyed working with Bill for the draw. Peter you almost did it - good try. John Boardman thank you for your quality gamemastering and always punctual 'zine. Oh! A public apology to Bill for the NMR that cost you a unit.

I do have a question, if its in order. At what point do starting players accept a standby as having a right to go for a win? (or even to participate in a draw). I began with an unearned 13 centres. I ended with 16. Had the game continued and I was able to take the two Austrian-controlled cenres I would by the rules be the winner. But would I truely have deserved the win, having played say six of 20 game years? I'm not sure in my own mind. How about others?

1984B - GAME REVIEW

JIM GOLDMAN (France):

I would first like to thank all concerned for a most enjoyable re-introduction to PD. Special mention is due Doug Clarke (Austria) for most adroit diplomacy.

My original intention was to take France, then England, then spread northern and

southern wings to crush Italy and Russia against Austria. France fell to Germany and Italy even more rapidly than we had expected (by a year); England, thanks to some confused play, was never able to get beyond a forlorn defense.

By 1902, I was sure that Austria would attack Russia in the Balkans; I still think that would have been better than attacking Italy. Although the attack on Italy was crushing, it left Austria's back open in the East, and Russia wasted no time in

stabbling Austria as severely as Austria had stabbed Italy.

At that point, I concluded that I would have to attack Russia in order to prevent a Russian victory, and that by diverting Italy, I would allow Austria to rebuild itself into a suitable anvil for the hammering of Russia and Italy. Fortunately, a desperate England offered at this time to become a puppet in exchange for long-term survival.

I have spent years writing amphibious warfare scenarios for the Navy, so the campaign in the Baltic was familiar to me. With its fleets trapped, Russia could do little more than give ground grudgingly, while England and Germany could throw fleets

and armies around at will.

Unfortunately, the very likelihood of a German victory drew Austria, Italy, and Russia into a coalition considerably outnumbering my own on the Western and Central Fronts. With the coalitions locked, further diplomacy was useless, and a draw was forced. As a reward for his steadfastness, I decided to let England share in the draw --although he had played poorly in the beginning, after 1903, I could not have done better had I planned his moves myself. Thus, a five-man draw.
