1983AJ - GAME REVIEW

ED WROBEL (stard-by, Italy): Upon entering this game as a stand-by I was surprised to find Italy apparently aiding an Anglo-German alliance against Austria. This looked to me to e the quickest road to extinction. The previous Italian playor - and current Austrian player - explained that Austria refused to approve a draw including France. And England refused to eliminate the one-center France.

I decided to form a stalemate like against England and Germany rather than attack Austria. I knew nothing of the dispute over France except that it was not my fight. Preserving Italy was my goal and a nice firm wall against the dominate powers seemed the best way to reach it. Surely England would succumb to the temptation to eliminate France and a draw would be approved. He did but still the draw was vetoed. Before the game ended Rusnak assured me that he approved the Franceless craw; after the game he repeated his assurances when I questioned him about it at MaryCon. Rusnak went on to speculate that the German player actually vetoed the draw, and convinced the Englishman that Austria was still at fault.* Thus, the only way (and the best way, anyhow) to end the game would be by trading centers to allow one of them to win.

In my circle of gaming friends the English capitulation is known as "toadying" and carries distinctly unpleasant connotations. Congratulations to the German player if he did succeed at such a ploy. I can see no reason for Rusnak to lie to me after the game about his vote (unless he was practicing for the next game ...) so perhaps the German dil cast the last veto. If the Englishman traded his virtue for consideration in a future game, then shame on him. If there can be such a thing as "sportsmanship" in the game of Diplomacy, crossgaming is as great a transgression

as deceit of the gamesmaster.

* - In actuality it was continually the Austro-Hungarian player who voted against the draw, both before and after the elimination of France. In fact, he sent in conditional moves all the way to "1930", maintaining his stalemate position and his rejection of the draw. Under the circumstances, the way to get a draw would be to let Postal Rule 21-B take its course: "If three full game years go by, beginning with a 'Spring' move and including 'Winter' moves, without a piece being built, removed, or annihilated, and if no power gains or loses a net number of supply centers" then the game is a draw. These conditions have never yet been met in a GRAU-STARK game, but 1983AJ came closer to them than any other game ever has. - JB

Brux's forgery of Diplomacy World "40 was an overwhelming favorite for "Best Feud Item

of the Year" - but then we have always known that Brux Linsey was pre-eminent in the field of forgery, and by now has compiled a record of dishonesty that would make Daniel Gorham or Charles Brannan turn green with envy. Chris himself won "Novice Feu er of the Year" with only one dissenting vote, while "Feud Wimp of the Year" went to the richly deserving Larry Peery.

W. Elmer Hinton Jr. recently sent along the following comment:

"The other day I got a strange piece of mail from a fellow who, not apropos of the conversation, inserted the statement that the President of his wargaming group was 'George Phillies, publisher of the first gaming zine.' Naturally this caught my eye.

"Do you know what he is babbling about?"

Well, sort of. For several years I have seen the claim that Phillies is "the publisher of the first amateur war-gaming 'zine". This is, of course, a total crock. CEMUSTARK #1 appeared in May 1963, which is several years before the earliest date I have seen claimed for Phillies' 'zine.

There was a time when Rod Walker and a possible figment, of his imagination named "Conrad Friesner von Metzke" or "Matzike" claimed to have begun a postal Diplomacy game in 1962. This game, which never existed, was even given the "Boardman Number" 1962A. However, Walker has since acknowledged this whole thing to be a hoax.

The Washington Post sent a reporter to cover MaryCon/DipCon, and a story was filed of the condescending and erroneous sort that is expected by science-fiction, war-gaming, and comic art fans whenever the daily press deigns at to recognize them. The reporter apparently got hold of Rod Walker (a risky undertaking) and filed a story about how he had founded the original postal Diplomacy 'zine away back around 1966. (I cannot assert categorically that this is what Walker really told the reporter. In my experience with the breed, what goes into the ear does not always come out in print.) As it happens, my step-daughter lives in Frederick, Maryland, and she sav this claim in the Post. She phoned me with the story, and wrote an indignant letter to the Post, set og them straight on some matters of hobby history.

In GRAUSTARK #510 I published a long article giving complete, unqualified, unquestioning support to the American attack on Libya on 15 April 1986. I am happy to report that the state of the readership is sound. Not one letter in opposition to my position came in. There was a letter of comment, but of a rather peculiar sort. The author, apparently managed to work his way through a four-page article without understanding it. As a teacher, I am quite aware of the fact that many people are utterly unable to extract the meaning from a simple passage of English prose. However, I do not understand how anyone could have read the lead article in GRAUSTARK #519 and then come away under the impression that I had any criticism whatsoever of the American and therefore altogether just, right, and proper attack on Libya.

I find myself in a situation far preferable to the one that I occupied during the First Americo-Vietnamese War. In those days, as veteran GRAUSTARK readers will recall, I was foolish enough to believe that war could be morally wrong when engaged in by the Great Big United States of America. And, as these readers will also remember, I encountered a great deal of opposition from GRAUSTARK's readers. Rod Walker accused me of "tirelessly insulting our nation". Charles Reinsel threatened me with physical violence. Several gamesmasters broke off trade relations with GRAUSTARK,

or attacked me bitterly in their own 'zines.

Things are much better now. There is a wisdom that most people do not fully realize, in the words of the 4th-century Roman veterinarian Flavius Renatus Vegetius: "Qui desiderat pacem praeparet bellum." These words ("He who desires peace, let him prepare for war.") do not only mean that if you build up a huge armed force no other nation will dare do anything that angers yours. They also mean that, if you would

live in peace within your own society, at peace with your family, your neighbors, your colleagues, your employer, and the civil authorities, you must support every war made by the society in which you live. I defy anyone to determine how the opinions I expressed in "The Second Tripolitan War" could get me in the slightest possible trouble with the President and government of the Great Big United States of America.

David Berk, one of the people who recently wrote in an inquiry about postal Diplomacy in GRAUSTARK, asked me if I could plug his 'zine. I am going to do it, but I have some doubt as to how effective it will be. Berk's 'zine is entitled The Communist Diner and it's "no stamps for a sample (radical)". I rather doubt that, in the present temper of the American people, particularly as it is reflected by the GRAUSTARK readership, there we be much interest in anything with the name "Communist" on it. The American people we shown, at the polls and elsewhere, that they have a healthy and heart-felt revulsion against the essentially Communistic notion that peace is preferable to war. My own observations locally, in a city once pervaded by Pacifistic sentiment, indicate strong support for the present war with Libya.

As an example: On the day after the war began with the attack on Tripoli, I was visiting the campus of another college in New York City. As I prepared my lecture notes in an empty classroom, I could not help but hear a philosophy class that was holding a vigorous meeting in the next room. This course, taught by a member of the clergy, was discussing "ethics". The previous night's American attack on Libya came in for considerable discussion, and every time it was mentioned a great feral roar went up from the students. If these are the views on a college campus, what is being

said in blue-collar bars, Gulf Coast resorts, or Ku Klux Klan meetings?

You'll find Berk's address elsewhere in this issue, with those of other new readers, under the heading "Hew Blood". But I fear that, with the American people in their present temper, he won't find many takers.

Another sort of international combat besides war games has been occupying me this month. The 13th World Cup competition in soccer is now under way in Mexico City, and the date of publication of this issue marks the boundary between the first and second rounds. The first round, in which only 8 of the 24 competing teams have been eliminated, are a sert of feeling out of theoopposition, and some of the teams have obviously been playing under wraps. But single-game sudden-death eliminations hegin with the second round, and we can expect some vigorous play.

My pick, as matters stand now, is France, though the Soviet Union, Brazil, and West Germany also look good. Denmark is a good possibility as a dark horse. MBC will be telecasting many of the later-round games, and the final, which will take

place on the 29th.
