WAR IN FAMILIAR SURROUNDINGS

"I don't see why we should stand by and watch any nation go Communist simply because its people do nothing." - Henry Kissinger

"Damn, damn, damn the Filipinos, Cross-eyed kakinak ladrones! Underneath the starry flag, Civilize 'em with a Krag, And we'll all go back to our own happy homes." - U. S. soldier song, 1898*

During his 1984 campaign, President Reagan informed us that Corazon Aquino and her movement against President Ferdinand Marcos of the Philippines was Communistic. During one of the carefully staged "debates" He told His obstreporous opponent, the nation, and the world, that the only alternative to President Marcos was Communism.

Our President did not make any exceptions for Mrs. Aquino, or assert that it is wrong for Communists to start rebellions but right for them to win elections. If you follow the leadership of Our President, Commander-in-Chief, Alpha Male, and Supreme War Leader, you oppose Aquino as a Communist. If you do not believe Our Pre-

sident, what nation's president do you believe?

The present turmoil in the Philippines, where a Communistic guerrilla army is already in open warfare with the pro-American government, was neatly summarized by William F. Buckley in his New York Daily News column of 14 February 1986. Bucjley starts by saying that "democracy, particularly in its currently accepted, fanatical application (one-man, one-vote) is nothing more than a Western superstitition." He goes on to say that "The notion that democracy is actually an instrument by which the people can fine-tune public policy is a Western superstitition, along with the notion that anyone 18 years old, whether literate or illiterate, instructed or dumb, should participate in political decision-making." This notion, invented by 18th-century revolutionaries, and devoutly maintained by 19th- and 20th-century revolutionaries, is about to go down the drain in favor of stable, powerful, vigorous government.

(In New York City we found this out last year, when a pack of Pacifist malcontents tried to put on the city's ballot a ban on the presence of a U.S. Navy nuclear task force in our harbor. The state government promptly yanked this notion off the ballot;

such decisions are not for the dirty ignorant rabble to lay their hands upon.)

Rather than the discredited 18th-century notion of democracy, for what is the Great Big United States of America fighting? Buckley tells us that: "We have imperial responsibilities in the Western Pacific that have nothing to do with civic progress in that country." In short, the Great Big United States of America is not a democracy. it is, now and forever, an Empire. If people want to play with voting for or against candidates who uphold this Empire, fine, but neither here nor in the lesser nations should such things be allowed to interfere with the Great Big United States of America's high imperial destiny of world domination.

Ot er voices of the media are also supporting our imperial position in the Philippines. In an editorial of 20 February, the New York Post told us that "to place Philippine democracy above the strategic interests of the U.S. is a dereliction of duty." Secretary of State Shultz seems to believe the contrary, as the editorial quotes him. Shultz seems destined for the same rubbish heap as his weak-willed predecessors Cyrus

Vance.

According to the latest reports, a certain General Ramos has, in the Philippines,

cast his lot with the Communistic opposition of Aquino, Laurel, and the "New Peoples' Army". As this issue goes to press the only certainty is that Ramos, Aquino, and Laurel will all be shot dead soon. The only thing in doubt is when these anti-American subversives will meet this fate, and whether it will be at the hands of President Marcos' army or U. S. troops. For, if that last step becomes necessary, there can be no coubt that the U. S. Army will once again move into the Philippines and bring its malcontent people into line with imperial policy. From Chile through Grenada to the Far East the same constant applies. Every 'one of the lesser nations is going to have not the government its people think they want, not the government the Soviet Union wants it to have, not the government Castro or Khomeini or something called "Contadoro" thinks it ought to have, but the government that the Great Big United States of America wants it to have. Ultimately, that will include Russia itself. In the eyes of the Great Big United States of America, Russia is simply a slightly larger and colder version of Grenada.

Some people are so foolish as to believe that President Reagan was lying when Ke said that the only alternative in the Philippines to Marcos is the Communists. Just so such people don't get the wrong ideas, a statement on the matter was issued by the White House eight days ago. A short statement concluded with the words: "The President

is the final voice on foreign policy." (Newsday, 15 February)

This statement should straighten out the confusion that exists - a confusion which I have called "The Weasel and Lectern". The Weasel and Lectern is not, unfortunately, the name of a British pub; instead it is a phenomenon that you may see on television a day or two after Our President makes a major policy statement. A weasel-faced man behind a lectern appears and says that the President really didn't mean what He said, that instead He meant something else. It is about time to tell the weasel, and the people who are responsible for his appearance on television, that we His people are quite capable of knowing for ourselves what Our President thinks and says. We can read or listen to His words ourselves, and we already know that his is "the final voice."

During His campaign in 1980, Romald Reagan severely and repeatedly attacked his predecessor, whose name I cannot now remember, by accusing him of losing Iran. In Iran, as in the Philippines, a revolutionary leader came home to lead opposition to the government which, because it was supported by the Great Big United States of America, was the legitimate government. Acting the the instructions of the then U.S. President, the Shah of Iran fled without putting up a fight, and Ayatollah Khomeini now rules that country. When the same thing was tried in the Philippines, during the First Reagan Administration, President Marcos had the rebel shot as soon as his plane landed.

In short, Our President simply is not going to follow the example of His predecessor and let a loyal subject ally fall into unfriendly hands. Get used to that.

New postal war games are available from Rick Barr, P. O. Box 1873, Cave Creek, Ariz. 85331; 602-488-3148. Rules are \$1 and set-up fees are \$2 for each game. One of the games, Reformation, sounds like the board game A Mighty Fortress; it deals with the religious wars in 16th-century fermany. ("A goblet of poison can turn a losing position into a winner.") There is also Hemesis (a computer break-down wrecks the galactic empire), Moneylender (rivalry of the great banking houses of the Italian remaissance), Crisis (can you win the Fourth World War?), and Armageddon, which sounds like another of those dreary s-f novels and games about Our Barbaric Descendants. These games are all computer-moderated.

Two up-coming gaming conventions may be of interest. Fantasy Role-Playing games (FRP) will be featured at Princecon XI on the weekend of 14-16 March. It is sponsored by the Simulation Games Union, Whig Hall, Princeton University, Princeton, N. J. 00544; 609-452-3626. Registration is \$8, and opens at 3 PM on the 14th. "You may... run your character in Princecon scenarios as many times as you wish during the weekend, subject only to the endurance of yourself and your character." Twenty dungeon-masters are lined up, so things should be lively. Registration at the door is \$10. This year there's a new FRP scenario: "Floyds, the international insurance cartel" is being hit with an a alanche of phoney claims and only YOU can find out what is behind them. (Remember, the young WASP gentlemen of Princeton are brought up to assume

that any claim made against daddy's insurance corporation is invalid until proven otherwise.) The flier makes no mention of accomodations, but then people who attend FRP conventions don't plan on sleeping anyhow.

Last year Ray Heuer took to Princecon 50 copies of Dark Dungeons, the Christian tract which claims that FRP gaming is a wile of the devil. He handed them out to great hilarity among the gamers. I plan to do the same at the gaming conventions I will attend this summer.

MaryCon'86 will take place at Mary Washington College at Fredericksburg, Virginia, on the weekend of 30 May-1 June. This year Allen B. Calhamer, founder of Diplonacy, will be present. Depedning upon which "package" you choose, membership and loging can run from \$35 to \$77. THE MAILS STILL GET THROUGH

People frequently try to telephone me with their postal Diplomacy moves. Please note that this is postal Diplomacy. During the present semester, I am not likely to be available to home until 9 PM on Monday through Thursday, and not predictably home on Friday or Saturday nights at all. If you must call in your moves, please keep this in mind, as my wife has wisely decided not to get involved in writing down orders in a game she does not wish to understand. If I am not available at my home number (718-693-1579) it is sometimes possible to reach me at 718-780-5180.

However, mail is the most reliable way by which I can be reached - if you allow enough time. If you think that a letter can be counted on to reach Brooklyn from the corridor reaching from Maine to Virginia in less than a week, you are living in a fool's paradise. Ten days should be allowed from the west coast. It doesn't always take this long, but it can. Anyone who thinks that a letter dropped into a mailbox in San Francisco, Boston, or Baltimore on Jednesday will predictably reach New York City by Friday is temperamentally unfit to function in the contemporary world. A great nation can choose, as ours has done, among two alternatives. It can conquer the world, or it can have an efficient postal service. Not both.

This is particularly important for the enclosed moves, since so many "alliances" supported moves that weren't made. I suspect either a large number of backstabs, or a flood-tide of hurred last-minute changes that will reach me next Tuesday.
